### Santa Anna Elementary Turns Box Tops Into Bucks

To help raise money for their school, local students at Santa Anna Elementary are participating in a unique program from General Mills, maker of popular cereals like Cheerios and Wheaties, called Big G Box Tops for Education.

The school will receive 15 cents for every qualifying General Mills cereal box top collected between now and March 31, 1997. A qualifying box top is the top flap of any General Mills cereal box.

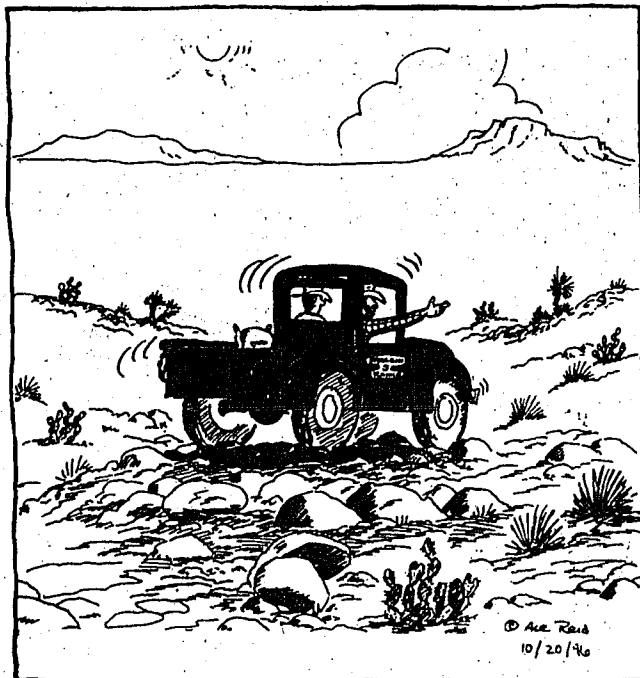

Duane Aldridge was the former Mountaineer, pictured as a junior at SAHS. He played guard for the Mountaineers and graduated with the class of 1974.

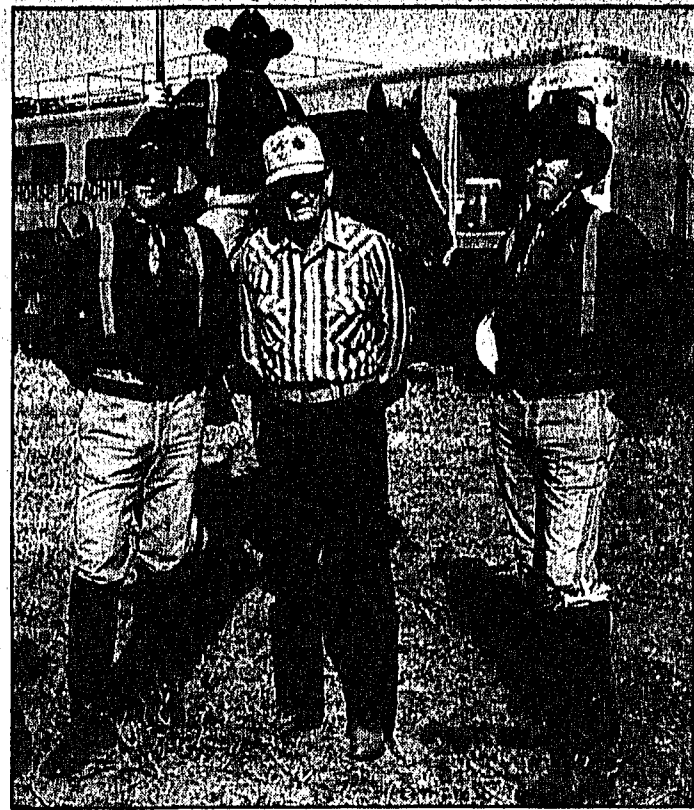
Bangs and Mason tied so that's a free game for all contestants.

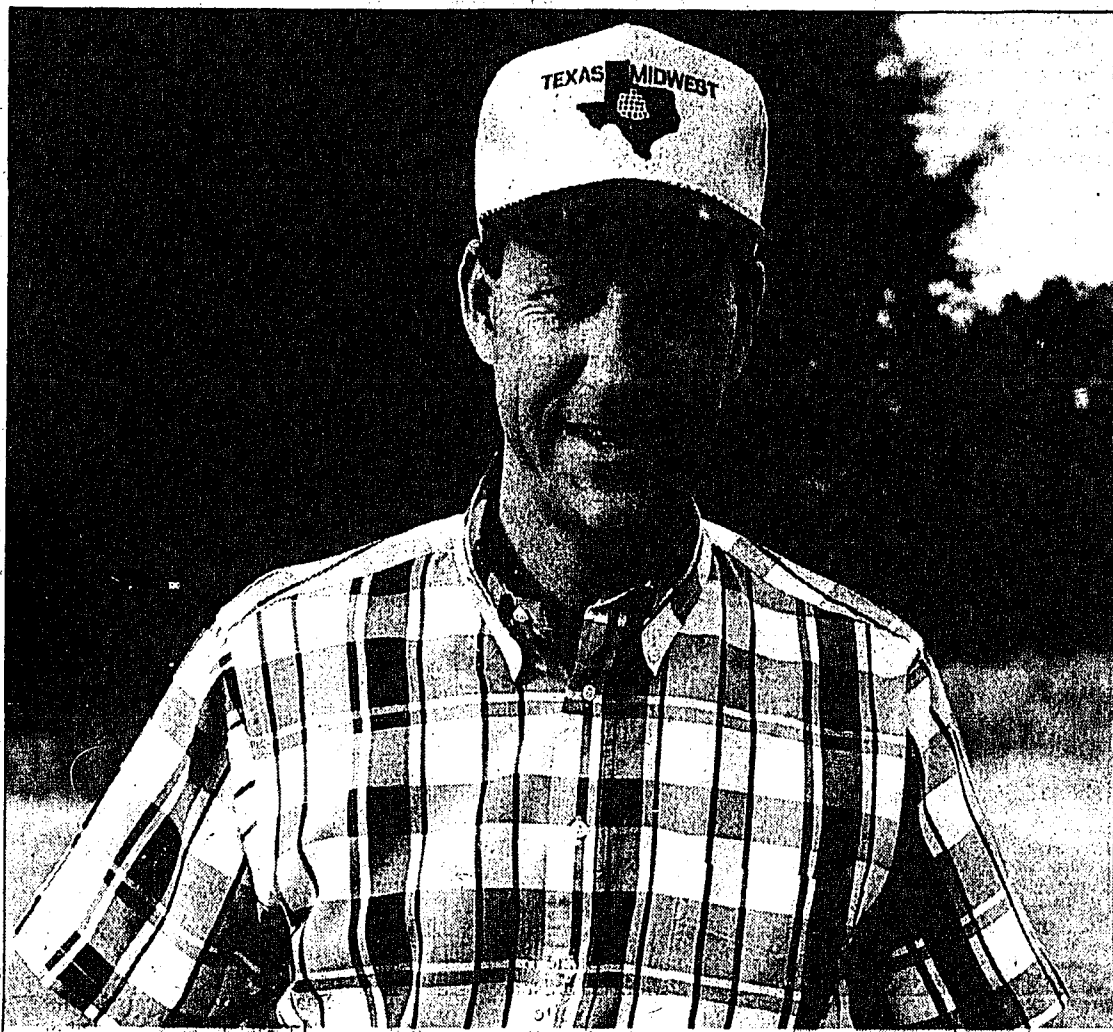

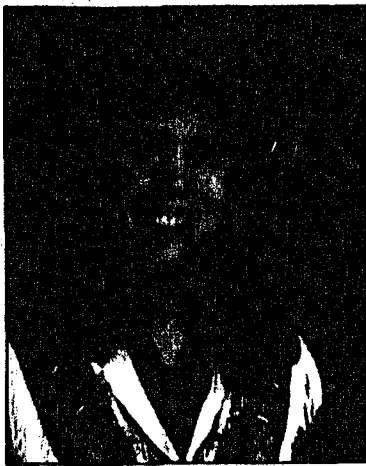

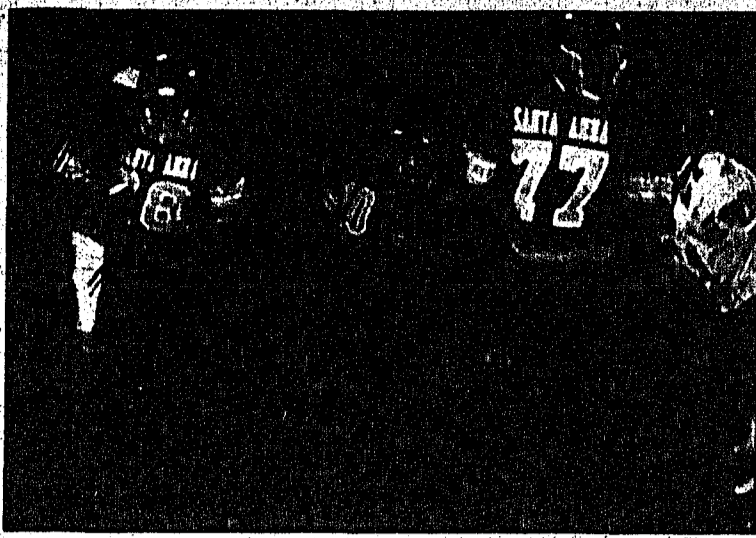
SAHS Volleyball Team Defeats Abilene Christian
