Gary Lawrence, pastor of the Northside Baptist Church, will be speaker at the Sunday night service. Music will be presented by the choir of the First Baptist Church.

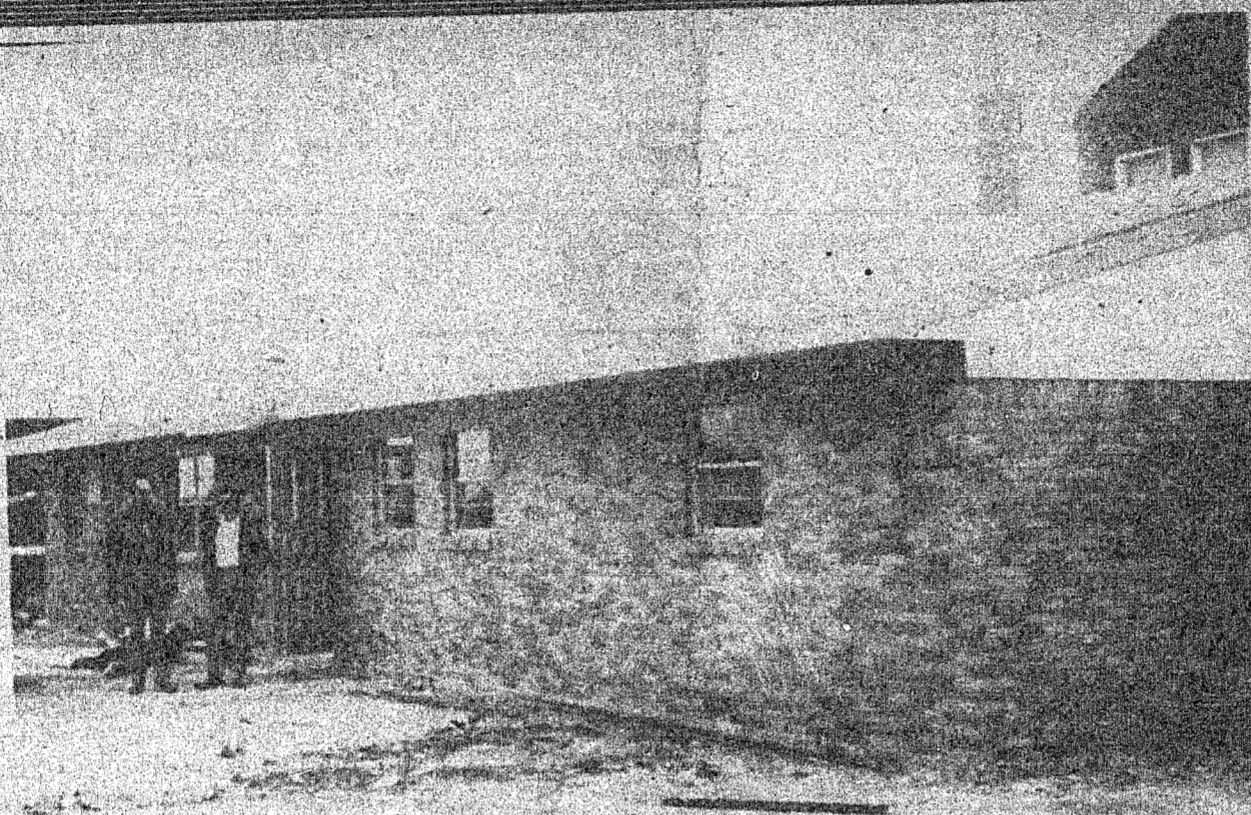
