Tax Dollars At Work

We often hear about "federal government dollars," but where do they come from and where do they go?

According to the budget prepared by the Office of Management and Budget for the current 1990 fiscal year, each dollar is comprised of individual income taxes (41 cents), social insurance receipts (34 cents), corporation income taxes (10 cents), borrowing (8 cents), other sources (4 cents) and excise taxes (3 cents).

As to how it is spent, 43 cents of every dollar goes to direct benefit payments for individuals, 26 cents goes to national defense, 15 cents pays net interest on the deficit, 11 cents funds grants to states and localities, and 5 cents is spent on other federal operations.

First Step In Climb To Another Playoff Berth

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will tangle with the Tolar Rattlers at Mountaineer Field Thursday evening at 6:30 in a controlled scrimmage. The outing is the first in their quest for another district title.

Texas Football Magazine has picked the local team to "fight it out" with Water Valley for second place in district play. Eden is the pre-season favorite with 20 returning lettermen. Other schools in the district are Miles, Menard and Irion County.

After a few workouts, the last few days in full contact, new head coach and athletic director says, "I'm glad to be here in Santa Anna. We have some pretty good kids and they want to play football. We'll have size, strength, and speed. The main weakness will probably be in

depth...a familiar occurrence in Class A football."

Among the 32 who have shown up for workouts, the Mountaineers have six starters returning each way and eight returning lettermen in all. Jackson averaged 100 yards plus for the Mountaineers last season and the Black and Gold went 7-5, losing to Rotan 13-0 in Area playoff. Fullback Byron Dowdy is back with his bruising style of running, averaging five yards per carry after being sidelined in the season with an injury.

The Mountaineers will scrimmage Rankin on Friday, August 31 and their first full pledged game will be against Permenter's old team, the Cross Plains Buffalos, here at home.

Councilman Daniel Named Mayor Pro-Tem

New Tax Rate Set; Other Council Business Routine

In a City Council meeting Tuesday night of last week, Councilman Quinton Daniel was chosen unanimously by his fellow councilmen to serve as Mayor Pro-Tem. Council-lady Karen Morris made the motion to appoint Daniel to the post with a seconding by Jim Spillman. Other than that action, the business

taken care of at the meeting was pretty much routine.

Mayor Brock called the meeting to order with all members present except Tom Hays, who was in a Dallas Hospital undergoing medical tests. City Secretary Alys Pelton and Supt. of Operations Derriel

Warnock were also present.

Items discussed and actions taken was as follows:

- The ordinance for setting the property tax rate was reviewed. The 1990 effective tax rate as determined by the County Tax Appraisal Office is .7162. Last year's rate was .7039.

The effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. The rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are per \$100 of property value.

Councilman Spillman made the motion to accept the effective tax rate for the purpose of generating the same tax revenue as last year. Daniel seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

- Mayor Brock opened a discussion on worker's compensation insurance. After some consideration, the council agreed for Mrs. Brock to contact Texas Municipal League about the Intergovernmental Risk Pool, which, according to a proposal received, would cost the City about \$3000 less than the current policy with another carrier. More information will be obtained before a final decision is made.

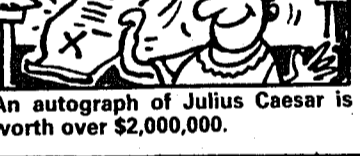
