Homecoming Honorees Announced

Ada Lois Newman Williamson, a member of the SAHS graduating class of 1938 is to be honored as "Ex-Student of the Year" during homecoming activities to be held at Santa Anna High School this Friday and Saturday. She will be introduced during halftime activities of the Friday night football game and will be honored at the business meeting on Saturday morning.

After graduation from Santa Anna high school she attended and graduated from Howard Payne College in Brownwood and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. She also did graduate work at Baylor University and studied library science at Texas Women's University in Denton.

Immediately after graduation from Southwestern Seminary, she went to Nigeria, West Africa where she served as a missionary for the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern

Baptist Convention. She worked in a boarding school for girls, preschool through junior college. She studied to have an understanding of the Yoruba language. The classes she taught were in English but the curriculum was different in that she taught, along with the "three R's", Bible, washing, ironing, and mothercraft.

She stayed in Nigeria only two and one-half years and came down with a tropical fever and was not allowed to return for fear of the fever re-occurring.

She became a librarian at the Junior High School in Portales, New Mexico and also worked as an assistant librarian at Eastern New Mexico University.

She married Osler C. Williamson and moved to Fort Worth where he worked at General Dynamics. He retired in 1982 after 39 years.

She has three children, Judson, who works for Friona Industries in Friona, Tex., June Williams and her husband Reggie teach in the Sonora School system and Arlene Oliver and her husband who reside in Fort Worth. She also has four grandsons.

She is especially proud of a project she participated in while serving as WMU director of the Weatherford First Baptist Church. Members constructed 82 flags of countries where missionaries served and 101 of the church members presented the flags at the WMU Houseparty in Waco in 1976. As a result of the Parade of Flags, many churches in Texas and Louisiana have used the method of presenting missions in their churches.

A Mountainside Viewpoint

The Santa Anna News joins the rest of the community in welcoming all visiting exes to the annual homecoming of SAHS and hope your stay here is enjoyable.

By being a graduate of Santa Anna High School, the exes are returning for the homecoming have avoided becoming one of the fastest growing groups of people in the state of Texas.

According to the Texas Department of Commerce, the number of Texans who are functionally illiterate is growing at an alarming rate.

Just over a year ago, the number of high school dropouts who were in Texas prisons was 85 percent, now more than 90 percent of all Texas prison inmates are high school dropouts.

Today, one out of five adult Texans cannot read, write or perform basic math skills well enough to be a productive member of the work force.

One out of every three (in some areas, one out of two) Texas ninth graders never complete high school.

Closer to home, the U.S. Census Bureau reports that 25 percent or more of the population in Coleman and Brown counties ages 18 years and older have less than a ninth grade education. An individual with less than a ninth grade education is considered to have minimal level skills for functioning in today's society.

The cost of illiteracy to Texas is estimated at \$117.2 billion per year in lost income, lost tax revenue, unemployment income, adult training and education, and in the increased cost of crime, welfare and incarceration. And the financial burden will only continue to increase.

Fire Prevention Week Proclaimed For Oct. 9-15

Citing the tragic loss of lives and property from fire each year in Texas, Governor William P. Clements has proclaimed October 9-15 as 1988 Fire prevention Week.

Children in the Santa Anna schools will be observing the week by displaying fire prevention posters they have constructed.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all our citizens, particularly the young and the old", Governor Clements said.

Fires in Texas killed 322 people and injured more than 2,000 and destroyed in excess of \$300 million in property during 1987, the Governor noted.

"Much of this tragic loss could have been prevented", the Governor added. "We have knowledge and technology today to prevent much of the needless loss of lives and property in this state and we urge every Texas citizen to practice fire prevention every day in an effort to conserve our valuable Texas resources."

This year marks the 66th anniversary of the National Fire Prevention Week. The week-long observance was first established in 1922 by President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" of October 9, 1871.

That conflagration killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million. People began thinking in terms of fire prevention in addition to fire fighting as a result of this fire.

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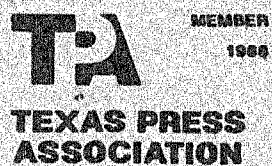
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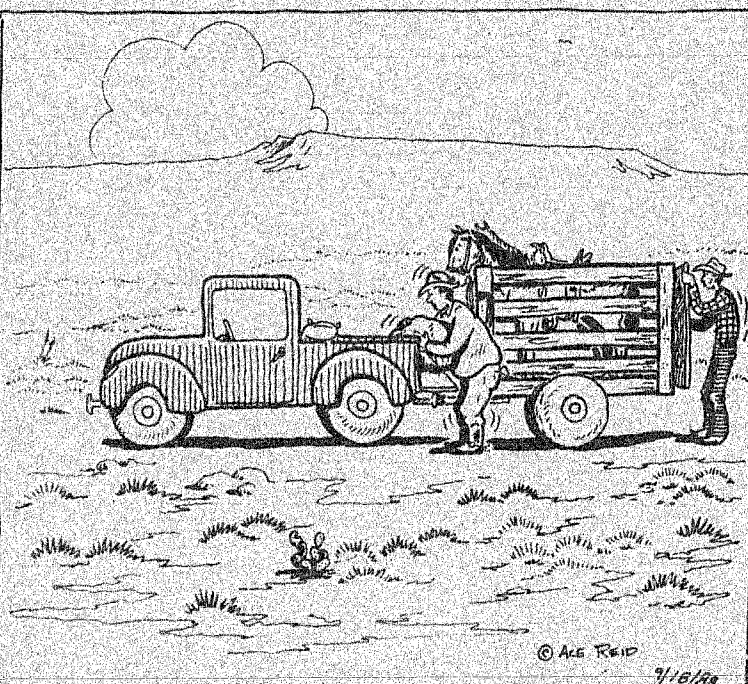

REVIVE US AGAIN

Christians today are called to be light, salt, and faithful in the midst of a crooked and depraved generation. We are to stand out like stars in the universe. In Psalm 85 we read the thoughts and prayers of those people who had suffered some 70 years in Babylonian captivity. Perhaps we can learn from their experience.

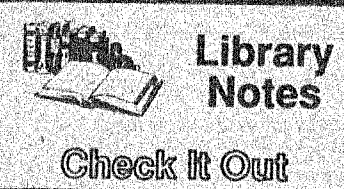

10 Commandments For Reading Aloud

All of us find it helpful to focus on significant ideas we should keep in mind when reading aloud to children.

Here are 10 basic guidelines for reading aloud. Remember that none of us are perfect, and when we fail to keep one of these 10 commandments of reading aloud, we should simply strive to do better in the future.

1. Thou shalt not commence reading to thy child any later than the first birthday.
2. Thou shalt read aloud to thy child daily so that reading aloud becomes a habit in thy family.
3. Thou shalt never read aloud books thou or thy child find boring.
4. Thou shalt preview books to be read aloud to make sure they have parts that are exciting, or interesting, or warm and happy, or sad, or silly.
5. Thou shalt read aloud these parts with great feeling.
6. Thou shalt sit thy child on thy lap as thou reads or at least snuggle real close as thou reads.
7. Thou shalt often let thy child pick the book to be read.
8. Thou shalt not give up on reading aloud, since it is a habit and a pleasure that may, for some children or parents, take some time to cultivate.
9. Thou shalt only "not read tonight" if thou art going to tell a story instead.
10. Thou shalt ask thy relatives, friends and/or other children to read aloud to thy young child.

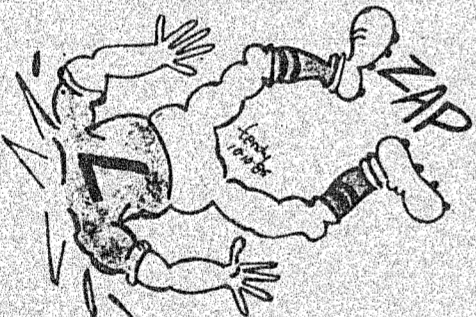

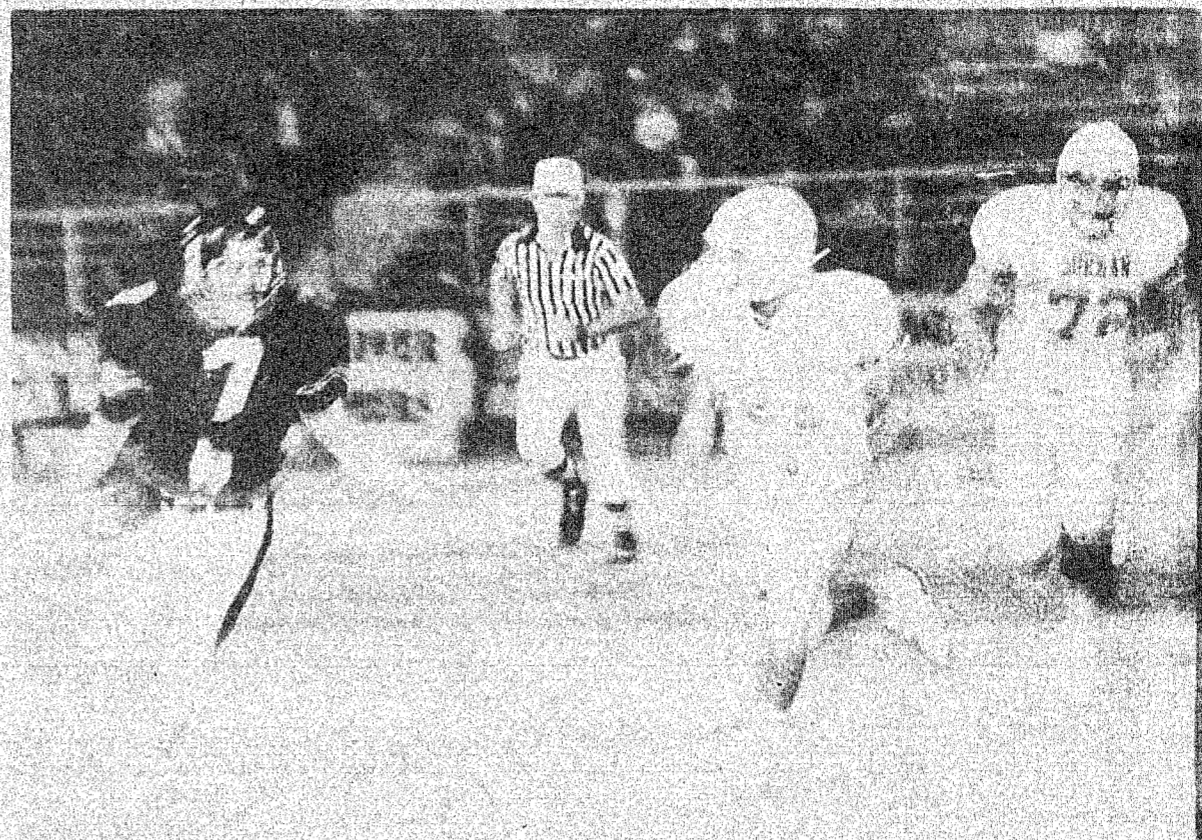

News For Parents Parents Influence School Success

If your child is having trouble adjusting to school, parental attitudes may be one possible problem, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Sometimes parents are afraid to let new people care for their children. Children pick up such signals and also become anxious. Parental stress about curing or other problems can make a child feel uncomfortable.

Doubts and fears of parents and children can be eased by visiting the school and talking with the teacher. Such discussions can familiarize everyone with the child's schedule and upcoming activities.

A visit also can give parents an early opportunity to inform the teacher about the child's special abilities, problems, or complicating situations, such as a recent family divorce that may have upset the child.

Another important discussion can be between parent and child. It can help reassure the child that he or she can handle new circumstances just as in the past. Getting frequent updates about the child's progress and attitudes can help parents keep in touch with problems.

Persistent problems may mean the child has a learning disorder. To

find out about possible problems quickly, tests can be done to determine hearing, sight, or learning handicaps that can cause the child years of frustration and failure if undetected, according to TMA. The teacher often can give recommendations about available testing.

No matter what the cause, poor performance in school is a frustration to help deal with as the troubles last too long.

Help may be somewhat as simple as aiding the child with homework. Or it may involve getting medical attention. But TMA urges parents to take action to help keep the child from falling far behind in class.

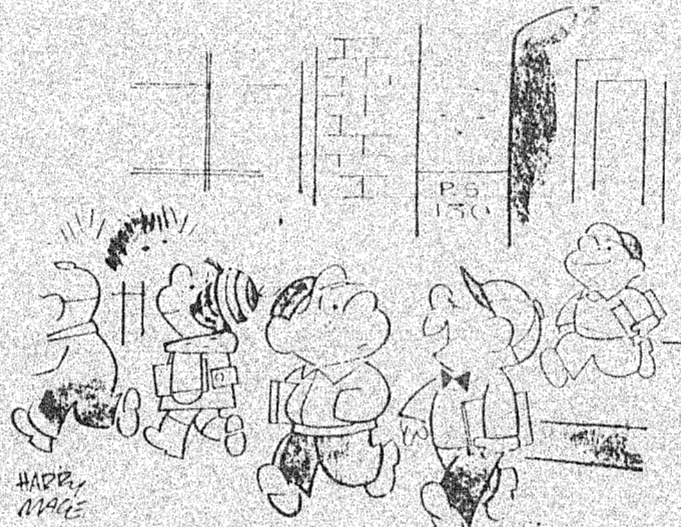

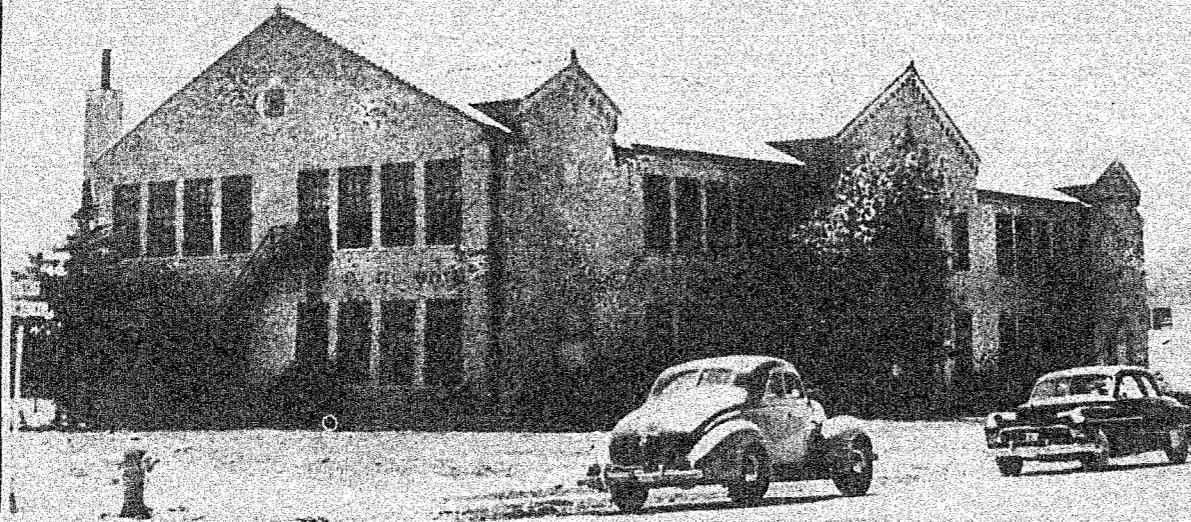
