the Chamber list. The cost of including your garage sale on the Chamber of Commerce list is \$3.00. This will also put the address of your sale on the maps handed out with the list.

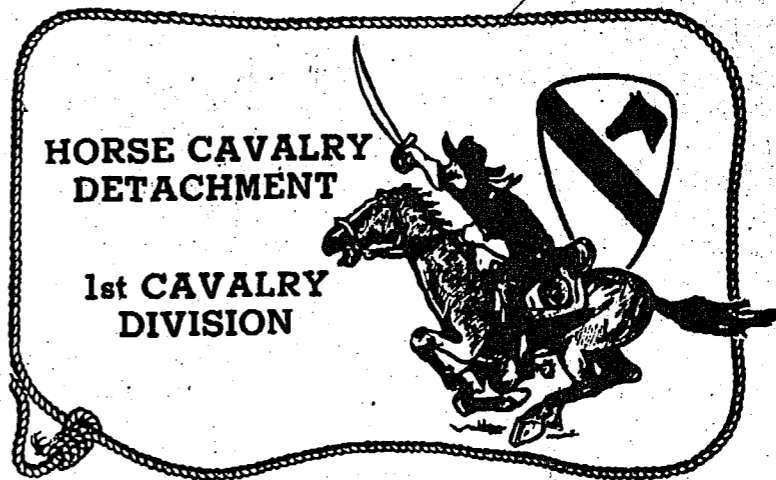

## Horse Cavalry Detachment Will Be At Frontier Heritage Festival

The Horse Cavalry Detachment of the 1st Cavalry Division from Fort Hood will be performing during 1st annual Frontier Heritage Festival October 12 at the rodeo arena located west of town.

The 1st Cavalry Division Horse Cavalry Detachment, based at Fort Hood, Texas is the last horse-mounted cavalry unit in the United States Army. The mission of the Detachment is threefold: represent the 1st Cavalry Division and the U. S. Army in public appearances throughout the country, assist in recruiting by demonstrating the professionalism of today's soldiers, and maintain the proud traditions forged by the Cavalry in our country's colorful history.

Since its inception in 1972, the Detachment has appeared in two Presidential Inaugural parades, the 1984 World's Fair and literally thousands of state and local fairs,

parades and rodeos. The Detachment performs formal military parades and reviews, civic and community street parades, and a 30-minute Mounted Drill and Weapons Demonstration. The mounted demonstration is a thrilling exhibition of the skill and precision required of the mounted trooper. It includes drill maneuvers at the walk, trot and gallop. The weapons portion of the show demonstrates

the mounted use of the cavalry saber, Colt .45 caliber revolver, and the Springfield carbine. The Detachment is entirely self-contained. With 30 troopers and horses, an 1878 Army supply wagon and an 1941 cavalry support cannon, the Detachment is flexible and can adjust performances and parades to create almost any effect and only requires an area the size of a football field for its performance.

Capitol Comments by BOB TURNER State Representative - District 73

In stark contrast to the federal government which is several trillion dollars in debt, the State of Texas ended its 1996 fiscal year with a surplus of approximately \$2.3 billion. This basically has come about for three reasons: First, the Texas state legislature intentionally over estimates expenses and under estimates expected revenue. I feel this is good policy when figuring the state budget for a two-year period. Second, state agencies underspent their budgeted expenditures by \$484 million. Third, there was increased revenue above projections (primarily revenue from sales tax, motor vehicle taxes, interest on state deposits and lottery) in the amount of \$573 million. It might be noted that the economy of the State of Texas is healthier and functions well above the national average. Nearly one-fourth of all new jobs created in the United States during 1995 were created in Texas, which is definitely a contributing factor in our ability to achieve this level of budget surplus.

Unlike the Federal constitution, the Texas constitution prohibits unlimited debt creation through "printing more currency" and the issuance of revenue producing bonds and paper. The Texas state constitution only provides for the sale of bonds for specific purposes, all of which must be approved by the voters. The Texas state constitution further requires the State Comptroller of Public Accounts to certify that projected income for the two-year budget is large enough to cover the budget's projected expenditures. Currently our State Comptroller is John Sharp.

elimination of 4,700 state jobs from the state work force as a result of the legislature's effort to minimize the size and cost of government in Texas.

Figures for the 1996-97 biennium total \$79.9 billion, with \$23.2 billion (or 29%) of this coming as returned monies from the federal government for such projects as highways, some educational funding, health and old age benefits, national guard funding, etc.

Perhaps you are interested in how state funds are spent. Basically there are three types of funds. Matching funds are just that; a match to maximize federal funds for highways and human services. Dedicated funds are funds legislatively designated to be spent for certain uses.

For example, a portion of fuel tax revenue is dedicated to roads. Finally, there are general revenue funds, which are somewhat discretionary. Elected Representatives and Senators essentially only have control over the general revenue account.

However, general revenue funds account for only one-fourth of the entire state budget. Therefore, dedicated funds present a problem, because the legislature cannot hold state agencies accountable for how they spend three fourths of the state budget.

Education receives by far the major portion of state dollars. The breakdown in percentages is as follows: Education - 41.8%, Health and Human Services - 33%, Public Safety and Criminal Justice - 5.6%, General Government - 2.370, Business and Economic Development 11.0%, Regulatory Agencies - 0.5%, Natural Resources - 2.2%, the Judiciary -0.3%, and the Legislature - 0.3%.

On the revenue side, the lottery generated approximately \$599 million in FY95, increasing to \$1 billion, 158 million in FY96. After prizes, required reserve funds and administration, the lottery continues to grow (be that good or bad, I'm not discussing the morality of the lottery). Property taxes generate approximately \$10 million dollars per year for public education.

Any new method of financing public education that would replace property taxes that might be recommended by Governor Bush's special committee must raise a similar amount to correct or solve the problem of education finance. Of all the proposals, expansion of the sales tax poses the greatest threat to our agricultural economy in central and west Texas. If livestock feed, seed fertilizers and farm equipment parts were subject to sales tax, it would not be physically nor fiscally possible to remain in the farming or ranching business. It is obvious that what looks good to one segment of Texas citizens presents a real problem for those in another group.

Granted, there are definitely problems in Texas, as well as our every day lives and the world in general. But, let's not let our negative mindset hinder us from seeing the good, as well. I see people and businesses moving to Texas in great numbers. There are very "short lines" of citizens lined up at El Paso and Texarkana in an effort to go elsewhere.

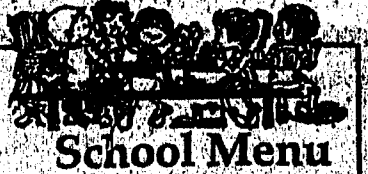
