District Principal Lee Coffman will present various awards to the graduates. Presentation of the

Class of 1998 will be made by Superintendent Dean Bass with board members Gay Abernathy, Sandra Ferrara and Sharon Guthrie presenting diplomas.

Speaker for the commencement will be Michael Hartman. A 1983 graduate of Santa Anna High School, Hartman received a Bachelor of Business Administration degree from Angelo State University in 1987 and graduated from Texas Tech School of Law in 1991 with a Doctorate of Jurisprudence degree.

Following graduation, he began working with a law firm in Snyder and was named a partner in the firm in January 1994.

Hartman was elected Scurry County Attorney in January 1997. In addition to his duties as county attorney, he has taught on a part-time basis at Western Texas College since 1994, teaching courses in both the government and criminal justice departments.

He has also served on and chaired the State Bar of Texas Grievance Committee overseeing the investi-

gation and prosecution of attorney misconduct for a seven county area in West Texas.

Hartman is a member of the Snyder Lions Club where he has served as both an officer and director. He serves on various boards, commissions and volunteer agencies and has received recognition for volunteer service to the Scurry County Senior Citizens Center and the D.A.R.E. program.

Hartman lives in Snyder with his wife, Donna and their son, Travis. He is the son of Eddie Wayne and Mary Ann Hartman of Santa Anna.

Hector Patino, son of Roy and Olivia Patino, is the Valedictorian for the Class of 1998. He is graduating with a 4.38 grade point average. Patino has been active in football, FFA, National Honor Society, Science Club, UIL events and track. He has served as Sentinel in FFA and President of the National Honor Society.

Jenna Hensley will give the Valedictorian address and Daena Castillo will deliver the Salutatorian address.

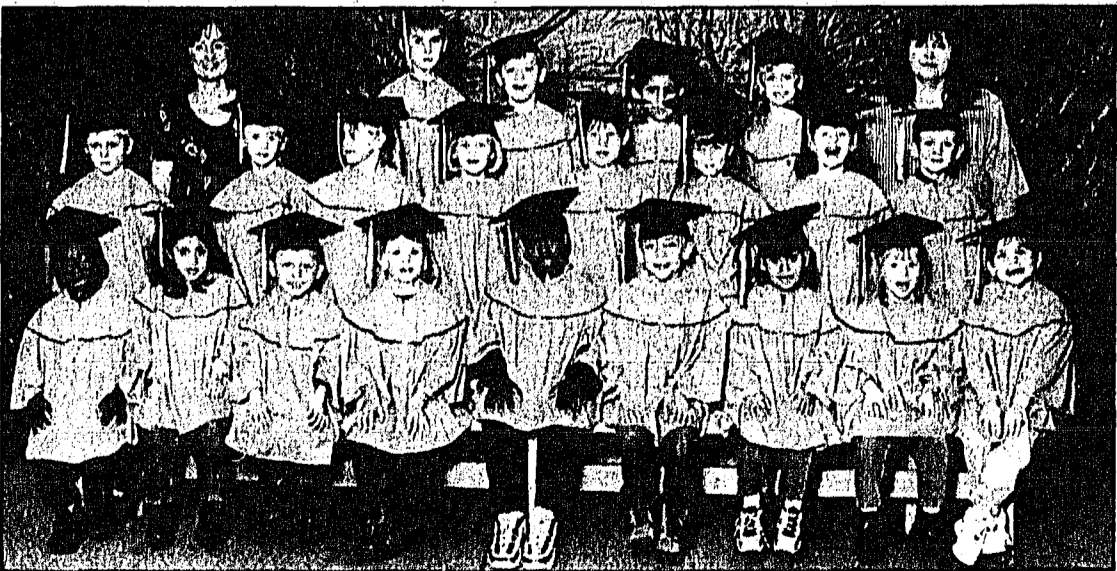

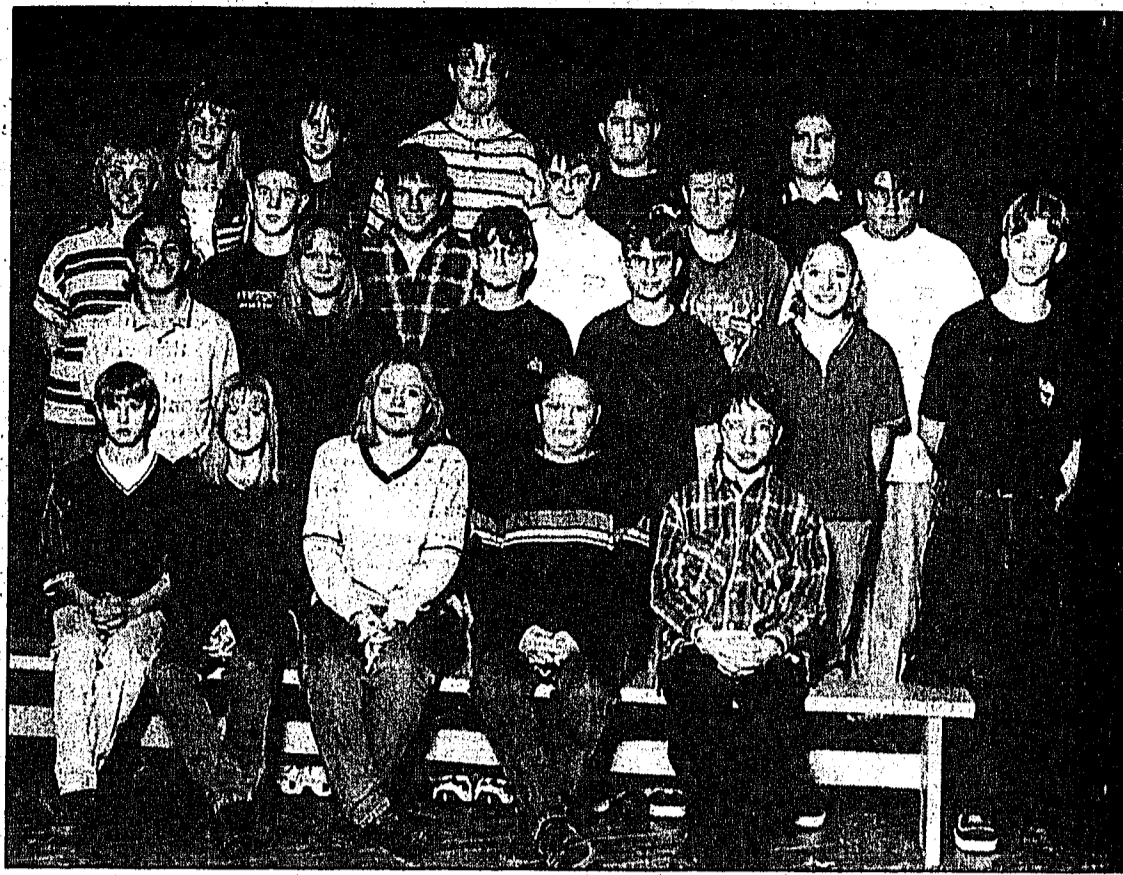

The Bicycle Wreck

Our four kids would often ask, "Dad, what did you and Uncle Tom and Uncle Hank do for entertainment and excitement back in the olden days when you all were kids? You didn't have television or radio-life must have really been boring."

Life wasn't near as boring as they thought and here is an example. In the early thirties when my brothers and I were ten, eleven and twelve years old living on our ranch south of Santa Anna in Coleman County, Texas, we kept begging Mother and Dad for a bicycle. Dad wondered why we wanted a bicycle since we had plenty of horses to ride. Most kids would have given an eye tooth for a horse to ride.

To our surprise, we got a pretty red bicycle that Christmas. We were thrilled and could hardly wait until we could go outside and ride it. With only one bicycle and three eager boys, there was some heated arguments as to whose time it was to ride and for how long.

That next Sunday when we got home from church, we changed clothes and went outside to ride the bicycle while Mother fixed dinner. We agreed that we would take turns riding the bicycle around the house. We agreed that each of us would ride it one round and then the next one would go around once.

Hank was the oldest and kind of bossy so he said he was going first. As he came by Tom and I on the first round, he didn't stop—just kept on for another round. He came by us a second round so I picked up a broken broom handle and threw it like a spear toward the front wheel. Hank was really pedalling fast and the broom stick went between the spokes of the front wheel and and just behind the fork that holds the front wheel. The broom handle broke nearly all the spokes and the bike turned a flip with Hank. He was madder than he was hurt and we explained to mother that he wasn't being fair in sharing the bicycle.

We didn't know what Dad would say about the damaged bicycle. He wasn't too happy, but did take the wheel to town after a few days and got the broken spokes replaced.

After the new wore off there wasn't much argument about who rode the bike. We had to go about a mile on the county road to get the mail and one windy March afternoon I was on my way home riding a young horse I was breaking. As I rode out of the pasture where I had been checking the cows onto the county road, I saw Hank getting the mail out of the mailbox. He was riding the bicycle so we road along together for a ways.

We were heading west into that strong March wind and it was still about three-quarters of a mile to the house. Hank was having a hard time peddling into the wind so he said, "Why don't you pull me?" I was riding this young horse with a hackamore and he was going pretty good, but was a long way from being considered broke. I always carried a lariat rope with the horn end tied to the saddlehorn—even on young horses I was breaking. The lariat was held to the saddle by a strap so I took the strap loose and pitched the lariat rope to Hank.

I started trotting the young horse a little faster and assumed that Hank

was holding the lariat with one hand and steering the bike with the other hand. We were going along just fine and Hank hollered out to go faster. The young horse didn't seem too spooky when we were all going at a regular trot, but when I kicked him out into a lope, he started getting scared of the bicycle going that fast that close behind him. He began to cock that right ear back and I could tell the young horse was really spooked. I started trying to slow him down with the hackamore reins, but the harder I pulled, the faster he went. I thought Hank would turn loose of the lariat so I looked back and was shocked to see that Hank had put the lope of the lariat over the handlebars and the loop was pulled tight below where the handlebars start.

All I could do was sit up there on the horse, pull hard and holler whoa. Hank was hollering, "Stop, stop", and would put on the brakes, but that wouldn't help a bit. The horse was running as fast as he could go and there were two terrible obstacles that we had to survive before we got to the house. The first obstacle was a sharp ninety degree turn in the road about two hundred yards from our house. Going that fast I figured the horse could make it, but there was no way the bicycle could. The second obstacle was going through the gate that went to the house and barn. The gate from the road had two big heavy mesquite gate posts in the road fence. We would be going parallel to the fence on the narrow road and would have to make a right turn between the gate posts. If the bicycle and rider were still intact after the 90 degree turn there was no way for Hank to miss the near gate post because the road was so narrow we wouldn't be able to swing out enough at that neckbreaking speed.

As we approached the sharp curve, I glanced back and Hank was bent over hanging on for dear life. As we went around the curve, the bicycle skidded sideways and down it went with Hank rolling at least twenty or thirty feet. The bicycle was bouncing from one side of the lane to the other. I pulled the horse close to the left side of the lane before he turned right to go through the gate. The turn wasn't wide enough and the bicycle hung the first gate post and whipped the other post and it completed wrecked the bicycle. The horse ran into the

big corral and up to a corner and stopped. The horse stopped so quick that the wrecked bicycle hit him in the rear and he kicked back to the end of the lariat.

I took the rope off the saddlehorn and rode back down the road to check on Hank. He was skinned up some but otherwise he was okay. Hank didn't have much room to chew me out since he realized he

didn't use very good judgment in putting the rope over the handlebars.

Dad looked at the wrecked bicycle and didn't have much to say. Incidentally, we never asked Dad for another bicycle.
