Early Voting For Runoff Election Begins April 4

Voters who did not cast a ballot in the Tuesday, March 8 Primary Election can still vote in the April 12 runoff election says Secretary of State John Hannah.

"When participation is low, it's crucial that people remember that they can vote in the runoff elections, even if they didn't vote during the first round," Hannah said.

Hannah reminded everyone who did vote on March 8 must vote in the same party's runoff.

Early voting for the runoff will take place in the County Clerk's office April 4-8.

When asked the most rewarding aspect of teaching, Loyd said, "The most rewarding aspect of



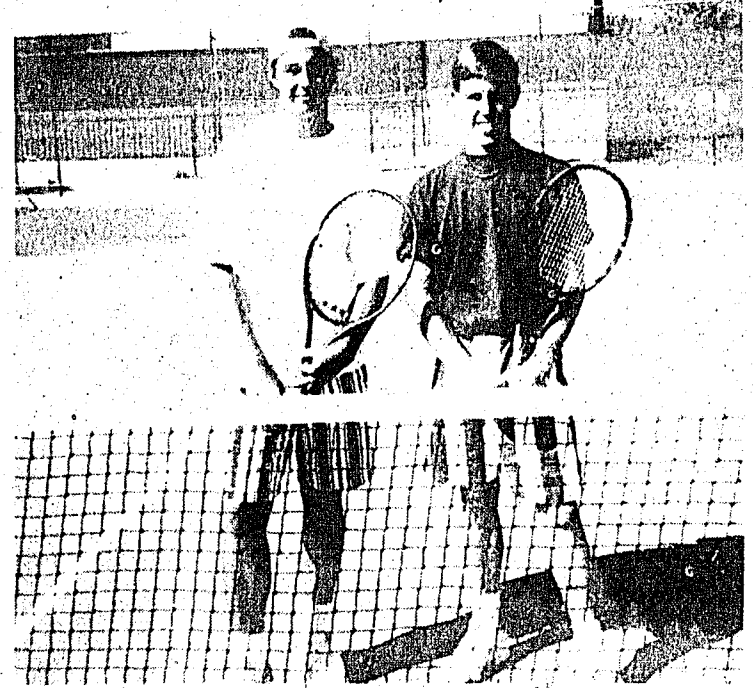

Comanche Women Of Power and Influence

Kewiddawippa (Tall Woman)??

Treaties signed by The People (We call them Comanches. They call themselves Numunu, "The People") with the Republic of Texas and United States contain signatures with the word "woman" included in the translation: A very interesting example is the signature of Kewiddawippa on the Butler Lewis Treaty. I suspect this signature belongs to a wife of the Warchief Santa Anna. There are two good reasons for this suspicion. First, one wife accompanied Santa Anna to Washington to meet "the Great White Father", President Polk; after the Butler-Lewis Treaty was signed. She was the only woman from the delegation of Texas Indians noted in Polk's journal. In an entry on July 1, 1846 Polk notes, "Among the Comanches and other wild Indians of the prairies were several women or squaws, and among others the wife of Santa Anna, the Comanche chief, was present." The second possible clue is contained in the following quote from William Parker's Notes Taken During the Expedition Through Unexplored Texas in the Summer and Fall of 1854 contains an interesting observation. Parker reported:

A very interesting woman accompanied this party. She was the widow of Santa Anna, a celebrated chief who died about three years since, and still mourned her loss, going out every evening in the neighborhood of camp to howl and cry and cut herself with knives, according to the custom among them of persons in affliction. She had separated herself from the tribe, and formed a band of women, seven in number, like herself widows. She owned a large herd of mules and horses, and was a most successful hunter, having alone shot with her rifle fifteen deer in a mornings hunt. She was a fine looking woman, an Amazon in size and haughty bearing, rode astride, and dressed in deep black.

Tall Woman...an Amazon in size...The choices of conclusions, until additional documentation is discovered, are (1) Santa Anna's "Amazon" wife signed the treaty and accompanied him to Washington and her name was Kewiddawippa (2) some other "tall woman" signed the treaty (3) A man called "Tall Woman" signed the treaty (4) none of the above. Unfortunately,

no reference has been found naming Santa Anna's wives. They seem always identified in relation to a male. Another example was provided by RIP Ford. He was impressed by "the mother of Carne Muerto" (Carne Muerto was Santa Anna's son). He noted:

While encamped at Los Ojuelos, Ford's company on September 24, 1850, was sworn in for another six months enlistment. Shortly after this, we were quite surprised to be honored by a visit from two ladies. One was the mother of Carne Muerto, the Comanche prisoner, and the other, the mother of the young brave whom we had been forced to kill at Benavides' ranch. They had come to learn of the fate of their children. How they managed to make the trip, to pass between the different military stations of regulars and troops and rangers, no one could guess. But here they were, speaking for their children and for themselves.

They found an able interpreter in Roque and also in Warren Lyons, who had recently joined the company. Everything was explained to them and they started, accompanied by Roque,

DENTON—Services for Dr. Othel Jackson Curry will held at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, March 24, 1994 at Deberry Funeral Home. Burial will in Oak Grove Cemetery in Cameron, Texas.

He died Friday, March 18, 1994 at Denton.

Born in Brown County on Oct. 25, 1904, he attended the Buffalo School and Daniel Baker College in Brownwood. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Texas and his doctorate from the University of Michigan. He worked in many professions and served as professor of economics at the University of Michigan, professor of finance at the University of Arkansas and professor of accounting at the Wharton School of Business of the University of Pennsylvania. He co-authored several accounting and business textbooks.

In 1944, he became the first dean of the School of Business Administration of North Texas State College, now the University of North Texas. He served in that capacity until his retirement in 1969 which was marked by the establishment of the O. J. Curry Chair of Accounting.

He was a past elder of the First Presbyterian Church and was active in several civic and professional organizations.

Survivors include one brother, W. V. (Buster) Curry of Brazosport; one daughter, Betty Curry Laney of Denton; one son, Jack Kelso Curry of Irving, five grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Mary Kelso Curry, who died Nov. 1, 1989.

Thoughts From Our Pastors

There are a lot of people in Santa Anna and else where who have nothing to do with church or God. As a pastor I often hear the rationalizations used to justify this behavior. Some of the more popular ones are:

1. I don't have time Sundays my only day off.
2. The Church is full of hypocrites.
3. The theology is incomprehensible or irrelevant to my life.
4. The rituals are meaningless and boring.

I think it boils down to the fact that many people feel that a relationship with God is just too complicated and demanding to be worth the bother. Let me share a story that will demonstrate how simple and beneficial a relationship with God can be.

Spencer Morgan Rice, Rector of Trinity Church, Boston, once told (Watch, Therefore, for Ye Know Not When the Master Cometh," 2 December 1984) of how early in his ministry he was serving a small congregation in the Los Angeles basin. The sexton of the church took as much interest in those who came to pray and meditate as he did the upkeep of the church.

One man in particular attracted his attention. This man dropped by the church briefly every day about 12:15. He would walk down the center aisle, stand at the chancel steps and stare at the altar for a moment. Then he would leave.

After a few days, the sexton began to worry. The man was not well dressed. He was not the cleanest. He did not always walk steady. The sexton mentioned his concern to Rice, who suggested the sexton simply ask the man if there was anything the church could do for him.

When the sexton asked, the man said, "No, thank you. I just come in every day and stand before the altar and say, 'Jesus, it's Jim.' It is not much of a prayer, I know, but I think God knows what I mean."

Months slipped by. The sexton never again mentioned their daily visitor. Then, one morning Rice got a call from the Mother Superior of a home for aged men run by the Sisters of the Transfiguration. These women minister to men broken by life.

Let's let Rice tell the end of the story: The Mother Superior told me that Jim had been admitted, and I said I would be out to see him. She met me at the door and said, you know, Father Rice, he has been here for two months. He went into the most cantankerous ward we have. Every nun here has tried her best to bring some sense of joy and calm to that ward. We failed. Jim went into that ward and the place is transformed. It is a new place. I went to him two days ago and I asked, 'Jim, how is it that you have been able to bring such joy and such a sense of peace to these men?' And he said, 'Oh, sister, it is because of my visitor.' And she said, 'I know he didn't have any visitors. That chair hadn't been occupied the 60 days he has been here. So I said, Jim, what visitors? I've never seen a visitor.' And he said, 'Sister, every day at 12:00, He comes and stands at the foot of my bed and says, 'Jim, it's Jesus!'

A relationship with God is not hard, boring or irrelevant. It is simply a matter of opening yourself up to His presents. As you saw, that is easy to do and it can make all the difference in the world.

If you need help there are several churches and pastors in town that would be more than happy to assist you in any way possible. May God bless each of you this day and all the days of your life.

Coleman Man's Death Probed As Homicide

COLEMAN — Authorities of the Blanco County Sheriff's Department have ruled the September 1993 death of Coleman businessman Jerry Crosby as a suicide.

Blanco County Justice of the Peace Bill Guthrie entered the homicide ruling into inquest records Wednesday following an investigation of more than six months.

Guthrie said investigators ruled out suicide, initially believed to be the cause of death, after a long investigation which included sending evidence to the Department of Public Safety lab for fingerprints and ballistics on the rifle found in Crosby's vehicle. It appeared none of the results of the test were indicative of suicide or an accident.

Several other discoveries led officials away from the original suicide

theory, including the fact that Crosby had just purchased new hunting licenses; the pickup in which his body was found was full of gas; and there was no suicide note.

Crosby died of a single gunshot wound to the abdomen from a .22-caliber rifle.

Crosby was last seen in Coleman the morning of Sept. 7, 1993. His body was found in his pickup on a private ranch near County Road 205, approximately eight miles west of Johnson City on Sept. 9.

Due to heavy rains at the time, some of the evidence surrounding Crosby's death could have been washed away which, in turn, may have slowed the investigation, Guthrie said.

At the time of his death, Crosby was owner and operator of the Three Ks Bar-B-Q restaurant on Highway 84 just east of Coleman.

These women remained at Laredo for some time. They received many presents from all classes, and finally departed.

All that can be concluded at this point is that Santa Anna had one or more wives/wives who certainly did not fit well into the "powerless chattering" role. The story of remarkable women associated with Santa Anna does not end here. Information about this

mother was collected from Horseback and some of the other last surviving chiefs of the horse culture by Emmor Harston, an adopted member of the tribe whose Comanche name was "Nod-e-mah Ta-o-yo" or "Little Trader Boy." Harston reported Santa Anna's mother, Wap-so-ni, was the female governor of Conas (the warrior training camp at what is now called Santa Anna's Peak). An additional source, a recently published Comanche Dictionary and Grammar, included the following entry, "Santanta (name) Comanche chief; mother was Wapusoni; sent to Washington, D.C.; in 1847 signed German peace treaty." This recent dictionary and grammar was compiled with the assistance of Comanche elders and leaders who remember both their language and history. The fact that Wapusoni/Wapusoni was included in a reference created almost two centuries after she lived is an indication of her importance to the People.

THE PEOPLE TO RETURN

The People (Numuru or Comanche) will return to Santa Anna Peaks in Coleman County to participate in "Funtier Days", an annual event sponsored by the town of Santa Anna, the weekend of May 7-9. This is an opportunity for them to remember some of their most glorious years as "Lords of the South Plains" and to strengthen a growing friendship with the citizens of Santa Anna and the people of Texas. I hope you will join the town of Santa Anna and the people of Texas. I hope you will join the town of Santa Anna, Texanna, and other groups of Texans in welcoming The People as they again return home. Bill Neeley, the Comanche Tribal Historian recently wrote, "Texas is a religion. Our land is sacred to all races who live and have lived upon it. As we once fought for its possession, let us now pray together for our integration with it and our harmonious unity as we reflect upon a stormy past."

DANGER; SUN SHINE!--Sunny Texas is a wonderful place to be in the summer--if one is careful about the sun.

Dermatologists at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas warn that even the winter sun can cause skin cancer if one gets too much exposure. Summer sun can be devastating, even to people with dark skin.

Dr. Amit Pamdya, assistant professor of dermatology there, says fair skinned people are at most risk to sun damage. He adds, however, that Hispanics and others with dark skin also are susceptible to skin cancer if they fail to use sun screen and get too much exposure to the sun's rays.

He says cancer isn't the only danger. The sun also can cause the appearance of premature aging. This results from a lifetime of prolonged exposure rather than a few bad sunburns, he says.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT... Thousands of Americans eat insects every day without knowing it.

Barrie Kitto, biochemist at The University of Texas at Austin, says that everyone who eats a breakfast cereal probably consumes a small quantity of insect fragments each morning.

Beetles, weevils and moths are the three insects most likely to garnish cereals. They're not strangers to bakery products, packaged mixes and other products.

Except for possibly upsetting the sensitivities of the consumer, there is no cause for undue concern, Kitto says. The bugs may be harmful to the psyche, but not to the stomach.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture stations inspectors at mills, packaging plants and even large bakeries. Their job is to see that no more than two insects per kilogram end up on a diner's plate. If inspectors find a higher bug population in a grain, it's detoured to animal feed.

Testing for insects is expensive. However, Kitto has developed a substitute method which the USDA is testing. He mixes a quantity of the

food product with a chemical to form a liquid. If it turns green it means that insect fragments are present.

YOU MIGHT LIKE TO KNOW... That the Center for the Study of the Vietnam Conflict at Texas Tech University has one of the largest repositories of materials on that war in the world.

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED... What causes ringing in the ears?

It's called "tinnitus" and it is a fairly common ailment that can lead to poor sleep and other problems. In order to drown out the sound and catch a few winks, some patients say noise helps, and they turn on an air-conditioner or a fan.

Scientists at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio are studying two such noise-producing devices as to their effectiveness in inducing sleep. One emits a continuous rain or waterfall sound. The other sends out a continuous "white" noise.

Dr. Robert Dohie of the department of otolaryngology-head and neck surgery, is testing the device on volunteers who have suffered from tinnitus for six months or more.

SCHOOL DAZE--Bandera, the Hill Country town famous for its dude ranches and race track, has added a college to its attractions.

LABOR PAINS--A happy worker isn't always a productive worker.

That's the conclusion of Alicia Gladney, who studied workers in an Illinois manufacturing plant for her master's degree in sociology. She discovered that improving morale of workers doesn't necessarily increase their productivity.

However teaching new tasks to employees is an effective way to increase their production. Such workers become self-motivated and thus more efficient.

Great Expectations

Researchers at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas and scientists at a California biotechnology company may have discovered a new drug which could be a cure for colon and pancreatic cancer.

The drug--a newly designed molecule--targets a protein believed to promote most tumors of the colon and pancreas. Unlike most cancer drugs, this one is non-toxic and apparently has few side effects.

Toxic drugs hunt for all rapidly dividing cells, even those not involved with the cancer. The new drug, in experiments with cell cultures, halted only the growth of cancer cells and left normal cells intact.

The drug still must be tested in animals. If successful, it will then be tested gradually on humans. Finally it will have to be approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

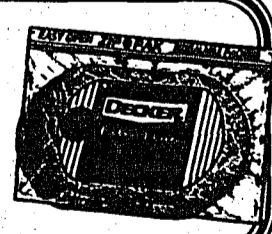
