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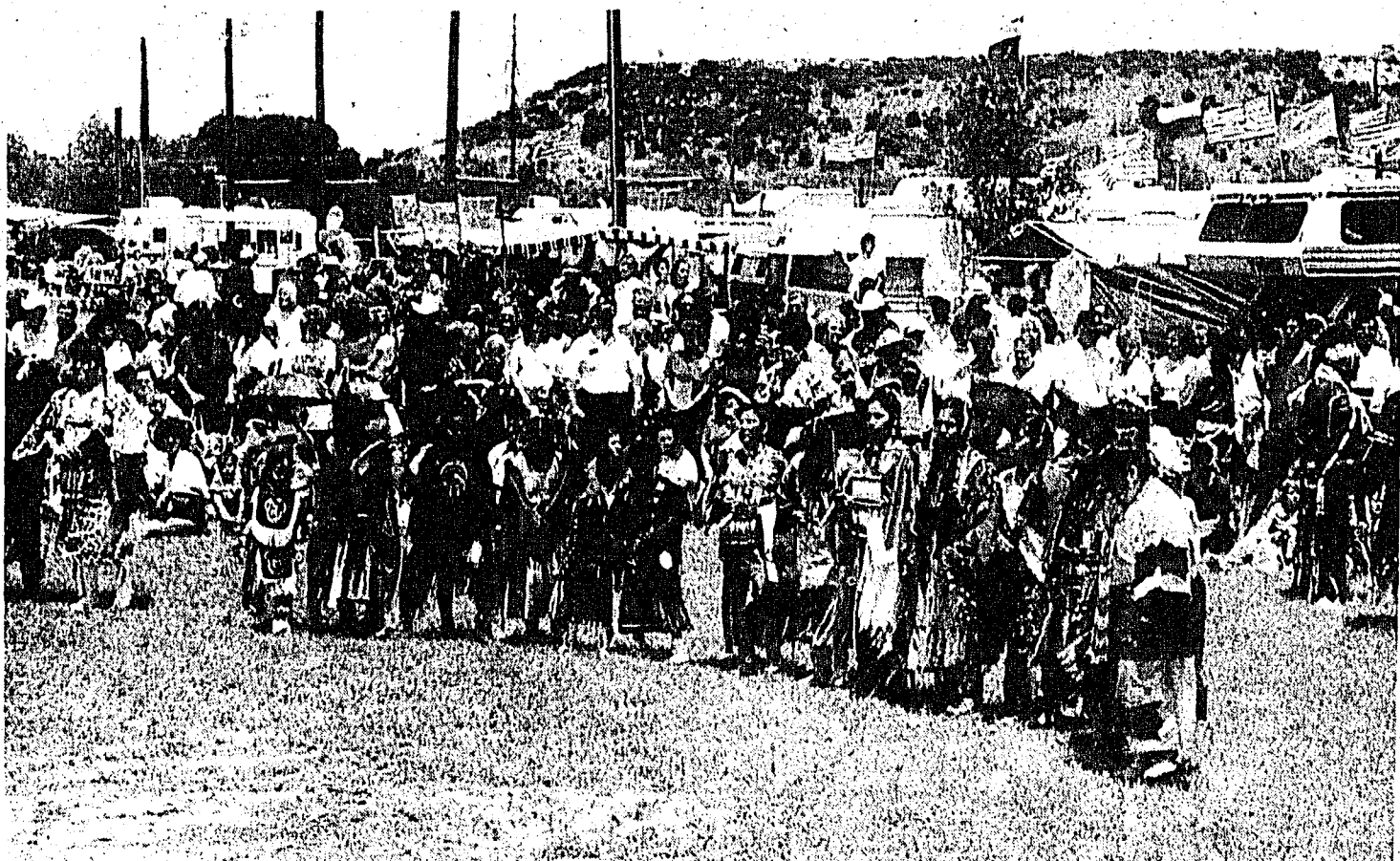

Time is winding down to the time when Funtier Days, 1994 will be unfolded at Funtier Square in Santa Anna, Saturday and Sunday, May 7-8. Thousands of people will descend on our community from all over Central Texas to watch the goings on and have a fun day in Santa Anna. Among the activities taking place Funtier Saturday at Funtier Square (unless otherwise indicated) will be:

*Parade-10:00 a.m., downtown. Confederate Air Force flyover will announce beginning of parade.

*Comanche ceremonial tribal dancing tentative time 2:00 and 6:00 p.m.

*Antique tractor and farm equipment show.

*Buffalo cookoff, Rod Musick chairman. Judging taking place at 2:00, with several "celebrity" judges including Mayor Woody Maddox of Coleman, Gail Kaiser of Abilene Center for Non-Profit Management, a member of the Texanna Historical Players, a member of the Texas Historical Association from Austin, Mary Griffith- president of Coleman

Chamber of Commerce, June Savo - a Comanche tribal leader, and local citizens Curly Galin and Troy Daniels. Buffalo sandwiches will be sold after the judging. Twenty individual cooks have entered along with three celebrity teams, KRBC, KTAB and KTXS television stations.

Rural Health Clinic To Open Here In Early May

Because Coleman County has been designated as medically underserved and through the effort of Abilene Regional Medical Center in conjunction with Lynda Cortese and Jeffrey Perritano of the Practice Management Institute, Santa Anna will have a Rural Health Clinic.

According to Ms. Cortese the clinic is scheduled to open and begin seeing patients in early May and is located on Highway 67 in the former Cabansag Medical Building beside the Ranger Park Inn.

The clinic will be staffed by Richard (Bud) Isbell, physician assistant and Debra Smith, business office. Interviews are currently being conducted for an LVN to staff the clinic as well.

A physician will be at the clinic one day a week and on call for consultation by the P. A. during the clinic's business hours.

Cleveland Cemetery Meeting Set For Saturday

The 32nd annual Cleveland Cemetery Association meeting will be held on April 30 at 10 a.m. in the former Cleveland Methodist Church.

The business meeting will include election of officers, financial report and any other business.

Officers of the cemetery association are Darrell Cupps, president; Joe Wallace, vice president; James Ford, second vice president; and Juanita Naron, secretary-treasurer.

Everyone is urged to attend this annual meeting.

The clinic is being funded by Abilene Regional Medical Center in Abilene.

The clinic will be open to all who seek its services regardless of insurance coverage and will provide affordable primary medical care to those utilizing its services. Medicare assignment and Medicaid will be accepted.

The care provided by the staff will include physical evaluations, general family practice for all ages, referrals to specialists and other primary medical practice care.

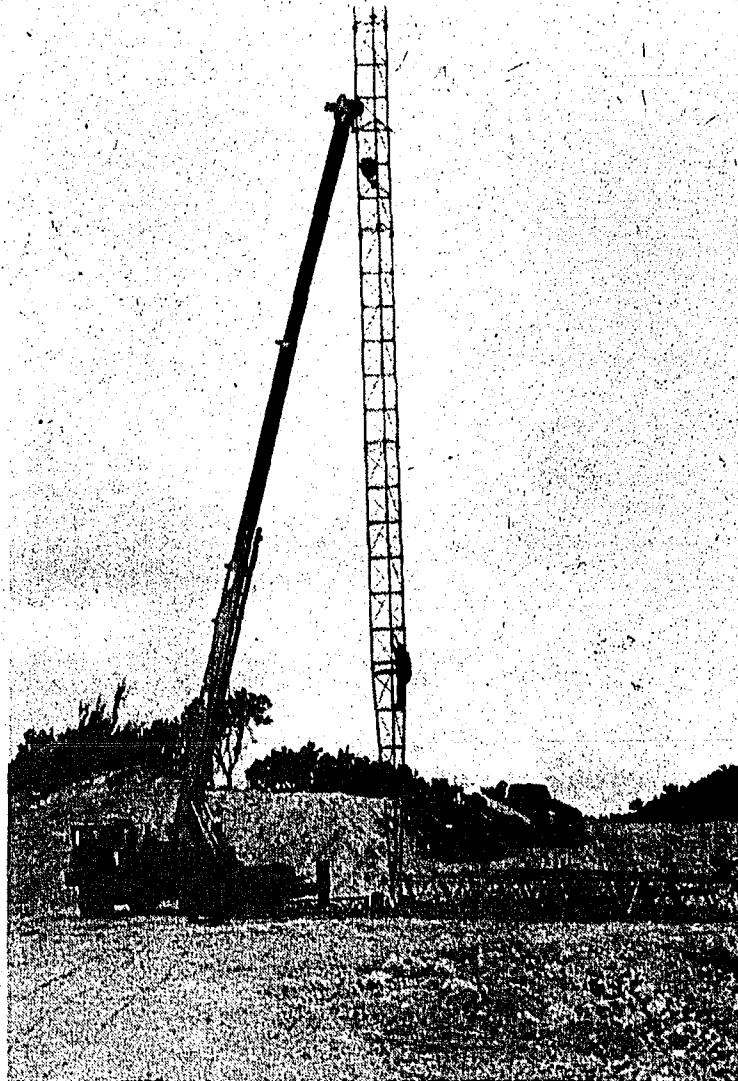
Richard Isbill, P. A. will provide health care at the Santa Anna Clinic under the supervision of a licensed physician.

Isbill is a physician assistant with 20 years experience. He spent many years in the military service as a physician assistant and prior to that as a field medical trainer and Special Forces Independent Duty Aidman.

A physician assistant is a health care professional who has completed an accredited training program consisting of basic medical sciences on such topics as anatomy and physiology, pharmacology, physical diagnosis, biochemistry and medical sciences.

The clinical portion of a PA's training consists of experience in such areas as internal medicine, surgery, pediatrics, geriatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, psychiatry and family practice.

In 1990 there were only two rural health care clinics in the state of Texas. Today there are approximately 200 in the state employing physician assistants and providing medically underserved areas with much needed medical care.



Coleman County Broadcasting Raises Transmitting Tower

Coleman County Telecommunications & Broadcasting Company raised its multiple use transmitting tower last week on top of Santa Anna Mountain under the watchful eye of many local citizens who used binoculars to keep up with the day-by-day progress. Other than for the use of "wireless TV cable", the tower will have a maintenance radio, cellular repeater and room for 15 other antennas for lease purposes. With recent FCC approval and the tower now up, delivery of the transmitters is expected sometime in August. Manager Jerry Ellis says they expect to begin television transmission about the 1st of September, unless some other unforeseen delays come about. Other associated equipment will be installed between now and the arrival of the transmitters. A building is being constructed at the tower base to house the equipment. "I'll Take My Ball And Go Home"

I recently volunteered to coach a baseball team here in home. At first no coach was needed, because all of the boys who were to play formed their own kind of boycott. They just decided that they were not going to play. Several new kinds were now old enough to play on the team and they wanted to play. But, without the players from years past coming back there were too few to have a team. At registration day one boy showed up. The boycott had worked.

I was frustrated. What party poopers those older kids were. What apathy! Why do parents let their kids call the shots like that? Why isn't someone encouraging these boys to show up and play? After a few weeks of talking it up with various boys, and them in turn talking among themselves interest in the baseball team took off! I decided to coach the team, and we held our first practice. Eight boys showed up. (It takes a minimum of nine, and it is best to have about fifteen). We talked it up some more, and at the next practice eight showed up. Again we talked it up, and nine came, then ten, then twelve, then thirteen, and finally fourteen! We had a full team.

I wondered what had gone wrong with these boys that caused them to not want to play? They all liked to play baseball. They were all pretty good players. And, most of them had no reason for not playing—they just weren't. Like a herd of cattle, or a flock of birds, the direction of the group had followed the movement of a few and soon enough no one was going to play. With no one to motivate or encourage them the boys did what we all do in that situation. Quit! We take our ball and go home.

In our lives as adults we quit. As older folks we quit. As children of God we quit. As people with potential for greatness we quit. We give up as a community. And as a nation, a family, and a marriage we quit. Why? Because we have a losing season the year before? Or is it because we are too busy? It is because we aren't cut out for the game or job, or because we don't like the coach and/or the league? It is because we know we could do a better job than the coach, or because the other players aren't good enough to be on the team? No, those are just excuses. It is always someone else's fault, right? The real reason that we quit is because we do not have support and encouragement from others that we need.

Each of us give up and become lazy when we have to work all alone. But that is just an excuse. We blame those who need the help instead of become the coach and starting the encouragement. Believe me, I work no magic with those boys; they did it themselves. However, what was needed was an encourager. Let us commit to the practice of encouraging others. Let us lend a hand; give a smile; shout a cheer. Remember, though, no one likes to be pushed, but that the herd always follows the direction of the leader. Leading is what Jesus did, and still does. He give hope, a reward at the end, and support all along the way.

We can be an encouragement too, anything else is just an excuse.

Also on hand will be her two grandchildren, Orabeth McIver of Houston and Michael Blue of Louisiana; and four great-grandchildren, Reece, Grady Clay, Betsy and Sally McIver.

Penatuhkah Comanche And The Texas Rangers

A party of warriors (Comanche) dressed in their trappings—embellished shields, fancy moccasins, long pig tails, bedecked with silver shoulder belts worked with beads and adorned with shells, fine leggings, ornamented cases for bows and arrows—mounted upon spirited horses, singing a war song, and sweeping over a prairie is a beautiful spectacle to a man with plenty of brave fellows to back him.

"RIP" Ford, Texas Ranger

John C. "Jack" Hays, "RIP" (Rest in Peace) Ford, "Big Foot" Wallace and Ben McCullough, all legendary leaders of the Texas Rangers, earned their reputations as Indian fighters during the years they guarded the settlements of Southern Texas. These were the years of the Texas Republic and the early years of statehood. The Penatuhkah Comanche territory was the front line of the conflict between Comanches and encroaching Texas settlements. The Comanche raid on Linnville in 1840 and the battle of Plum Creek which followed were listed among the events which have been called "a sort of postgraduate course in Indian warfare from which the real leaders, such as Ben McCullough and Jack Hays, emerged." Buffalo Hump, a Penatuhkah war chief, was in command of the Comanche forces in these events.

The Texas Revolution lured a group of remarkable men to Texas to assist the Texans in the fight for independence. When the Alamo was under siege in 1836 Colonel William Barrett Travis wrote an impassioned plea for assistance. The letter was sent throughout the United States. Travis' letter, news of the fall of the Alamo, and of the massacre of Fannin's men at Goliad motivated many educated and brave young men to come to the aid of the Texans. John C. Hays was among them. He arrived too late to fight in the brief revolution but stayed and became the guardian of the southern Texas settlements and "the leader and foremost spirit of the Rangers." Hays' Texas Rangers were successful for many reasons. The personal courage, intelligence and skill of Jack Hays made him a natural leader or rugged and independent men. He led through example and informal authority rather than through the structure of formal command. His Rangers lived off the land and could move quickly without the burden of extra supplies. This mimicked the organization of a Comanche war party and provided the mobility and flexibility necessary to successfully wage campaigns against them.

Comanches had the technological advantage until the invention of the Colt revolver, which first appeared in Texas in 1839. Until then the bow and arrow were superior weapons because they could be used for rapid fire from horseback; there were no guns designed for that purpose. Hays' Rangers field tested the revolver and consulted with Colt regarding improvements. The revolvers were scarce until 1844 when an improved version became part of the armament of the Texas Navy. Hays equipped each of his men with two of the new Colts and an extra cylinder for both. The advantage of superior arms shifted to the Rangers.

Encounters with Texas Rangers armed with the deadly new weapons had serious consequences for the Comanches, especially the Penatuhkahs, since they were the band whose territory was nearest to the areas protected by these Rangers. A Comanche war chief visiting Bexar was said to have described one of the first encounters between his warriors and Hays' Rangers armed with revolvers to Bob, a friendly Delaware. Bob reported that the war chief asked him the identity of the white commander at the fight on the Nueces. Bob told him it was "Devil Yack". Bob reported the chief shoo, his head slowly and said,

I never want to fight him again. He had as many shots as I have fingers on my two hands. I lost half my warriors in that battle, and many more died along the route while returning to my country on Devils River.

Comanche placed a high value on the individual warrior. Bands were small and a lost warrior was irreplaceable. The psychological impact of the deadly new weapon should not be underestimated. The Comanches in central and southern Texas were used to field test this weapon which later became standard equipment for the United States Cavalry to use against other bands and tribes. The revolver may have been as deadly later, but it was not as unexpected.

The conflict between Comanches and Texas Rangers changed dramatically in 1849. The leaders of the Penatuhkah band, Santa Anna and Old Owl, and an estimated one half of the band died of cholera. The band members who survived the epidemic could not agree on new leadership. They moved their camps northwestward into the Fort Chadborne area. Jack Hays led a caravan to California in the '49 gold rush. He stayed in California and served as sheriff, surveyor and promoter of the city of Oakland. New groups of Comanches were soon to fight other groups of Rangers, but Ranger legend and tradition were established.

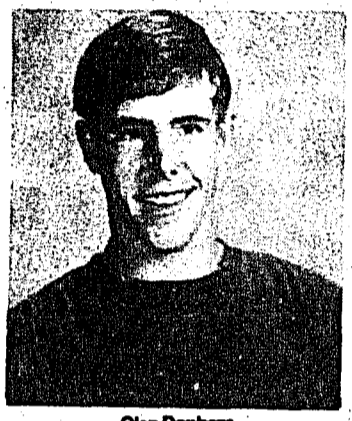

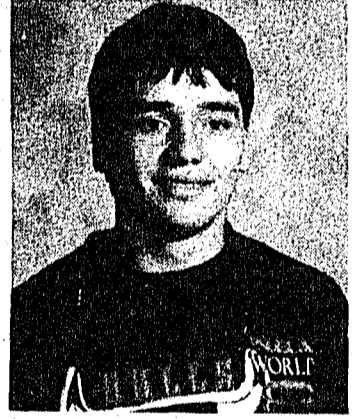

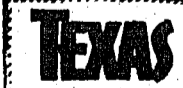

numbers in the next couple of
weeks.

acquainted with the lake and
become aware of the underwater

hazardous places if you are not
familiar with Lake Ivie.
