

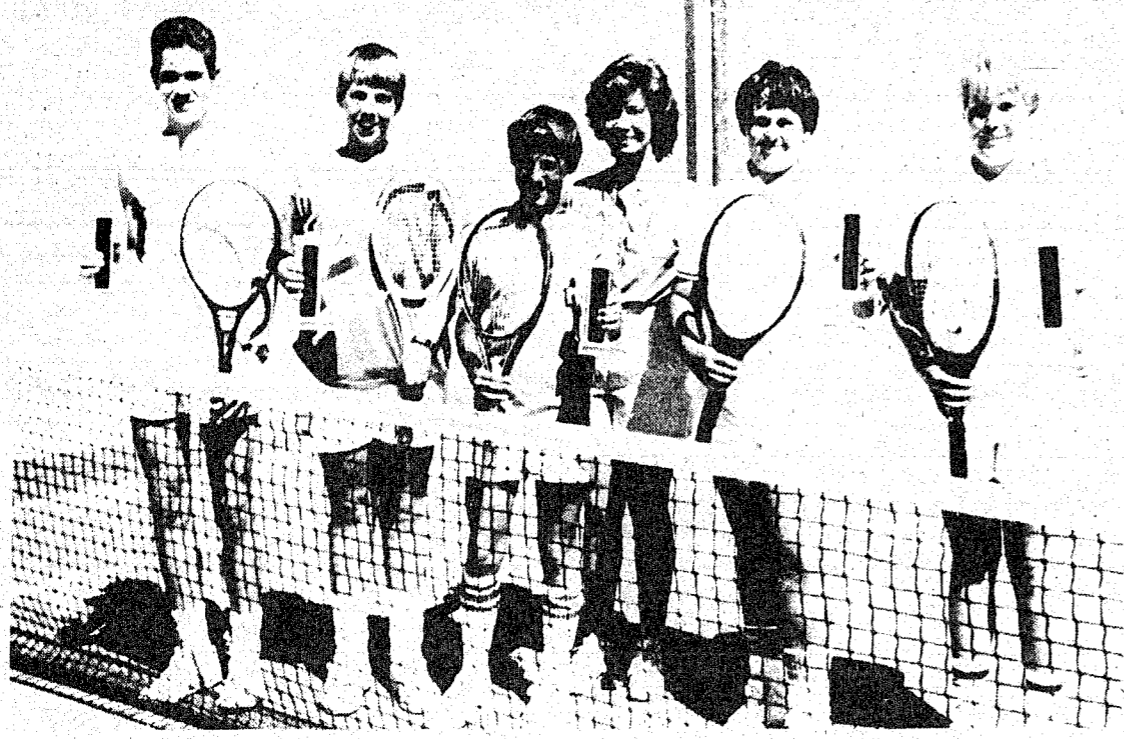

## Assembly Of God To Have Guest Speaker

Reverend Jim Osborn will be guest speaker at the Assembly of God in Santa Anna, Texas on Sunday, May 3, at 11:00 a.m., according to Reverend James Ford, pastor.

Jim and his wife Linda are newly appointed Assemblies of God missionaries to Brussels, Belgium, where they will resume their responsibilities at the International Correspondence Institute (ICI).

ICI is a worldwide correspondence Bible school, sponsored by the Assemblies of God Division of Foreign Missions. Now in its 20th year, ICI has enrolled more than 5 million students from 164 countries of the world. The Osborns have been working at ICI for the past two years on assignment with the MAPS (Mobilization and Placement Service) program—a program of the Assemblies of God which places interested lay persons on short-term missions assignments.

Upon returning to ICI Brussels, Mr. Osborn will help to produce and direct special ICI video projects and

serve as director of office systems (which will involve setting up ICI offices around the world)."

"Almost two-thirds of the world's people are functionally illiterate,

therefore audio and video evangelism and training courses are growing in popularity and effectiveness," says Mr. Osborn. "New advances in computer, audio, and video technology are making it

possible to place these tools in the hands of evangelical Christian workers around the world."

Mr. Osborn's training and work experience are in the areas of radio and television broadcasting, electronics and computer systems. Prior to their work with ICI Brussels, the Osborns served for six years in a church in Austin, Texas, where Mr. Osborn was minister of music and

media director. At that time he also was president of a television production company which produced Bible study tapes, television commercials and documentaries.

At this special missions service, Mr. Osborn will share a multi-media presentation challenging people concerning the worldwide outreach and goals of ICI. The public is invited.

Gary Absher, Santa Anna Postmaster, announced the sale of the new 22 cent Stamp Greetings Book. Each book of 10 stamps costs

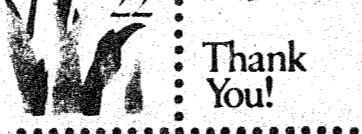
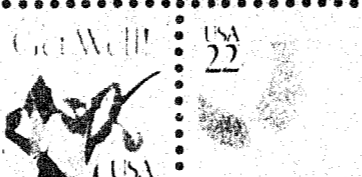
\$2.20. The special stamps contain specific greeting messages: Congratulations; Get Well; Thank You;

## Fire Dept. Watches Storms

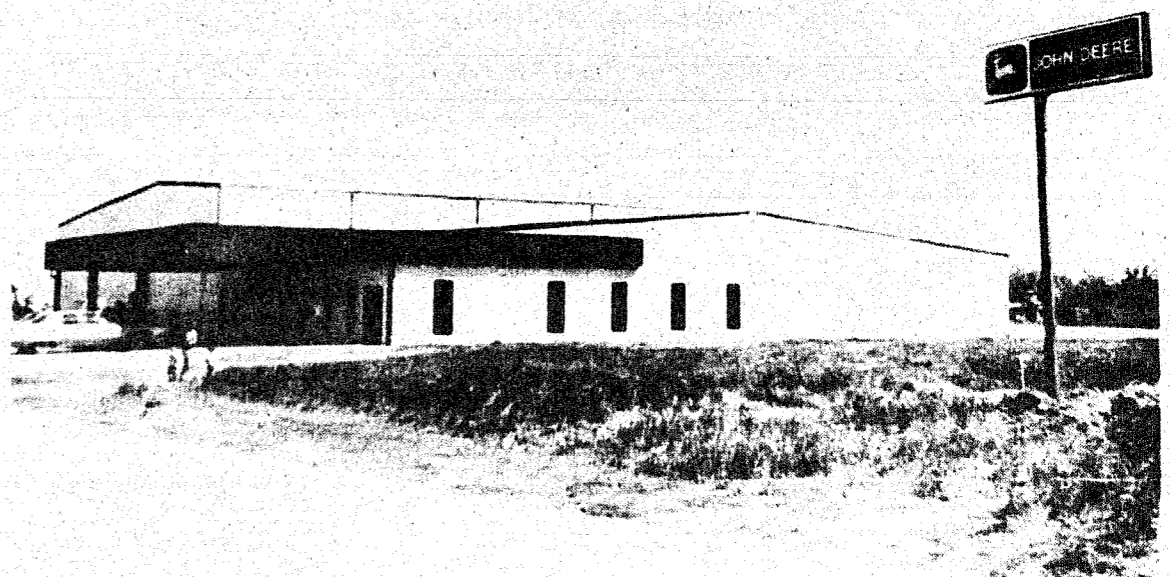
Youth Director for the Texas Conference, Mario Ceballos, will be present to conduct the ceremonies. This

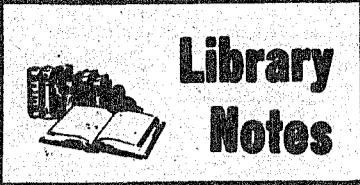

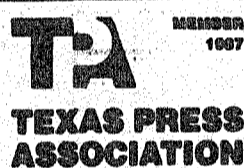

The event was held at McMurry College in the Presidential Dining Room at the Campus Center.

Wilnette Spencer was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom A. Mills. She was a graduate of the Santa Anna Schools and Sul Ross University.

In making the announcement of the scholarship, it was said that "Wilnette Spencer opened the doors to the education of over 1,000 first graders. She taught for 34 years, 23 at Johnston Elementary School in Abilene, Texas.

Wilnette worked magic on those children. It seemed she never raised her voice, but somehow managed to

control a room full of rowdy first graders who didn't know the rules. No child was ever a problem for Wilnette. The hard to handle ones were allowed room to grow up. The shy ones gently coaxed to the front of the class. The artist blossomed. The thinkers were challenged. The slow ones encouraged.

No one ever had such an impact on so many lives in such small but significant ways. The kind word to a frightened first grader. The thoughtful note to a frustrated fellow teacher. The encouragement to a son who had just faced one of life's setbacks.

An anonymous donation has established an endowed scholarship in memory of Wilma Jeanette Spencer at McMurry College. The donor requested, "that it be given to a Junior Elementary Education major in the hope that it will enable a deserving student to follow in the footsteps of one of the finest teachers who ever helped to shape the lives of others."

To The Editor:

House Bill 2321 was recently introduced in the Texas House of Representatives and has been referred to the Committee on State Affairs. This bill includes provisions that will require an environmental impact statement followed by thorough review by various state agencies before the Texas Railroad Commission can issue a permit for eminent domain for oil, gas, or other minerals pipeline construction. The bill further provides that notice be given to landowners and counties through which the pipeline route is proposed and public hearings be held.

House Bill 2321 represents legislation that will provide greater protection of our most valuable resource—water—by assuring pipelines are not constructed where irreparable harm would result should leaks occur.

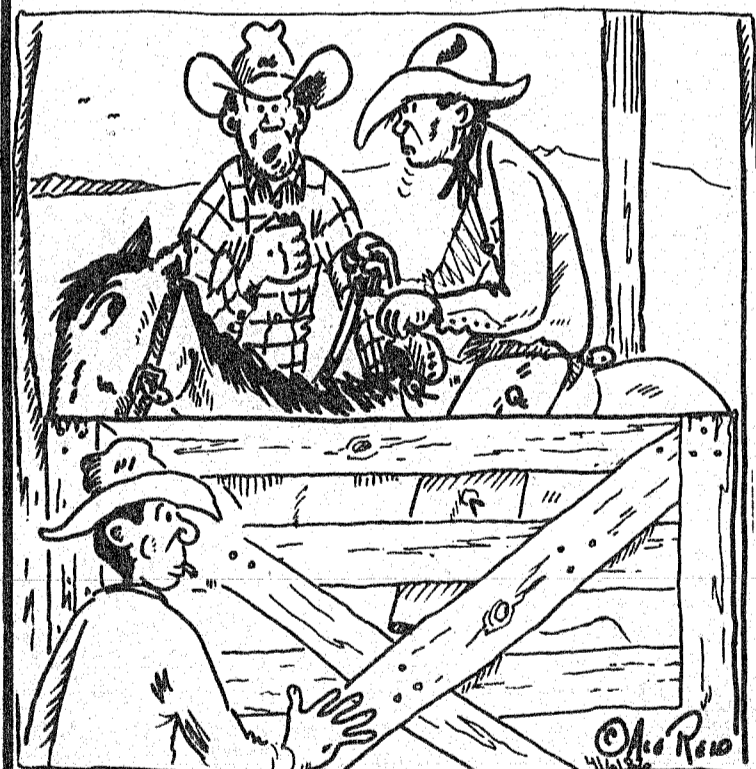
Public support is essential for the bill to be presented for House vote. In order to insure that the Committee is made aware of your concern in this regard, please contact your State Representative and State Senator voicing your support of House Bill 2321. **Thoughts From Our Pastors**

**It Is A Gift, Not A Reward!**

"For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Romans 6:23. GOD HAS A GIFT FOR YOU. This gift is eternal life through Jesus Christ. It is not a wage paid or a reward for good deeds. It is a free gift! Your part is to accept it by faith. Not the devil or demon faith (James 2:19) but saving faith. This gift is not based upon a church membership, baptism, good works, keeping the ten commandments or anything else that can be done in the energy of the faith. Because flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God. Jesus said in John 3:3 "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." Read all of John 3:1-17. So the gift of eternal life is based upon a person—JESUS CHRIST!

If it were based upon you and I then there would be no possibility of eternal life. We would have to be as perfect as God is. And there is no church or person who is that perfect. So as Romans 3:23 says: "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;" we come up short on perfection like God requires. Therefore, we can never earn eternal life as a wage paid or as a reward given. It has to come as gift through saving faith in Christ Jesus. Read Ephesians 2:8-10! The only thing that pays wages and gives rewards is sin. Romans 6:23. The Bible promises eternal life to all who receive Christ. (1 John 5:11-13).

This is not saying that we throw away church membership, baptism, Lord's Supper, good works, 10 commandments, or the Sermon on the Mount. These things ought to follow your faith in Christ. These are the results of faith in Christ for eternal life. These are the evidences of a saving faith. In James 2:17 it says that "Faith without works is dead." So works are the result of eternal life not the cause of it. In that saving faith there must be repentance and baptism as the first step of obedience. Keep in mind that baptism is not a saving element but the first step of outward obedience. It comes after faith and repentance as an outward evidence.

Receive your free gift today by first accepting Jesus Christ and the work he did upon the cross that you and I may have eternal life. Then find you a local church and follow Jesus in baptism as the first step of obedience. Read all the Bible not just parts of it.

**Law Enforcement Classes Offered**

STEPHENVILLE—The Law Enforcement Academy at Tarleton State University has a number of programs in peace officer and reserve officer certification beginning in May. The programs are offered through the Division of Continuing Education at TSU. The 400-hour Basic Peace Officers certification course starts May 4 and will meet Monday through Thursday evenings from 5:30 to 10:30 p.m. through August 20. There will also be ten Saturday class sessions from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The course is designed to meet the minimum training standards for peace officers as required by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standard and Education. Instructors will include professionals currently active in the law

enforcement field. Curriculum includes mechanics of arrests, civil law and process, protection and search of a crime scene, interviewing and interrogation, report writing and firearms training, among others.

Registration is \$600 plus texts and students must furnish a large notebook and approved firearms and ammunition.

Reserve courses for Basic Services, Intermediate Reserves and Advanced Reserves will also start May 4 through the TSU Law Enforcement Academy. The reserve students will meet at various times with the basic peace officers certification course and will be expected to attend only certain designated classes dealing with specific subject matter. The Basic Reserve Course is 145 hours and registration is \$200. Intermediate Reserve courses are 121 hours and registration is \$180. The Advanced course includes 124 hours and registration is \$170.

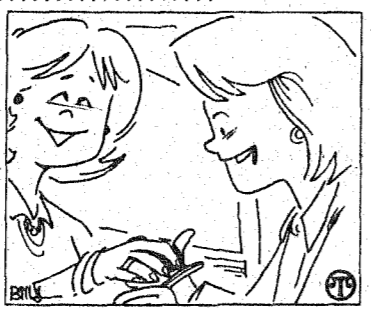

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

- Q-I am receiving Veterans Administration benefits as a full-time student under the Veterans Education Assistance Program (VEAP). Am I entitled to participate in VA's work-study program?  
A-Yes. Full-time students who receive VA education benefits under VEAP and under the new GI Bill-Active-Duty Educational Assistance program are eligible to participate in the VA's work-study program. Previously, only those veterans receiving benefits under VA's vocational rehabilitation or the Vietnam ERA GI Bill were eligible.
- Q-My mother, a veteran of the armed forces, was buried in a private cemetery and her headstone was furnished, at no cost, by the Veterans Administration. I visited her grave recently and noticed that the stone was cracked. Will the VA fix the headstone?  
A-The VA will replace a previously furnished government headstone at

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government expense if it is cracked, broken, destroyed or otherwise made illegible. Request for replacement of a headstone should be made in writing to a family member or other responsible person. The request should be in the condition of the headstone and be sent to: Director, Memorial Service (42), Veterans Administration, Washington, D.C. 20420.

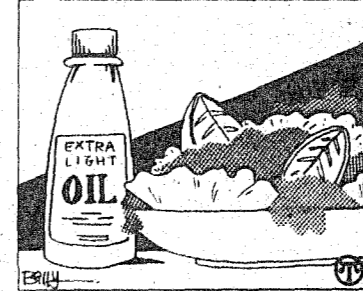

## Older E Bonds To Cease Earning Interest

DALLAS - Individuals who are still holding Series E U.S. Savings Bonds issued 40 years ago need to take action promptly, according to the U.S. Treasury Department.

People who purchased Series E Savings Bonds in 1947 have two options this year: cash them in and declare the interest on the 1987 federal income tax return or exchange the Series E for Series HH and defer taxes for another 10 years.

An example of the importance of taking action on older E bonds is a \$1,000 face value bond purchased in January 1947 for \$750, which stopped earning interest in January 1987 after accruing a total net value of \$4,935.20.

net value to determine the amount of accumulated interest, which, in this example, would be \$4,185.20. The accumulated interest must be declared on the individual's 1987 federal tax return as other income.

The other option is to roll over the Series E into a Series HH bond. Series E holders have 12 months from the date of a bond's maturity to roll it over. A rollover into Series HH defers federal income tax on the interest for 10 more years.

Individuals holding bonds that are more than 40 years old face a more complicated tax situation. Since the interest on mature bonds must be declared as income, bond holders who have not yet cashed in a bond bought before 1947 may have to file an amended income tax return and

may experience a penalty. To help prevent this situation from occurring, the Treasury Department is trying to alert consumers to the need to watch the maturity dates of their older savings bonds. A small percentage of E Bond

holders keep them for sentimental reasons even after they have stopped earning interest. Other people simply forget to cash in their mature bonds and leave them stashed away in bank safety deposit boxes or other places. The government held approximately \$1.45 billion in non-interest-bearing savings bonds on Dec. 31, 1986.

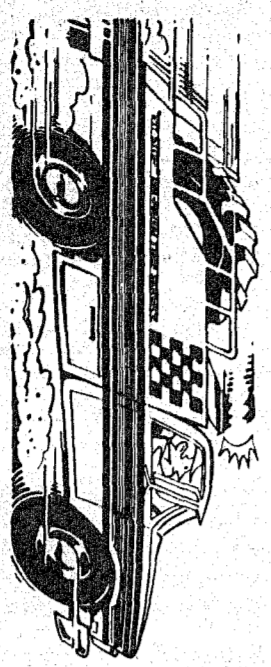

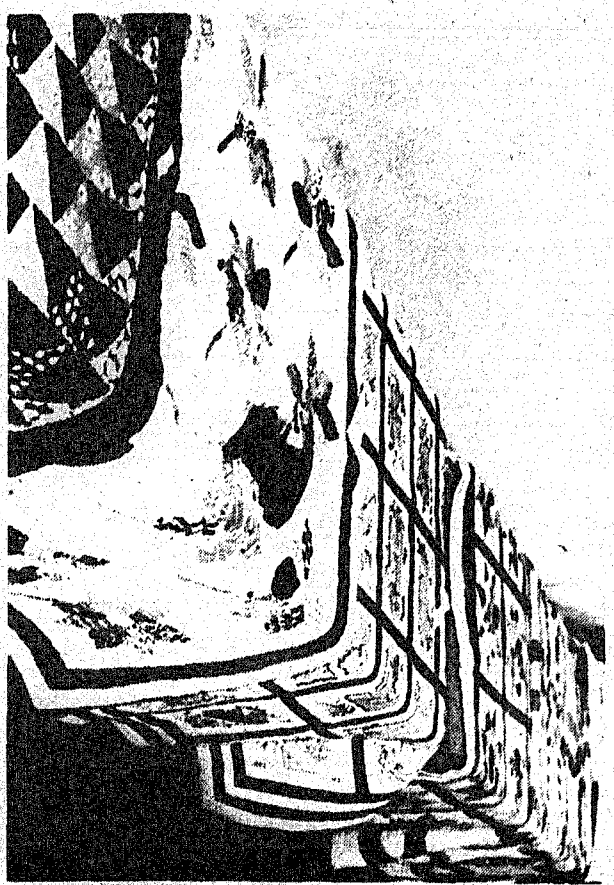

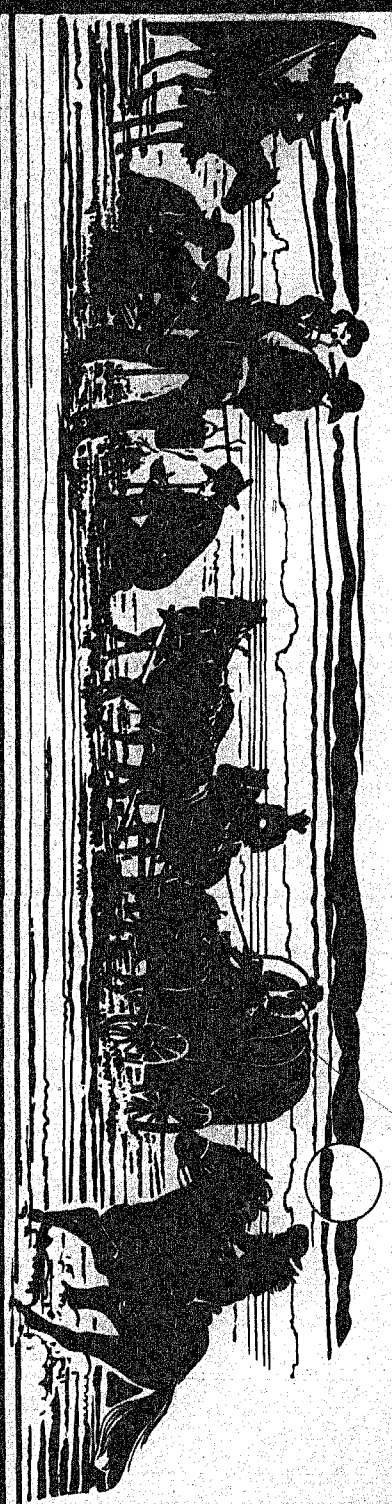

# Johnson Implement To Hold Open House Friday

The original store was located in a portion of the building at 263 Needham, which originally housed a drug store and grocery store. In 1944, the store was expanded to its current size.

The use of tractors was a relatively new concept in Delma traded for livestock and crops from farmers that were buying their first new tractors.


In 1968, Delma's son, Cecil, began working at the store. Cecil became a partner in the business in 1972, and became sole owner of the store in 1986.

Due to customer response and support, the dealership decided in 1985 that an expansion program was needed. After many months of study and planning, construction began in early September of 1986 on the new 18,500 square foot building located on a 7 acre plot on Santa Anna Avenue in Coleman, where the same quality products will be sold and serviced. 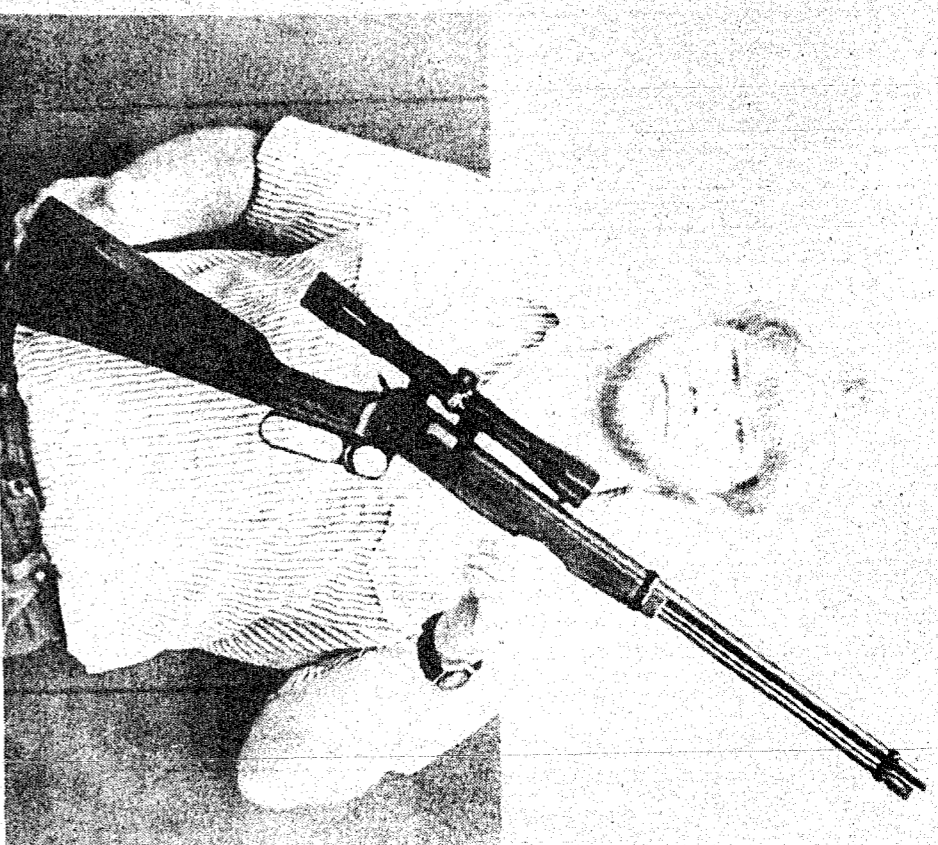

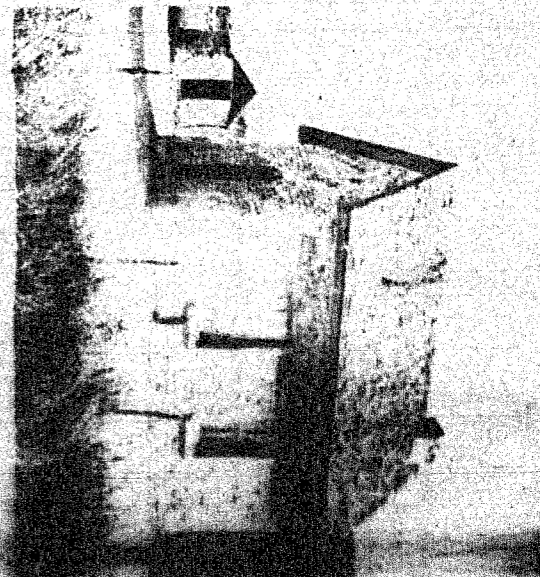

## Rifle To Be Auctioned During 'Funtier Days'




The "Old Rock House" stands just outside of the Santa Anna City Limits on the east of the West Main Street. It is a historical landmark and the master estate of "OLD ROCK HOUSE". This site was utilized in 1897 under a Republic of Texas Land Certificate held by former State Representative Thomas Henry of "Victor's Quarry". In 1898 he sold the tract to another absentee owner. By tradition, this house was built in the 1850s by John J. Brewster, a squatter who came to the area from nearby Santa Anna mountains. Later owners, including the Sarah Hinman, rented the property to tenant farmers. Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Brown, who purchased the land in 1907, purchased the rock house and residence it now sits on a monument.

There is no entry fee, but each freezer of ice cream is to be donated to the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce, which will sell it.

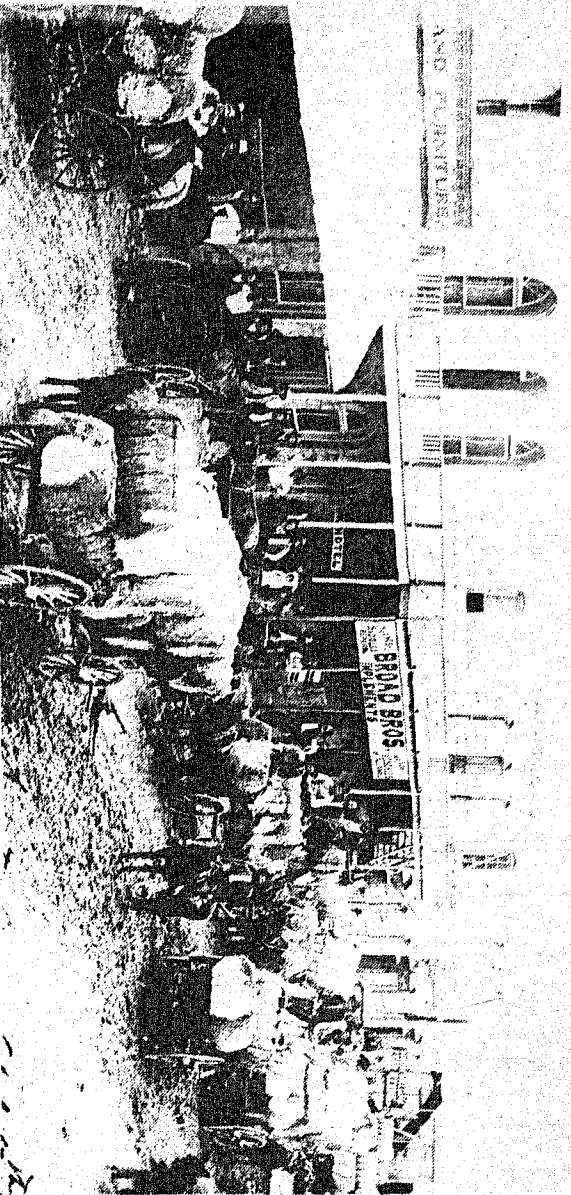

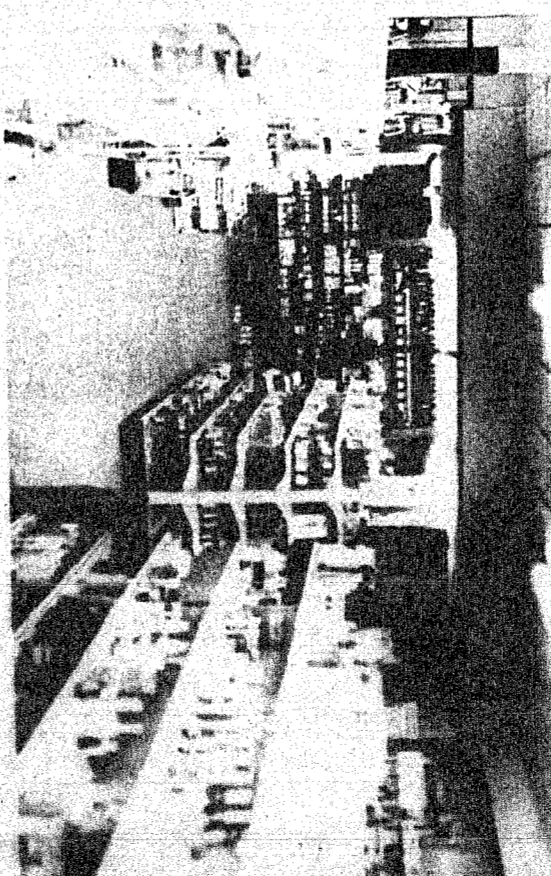
First National Bank of Santa Anna is shown here in the early days of Santa Anna. The photo was taken in the early 1900's.
