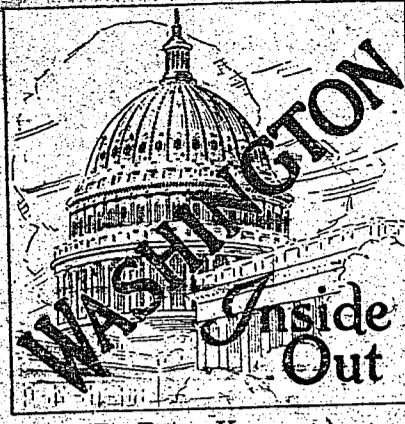

Alice Robertson, former Congresswoman from Oklahoma, has quit public life for all time to come. In bidding farewell to her friends in Washington, Aunt Alice said that the political arena was "no place for a good clean woman."

One of the greatest advertising campaigns ever put on in this country is now being directed by Secretary Mellon in an effort to "sell" his tax reduction plan to Congress and the country. It may seem ironic, but it is true, nevertheless, that Mellon is confronted with the problem of convincing the people that they want and should have their taxes cut.

It appears that Congress will have to tear the outer hide off the Russian situation with an official investigation to find out who is telling the truth—Hughes or Tchitcherine, the Department of Justice or the Workers Party of America. The international air is now filled with charges and counter charges, but the Progressives in Congress declare that they are going to get at the truth.

Henry Ford will get control of the government's nitrate and power project at Muscle Shoals, Ala., according to well-authenticated opinion in the capital. President Coolidge virtually is committed to selling the Muscle Shoals property to the automobile magnate; and it is also pointed out that Ford's chances have been enhanced to some extent by his withdrawal from the presidential race.

Reliable reports are current here that James M. Cox, former Governor of Ohio and Democratic presidential candidate in 1920, will be in the race again next year against William G. McAdoo, Oscar Underwood and other possible aspirants for the presidency. If Cox decides to go in he is expected to limit his pre-convention activities to his home state, but he owns a newspaper or two in the South and may try to submarine Underwood in the latter's own territory.

Secretary Denby is getting ready to ask the President to revoke the order issued last summer by President Harding to keep the Navy from increasing the firing range of the big guns on American warships. The Harding order followed a misunderstanding with Great Britain and was the result of a fear on the part of American officials that they would be charged with violating the naval limitation treaty. Denby thinks, however, that it would not be a violation of the treaty to improve on the warships so he is going to ask authority from the White House to go ahead with the work.

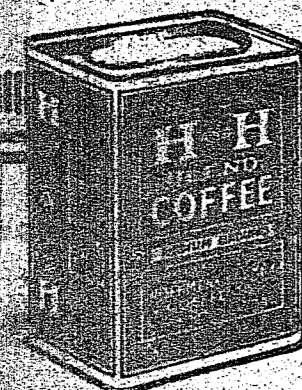
