Universities Should Be Self-Governing. There is no reason why a state university or college should be, in fact, dominated by boards of regents, boards of control, legislative committees and others with the power at any time to cripple its activities. As a rule those who compose political official families know very little about school matters and controlling boards know but little more about such things. They may be ever so competent in other things, good business men, anxious to promote the interests of the institutions they serve, but in the nature of things they can't go closely into a study of edu-cational needs and so they become mere figure-heads as board members. School faculties are composed of persons who devote their lives to a study of school problems, whereas boards are composed of business men who devote only a few days a year for a brief number of years to such studies. Legslative committees know even less about school requirements in a great state like Texas, and governros with the power of veto can give little time to the thousands of diversified school problems. Whatever educational problems need board supervision should have the control of boards of the faculty, and the president of an institution alone should be authorized to veto the action of the faculty, to which control of a school should be given.

Seeking New Thrills. The old sensations do not appear to satisfy the youth of today, who is constantly seeking something new and untried. It is doubtful, for that matter, if those of us who are older are any longer really thrilled by anything. Things are no longer wonderful; how ever unusual or novel, they are accepted as ordinary events. I listened on New Year's morning, over the radio, to the ringing of the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia as complacently as if it had been nothing unusual. Tonight I may tune in on New York or Hayana, or Mexico City for the best musical concert either of those cities can fur-nish. Why not, and what of it? Nothing surprises any more, nothing starties. What may not tomorrow or another year bring forth?

May Yet Talk With Mare 108 The papers recently brought the information that W. J. McDonald, a Paris, Texas, banker, had left nearly one and a half million dollars to the University of Texas for the erection of an astronomical observatory. Dean H. Y. Benedict of the University, who is professor of astronomy, thinks that with that amount of money the power of the observatory may be limited only by the ability of men to produce strong lenses or whatever other things are used in making observations of the heavens. Who knows but that in a few years we may be peeking over at Mars, about which we have been so curious so long, and that some one may discover the Mars air wave length and let us talk with the Martians? All things seem probable, now.

Texas' Scenic Beachway. Texas is building the greatest beach driveway to be found anywhere. 

Lesson for February 28 JESUS TEACHES RESPECT FOR LAW.

LESSON TEXT—Matt. 22:15-22; 24-40.
GOLDEN TEXT—'Ye think that I am come to destroy the law or the prophets. I came not to destroy but to fulfill—Matt. 5:17.
PRIMARY TOPIC—A Lesson on Obe-discoe.

JUNIOR TOPIC-Obeying the Law.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOP IC-Obeying the Law. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOP-IC-How to Secure Respect for Law.

It is to be regretted that the lesson committee introduced this lesson, important as it is, thus breaking up the unity of instruction in the Gospel of John. Teachers who prefer to continue in John would do well to choose John 12:1-11 as the alternative les-801.

1. The Tribute Money (vv. 15-22) The Pharisees and Herodians proposed to entrap Jesus and bring Him into conflict with the Roman government so they came to Him with a subtle question-'Is it lawful to give tribute to Caesar or not?" At this time the Jews were galling under the yoke of the Roman government. Some even denied the right to pay tribute to the government. To have answered this guestion yes or no would have involved difficulty. To have answered yes would have conveyed the impression of endorsement of all that the Roman government did. To have answered no would have at once brought Him into conflict with sthe government. Christ's reply to this question. properly understood and applied, is the final word on the subject. Until the civil authorities demand of us that which is a violation of God's things that are Caesar's" means that within the realm of the right of government the Christian should yield glad and full obedience. "Render unto God the things that are God's" means the highest obligation. Since enjoying His protection and care, it is our duty to own all allegiance to Him, to yield our lives to Him in service. worship and praise. Everyone who enjoys the benefits of civil government is obliged to pay the taxes which are necessary for the support of that government, and everyone who receives God's favor is placed in like obligation unto Him.

II. The Great Commandment in the Law (vv. 34-40).

1. The First Commandment (vv.

Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy soul and with all thy mind." This means that supreme and undivided love to God is the first and great commandment. Man's supreme obligation is to God. It is wrong to evaluate man's character on the basis of his morality as expressed in his relation to his Tellowman. /Real righteousness is doing the right thing with God. The greatest immorality, of which a man can be guilty is his failure to respond to the demands of God.) The one who does not supremely and with undivided affection love God is the great-

2 The Second Commandment (vv.

39-40). The second commandment is like unto the first in that it centers in love. It is not said that it was equal unto the first; that would not be true. A man may love himself, but not supremely. One's love for his neighbor may be either too much or too little. The measure set is love for self. We should love God better than ourselves. He is worthy of all our affections. and demands all. Love is not mere emotion, but a supreme desire for the welfare of another and a willingness to do everything possible to secure that end. The command to love our neighbor is involved in the command to love God. To pretend to love God is folly if we do not love our neigh-Foor. To attempt to establish a brotherhood among men without the recognition of the fatherhood of God is otter nonsense. Men become children of God by faith in Jesus Christ. It is true that in the sense of being God's creatures, all men are God's -children, but in the New Testament sense, men are only God's children as they are in Christ. The only way to bring in the brotherhood of man is to preach Jesus Christ to the race and secure acceptance of Him. We thus become brothers in the real sense of the term when we have God as our Father. All obligation resting upon man is embraced in these two commandments. Those who conform their dives to them are God's children and care the very best citizens.

Grading Of Towns

At the close of the contest, loca committees who will act as judges, will make a survey of towns and de cide as to the one making the best showing: Such committees should be composed of both men and women, and should be selected in such a way as to eliminate all suspicion of partisanship.

A number of inquiries have already been received by the state board of health in regard to these contests, and it is hoped that as many counties as possible will institute such campaigns this year. Towns will be graded on water supplies, manner of sewage dis posal, sanitation of food establishments, dairies and milk supplies, mala ria control, slaughter houses and industrial waste, general cleanliness and health education activities.

Towns entering the contest can get grading sheets from the state board of health. Literature on insect and rodent control, communicable diseases and posters in limited numbers can also be secured by all towns conducting 'clean-up" campaigns.




