Info About Artist

A great deal of interest has been shown in the World War II mural on a wall at the Wagon Wheel Restaurant in Santa Anna, and the signature only gives the name of the artist, Cpl. Edgar R. Aberman, and the date it was painted, August 1943.

It was also known that the local building was originally part of a military building at Camp Bowie at Brownwood and moved to Santa Anna in the late 1940's by Mrs. Erin Day. It first housed a grocery store and later the Clover Grill Restaurant. The mural was covered by sheet rock and shelving during the first renovation.

Locating the artist has come to a dead end this week, but the search has revealed some additional information about Aberman.

According to information provided by the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, Missouri, S-Sgt. Edgar Raymond Aberman was inducted into the service on May 7, 1943 in Chicago, Illinois. He served all his time at Camp Bowie as a draftsman, receiving his honorable

discharge on January 31, 1946 at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Aberman was born in Chicago December 9, 1924 and was 19 years old when he entered the service. He was not married at the time of service.

The military records also show that he attended the University of Iowa for five years, majoring in art, no doubt attending under the GI Bill.

Since the official records list Aberman as still living and entitled to privacy, his current address could not be revealed.

The Alumni office at the University of Iowa had no listing for their former student as he did not receive a degree from that school.

One last attempt to locate Aberman was a chance telephone call to the Chicago listing for R. Aberman, and the person answering knew of no one by the name of Edgar R. Aberman.

In the meantime, patrons of the local restaurant can enjoy the work of the young soldier from Camp Bowie.

WHEREAS, The independence guaranteed to the American people by the Constitution should be celebrated by appropriate ceremonies and activities during Constitution Week, September 17 through 23, as designated by pro-

clamation of the President of the United States of America in accordance with Public Law 915,

NOW, THEREFORE, I Mayor Joe Guerrero by virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Santa Anna (in the State of Texas) do hereby proclaim the week of September 17 through 23 as Constitution Week, in the City of Santa Anna, and urge all our citizens to pay special attention during that to our Federal Constitution and the advantage of American Citizenship.

Police Chief Craig Terry would once again like to ask ANYONE interested in the Neighborhood Watch Program to contact him at the Police Station or contact City Hall to sign up. HSU Establishes Grant Program

ABILENE--Hardin-Simmons University has established a Texas Equalization Grand Alternate Award of \$1,000 a year.

Gerry Armstrong, director of financial aid, said the award has been established in the light of proposed cuts in the budget and reduced funds for the Texas Equalization Grant (TEG) for students attending private and church related colleges and universities.

"This money does not come from state sources," Armstrong said. "It comes from a private source."

Armstrong said the award will be given "in lieu of the TEG."

The award will be given in increments of \$500 per semester and will be given in addition to other aid for which a student may be eligible, he said.

Armstrong credited the HSU administration and trustees for the "additional funding" to supplement the TEG.

"All we've been reading about lately is cuts in the state budgets," said Armstrong. "These cuts, whatever the final outcome, will adversely affect the Texas Equalization Grant program (TEG)."

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Opera House To Re-Open

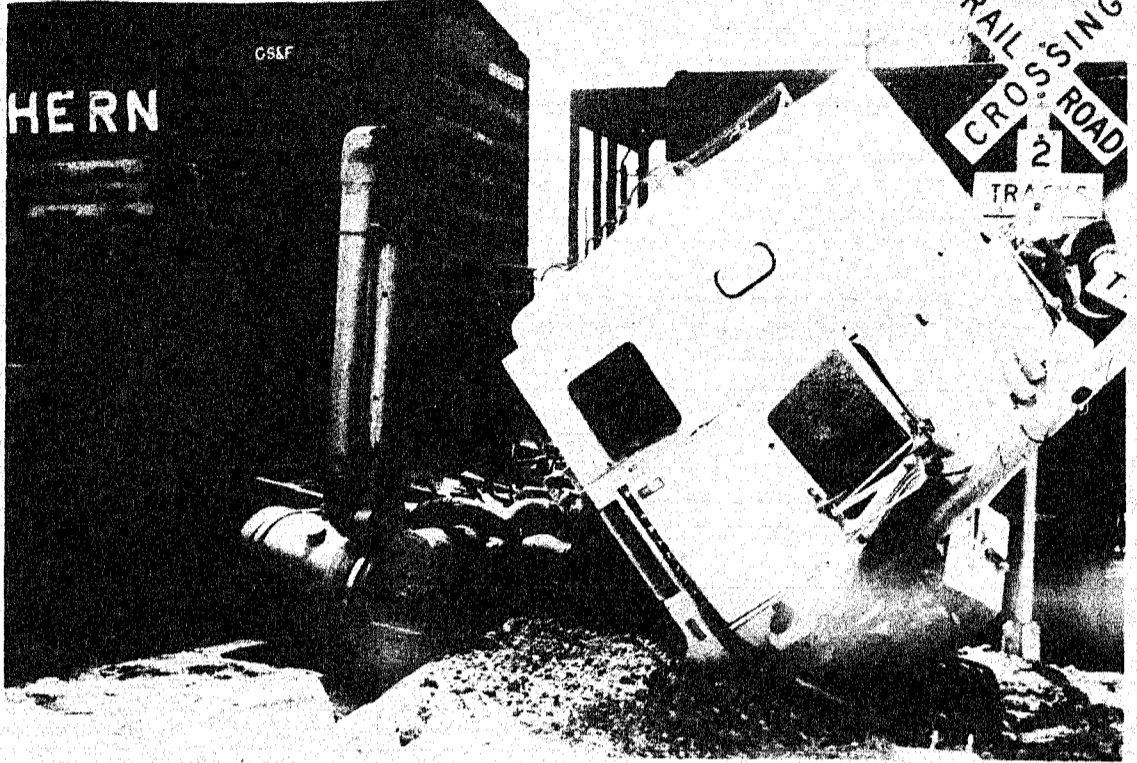

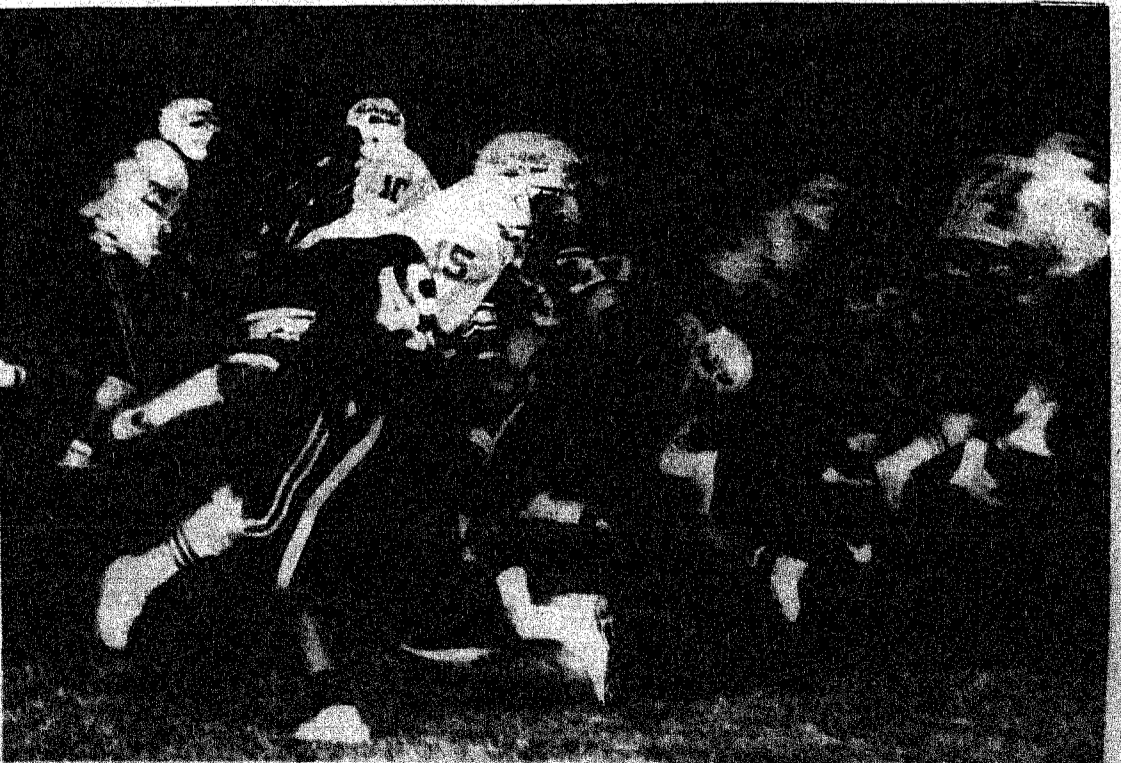



Don't let small children play near electrical outlets. A child could put some object in an outlet when you're looking away. A wise safety precaution would be to put safety caps in all wall outlets.
- **Always Disconnect Cords by Pulling on the plug**
When disconnecting electrical items, be sure to pull on the plug — not the cord! If you pull on the cord, you'll eventually wear it out and expose hazardous wires. Also, don't overload extension cords or outlets.

But did you know, disappointments and disappointing events have been around a long time.

The Apostle Paul had a burning desire. For years he had wanted to go to Rome. He wanted to speak to Nero about the claims of Christ. This was a worthy dream. But the trip Paul started out on turned into a seemingly disaster. The ship didn't sail, it sank in a storm. He didn't arrive in Italy as planned. And it wasn't the city he wanted. He landed fifty miles south of Sicily and it was a rugged island named Malta. Paul must have been sorely disappointed. But out of it came some good things that we read of in the Book of Acts.

Someone has said "Disappointments are like a sieve. Through its coarse meshes small ambitions and hopes of the soul are sifted out. But the things that are big enough not to fall out are what things that are really important. It is only a test, not a finality."

Disappointments have been called detours. The detour is rough, and dusty and takes us off the main road. Yet it is a necessary change of route and if we follow patiently we will get back on the main road. And as we

Thoughts From Our Pastors

MAKE WHAT YOU HAVE EXPRESS WHAT YOU ARE

There are many definitions of stewardship, but one that has challenged me recently is from Rockwall Smith's book "Rural Church Administration." "Stewardship...is the consistent and never-ending effort of the mature Christian to make what he HAS express what he IS" (emphasis mine)

Each pay period, whether employed or retired, we exchange "X" number of hours for "X" number of dollars. Once we expend these hours, they are history, gone forever. However, what we DO with the dollars is an index of our stewardship.

Jesus said for us to "give unto Caesar what is Caesar's and to give unto God what is God's" Mk 12:17. A paraphrase might read, "Pay the taxes that you owe, and no more. As Christians, be wise and faithful stewards over all that remains." God is not pleased if we cheat on our taxes nor honored if we overpay. We have a responsibility to know and apply the tax laws. For example, over 75 percent of eligible taxpayers did not use the IRA last year. Those who received a tax refund at the end of the year overpaid during the year. Few are aware of the various trusts and the Gifts to Minors Act whereby money can be placed in children's names and then taxed at the lesser rate. Give unto Caesar what is his—no more!

Being wise and faithful stewards over what remains covers many areas and is a lifetime responsibility. It falls into two areas: what we give to the Lord's work and what we keep to live on. The Bible addresses both.

All Christians are allowed the privilege and yes, the responsibility, to give to the Lord's work. Giving a tithe is a Biblical place to begin, but beyond that, the Scriptures challenge us to give...as we have prospered, as we purpose in our

hearts, as we see the need, and willingly, generously, and regularly. God does not need our gifts, but we have a need to give.

In our daily lives we should shop for good value and not be wasteful. This does not mean we must always buy the "twist-dial" model in favor of the "touch-matic" one, yet we should seek good dollar value. One very common violation of this principle is the purchase of expensive, cash value life insurance policies (known as whole-life, universal-life, or those that promise dividends) which cost three to five times more than term-life. The Federal Trade Commission has said that Americans lose billions of dollars each year through these policies, yet term-life is available from virtually all companies if asked for.

Two other areas of stewardship are worthy of consideration. First, what are we doing with our bodies. Surely those who abuse with tobacco, alcohol and other drugs, overeating, etc. are not considered good stewards. Our bodies have been given to us as temples of God's Holy Spirit and are not to be defiled. In addition, we should ask and answer what we are doing with the most valuable treasure we have been given, namely, the Word of God.

If we are to be found faithful stewards (above all else, it is required of stewards that they be faithful." I Cor. 4:2) then we must share this Word. Share it for witnessing to the lost, for encouragement, for comfort, for purpose, for direction, for exhortation, for rebuke, for doctrine, for correction, for instruction in righteousness and edification. This written Word always points to the living Word, Jesus the Christ. To whom this seed is given, sowing is required.

What we are DOING with what we have, expresses what we ARE!

are on that detour just look at the new highway that is being built for our return trip.

Disappointments have been called adversities. Out of adversity and disappointment often come the virtues of the Christian life such as patience, courage, kindness and sympathy. Easy lives will not arouse the dormant powers we have in our beings. The sleeping giant within us is often called to action by some adversity.

A traveler in Africa saw one of the large butterflies of the tropics struggling to free itself from the cocoon. He took pity on its struggles and with his knife cut the cords at which it was struggling, and it came safely and easily out. But all the brilliant coloring was gone! The anguish of struggle was necessary for the color. Often times the beautiful colors of the soul are won in struggle with, and the victory over disappointment.

God often disappoints us and baffles us in order to make us succeed. For instance, if Phillips Brooks had succeeded as a teacher he would not

have moved men with his mighty ministry. If Hawthorne had been retained at his job at the custom house he never would have written those wonderful novels. Out of the snows came the leadership of George Washington. Out of defeat came the greatness of Abraham Lincoln. And the list could go on.

What can we do with our disappointments? We can blame God or those around us. We can give up and never try again. We can run away from the hurt. We can struggle with them or we can let God have them. We can get angry with life and commit suicide, oh it may not be physical suicide, but it can be spiritual suicide or feelings suicide. We can run from the shadow of hurt. Or we can look beyond today to tomorrow.

We can blame or we can take all our disappointments and write above them "GOD IS ABLE."

"When He gives quietness, who then can make trouble" Job 34:29.

The party was a real success and a big surprise for the honoree, who is a very special person to her four children, eight grandchildren and fourteen great-grandchildren.

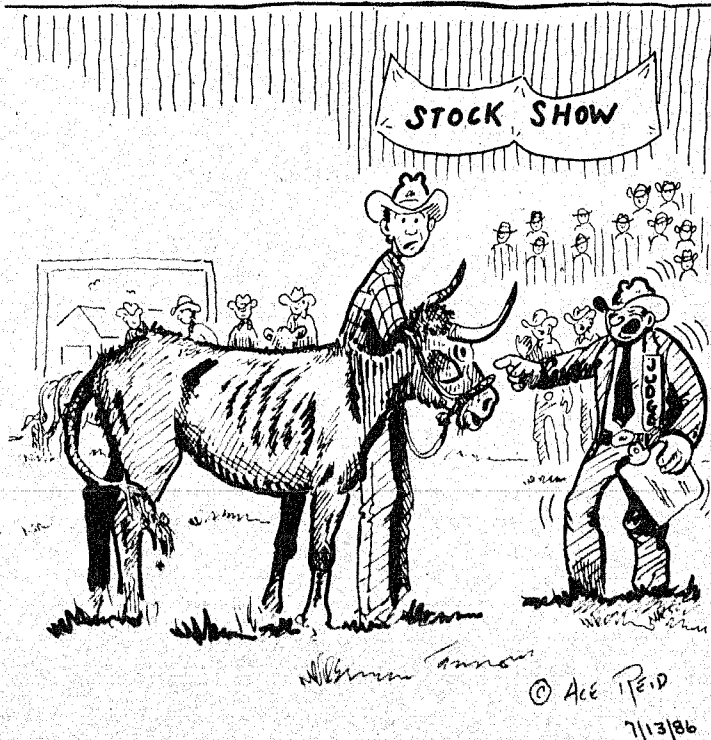

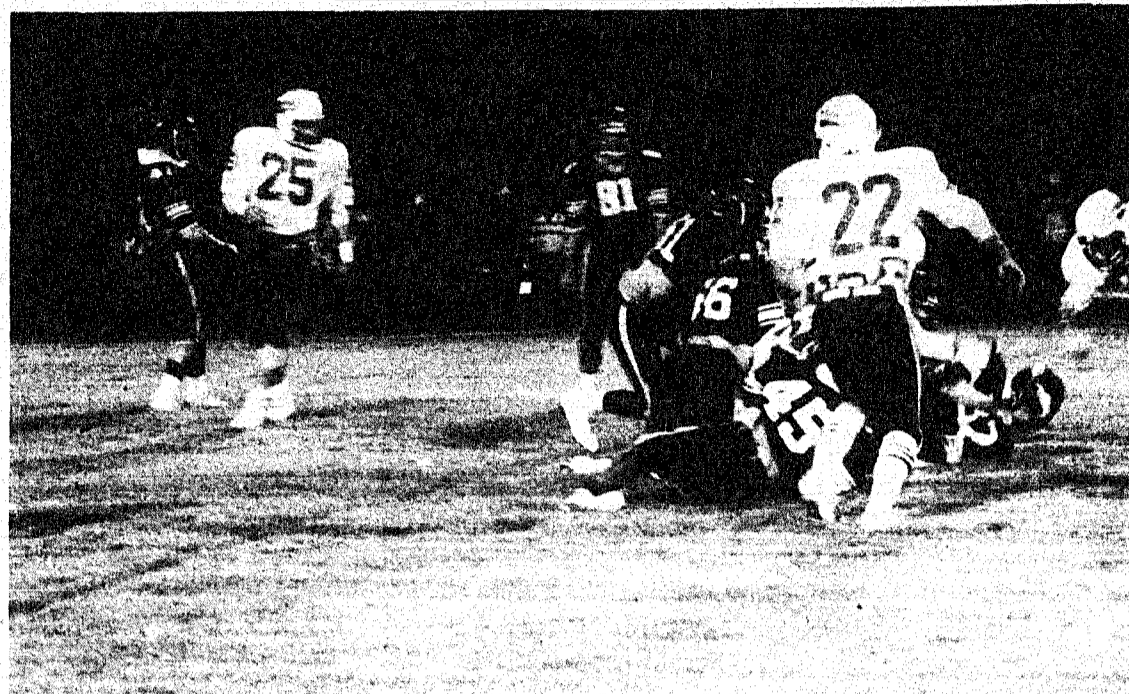

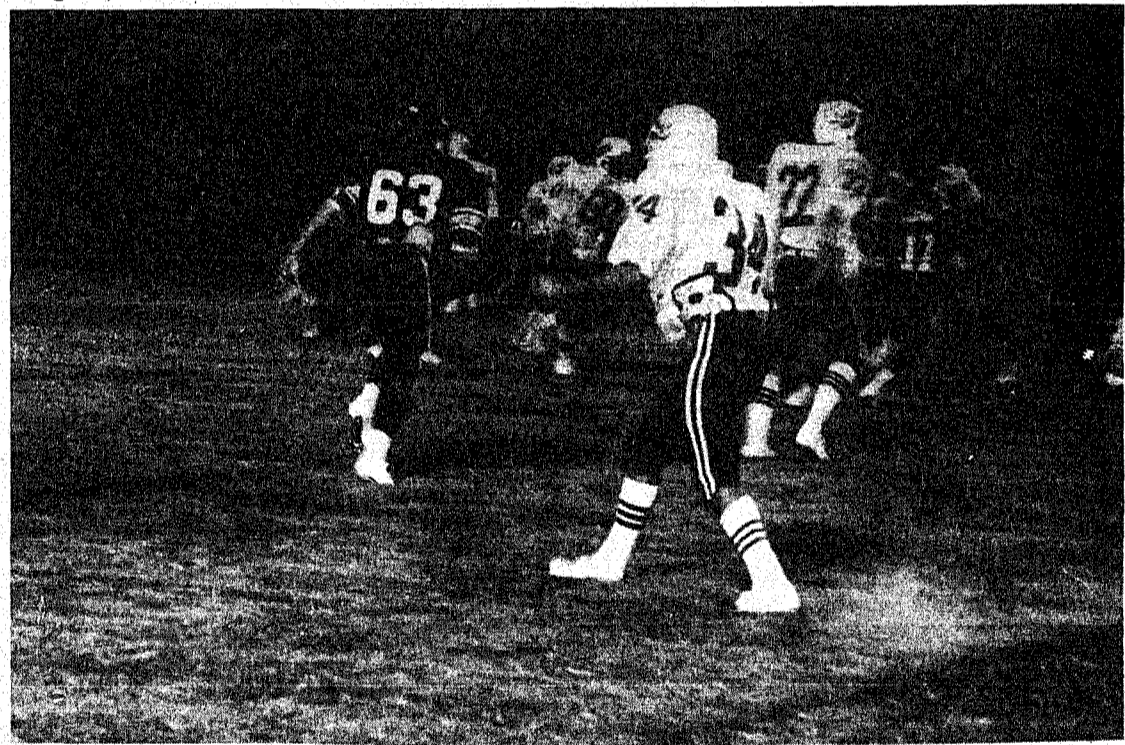

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

Take Care of Your Teeth-Eat Cheese

Taking care of your teeth can be as easy as eating a delectable piece of aged Cheddar along with your fruit, according to research done over the last few years.

Cheddar, Swiss and Monterey Jack cheeses battle cavities by preventing sugar from forming an acid layer on the teeth, and according to the National Dairy Council, they are the only foods known to have this ability.

Cavities form when bacteria called dental plaque stick to teeth. This bacteria breaks down the carbohydrate foods we eat, changing sugars to plaque acid. The plaque adheres this acid to the teeth where tooth enamel is attacked and eventually causes decay.

Experiments have shown that aged Cheddar eaten immediately after a pear blocked an expected rise in cavity-causing plaque acid from the fruit's natural sugar.

"Once we define what makes the cheese apparently anticariogenic (anticavity), we possibly could put
