Booster Club Meets Wed.

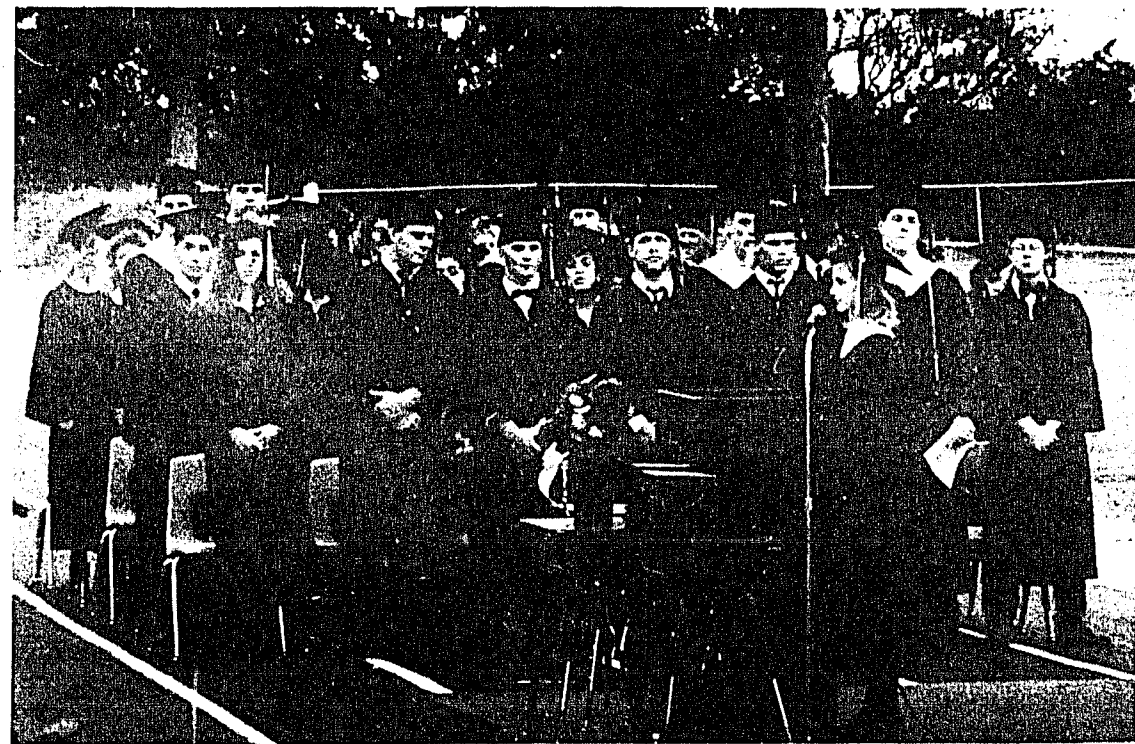

This Job Doesn't End Until Your Life Ends—Stenholm To Class Of 1990

A large crowd was on hand at Mountaineer Stadium last Thursday night to watch the SAHS Class of 1990 receive their high school diplomas and to wish them well in their future endeavors. Charles Stenholm, U.S. Congressman of the 17 District, was the guest speaker for the occasion. A reception in honor of Stenholm was held immediately following the graduation exercises and was hosted by the class and their parents.

The following is an adaptation of Congressman Stenholm's speech to the Class of 1990.

Stenholm:

I come before you tonight to of-

fer my congratulations for a job well done. For the past twelve years you have been employed at one of the most important jobs you will ever have...that of gaining an education. This graduation season is extra special to me and my wife, Cindy, because our youngest child, Courtney, is graduating from high school in June. Cindy and I have now seen three children complete their high school educations and I can relate to all the emotions you parents in the audience are feeling right now as you watch your sons and daughters complete a mile stone in their lives.

Graduates, in a little while you

will be handed a valuable piece of paper that proclaims to the world that you have a high school diploma and that itself will start opening doors for you. You haven't been paid money to attend school and I'm sure there were more than a few mornings that many mothers and fathers in this audience had to do more than some gentle prodding to convince you that you needed to get out of bed and get to class. There were probably even classes you took that didn't seem at all important in the grand scheme of things, but I can assure you that you didn't waste a single minute at school. Those classes that

seemed unnecessary taught you discipline and persistence just as those teachers you remember as relentless encouraged you to think and expand your horizons. I guarantee that you will remember those teachers, (the ones that demanded performance) years after you have left this school. The classes you loved brought about a desire to learn more, and the classes you needed opened your mind to a variety of topics and experiences. Now I know you have probably been told at least a dozen times that education is important...and I'm here to tell it to you once again. For those of you who think your job is complete, I have some startling news for you because this job will not end until your life does. I'm not talking to only those of you who will be heading for colleges and universities for higher degrees. I'm TALKING TO ALL OF YOU. Life itself is an education and it's your choice as to what you want to learn and how you want to apply that knowledge. During your years in school you have grown and matured into young adults. Most of you are 18 and can now legally vote and /or join the military. You can now make decisions about the future of this country...because YOU ARE THE FUTURE!

In the past months as you finished your Senior year in high school, world events were taking place that will affect all of our lives, for the rest of our lives. The Berlin Wall fell, communism took a back seat to democracy as Eastern Europe experienced the first winds of freedom, Solidarity made headway in Poland and students in China lost their lives as they

County Officials Consider Options To Make Up Deficit

COLEMAN — Coleman County Commissioners will meet June 11 to discuss budget cuts or borrowing money to make up an estimated \$200,000 deficit.

The commissioners are facing the deficit because they included in their 1989-90 budget taking out a loan instead of hiking the county's 42 cent per \$100 evaluation tax rate last fall, said Coleman County Judge Pete Skelton.

"We just budgeted to borrow some money instead of raising

taxes," Skelton said.

Commissioners must consider taking out a loan or making such budget cuts as slashing employees' salaries by 10 percent or laying off workers, Skelton said.

"It's just one of those things that finally caught up with us," Skelton said.

Even though the commissioners included a \$248,000 loan in this year's \$1.8 million budget, they

The group enjoyed a lovely lunch of roast beef and all the trimmings.

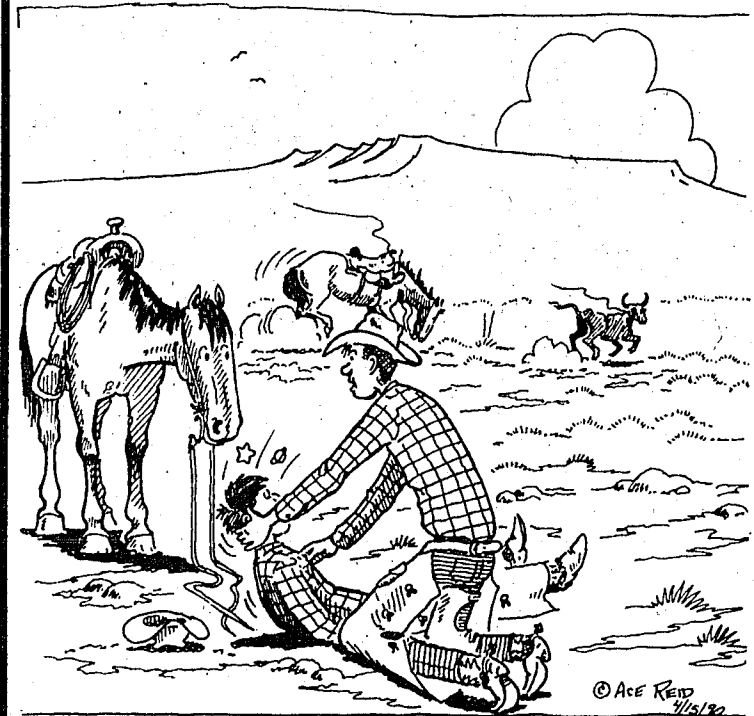

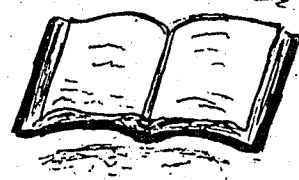

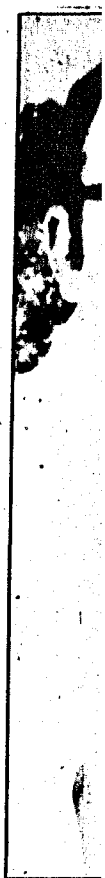

Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Eason of Bangs and Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Sikes of Dallas.

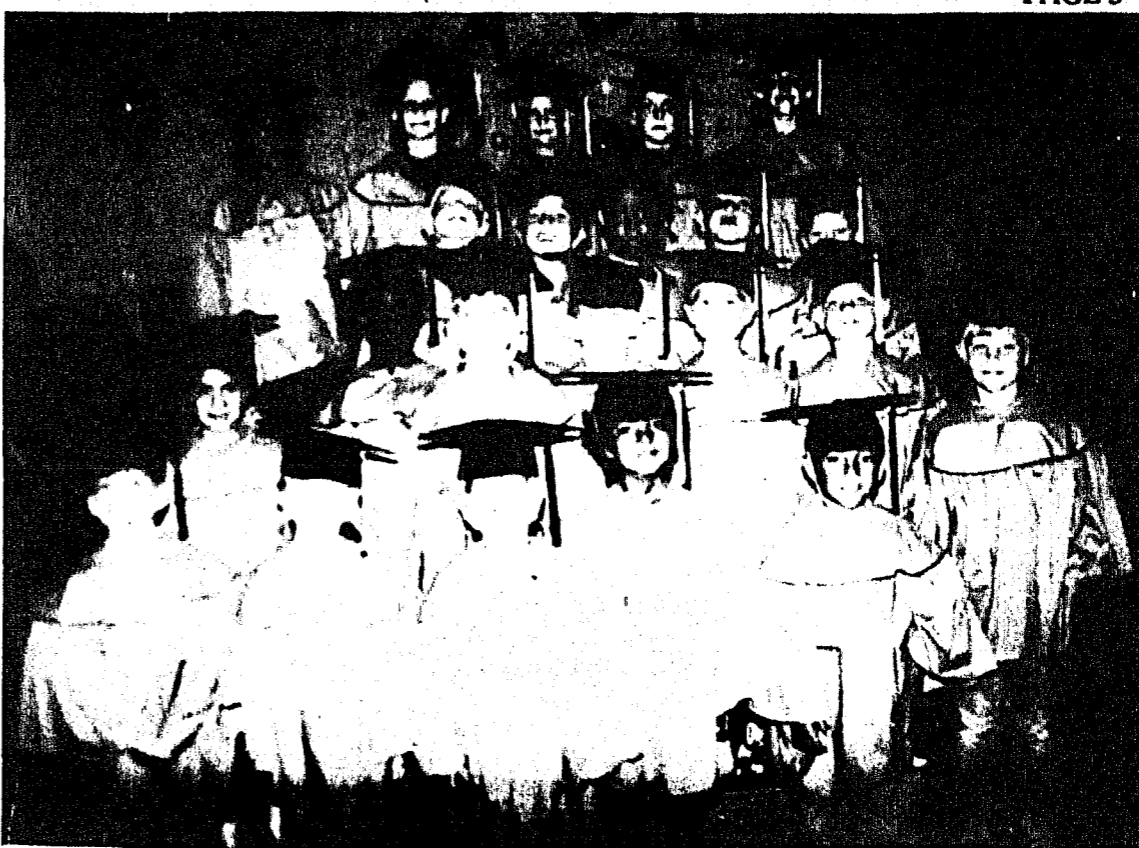
The couple are active members of First Baptist Church and take part in community and civic groups.

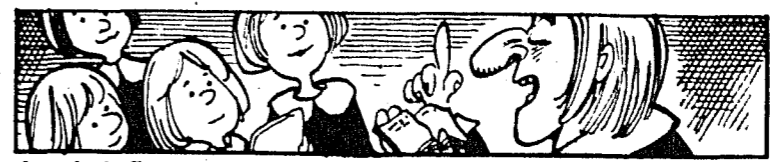

had during your school years and branch off into new experiences, you will be taking your background with you. This education you've earned is a basis for what you will become. You have the right to dream, to follow those dreams and try to attain them. You also have an obligation to do it fairly. As former President Andrew Jackson's mother wrote in her last letter to him:

"In this world you will have to make your own way. To do that you must have friends. You can make friends by being honest and you can keep them by being steadfast. You must keep in your mind that friends worth having will, in the long run, expect as much from you as they give to you. To forget an obligation or be ungrateful for a kindness is a base crime...not merely a fault or a sin, but an actual crime. Those guilty of it will sooner or later suffer the penalty. In personal conduct always be polite. No one will respect you more than you respect yourself. Avoid quarrels and never wound the feelings of others. If angry, wait until you

calm down before proceeding." In the past few months I've had the privilege of hearing Lech Walesa of Poland and President Vaclav Havel of Czechoslovakia address the Congress. Both men were ORDINARY PEOPLE who became great leaders in emerging countries that look up to the United States and what it stands for.

In 1980, Lech Walesa was an unemployed shipyard worker from Gdansk who was involved in the famous strike that led to the emergence of the first independent trade union in communist countries. It has now become a vast social movement supported by the Polish nation. Walesa has since devoted his entire life to the Solidarity movement which believes in "government of the people, by the people, and for the people," just as we here in the United States. He fought against privilege and monopoly, violations of law, against the trampling of human dignity and against contempt and injustice. The people of Poland associate the United States with Freedom and democracy, generosity

and high-mindedness, human friendship and friendly humanity. The people of Poland believe freedom is a human right and something worth fighting for. During the nine years it took to bring freedom, Solidarity supporters were being locked up in prison, deprived of jobs, beaten and sometimes killed, yet the Solidarity movement NEVER brought violence into its cause. They did not destroy anything. They did not smash windows, burn cars or buildings, nor did they kidnap or harm private individuals. They were ready to suffer and make sacrifices because they knew what they wanted and their power prevailed in the end.

For years these people were told to be quiet and suffer in silence because they were not entitled to the freedoms that we take for granted here in America. NOW they have their chance.

Vaclav Havel was an imprisoned playwright who rose to the post of President of Czechoslovakia when the communist party started to back down. As a prisoner, he was living in a country ruled by the communist government. Now he is leading a country that is on the road to democracy and its own free elections.

The totalitarian system in the Soviet Union and most of its satellites are breaking down. The nations like Czechoslovakia are looking for a way toward democracy and independence. The first act started when Mikhail Gorbachev initiated the policy of "perestroika" that set in motion the quest for democracy.

This means Europe will begin again to seek its own identity without being compelled to be a divided armory any longer. It will allow those large and small to be able to create what our President Lincoln called the "family of man."

President Havel said: "As long as people are people, democracy in the full sense of the word will always be no more than an ideal; one may approach it as one would a horizon, in ways that may be better or worse, but it can never be fully attained."

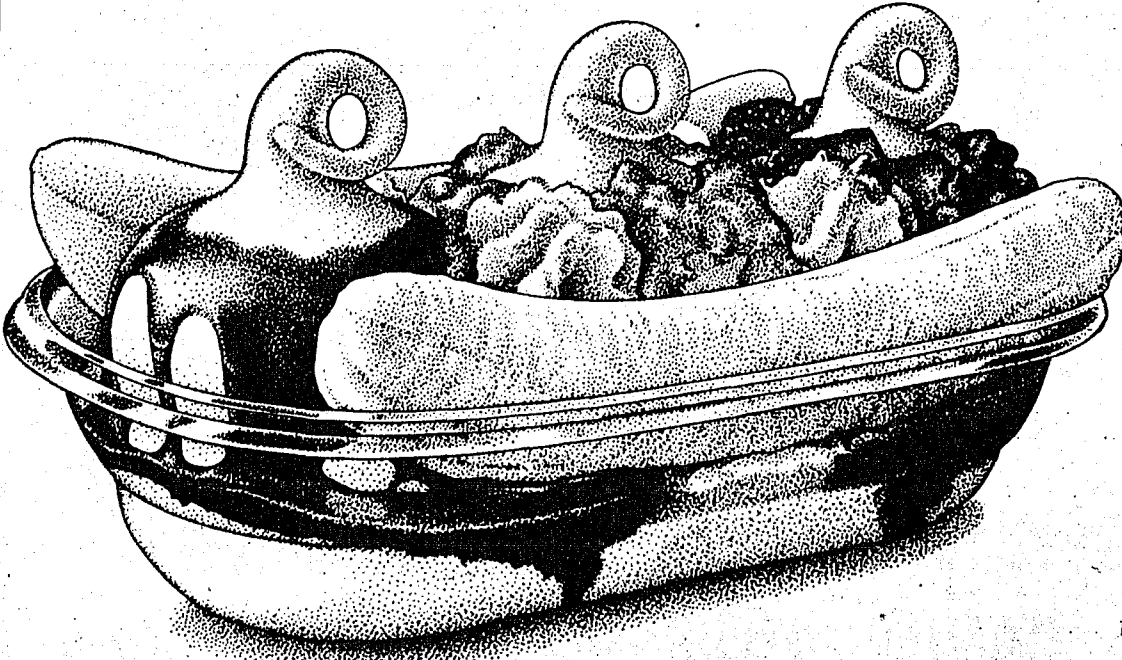

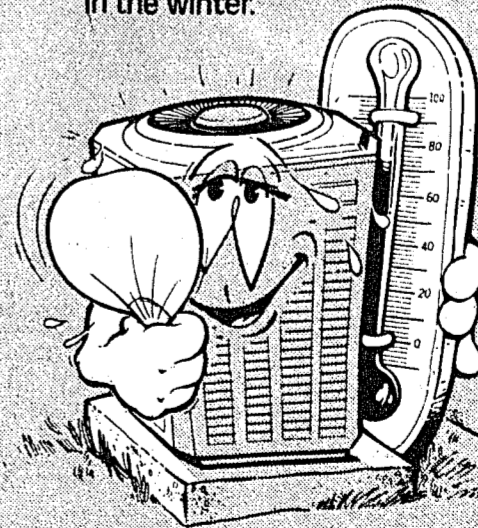

THICK TOENAIL

Thick toenails (onychogryphosis) are usually the result of trauma, of having been injured time and again. It could come from repeatedly jamming your toes against the front of your shoe or from dropping things on you toe. The nail then can thicken to the point where it's 1/2 to 3/4 of an inch thick. When it reaches that state, the pressure of your shoe can make it very painful.

It can be clipped and filed to reduce the thickness, then smoothed out with an emery board. However, if you clip and/or file your

hope to avoid actually borrowing the money or raising taxes, Skelton said.

Also, the deficit may not be as high as \$200,000 because some spending should be lower than actually anticipated in the budget, Skelton said.

Because the county became self-insured this year, a savings of about \$25,000 is expected, Skelton said.

Also, indigent health care expenses have been lower than anticipated. If health care costs for the poor continue to be low, the county may save between \$25,000 to \$30,000, Skelton said.

Also, at 5 p.m. June 11, the commissioners will discuss leasing a substation to be built adjacent to a planned 500-bed private prison. The substation would be used as a 48-bed county jail.

The substation also may be used to house the sheriff's and police departments at the prison to be located north of Coleman.
