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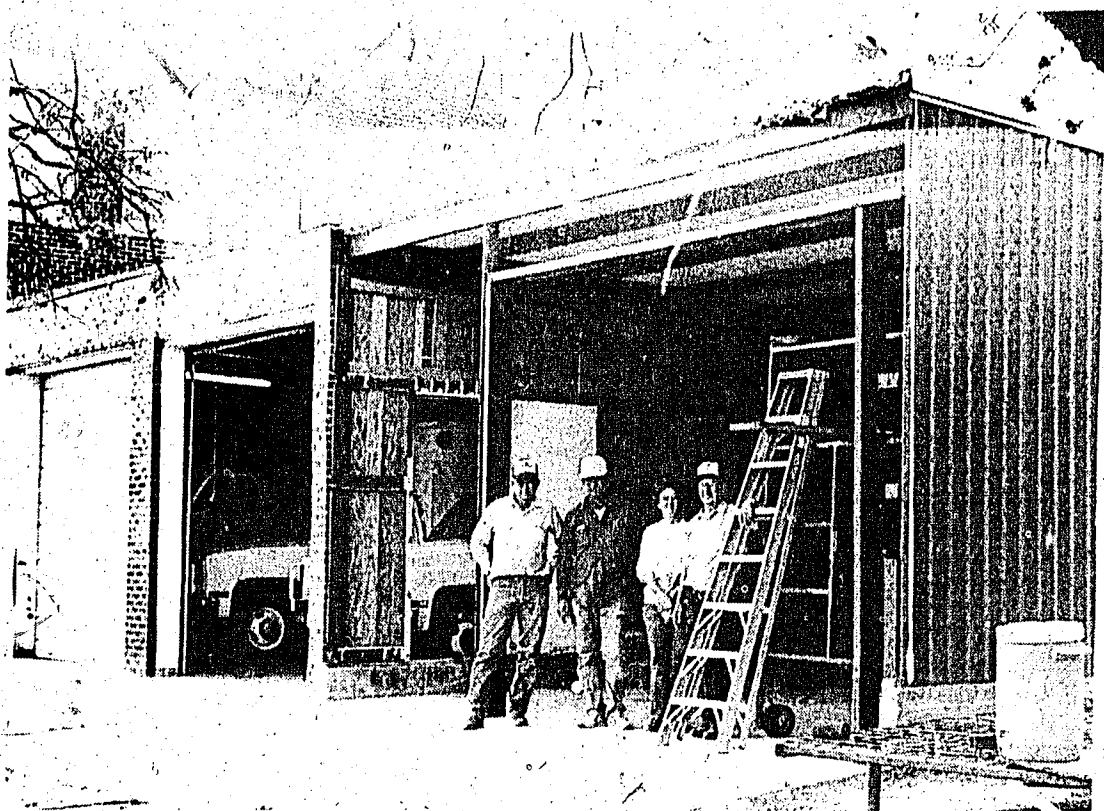

The People (Numunu or Comanche) look at this as an opportunity to return to the land of their heritage and remember some of their most glorious days as "Lords of the South Plains". Their visit to "Santa Anna's Peak" will also strengthen a growing friendship with the citizens of Santa Anna and Texas.

Everyone will want to make plans to welcome them here once again and to be present to watch as they perform their colorful native ceremonial dances at Funtier Square, Saturday, May 7.

The entry deadline for those planning to enter the Funtier Day

buffalo cook-off had been set for the 1st of April. However, since this date falls on Easter weekend the deadline has been extended a few days. Rod Musick, who is taking care of entries for the Funtier Day event asks that those wishing to enter contact him within the next week when the deadline will have to be enforced so that the buffalo meat can be ordered.

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## Celebrate Easter With Texas Produced Ag Products

AUSTIN—Which came first—the chicken or the egg? Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry doesn't know, but he does know that Texas producers have more than enough eggs for all the Easter baskets in the state.

"Last year, 3.6 billion eggs were produced in the state," Perry said. "That means that every single Texan could color 17 dozen eggs this Easter to total our annual egg production."

Texas is a large producer of another Easter tradition—the Easter lily. According to the latest available figures, the state's nurseries produced 347,000 potted Easter

lilies worth \$1.1 million wholesale in 1992.

Perry also reminds consumers to look for and buy Texas-produced ham and leg of lamb when planning that Easter Sunday meal.

Texas leads the nation in the number of sheep and lambs, with 1.7 million head on hand Jan. 1, with a value of \$95.8 million.

For hog production, Texas ranks 13th nationwide with 500,000 head, valued at \$41.5 million.

"Consider making this Easter a Texas-style one; it's the best way of getting the highest quality food products in the quantity you need," Perry added.

## IVIE Reservoir Fishing Report

Bass have moved into the beds by now and are being caught on lizards and power worms. Some are also being caught on red shad colored riverside worms. Bass are ranging from small up to seven pounds.

Crappie have begun to move back into deep water and bigger ones are being caught in the deep water.

The smaller crappie caught last Saturday were about 1-1/4 lb. Most were in the 2 lb. range. They are found about 22-27 feet deep.

For crappie we're using small jigs with minnow dressing.

Catfish are beginning to bite in shallow water. We've found night crawlers are the best bait. Minnows are best for the high fin bluecat.

## Call Of The Wildflowers Goes Out

Now that spring is here, thousands of Texas travelers want to know one thing—where are the best wildflower patches? The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has the answer.

Every spring, TxDOT provides a wildflower reporting service that points travelers in the direction of the state's most gorgeous fields of bluebonnets, Indian paintbrush and other native flora. Throughout April and early May, callers may dial the department's travel information line at 1-800-452-9292 for the scoop on the most colorful wildflower sightings across the state. This information, which is updated weekly by TxDOT employees across the state, is also available at

any of the department's 25 district offices or 12 Travel Information Centers.

Travelers can also find out about bluebonnet driving trails, wildflower festivals and other springtime events held across the state.

This reporting service gives the department a chance to show off the year-round work of TxDOT's maintenance crews, who plant thousands of pounds of wildflower seed annually and coordinate mowing schedules that allow the native plants to mature. Not only do these vegetation management techniques produce some of the most beautiful rights-of-way in the United States, they also prevent erosion and save water and money.

## Teen Inhalant Abuse Rising

One of the greatest threats to your child's health may be right under your nose. Use of inhalants among children to get high is on the rise. The physicians of Texas Medical Association want you to realize that inhalants are lethal poisons, with effects potentially more devastating than other drugs, including cocaine. A recent national survey revealed that a little more than one of every 10 eighth-graders in the survey had inhaled glues, solvents and aerosols to get high.

In Texas, the problem may be even worse. According to the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, 23 percent of secondary students in Texas have used inhalants, and 10 percent of seventh-graders have used them in the past month. A recent position paper on teen-age substance abuse by Texas Medical Association's Adolescent Health Task Force states that the age of first use of inhalants in Texas fell from 14.4 years old in 1988 to 13.3 years old in 1990.

Inhaling substances, also known as "sniffing" or "huffing", is an easy way for adolescents to get high. About 600 legal products exist which can be misused as inhalants. They include glue, paint, gasoline, typewriter correction fluid, hair spray, cooking spray and hundreds more adhesives, aerosols, cleaning agents and solvents. Young people use inhalants for many reasons: they are universally available, inexpensive, and easy to conceal. Inhalants also do not carry legal consequences, like other drugs and provide a fast and pleasurable high.

That high, however, comes at a severe cost to the sniffer's health. Inhalants work by dissolving membranes around nerve tissue in the brain, and their use can lead to per-

manent and severe brain damage. Use and abuse of inhalants also can lead to kidney, liver and bone marrow damage; burns, eye irritation; increased potential for suicidal or antisocial behavior; heart failure; loss of consciousness; and even death.

Because it is easily concealed, inhalant abuse can be difficult to detect. The following signs may indicate a child is using inhalants:

- \*change in school performance or behavior.
- \*presence of strange smells, empty containers or plastic bags.
- \*residue of substances on face or clothing.
- \*complaints of headaches or nausea.
- \*redness around nose or mouth.

Because of the dangerous consequences of inhalants and the difficulty in treating inhalant abuse, prevention is especially important. Children typically begin using inhalants at a very young age, and inhalants are "gateway" drugs which can lead to use of other substances. Even young children need to know about the dangers and health hazards of inhalants. If you have further questions or want more information about inhalants and their effects on health, contact your physician.
