Rain!!!!

Relief For Fire Fighters

Rain was falling in Santa Anna and the surrounding area as we were putting the finishing touches to this edition of the NEWS on Tuesday afternoon. What a welcome sight and relief from the unbearable heat we have experienced that past couple of weeks or so, with temperatures over 100 most every day!

A quick check Tuesday night with Teresa Absher who records rain amounts for the National Weather Service, tells us that that last measurable rain until this week was June 26 when we received .03 inches. Not a drop of rain fell in the area during July. On Monday we received .14" and .43" on Tuesday.

Total rainfall for the year (through July) has been measured at 20.06 inches. At this time last year we had recorded 21.53 inches. Normal rainfall for the year in our community usually averages about 27-30 inches.

The moisture this week was certainly welcome by landowners in the area who have been experiencing range fires in past weeks.

Several area fire departments including the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department were called to help fight a range fire Monday evening in northeast Coleman County, apparently set off by lightning that accompanied the clouds which brought us that little bit of moisture. The rainfall on Tuesday helped to extinguish hotspots still smoldering in that area.

Typographical errors have plagued the printed word ever since the invention of type.



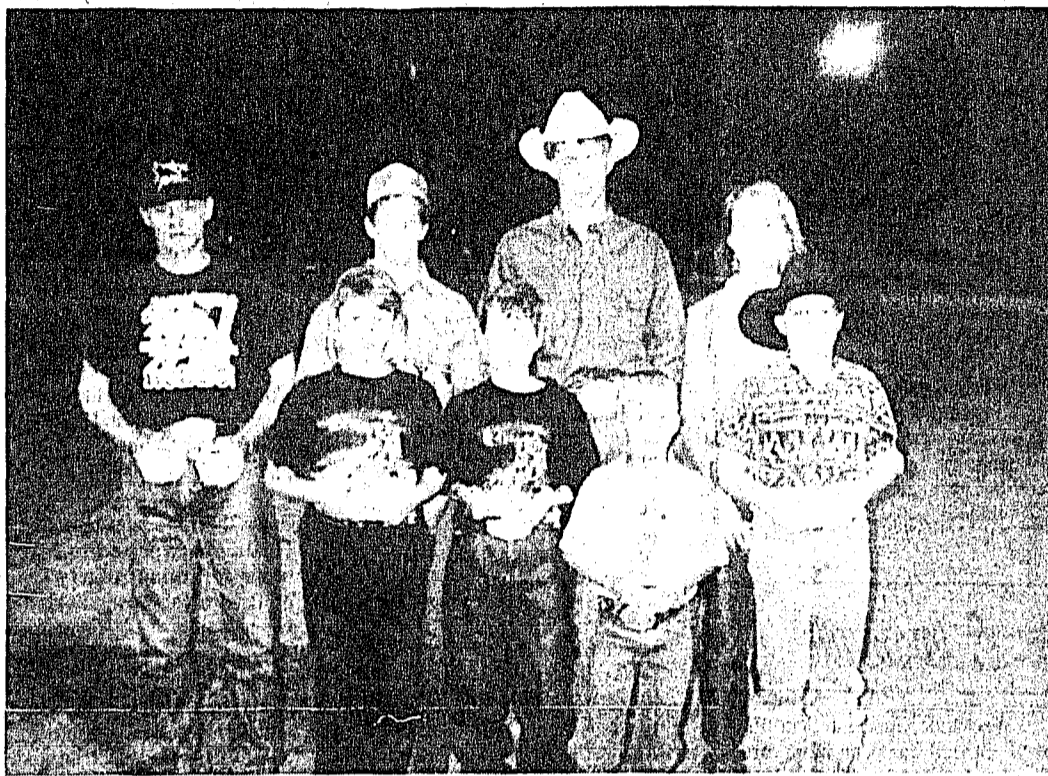
And we here at the NEWS have our share of them, as some of our readers are quick to point out. Of course, we take the constructive criticism in good humor as it is most times intended.

Commissioners Advised Flood Control Dams Need Repair

Coleman County Commissioners met Friday and heard several items on the agenda.

Commissioners were advised that 80 flood dams built in the 1950's have not been operated and maintained to government specifications.

Larry Seymore of the Central Colorado Soil and Conservation told commissioners that at least 20 the dams were in very poor conditions due primarily to erosion. One is in dire need of repair immediately.

He also said the county has failed to uphold their part of the operation and maintenance of the flood dams and original agreed.

According to the original agreement, \$200 was to have been set aside for the upkeep of each dam, but the money was withdrawn for other purposes and not replaced.

Now the county must come up with the money to repair the dams and operate and maintain the others as becomes necessary.

The commissioners agreed to pay contractor Joe Nuncio for the completion of 22,300 feet of fencing on FM 503. The court approved reso-

lutions to open condemnation proceedings on two small lots in the Voss community on the W.W. Sanders property for the widening of FM 503.

Bids were opened on surplus equipment and a budget review was conducted.

A public hearing on the budget will be held in coming weeks.

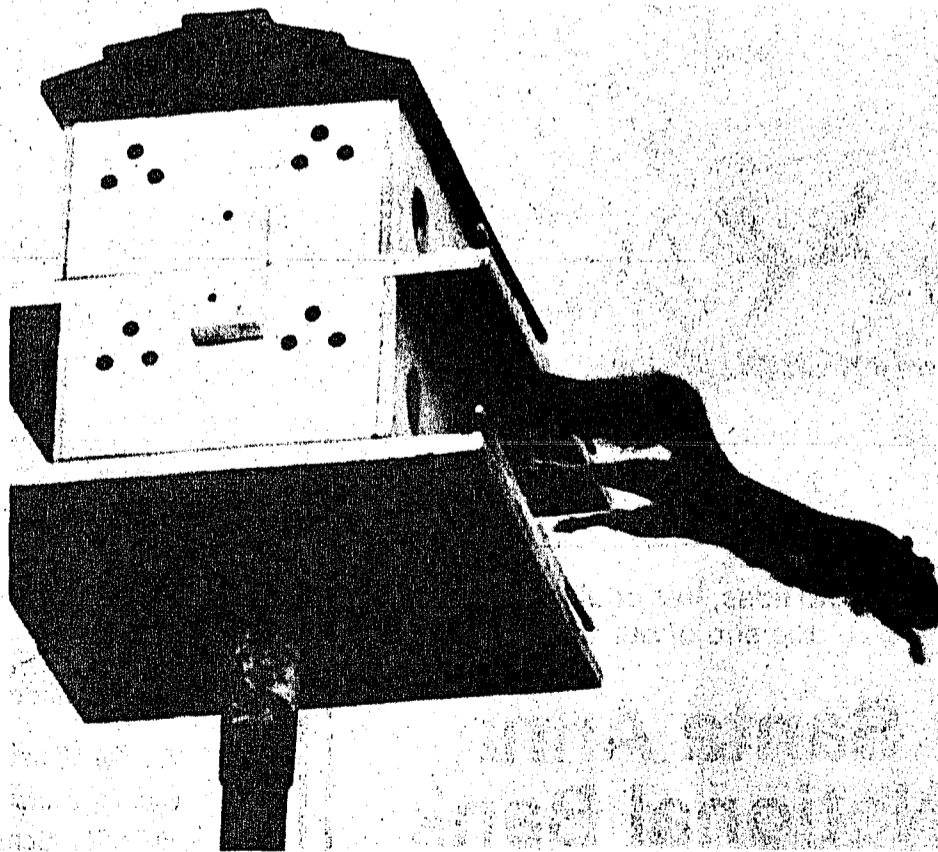

Chester and Mildred Galloway retired from their hardware store business and his job at Bangs Lamp Factory in 1983, but that didn't mean they retired from all the caring and thoughtful things they are known for doing for others. Even though health problems have slowed them down, being concerned for others still occupies much of their time.

The couple were married at the Methodist Church in Monahans, Tex. March 20, 1938, and honeymooned in Monterey, Mexico. At the time Chester was in the restaurant business in Monahans and she was working with her sister and brother-in-law, Lorene and Ira Huddler, who operated a grocery store there. They came to Santa Anna to make their home in 1947. In those intervening years Chester served a stint in the Army Air Force during World War II serving in the signal corps in India and Burma while Mildred worked in Brownwood.

During the interview I was shown some pencil drawings Chester had done while he was in Burma and India. They included drawings of people in their native dress and of animals he had seen there. He has recently taken up drawing again as therapy and is quite talented. I especially liked the one he calls "Big Brother". He says he was inspired by remembering his younger life as the big brother to five siblings. The Joe Galloway family lived in Sour Lake. Chester left there after graduating high school in 1929.

Mildred, one of seven children of the late Mr. and Mrs. M.D. Eubank, was born in Waxahachie. The family moved to Santa Anna when she was a young child. She is a 1933 graduate of Santa Anna High School.

The couple and Mildred's sister,

Pauline Eubank, established G & E Hardware in 1961 after buying the stock of Blue Hardware at its closing. They opened their store across the street in the building which now houses Village Ice Cream Shoppe and Little Country Mall, doing business there until 1983.

Even after retiring Chester continued to make parts for lamps for the factory he had been employed with in Bangs and kept himself occupied with his woodworking hobby. The Methodist Church Lord's Acre Harvest Festival has benefited greatly through the years from his handiwork donated for sale and auction. The pulpit that is used in the sanctuary of the

Methodist church was lovingly built by Chester as was the choir rail and music stand, and many other appointments in the church. He also built the pulpit, minister's chair and communion table for Northside Baptist Church.

Chester is a former president of the Santa Anna Lions Club and member of the Methodist Men's Club. He was secretary-treasurer of the group when it first organized many years ago. He also taught the intermediate youth Sunday School class for a number of years and the couple were sponsors of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in the 1950's. Mildred was a charter member of the Nitia Daniell Circle of the Methodist Church and a former president of the group which is named for her late sister. Both have served in many areas and on the administrative board and committees of the church.

Growing Up At Whon, Texas

Editors Note: The following is the first of a series of articles which ran in the NEWS in 1983. We thought our readers would enjoy reading it again and those who did not see it in 1983 might be interested.

Life at Whon, Texas during my childhood was simple—reminding me of the Faulkner novels about rural life in Georgia, with the dusty roads and people surrounded by family and friends.

The little community is located 18 miles south of Santa Anna, and in those days it was a dirt road all the way. Our community was bounded by Home Creek on the north and the Colorado River on the south. The Gill Ranch was the east boundary and the Robinson place on the west, comprising the Whon school district. Each community pretty well kept to itself. However the Morgan French children attended the Rockwood school but came to church in our community.

My earliest memories are of Ida Herring as postmistress. The community was a busy place with Tommie Holmes the barber; Ed Tisdell owner of the cotton gin, and Alfred

Bible the ginner.

Storekeepers of the three stores during the 1945-38 period were Alonza and Eva Barnett, Doss and Josie Barnett Smith, Mrs. Bell and children, Jack and Nora Black, Tiny and Mr. Black, and in later years, Mrs. Charles Benge, Mrs. Ed Tisdell and Gus Fiveash.

Olie Curry was the piano tuner, and Curtis Collins was our road commissioner. Christine Trobridge, who later became Mrs. John Will Vance, was County Agent. She came to Whon for the Home Demonstration Club, which was a really big thing, teaching the women of the community to can and preserve vegetables and fruit and "make something out of nothing."

Gus Fiveash was the blacksmith and Tom Simpson from Santa Anna was the cotton buyer. Carl Buttry, Woodrow and Eulcian Niell were truckers who took our livestock to the Fort Worth Stock Yards, the main market at that time.

Christmas 1934 in Whon was cold and dry. I spent Christmas Eve with my Uncle Jim Ramsey and his children, Lena Mae, Buddy, Shorty, James, Dorothy and Edith, who lived just across the field from our house. Uncle Jim's wife had died a few years

before and another daughter, Jeanette Faye, lived with an aunt in Avoca.

I remember they had such a good dinner, and about 4 o'clock Uncle Jim took me home.

Just as dark came, I could hear the sleigh bells ring, and in walked Santa Claus, who with a "ho, ho, ho," took the sheet from around the Christmas tree.

Mamma (Addie Ramsey Fiveash) lit the wax candles and played the piano while we sang Christmas carols. I asked if Santa Claus could be Uncle Gus Fiveash, who lived a half mile down the road from us. His shoes sure looked like the ones Uncle Gus wore. I don't remember ever looking at his shoes after that time.

Uncle Jim Ramsey later remarried and in all had 18 children.

Jim Robin, a Santa Anna butcher, came to Whon in his car to deliver fresh meat, selling from the trunk of the auto to the stores and housewives in the community. The ice man came through the community twice each week, making deliveries to the homes along the route where cards were displayed showing the size of ice block wanted—25.50, 75 or 100 pounds. If the card was not in sight, the delivery man passed without stopping.

Newspapers were read by everyone with the Fort Worth Star Telegram, San Angelo Standard Times and Santa Anna News the most read.

Community life revolved around the school, and students were active in county meets and tournaments. I remember Ernest Tenyson reciting "The House Beside of the Road," for declamation and thought he spoke so well—but don't remember if he won a prize.

We played tennis on clay courts—like Wimbledon—but we had to sweep the courts each day, and sometimes during a game.

We had a fine school building of four rooms and two wide halls. In 1938 we got our first school bus—until that time students walked to school or rode horseback. The first bus was really something. It looked like a flat bed truck with a wooden chicken coop on top, with small windows and benches along each side and back-to-back down the middle. About that time the high school students from Whon were transferred to Santa Anna to complete their education, along with many other students from the small rural schools.

Joe and Conception Diaz were the only Mexican students in school, and there were no Blacks. Charlie Martin Avants was the champion marble player with a jaw that was the prize of the county. Although playing "keepers" was not allowed, Charlie carried his marbles in a 10-pound flour sack!

I started to school in 1936 and my teacher was Inez McIver, first, second and third. Leta Hancock taught fourth, fifth and sixth; and Mr. and Mrs. Pearce Baker taught seventh grade and up. Other teachers I remember at Whon were Ina Smith, Pauline England, Leora Hester, Mrs. Hood, Hayden Goodgoin, Alpha Mae Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. Burl Shannon and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Durham.

Students dusted the erasers, swept the floors and pumped their own water. In other words, there were no janitors. Classmates I remember in the first grade were Allyn Gill, Helen Norris, W. T. Cargill and Tommie Sue Holmes.

Terrell Graves was County Superintendent, located in the red brick building with the Triple-A office. Warren Gill, Jim Carter and my dad, Lee Fiveash, were trustees. If a teacher drank, smoked or cursed, they didn't get the job—of yes, or danced!

I remember Mrs. Hood taught tap dancing and I wasn't allowed to take. But Rolan Deal and Tommie Sue Holmes taught me the steps they had learned in their class.

Children at Whon rolled casings for past time. The old discarded tires sure got your hands black, but it was lots of fun.

The Star Route letter carriers for Whon that I remember are Stube Phillips, Doug Mitchell, Doug and Louise Moore. I understand that the Star Route was a bid sent to the Postal Department and paid by the Government.

The mail always came to our house at 12 noon. I remember on April Fool's Day 1936 I ran for the mail, returning to sit down to dinner. I said, "Daddy, Roy and Nettie Bible's house is burning down!"

Daddy scolded me saying, "We don't play jokes like that." Anyway, the house was nearly gone by that time.

The day before the fire, the Bible family had received a large box with clothes and gifts for the family. Doris got a set of little pink glass dishes which I thought were the prettiest I had ever seen, and they were melted. The fire also burned their dog under the house. They moved to a small house just north of our house and later to Santa Anna.

A University Professor Has Found The Answer To Lower Grocery Bills

There's a refrigerator in the future that will greatly reduce the spoilage of many perishable foods and operate about as inexpensively as the one in most kitchens today. It could cut food costs dramatically.

This refrigeration marvel of the 21-century is being birthed now in the Separations Research Program of the College of Engineering at The University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. William Koros, a principal investigator on the project, says the refrigerator is ready to be marketed now insofar as technology is concerned. It won't be around for a while yet, however, because new products like this have to be made "commercially viable and consumer compatible."

But in the laboratory of Dr. Koros, he already is taking pure nitrogen out of the air and using it to replace the chilled oxygen that presently is the agent that keeps food fresh. Bacteria that aren't deterred by oxygen from attacking food and spoiling it can't exist in pure nitrogen.

Using nitrogen to keep organic and other substances away from oxygen to give them longer life is hardly a new idea. Until now, however, the expense of separating the gas out of the air has limited its use to large-scale commercial operations.

Not many home-owners have been willing to give the high costs, not to mention the potential danger, of installing a tank of nitrogen in the house just to make fresh food last a bit longer.

Now they won't have to worry about the costs or dangers of nitrogen if Dr. Koros' idea is as practical as experiments indicate that it will be.

He is a specialist in a little-known science called "separations research." He has spent his professional life separating various gases. However, until recent advances in the production of what are known as "polymer membranes" for separating gases, separating nitrogen from oxygen in this manner was not possible.

Polymer membranes are man-made. Those with which Koros and his research team have been working are designed in such a way that by using an inexpensive membrane and a small compressor, nitrogen can be separated from oxygen and forced through the membrane.

Details of how this is done are of little interest to the home-owner who only wants better refrigeration. But for those with a scientific bent, here's the explanation:

Nitrogen molecules are larger than those of oxygen. The laboratory membranes are designed so that the smaller oxygen molecules can escape, leaving the nitrogen trapped. That gas is then directed into the refrigerator food compartment under slight pressure, thus forcing out the air already in the refrigerator.

When the refrigerator door is open,

the nitrogen escapes. But when the door is closed, the process will repeat.

People breathe oxygen to live. So there is a danger that a device which produces nitrogen will also remove the oxygen from the room where it's located? Dr. Koros says no.

In fact, taking the nitrogen directly from the air in the room will actually increase slightly the richness of the oxygen remaining!

Dr. Koros warns, however, that there shouldn't be a rush to the nearest appliance store to buy the new refrigerator.

He says that many safety factors and other design features must be taken into account. Membrane-phased gas separation devices won't be built routinely into home refrigerators just yet.

"When you're designing technology for consumer use, you have to be careful," he says.

In addition to this new idea in preserving food, however, Dr. Koros and his team have other ideas to make the 21 century the best yet. They are studying the use of polymer membrane separation of other gases such as oxygen, helium and hydrogen. These could have important industrial applications.

For example, their research may include membranes for providing oxygen-rich air to automobile carburetors. Also cheaper methods of enriching oxygen environments for patients who now have to breathe this gas from bottles are in the future.

"These things are going to happen!" Dr. Koros says.

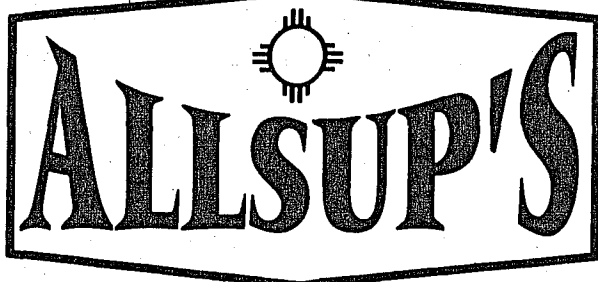

Santa Anna School Takes Part In National School Lunch/Breakfast Program

The Santa Anna School District takes part in the National School Lunch/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 60 cents. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price. If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals. If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the income chart, your children can get free or reduced-price meals for 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income. Your eligibility may be checked by the school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked for

information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals. If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of the verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing school superintendent James McPherson, 348-3136, P. O. Box 99, Santa Anna, Texas 76878. CONFIDENTIALITY. The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and verify eligibility. You may apply for free or reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible

not but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, and increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps from AFDC for your children, fill out an application. In the same respect, if your children are eligible for and receive the free or reduced-price meals, you must report any later changes to the school, such as income increases, household decreases, etc. To get free or reduced-price meals for your children carefully complete the application available at the school. If you would like help filling out the free and reduced application, Mrs. Betty Tucker will be in the cafeteria August 10, 12 and 13 9 a.m. until 12 noon.

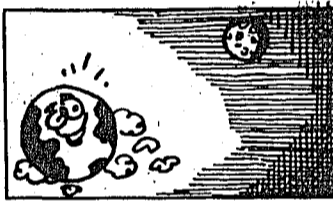

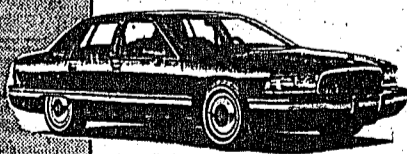
