game of every kind and raided periodically by Indians. No neighbors were located within...

S. F. Elkins, who was in the ranger service under Captain J. M. Swisher, was stationed in Coleman County in 1870 near the mouth of the Concho River.

In June, 1871, the Coffeys lost 1,020 head of cattle and 50 saddle horses, driven off by Indians.

Camp Colorado was established as a military post on Jim Ned Creek in the northern part of Coleman County.

came into the area and settled near the old fort. Many of the soldiers brought their families with them into the frontier region...

One of the pioneer cattlemen in the northern portion of Coleman County was Sam Gholson, a member of a frontier family well known in Texas.

Capt. Gillett, who was only a boy at the time, also relates the incident of an Indian raid on Gholson's camp on one occasion.

finally overtaking the Indians and recapturing the horses. A brother of Captain Elkins, G. K. Elkins, was in partnership with Mr. Gholson at that time...

Another reference to Mr. Gholson as one of the early day ranchmen of Coleman County was made by another ranchman there at the time.

The year 1871 seems to have been especially fraught with serious Indian dangers in Coleman and adjoining counties.

In 1876, under the permanent organization of Coleman county, Mr. Sam Gholson was elected county treasurer. He soon decided that the country was too thickly settled so he moved on westward.

STATE SUPERVISOR OF CROP PRODUCTION LOANS

Applications for the positions of State supervisor of crop production loans and field supervisor of crop production loans must be on file with the U. S. Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C., not later than October 20, 1933.

The examinations are to fill vacancies in the Farm Credit Administration throughout the United States, and in positions requiring similar qualifications.

The entrance salary for State supervisor of crop production loans is \$2,400 a year, and for field supervisor of crop production loans \$1,500 a year.

Competitors will be rated on their experience and, on a mental test.

Applicants must have had certain specified experience.

Full information may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office or custom house in any city, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

chapel period Mr. Scarborough talked on the subject of work books, in order that the pupils might know the use and value of them.

He stated that he had worked for eighteen months getting advantages, disadvantages, other important material and writing up his views of using work books for the different courses in school. As he carried on the experiment of letting one division of a class have note books and the other division working without them, he found that, on the average basis, the work book class excelled the other. Therefore, the reason for the large number of work books being used in the school is clear. The pupils and teachers appreciate Mr. Scarborough's work and explanations on this important subject.

**Pointers in Football are Demonstrated in Chapel**

Monday morning in chapel Coach Binlon gave a few pointers on the technique of that all American game—football. The boys on the team also demonstrated various formations and plays.

Coach Binlon explained the meaning of sundry football terms, the most important of which are: Center, tackle, ends, half-back full-back, quarter-back and line of scrimmage. He also showed what was meant by a spiral ball and an end-over-end ball.

Football boys demonstrated the unbalanced formation, two-on-one shoulder block, high-low block, single shoulder block and high shulder block. It was then shown how, by various methods a defensive man broke through the opposite line. Punts were also demonstrated.

The purpose of this lesson on the technique of football was to enlighten the school about the game so that it might be more fully enjoyed.
