Ice Cream Freeze-Off To Crank-Up Again At May 7 Funtier Day

After an absence of several years, the Ice Cream Freeze-Off will be cranking up again this year during Funtier Day, Saturday, May 7. Get out that favorite recipe or create a new one and enter this fun contest.

Gandy's Dairies will be awarding the prize money with \$50 for 1st place; \$25 for 2nd place and \$10 for 3rd place. Ribbons will also be awarded to the winners.

The Freeze-Off will be held in Funtier Square in the nutrition center room with tables and electricity furnished.

All ice cream must be made from scratch on the freeze-off site. No commercial pre-mixes may be used.

There will be no entry fee to enter the freeze-off but each entrant must donate their freezer of ice cream to be sold after the winners are announced.

Each contestant will be required to sell their freezer of ice cream with proceeds going to the Chamber of Commerce. (Please bring a large serving spoon, Chamber will provide cups for ice cream.)

Judging of the ice cream will be 1:30 p.m. on Saturday afternoon and the ice cream will be sold to the public immediately following the judging.

City Offices May Be Relocating

Among discussions at last week's City Council meeting was roof repair of a building currently being purchased by the City. Approval for the purchase of the building at 709 Wallis came in a called meeting held March 22nd. The building which presently houses the offices of Countywide Insurance is being purchased by the City at a price of \$15,000.

In the council meeting held last Tuesday, April 12, the discussion of the building centered on roof repair with Supt. Tommy Jackson reporting he had discussed the problem with Jim Laubhan of Art Fabrics who owns the adjacent half of the building which shares a common wall and roof. Mr. Laubhan quoted a price of \$7,000 for his half of the building if the City wanted to purchase it also. The council agreed this would be a good investment and requested Jackson to talk again with Mr. Laubhan about his offer. His report on negotiations is expected in next month's council meeting.

According to an official, plans are to move the City Hall office and the Police office to the "insurance building". If the second building is purchased, it could be utilized as a permanent City Council meeting place.

It was noted that the insurance company is expecting to re-locate to another site when everything is finalized.

John Pearce approached the council requesting the City send letters to owners of some buildings downtown asking that they clean up and repair such buildings. The City does have an ordinance regarding matters such as this. Pearce said he would get information on the buildings to City Secretary Alys Pelton if she would write and mail the letters to the owners.

Pearce also suggested to the council a plan for annexing the mountain.

Mayor Gale Brock told the council that the Chamber of Commerce had approached her about the City contributing \$500.00 toward expenses for the Indians during Funtier Day. Pepsi Cola Bottling has backed out on their contribution and the Chamber is requesting assistance. The matter will be placed on the agenda next month for further discussion.

Members of the Park Board were named with Doris Haak being director. Other members are Shirley Taylor, Thelma Brooker, Betty Sue Cupps, Shanna Enriquez, Bessie Hull, Bobbie Asher, Helen McIver, Donna Dobbins, Kay McGee, Shirley Rankin and Jeannie Hull.

The litigation with the Brownwood Bulletin is still unresolved. The City has placed a counter offer at the present time. City Attorney Sam Allen discussed

the City making an offer of about one-third of the Bulletin's petition. In the event the matter reaches trial, the City would be facing approximately \$2,000 to \$3,000 in attorney fees. The matter will be taken up at a later date in executive session.

The revised City Employee Policy Handbook was approved by the council.

Also approved was the 1994-95 budget as presented, with a revision possible, if necessary, to meet the 1.2 debt service coverage ratio by GE Capital.

A resolution for the City to lease the Santa Fe land north and east of the City Park was agreed upon.

City Superintendent Tommy Jackson informed the council of some of the requirements for the water plant set out by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Among the requirements a turbidity meter costing \$2,290; two 4" meters for raw water and backwash flow at a cost of \$745 each; and painting of the storage tank. The turbidity meter is needed immediately with the price quoted including the 24-hour chart. A quote from Kelley-Moore Paint Company in Abilene for paint to repaint the storage tank is \$2,457.00. Scotty Herrod has quoted \$2,500 labor to paint the tank.

Jackson also reported to the council that he had traded the old Ford Tractor for a water tank for the water truck. The 1982 Ford Trash Truck bed was removed and the tank placed on the Ford.

He also said he can sell the trash truck bed for about \$275. Jackson would like to use this money to purchase a cellular phone for the City crew.

Jackson is looking into the recycling of oil filters which can no longer be placed in landfills. The cost would be about \$60 for a 55-gallon barrel which would hold about 190 filters.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Gale Brock, councilmen Karen Morris, Jim Spillman, Wanda Campbell and Emmitt Simmons. Others present were City Secretary Alys Pelton, City Superintendent Tommy Jackson, Chief of Police Carlos Torres, Rod Musick and John Pearce.

charge for the musical, however sandwiches and drinks will be sold with the proceeds going to the park fund.

Everyone is invited. You will need to provide your own seating so bring lawn chairs, quilts or blankets, etc.

Spring Cleaning--Time For A Home Safety Checkup

It's that time of year again...when spring cleaning fever hits the air and everyone decided to take on those tough chores around the house. This is a good time to perform a home safety check. Inspecting your home and creating a hazard-free environment will reduce your chances of having an accident.

West Texas Utilities Company and the National Safety Council recommend spring cleaning as the best time to conduct a home safety checklist:

*Avoid overloading electrical outlets.
*All appliances should have Underwriters Laboratories (UL) labels

*Replace cracked or damaged cords and plugs

*Cover electrical outlets if you have young children in the house

*Label all fuses and circuit breakers to show which outlets and fixtures they serve

*Washers and dryers should be electrically grounded. Be careful: damp or wet floors can lead to electrical shock

*When remodeling, position light switches in accessible areas. Accidents can happen when people stumble through the dark. Place locations around the home for emergency use

*Good lighting should be provided at the stove, sink and countertop work areas, especially where food is chopped

*Place night lights in bathroom or hallways to act as a guide to prevent falls

Make sure a home safety list is part of your spring cleaning plans this year. Take the time to ensure the health and safety of you, your family and your home.

The Santa Anna News plans to publish a candidate forum for each race in the next two issues of the newspaper. School board candidates will be featured on April 28, and City Council candidates on May 5th.

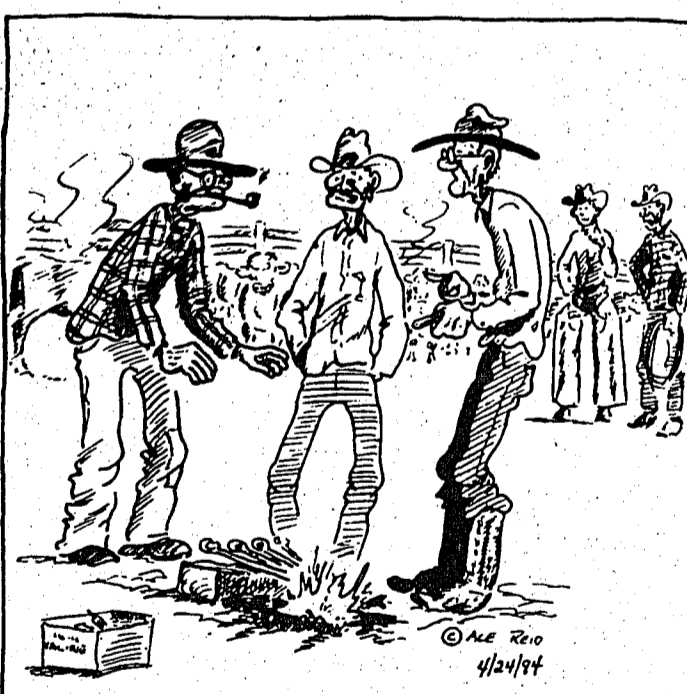

The present plan for "pilot" counties call for a hydrant to be placed every three square miles. People in the county receive a rate cut of 40-50 percent on insurance premiums.

The two largest fish caught by members of a group I took out Monday were a 6 lb. and a 7-1/4 lb. bass. The bass are spawning and running in water anywhere from two to six feet deep. They're biting on salty craws, power worms and riverside 10" worms with the riverside being the favorite. Colors don't seem to matter.

The big slab crappie are being found in deeper water, and you just have to keep moving to find 'em.

No great numbers are being caught, although some are coming in with stringers of 20-30 in the one lb. to 1-3/4 lb. range.

Catfish are moving in on baited holes. Channel cat are baited from 5-15 feet and coming in at 1-1/2 to 3 lbs. Yellow and blues are being taken on trotlines with small perch or cut bait.
