Commissioners Court Asks For County's Opinion On Trapper Funding

Coleman County Commissioners court has been approached by the Animal Damage Control Association (Predator Control) to supply funding for the government trapper that the Association has been paying. Currently, there are two trappers in the county; Coleman County pays for one and the ADC Association pays for the other. The annual cost for a trapper is \$16,800 but the tab is going to rise to \$21,600 beginning Jan. 1, 1999. The ADC Association states that it can no longer afford to pay for the trapper they have been sponsoring and has requested Commissioners Court to increase taxes by an amount to cover that expense. The amount of money required to cover the increase on the existing trapper and to fund an additional trapper would be \$26,400. Since this particular line-item is found in the General Fund, that rate would have to increase from \$44039 per \$100 of evaluation to \$4536 per \$100, an increase of approximately 3%. In other words, an increase of \$.0132 per \$100 of evaluation or a \$3.96 increase per year on a property valued at \$30,000. Animal Damage Control has stated that it is imperative that the county fund the additional trapper. They contend that the Sheep and Goat raisers will be forced out of business due to predation losses unless the additional trapper is maintained in the county. There are two other facets to the problem. Wildlife is affected in uncontrolled predator situations. The young of all game species are primary targets of the same predators that prey upon the sheep, goats and calves. Since hunting in an important part of Coleman County revenue, it is also directly affected by the issue. The final element is that of rabies control. The major reservoir for rabies in the predator population in the county. The more predators we have, the higher the risk for rabies incidents. Coleman County has been hurt by the loss of several large employers recently. Our job market and tax base have both been diminished. Additionally, we are faced with a major expense in the form of two murder trials. This is a tax issue question we are not comfortable making alone. Are you, the taxpayer, willing to spend your money to support the program? Commissioners Court has held to hearings on the issue and attendance was very light. We would like input from any many people as possible in order to reflect the will of our citizens. To that end, elsewhere in this paper, we have published a form that you can either mail in or drop by the courthouse. Please give us some guidance on this issue. A decision must be made for incorporation into the new budget which will be established in August/September and take effect Oct. 1, 1998. Thanks for your assistance. 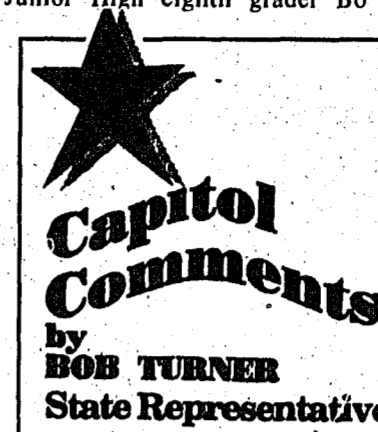
Santa Anna Police Department Announces Winner Of Badge Contest

To the People of Texas House District 73:

Since August of 1997, I have watched and studied the development of the Central Texas Rare Species Conservation Plan. The plan is still currently under development, and will not be completed earlier than August of 1999. However, it has become clear to me that the protection for landowners the plan is trying to achieve will not become a reality.

The proposed benefit of the plan is that it would allow landowners to sign a "Safe Harbor" agreement with the United States Fish and Wildlife (FWS). According to the FWS, the "Safe Harbor" program was developed because "property owners recognize the benefits of proactive habitat conservation activities to help listed species (but,) some are still concerned about additional land-use or resource restrictions that may result if listed species colonize their property or increase in numbers or distribution because of their conservation efforts."

Under this agreement, a landowner would have the right to "modify" any endangered species habitat the landowner grew on that property above the amount of suitable habitat already on the land. However, the landowner still may not "modify", affect in any way the suitable habitat which was already on the property because it is considered "baseline" habitat needed by the endangered specie. So, the incentive of the "Safe Harbor" agreement is that FWS won't fine you or put you in jail if you grow habitat on your property above the amount of "baseline", and then decide to remove it. However, you are still restricted from using your land that is covered by "baseline" habitat. And you can only remove the additional habitat you grew, if the TPW biologist agrees the planned removal isn't more than what is allowed under the "incidental take" permit held by TPW. I don't see any positive incentive to private property owners under the circumstances.

Another problem I see is that the "Safe Harbor" agreement may not be covered under the wildlife management plan "confidentiality law" I wrote and passed through the Texas Legislature in 1995 to protect landowner's habitat information from being released to the federal

authorities. The State law only covers wildlife management plans with our Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPW), and the "Safe Harbor" agreement is a federal program entered into with the FWS. I have said from the beginning stages of this Central Texas Rare Species Conservation Plan that if I felt a landowner's information could not be kept confidential from the FWS, then I would oppose the plan. I don't believe the FWS will accept conditions within the plan which will provide landowners with that protection. If the FWS cannot receive individual information on a landowner enrolled in the "Safe Harbor" program then they would not be able to enforce violations by that participant under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). In my opinion, the FWS will not, and cannot under the ESA, agree to such restraints on their regulatory control.

I want to commend the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and all the members of the plan's steering committee for trying to protect private property owners from regulation by the FWS. However based upon the current federal "Safe Harbor" guidelines and the ESA, I don't feel "Safe Harbor" agreements will provide the protection sought. Accordingly, I feel that I must oppose the continued development of the Central Texas Rare Species Conservation Plan.

Immigration Laws Affect Student Exchange Programs

Many people are concerned about the new laws which are a part of the U. S. Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996. This legislation requires exchange students of F-1 or J-1 Visas to reimburse public school districts for the cost of their education before they are allowed to enter the United States. In most areas, this can amount to several thousand dollars for the school year.

It is important to note that students who participate in formal exchange programs offering J-1 Visas will not be affected by this law. One program, the American Intercultural Student Exchange (AISE), offers its participants the security of monthly contact with a representative of the program, comprehensive medical insurance, parties and get-togethers with other exchange students in the area, educational trips around the U. S. and many other amenities.

An increasing number of Americans have friends and relatives in foreign countries whose teenagers would like to spend time studying in American high schools. To participate in such an exchange, these students should explore their options before paying tuition at an American public high school. Programs such as AISE have years of experience, and their caring staff members can offer students and their host families advice and support during the exchange experience.

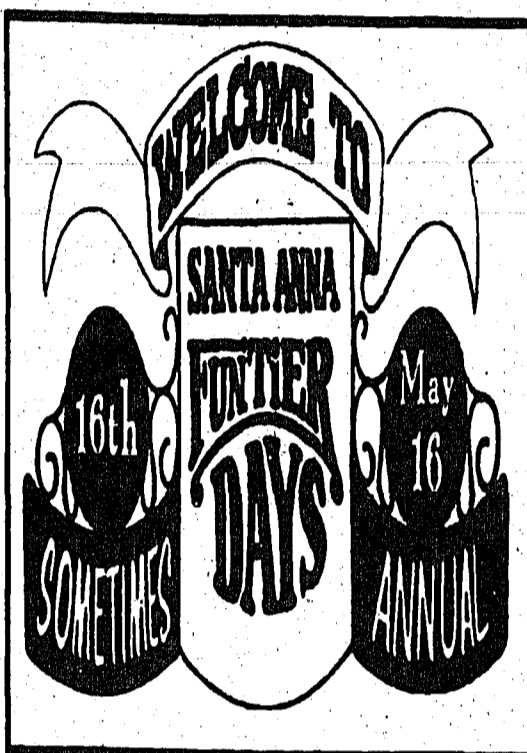

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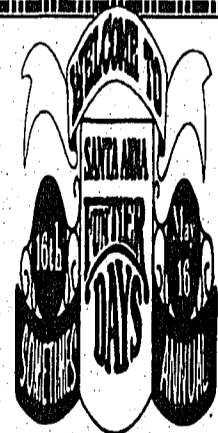

Reading With Your Child

Dads Can Play a Critical Role Teaching Sons to Love Reading



Study after study shows that girls are more likely to say they enjoy reading than boys are. But there are many boys who grow up to love reading. In *99 Ways to Get Kids to Love Reading*, Mary Leonhardt suggests that these boys were strongly influenced by their fathers.

"In our culture, reading isn't seen as tough and hard-hitting an activity as playing a sport, or fixing a car, or camping or hunting," she says. So fathers who want their sons to enjoy reading need to spend time reading together. In that way, the son can see the importance the father places on reading.

Again and again, Leonhardt says, conversations with high-school boys who love reading, "I notice they mention how their fathers helped get them reading."

All children are more likely to enjoy reading if they can find book characters with which they can identify. "For children to love reading, it's very important that they see themselves in books," she says.

So, if your child loves baseball, or worries about moving to a new school, or wishes he could be a cowboy in the old West, see if you can find a book that includes a character who can remind your son of himself.

The Rising Cost Of Raising Children

One-hundred and 50-thousand dollars. That's a lot of money to raise a child to the age of 18. Compare that to 25-thousand for a child born in 1960. Extension Family Economics Specialist Dr. Lynn White, says it's not as big an increase as it sounds. She says it is about the same increase as other costs of living. The U. S. Department of Agriculture figures a middle income, two-parent family with two children spends \$8-or-\$9 thousand dollars a year to raise each child. Housing is the biggest expense, followed by food and child care. The U. S. D.A. figures show child-rearing costs are highest in cities in the West, Northeast and South. They're lowest in Midwestern cities. But that does not take college into account. It will cost more than \$125,000 for a baby today to go to a public college—\$270,000 to go to a private school. White says much of that cost can be defrayed by scholarships or handled through loans. She also thinks it can be good for students to work their way through college.

Dr. White says research shows students who help pay for their education typically spend less money being spent. White suggests parents look into programs such as the Texas Tomorrow Fund which allows you to pay for your child's tuition at today's prices even though they may not enter college for another 18 years.

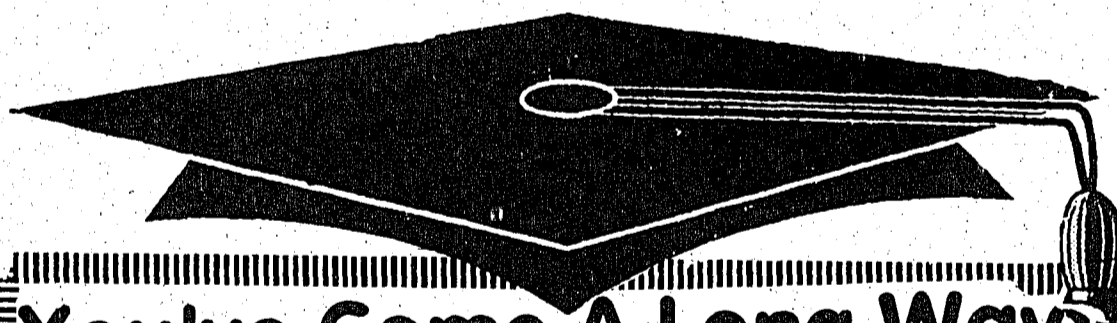

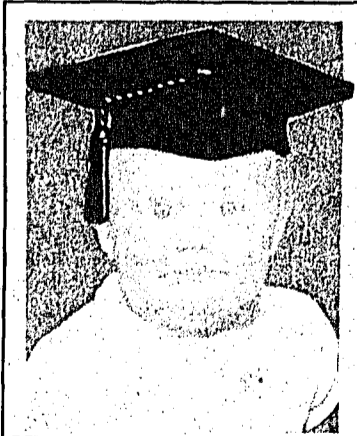
