





In 1927 we lived on our ranch coming up, but Dad would seldom south of Santa Anna, Texas. Just about every ranch family had a storm cellar close to their house. Over the years there had been cyclones pass in the area so most people went into the storm cellar for protection from the storms. Storm cellars were big holes dug in the ground and covered with heavy timber and made waterproof. They had a heavy door that would latch from the inside.

Late one evening there was a storm coming toward the ranch from the southwest so Mother took us three boys to the storm cellar. Daddy was in the pasture horseback and got back to the barn after we had gone in the storm cellar. Dad wasn't afraid of storms so he milked the cow and carried the milk to the

We had gas lights in the house and dad lit the kitchen light after he got in the house. Just then a cyclone hit the house and blew the west end out of the ground. The kitchen was in the west end and Dad ran out where the wall had blown out and was blown out into the pasture. The storm had blown the storm cellar door open--Mom had forgot to latch it. I was five years old and remember the incident well. Mother ran up the steps of the cellar calling Dad. We three kids were right behind her. The light was still on in the house and with the end out of the house we could see the kitchen stove, cabinets and table. The end of the house landed a few feet from the storm cellar door. We heard Dad answer from down in the pasture. When he ran out of the house he had been blown a good ways in the pasture and had grabbed a small mesquite tree to keep from being blown even farther. Dad was skinned up some but not hurt too bad.

As he came down in the cellar he closed and latched the door. He told us that the barns and sheds were still standing and only the end was blown out of the house. He told Mother that it wouldn't be much of a job to fix the house. I remember we kept asking Dad if he had rolled along the ground like a milk can or if he was on his feet. I don't remember what he told us about how he was blown down into the pas-

We kept hearing the wind blowing and the rain pouring down, After about an hour, it stopped and Dad opened the door and the moon was-shining-bright. -We all went up the steps to look at the house. The house was blown flat on the ground--the cyclone had circled and come in the cellar. The barns and


sheds weren't damaged. We had a Collie dog named Prince that Uncle Jack Woodward had given us. Prince was about three years old when the cyclone hit and we three kids were worried more about him than we were about the house. We called and called and no Prince. We just knew the house

had crashed down on him. Dad gut the gas off at the meter and we went to Santa Anna to spend the night with Grandmother Woodward. We went in on the Whon road and when we got to the Chambers place about three miles south of Santa Anna, Sweety Creek was running across the road and we had to wait until it ran down

enough to cross. The next morning Dad left early for the ranch to check on everything. The first thing he saw was Prince by the wrecked house lying on his side like he was dead. Dad called Prince and he raised his head. He was all skinned up and so stiff he could hardly walk. The first thing we kids asked Dad when he came back from the ranch that evening was "Did you find Prince?" We were really thrilled when Dad said that Prince was there. It was about a month before Prince was back to normal. We assumed that the cyclone had blown him a long ways and that was why he was so

stiff and skinned up. The only contents of the house that weren't destroyed was Dad's rocking chair and my little oak rocking chair that Uncle Jack Woodward gave me when I was two years old and we still have that lit tle rocker,

Dad built another house a few feet north of the one that had blown down. We continued going to the storm cellar when a bad cloud was



go. We had a bed in the cellar and we kids would usually be asleep when the storm was over so Mother would leave us there--with Prince-until morning. The storm cellar is still there at the ranch, but people don't go to the storm cellar like they used to. They now watch the direction of the cyclone--now called a tornado--on television and if it's heading their way, they'll run to the

cellar. Prince died when he was twelve years old and from the day of the cyclone, he was scared to death of a storm. The family only went to the storm cellar when there was a bad cloud coming up, but Prince was terrified at the first clap of thunder. He was the first one down the steps when we went to the cellar. Your Duty To Report Abuse

Texas law requires citizens to report child abuse. If you suspect that a child is suffering abuse or neglect, you must call the authorities. You may call the local police or sheriff, child protective services, or the Texas Department of Public Safety.

In addition, the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services maintains a toll-free, 24hour child abuse hotline at (800) 252-5400. If a child is in immediate and grave danger, call 911 immediately if that service is available in your area, or else call the police or sheriff immediately.

Failure to report suspected abuse or neglect is a misdemeanor crime punishable by a fine, jail, or both. It is not enough, under the law, to tell a minister, school principal, counselor, or other person with non-law enforcement authority. Employees of schools and day care centers, for example, do not satisfy the law by reporting abuse to their employers. They must also call law enforcement or child protective services.

You do not have to have evidence or know that abuse or neglect has occurred. In fact, you should not



PROTECT YOUR HOME WHILE ON **VACATION**

UMMER IS A GREAT time for vacations. Unfortunately, burglars do not take breaks. We at the Office of the Attorney General want your home to be safe while you are gone. That is why we " have prepared a list of simple pre-cautions.

Take a few minutes to safeguard your property. You will enjoy your trip more knowing that you took care of things at home, and you will minimize your chance of being robbed while you are gone.

A vacation to-do list

Few thieves like to break into an occupied home. Your best defense against robbers is a house that looks lived-in. Do not leave your house looking abandoned while you are away. At a minimum, be sure to do the following:

- Stop mail and newspaper deliveries.
- Double-check all your locks and windows.
- Turn down the ringer on your phone. If you have an answering machine, turn down the speaker, and do not change your message to say you are on vacation.
- Mow your lawn before you leave. If you are going to be gone for a long time, have someone you trust maintain your yard.

- Leave blinds, shutters or curtains open or partially open. Windows that are tightly covered all day, every day, are a signal to potential thieves.
- Have a friend come by periodically to pick up any circulars or other evidence that you are away. Also, leave your itinerary with a friend and a list of phone numbers where you can be reached in case of emergency.

Many e-mail programs allow you to send an automated response to incoming mail. While this is a useful feature, avoid using it to announce that you will be away from home during your vacation. You never know to whom the message might be sent.

More safety tips

Some robbers cruise neighborhoods, looking for houses that are dark or quiet night after night. Consider getting a number of timers, and hooking them up to lamps or your TV. Place the timers in different rooms and set them to work at different times. Another good idea is to leave your air conditioning on a higher temperature, rather than turning it off completely. It is a sure sign that you are out of town if the A/C is off when the weather is hot.

Before leaving, use an engraver to mark all your valuables with your social security number or driver's license number. Some police forces will lend you an engraver and provide you with a window sticker that tells all potential thieves that your house is no easy mark. Many burglars will move on to an easier target once they see this.

Above all, have a trustworthy neighbor, friend or relative check your house occasionally. He or she can take care of things while you are away, like removing advertising flyers from your front door or seeing that everything looks normal. It might even be a good idea to arrange for a house sitter -- that way, the house will look lived-in because it is. Avoid mentioning to anyone outside your confidence that you will be away.
