Texans To Take Out Trash Saturday

Delta Omicron Of Santa Anna To Participate

It's time to take out the trash in Texas.

On Saturday, April 9, some 95,000 Adopt-a-Highway and Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers will help ready the Lone Star State for another colorful wildflower season by participating in the ninth annual "Great Texas Trash-Off". This event, which is part of the Texas Department of Transportation's "Don't Mess with Texas" antilitter campaign, is considered the largest one-day cleanup in the nation.

In Coleman County, more than 80 Adopt-a-Highway volunteers such as members of the Coleman Evening Lions Club, the residents of Liberty Lanes Ranch, Delta Omicron Sorority and students and faculty of CAP High School, will scour the state roadways for litter.

This year, TxDOT is adding a new twist to the event by encouraging all Texans to kick the littering habit for at least 24 hours in observance of Trash-Off day.

For the fourth year in a row,

Trash-Off sponsor Coca-Cola is providing volunteers with Texas-sized garbage bags. Last year marked the largest Great Texas Trash-Off in the history of the Don't Mess With Texas campaign, with 85,000 volunteers picking up more than 7 million gallons of litter across the state. That's enough garbage to fill the beds of 17,000 pickup trucks.

Since the Don't Mess with Texas and Adopt-a-Highway programs were launched in 1986, the state has seen a 72 percent decrease in roadside litter.

The Easter table at the library contained two books of fiction that everyone should read and why not continue the Easter season by reading *The Robe* by Lloyd C. Douglas and *The Silver Chalice* by Thomas B. Costain. Both of these were made into movies, but the written word paints so much clearer picture. Last week's column mentioned the TV serial starting on Easter Sunday. "Christy" was based on Catherine Marshall's book. I read this years ago and had forgotten what a powerful story it is. The Sunday Abilene Reporter-News had information that we all should know. It is the true story of Marshall's own mother. By the way, she lived to be 97 years old. Read the story of how this book became a movie. The library has the article and we have a paperback and hardback book.

Carmen Donham has given support to the library for many years. How do I know? Her name was in books moved from the old library. Other names like Millard, Bannister, Barnes, Goy, Burrow, Kirkpatrick and Phillips were in books that are fragile with age or second copies. If you wish to have these books ask at the library.

Carmen continues her generosity. If you like condensed books, she brought several recent editions along with some paperbacks. The library can only exist because of its friends. Thank you for almost 90 years of help!

Recently, some condensed biographies have come in. These are well written enjoyable reading. Jim and I once stopped in the small town of Domremy, France. I'm told that Doe-ra-me like the musical scale. We visited the church and house where Joan-Jeanne d'Arc, began her life's story. What impressed us? The ceiling of the house was so low. How could anyone stand? The countryside is beautiful. Later we saw markers where she was burned at the stake. For years I'd planned to read more of the maid's story. One of the biographies gave me the chance. This book gives a very complete history of the trial. Even the questions and answers that were recorded by several men. What faith this young girl had. Her story can't be true—but it is in the records.

George Washington's story is based on hard facts and conclusions drawn from these. How much better I understand this man and his times. How the times influenced him. After all this man lost his father when very young, became the master of frontier lands, fought wars and lost his beloved older half brother—all in his early twenties. Did you know he had very little formal education and that others made fun of this? Take your pick of three dozen famous men and women. Learn what made them take the paths they followed. Books can take us on a trip through anytime or place.

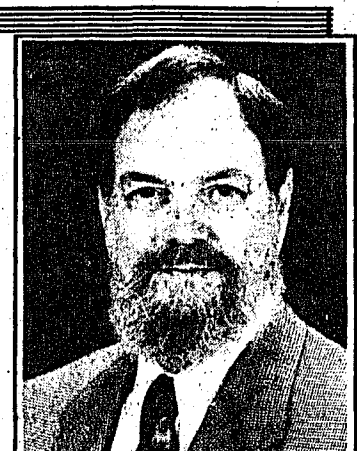

Consumer Credit: A Look At Credit Cards

Consumer credit is one of those everyday life subjects that is not taught by many public high schools. Because of this, there is a lack of knowledge about lending practices and credit.

Let's face it, many folks let the bank balance their checkbook and trust that the figures are right. Yet, the reality is the bank is often wrong—about your checking balance, about your house payment and about your car payment.

Since this general lack of knowledge about credit issues exists, there is one week a year deemed Consumer Credit Information Week. The credit week is the third week in April and the next series of articles will cover credit issues.

An important part of credit for individuals is the credit record. It is important, because without a good credit record a consumer may pay a higher interest rate or be declined for a loan.

A credit record is kept by a credit bureau and contains the credit history of a person or business. Credit bureaus are simply businesses that compile credit records.

There are many credit bureaus in the U. S. and not all of them have the same information. The credit bureaus get their information from businesses that subscribe to them for reports. So, the information on a particular record will be from the subscribers to that bureau.

The federal Fair Credit Reporting Act of 1970 helped many consumers by regulating the way credit bureaus operate and report debts.

The reports may not include bad debts, accounts placed for collection, criminal records or other adverse information that is more than seven years old.

Bankruptcies and judgments can appear for ten years on a record.

A person can request their credit record at any time. If you have just

been denied credit and ask for a report within 30 days, the bureau that was used by the lender cannot charge you for that report.

Otherwise, it may cost you up to \$20 to get a copy.

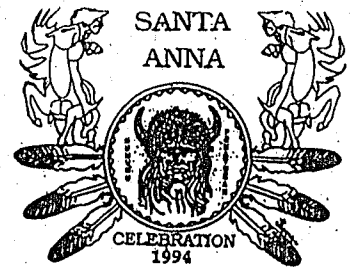
If you find a report has incorrect information, notify the bureau about the information by calling or sending the correction request in writing. Your best bet is to write, so you have proof of your request.

If there is a debate about the information reported by a certain creditor, you can file a statement of dispute with the credit bureau. The statement must be 100 words or less, and the bureau must provide you with assistance in writing it.

The Act also requires that certain notices of correction be sent to

those who requested your report within the prior six months. It is the responsibility of the individual to request this be done by the bureau.

Lastly, never hire a 'credit repair' company. Most of them operate by illegal means and can get you in serious trouble with the law. Only you can fix your credit.

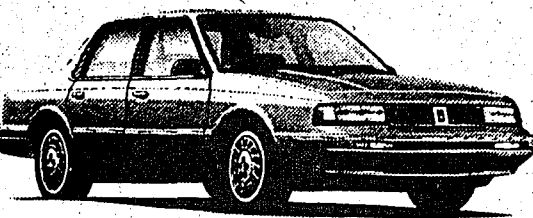

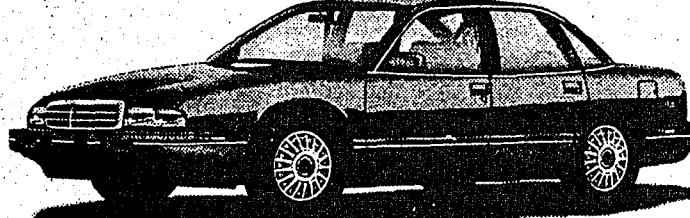
