Cisco Poultry Association Work Starts

Cisco, March 22.—The eggs from two counties produced by 30,000 hens signed up by the Bankhead Poultry Marketing Association, will be gathered by a truck and concentrated here for marketing and cold storage. Gathering will begin at once and a man will devote his full time to the work.

Two routes will be traversed by the Association truck. One route will be from Cisco to Breckenridge, Caddo, Ranger, Olden, Eastland and back to Cisco. The other route will be from Cisco to Romney, Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona and back to Cisco via Eastland.

Trips will be made over each route semi-weekly and the truck will pick up the products from the association members along the route.

Members living at a distance from the highways traversed will have their products ready for the truck at the highway. The man in charge will work the larger towns traversed and market the eggs to hotels, stores and other places. The surplus will be brought to Cisco and after filling shipping orders on hand, the remaining eggs will be placed in cold storage here. Facilities are provided in Cisco for storing several cars of eggs.

The Bankhead Association was organized last year and is subsidized by the Chamber of Commerce of the larger towns in the territory.

A small charge is made for handling the product which is deemed sufficient to maintain the organization. However, chambers of commerce have provided funds ample to insure proper functioning of the body. Members will be advanced part of the market value of the eggs placed in storage.

Hearne, Robertson County, Texas, March 26—Grandma Garrett, 103 years old, of the Wheelock community near here, died at her residence. She has lived in Texas since 1873 and was the mother of eight children. She was left a widow when the children were quite young. She plowed in the field to support them. Mrs. Garrett had been a member of the Baptist church for ninety years.

Burial was in Wheelock cemetery, services being conducted by the Rev. J. L. Wallace, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Hall of Franklin, the Rev. C. E. Bullock of Hearne, the Rev. Mr. Tidwell of Bishopville.

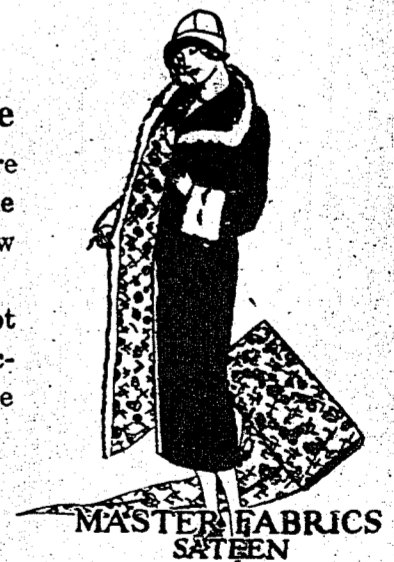

NOTICE OF ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Santa Anna, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, that an election be held on the 18th day of April, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Commission of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Santa Anna in the sum of Forty-Five Thousand & 00-100 (\$45,000.00) Dollars, payable and to mature serially as follows: \$1000.00 one year after date and \$1000.00 each year thereafter for a total of fifteen years, making \$15,000.00 per annum for the first fifteen years and \$2000.00 per annum for the second fifteen years, bearing interest at the rate of five and one-half percent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of construction of water

works within the limits of such city, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes of 1911 and Amendments thereto and Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 9 and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Santa Anna located in the Hays, Mathews & Riley Building on Lot 17 in Block 25 of the city of Santa Anna, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election to-wit: A. R. Brown, as Presiding Judge, and C. F. Freeman as Assistant Judge; said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes of 1911 and Amendments thereto and Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 9 and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the mayor of the City of Santa Anna, attested by the City Secretary of the said city, shall

Lesson for April 5

THE BLESSINGS OF PENTECOST

LESSON TEXT—Acts 2.
GOLDEN TEXT—"Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."—Acts 2:28.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Makes People Glad.
JUNIOR TOPIC—What Happened on the Day of Pentecost.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—The Story of Pentecost.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Holy Spirit in the Church.

I. The Day of Pentecost Fully Come (vv. 1-13).

1. Significance of the Day (v. 1). Pentecost is from a Greek word meaning fifty. It was the feast held fifty days after the wave sheaf offering (Lev. 23:16). The wave sheaf typifies the resurrection of Christ (1 Cor. 15:20-23).

2. The Gift—Holy Spirit (vv. 2-4). On this day the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples. This does not imply that the Spirit was not in the world before this, for throughout all the ages He has been in the world giving light and life to it. It means that from that time forth He would work on a new basis, having the crucified, risen and ascended Christ to present to the world.

3. Upon Whom the Spirit Came (v. 1); cf. 1:13-15. The twelve and others, both men and women to the number of 120, showing that the gift of the Holy Spirit was for all believers.

4. The Marks of the Spirit (vv. 2-4). (1) External.
 a. The sound of a mighty wind (v. 2). This is suggestive of the mysterious, pervasive and powerful energy of the Spirit.
 b. The tongues of flame (v. 3). Each of the 120 was crowned with such a tongue. Tongues show the practical purpose of the Spirit's gift—witnessing, and the fire indicates the purifying energy burning up the dross and making effective witnessing for Christ.
 c. Speaking in foreign tongues (v. 4). This was a temporary endowment for this special purpose.
 (2) Internal.

This is seen in the transformation wrought in the disciples. Though a little while ago they were trembling with fear, they now have great courage and self-possession.

5. The Effects (vv. 5-13). (1) The multitude were filled with amazement and wonder. The gift of the Spirit transforms common men into men of power and influence.

(2) Some mocked and foolishly attempted to account for this remarkable occurrence. They accused the disciples of being intoxicated. The world today mocks men and women who testify in the power of the Holy Spirit.

11. Peter's Sermon (vv. 14-47). Peter's sermon is as wonderful as the gift of tongues. It demonstrates the presence and power of the Spirit, since Peter was a Galilean fisherman without literary training. His analysis is perfect. He begins with a brief defense and scriptural explanation of the phenomenon of tongues (vv. 14-21). This is followed by a threefold argument to prove the messiahship of Jesus (vv. 22-38). The conclusion is an appeal to repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus.

1. The Introduction (vv. 14-21). (1) Defense of the disciples against the charge of being drunk (v. 15). (2) A scriptural explanation. He showed that this was a partial fulfillment of that which Joel predicted would come to pass (vs. 10-21; cf. Joel 2:28-32) before the messianic judgment, viz., an outpouring of the Holy Spirit and the salvation of all who call upon the name of the Lord.

2. The Proposition, or Theme (v. 38). This was the messiahship of Jesus.

3. The Argument (vv. 22-36). It was threefold: (1) From Christ's works (v. 22). He was approved of God among the Jews by His miracles, wonders, and signs which God did by Him in their midst.

(2) From His resurrection (v. 23). The Old Testament Scriptures had foretold the death and resurrection of Christ (Ps. 16:8-10).

(3) From His ascension to the right hand of God (v. 32). The proof that He had ascended on high was the wonderful miracle of the Spirit's operating in their midst, for He had said that upon His ascension into heaven He would send forth the Spirit.

4. The Effect of the Sermon (vv. 37-47). Many people were convicted of their sins. Some three thousand repented and were baptized.

University Graduates In Foreign Fields

Austin, Texas, March 20.—Many students of the University of Texas have become missionaries in foreign countries after graduation from the University. In Portalegre, Brazil, there is an Alamo-type of building designed by Miss Mary Sue Brown, a former student of the University, now a missionary. Miss Brown modeled the school house for her charges after the Alamo, and named each room for some Brazilian here. She was a student at the University of Texas 1893-95.

There are many other interesting stories told of the ex-students who are now missionaries. Among them is William Nash of Richmond, who was graduated in 1922, and is now installing a student honor system in a school in Korea.

Henry G. Howard, who received the B. A. degree in 1897, and the M. A. degree in 1898, was sent by the Presbyterian church to India. Margaret Beetle, who like many other carriers of the gospel, worked her way through college, is now in Szechow, China. She married a co-worker, Stephen F. Brokley. Miss Rachel Jarrett, of Texarkana, 1897-98 is a teacher at the Isabella Hendricks College at Bello Horizonte, in South America. This school is modeled after the Capitol at Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Jalmer Bowden, formerly Miss Eula Harper, of El Paso, spent several years at Passo Fundo, Brazil, before her marriage, when she removed to Juix de Fera. J. W. Daniel, who was sent out by the Methodist church, and is supported by students, has established a school and is one of the foremost missionaries of the Rio Grande ul., South America. Charles Herbert Marshall, of Brady, who received degrees in electrical and civil engineering from the University, and completed his training at Schenectady, N. Y., is also at work at Passo Fundo.

W. C. Gardner, of Adairville, 1909-13, was unable to take advantage of his last furlough because the need of his services as a missionary, were so acute. Miss Maud Mathis, a graduate of 1923, is now in Riode Janeiro, in Bennett College. Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Taylor, are two ex-students of the University, at Passo Fundo.

CLEANEST TOWN CONTEST

The Hall County Federation of Women's Clubs will sponsor a "cleanest-town" contest for their county for the week April 5-11, according to a letter received by Dr. H. O. Sappington, state health officer, from Mrs. J. C. Bufts, President Hill County Federation. Similar campaigns conducted the past two years resulted in creating much enthusiasm and friendly rivalry between towns entering the clean-up contest. Civic organizations, business men's clubs, school children, and Boy Scout Organizations cooperated with the Federation in eliminating health menaces from down-town districts as well as residential sections. Public markets, dairies and slaughter houses were inspected, and where sanitary conditions were found to not be good, recommendations were made for improvements. Managers of motion picture houses offered prizes for the largest number of tin-cans, and the Boy Scouts aided by the school children made a thorough clean-up of such rubbish. Much good was accomplished in the improvement of sanitary conditions and much interest is again being expressed in the contest this year. The date April 5-11 was decided upon because this is the week designated by the State Board of Health as a state-wide clean-up week. Other counties wishing to conduct such contests will be given the cooperation of the State Board of Health, and inspectors will be furnished free of charge to grade towns at the end of the clean-up campaign.

There were over 13,000 cases of influenza reported in Texas during the month of February according to the report made by Dr. H. O. Sappington, State Health Officer to the Surgeon General of the U. S. Public Health Service at Washington.

Warrants for \$4.00 per capita, making a total of \$13.00 of the sum total for year, has been received at the Depository for the Santa Anna Independent School District, and the remainder will be paid on or before May 1st, according to information from the State Department of Education.

First Broilers Of Season Shipped By Poultry Ass'n.

Forty five cents per pound was paid for the first broilers of the 1925 season F. O. B. Brownwood last week, the broilers being raised by a member of the Southwestern Poultry Association, and handled by that organization. There were 103 of the chickens of the Leghorn variety and they weighed 146 pounds.

The Southwestern Poultry Association is a branch of the Farm Bureau and was organized in Brown County last year. About 300 farmers signed up for the Association to handle their poultry, some of these members being in counties adjoining Brown. So far the organization has proven a success and the membership seems pleased with the results they have gotten. L. A. Nunn is president and H. G. Lucas secretary of the association. The business is handled by F. J. McMullen, the local manager who has as his assistant W. L. Lambert, and as bookkeeper Mrs. Lila Salyers.

For the past six weeks they have been shipping on an average of 160 cases of eggs per week. A case holds 360 eggs, so the average for the week is 57,600 eggs. They have been shipping between 1500 and 2,000 pounds of poultry each week and this is not the heavy shipping season. The Association has stations at Blanket, May, Zephyr and Brookesmith where poultry and eggs are assembled by members and then brought to headquarters at Brownwood. Last fall they shipped seven car loads of dressed turkeys. There

are two pay days each week at headquarters in Brownwood. On Tuesday checks are issued to members for all the eggs they have brought in during the past week, and on Friday are issued for the poultry.—Brownwood News.

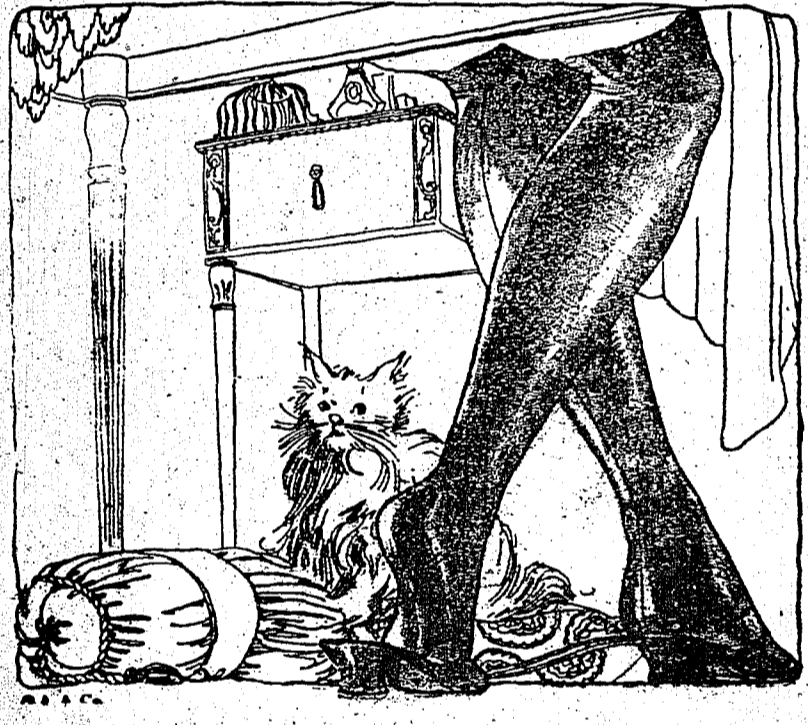
