We have long admired the carvings of J. E. Calfall that are displayed in the window at Bailey Hardware Co. The carvings are on steer horns and are very delicately done.

We just found that the art of carving on horn or ivory is called scrimshaw, and it is considered the only American folk art that is truly indigenous to this country. The technique originated among American sailors many years ago.

The original carvings were on whales teeth, walrus tusks, bones or seal shells. The scratches and dots in the designs were filled in with ashes or ink, then rubbed to bring out the design.

No one seems to know where the term "scrimshaw" originated, but it is truly an interesting and exacting art and hobby.

August Rainfall Totals 5.15 In.

August rainfall in Santa Anna for the month of August totaled 5.15 inches at the official gauge in the east part of town. The rain fell on seven days during the month with the largest single amount being 1.40 inches on August 5. A 1.20 measurement was recorded on August 27, and 1.15 on the tenth of the month.

The August rainfall is over half the total for the year which reached only 9.55 by September 1. The same nine-month rainfall total for 1973 was 18.50 inches.

Congratulations to Mrs. Todd and Miss Webb for their selection as employees of the month at the local medical center.

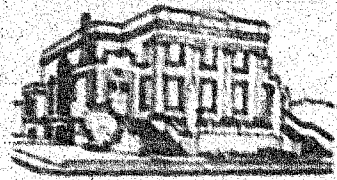

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Eternal City's Eternal Problem

(The following is excerpts from a story was written by Mike Ingram of Bossier City, La., a senior journalism student at Louisiana Tech. Mike is the son of Jim L. Ingram of Bossier City, a former Coleman County resident and 1934 SAHS graduate. Mike was in Rome, Italy this summer with a group of Louisiana Tech students in the annual Tech-Rome summer program.)

ROME- Gladiators have not left Rome; they have simply forsaken their tridents and swords for Fiats and motor scooters.

"All roads lead to Rome," and most Romans wish it weren't so; but ever since Julius Caesar banned chariots from the inner city 20 centuries ago, Rome has been struggling with its traffic.

But according to many Romans, the traffic now is less than it has been in years past. Most, though, don't say it's due to a basic change in Roman driving philosophy—simply a change in economics. Gasoline in Rome costs around 250 lire per liter or about \$1.30 per gallon, with other operating expenses on the same level.

Even so, the newcomers and tourists in Rome tell you that traffic here is "torture", "insanity", or even "hell." there is a saying around Rome that goes, "If you have a car, it's for use," and the Romans live by it.

Without a doubt, Romans seem to take a sadistic joy from using their cars with rush hour their climax of happiness. Romans have plenty of chances to use their cars, since Rome has four rush hours—morning, going to siesta, returning from siesta and evening.

Lucio Quaglia, a traffic engineer for the Auto Club of Italy says, "It's madness, utter madness. In a city of three million people there are five million motor vehicle trips in and out of the city daily."

When you combine rush hour with Romans, about one time out of five you come up with that

monument to human intelligence—the traffic jam. A wonder to behold, cars, buses and trolleys seem to spring up from the ground. As far as the eye can see, nothing but still, lifeless vehicles.

Unfortunately, this lasts for about 10 seconds. Then, from across the vastness, a timid Fiat beeps his horn. A second's wait and it is answered by another and then another. Suddenly the wildfire is loose, the plague is on the town and pedestrians must hold their ears against the roar.

Whether the jam lasts a minute or an hour, the horns continue, an inhuman cacophony of sound, like no other on this earth.

Even with jams and rush hours, Romans seem to be able to put up with anything, except walking. They say the bus is for peasants and the subway is for cattle, so what is left but your very own motor car.

Reasons for the congestion in Rome are many and varied. Aside from bureaucracy, inertia and lack of gumption, here are four reasons for the trouble: there are no main north-south or east-west arteries; the streets are narrow and cannot be widened; four or five streets all intersect at one time in various places around town; and the vast proliferation of automobiles. Rome has a car for every three people.

In the final analysis Rome has something no other city in the world has—Romans. To a true Roman, a traffic light is a tether to his soul and parking meters are a symbol of government greed.

But probably the best solution anyone has come up with yet as this: simply wait until the whole city is locked in a giant traffic jam then cover it with asphalt and start over again.

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No Screwworms In Coleman Co.

A steady increase in screwworms cases until sometime in October is foreseen by officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program.

Dr. J. E. Novy, director of field operations for the program, says increasing numbers of cases can be expected, particularly in far west Texas. "With the amount of rain that area has received, it may be an overwhelming increase," comments Novy.

Screwworms are larvae of the screwworm fly which enter wounds of warm blooded animals to feed on live flesh. They cannot tolerate cold weather and it is expected that cooler October weather will alleviate the problem in west Texas.

Of Texas' 437 August cases, 37.5 percent were in sheep, mostly in Crockett, Terrell and Val Verde counties. Goats, too, experienced trouble in the hill country and west Texas. Edwards joined Crockett and Val Verde counties in reporting most of the infestations in goats.

Coleman County did not have a confirmed case reported during the month of August.

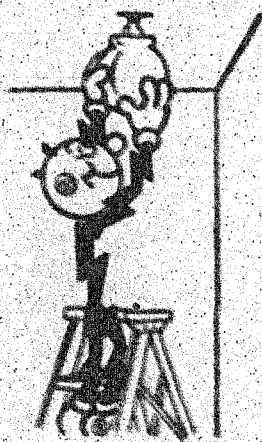

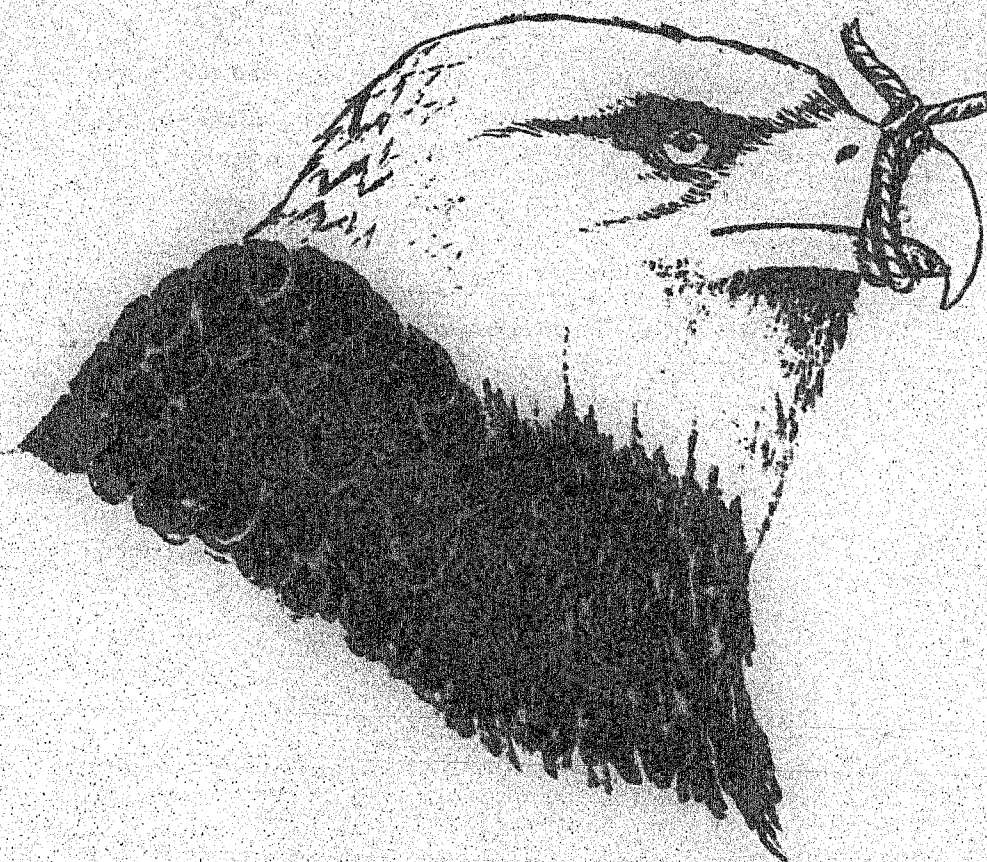
