Santa Anna Native Retires From Austin Weather Bureau

Wilbourn Weaver of Austin, son of Mrs. Burgess Weaver of Santa Anna, retired Saturday, October 12, after nearly 27 years as meteorologist with the National Weather Service at Austin. Before that time he was civilian forecaster at Carswell Field in Fort Worth and with the Big Spring weather bureau.

A graduate of Santa Anna High School with the class of 1925, Weaver is also a graduate of Baylor University. He served during World War II as head of a weather post at Tinker Field in Oklahoma. He joined the Austin staff in 1948.

While the raw data involved in the weather business has not changed, the instruments for collecting the information is constantly updated. The instruments are much more refined and forecasting is by computer rather than human ciphering. Weaver said

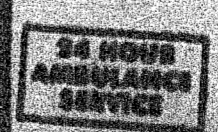

TWO VISITORS ATTEND MEETING OF LIONS CLUB

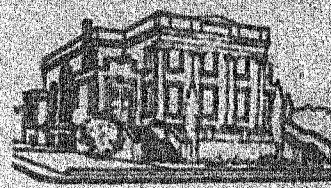
