Some areas of the county received as much as 15 inches of rain during the two-week wet spell during September.

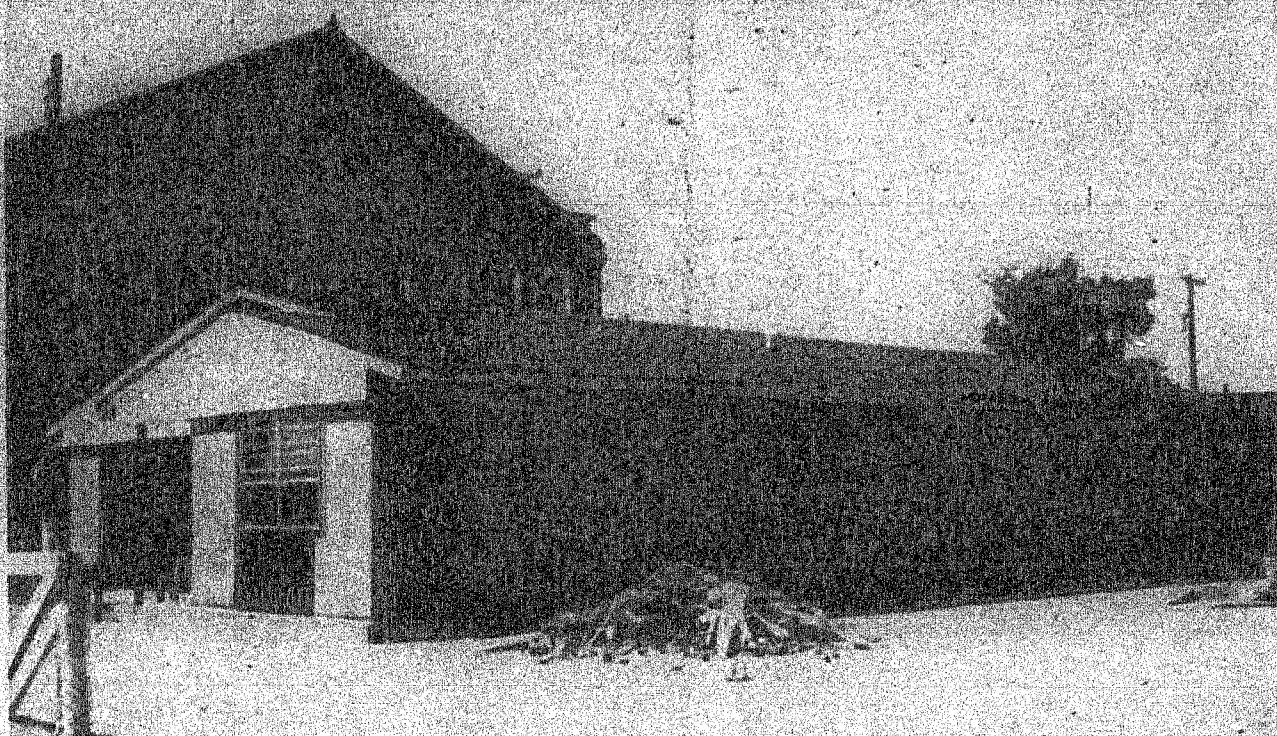
## SCOUT OUTING SET SATURDAY
