WILLIAMSON WELL COMES- IN AT DEPTH OF 2,385 FEET 1,000 BARREL CAPACITY

The Williamson well, fifteen miles north-east of Santa Anna, on the Cox tract in northern Brown county is flowing by heads, and reports by telephone from operators who rushed to the well the well stated that the well gives promise of a splendid production. Estimates of the probable production vary, but many observers, including some of the more experienced oil men making headquarters here, think the well will be good for at least a thousand barrels of oil daily. If this be the case, a big drilling campaign in the northern part of the county is inevitable. It will be called to mind that a leak in the casing a few days ago made it necessary to draw the casing. This was done and new casing put down. The drill had hardly been put to work after the new casing had been placed when a heavy spray of oil and strong gas flow was reached and this was followed by the report at noon that the well had come in a big proposition.

The Williamson well is located two miles from Byrd's store, 15 miles north-east of Santa Anna and about half way between the Sinclair and Bailey wells. Experts who have given close study to the various oil wells in this county state that the Williamson well is by far better than anything that as yet been found in the county. It was started almost one year ago and has been put down under a number of difficulties and backsets. Several times it has been necessary to stop, draw the casing, repair leaks and make other necessary repairs before work of the right kind could be resumed. The depth at which the oil was struck is said to be about 2,385 feet, and it is probable that the new incentive will be given to deep drilling.

The location of the well has drawn to it a great deal of interest from the very day it was sounded in. The Bailey well was brought in as a small producer almost two years ago, and shortly afterward the Sinclair well came in with production that for a time appeared to be especially good. The use of nitro-glycerine did not benefit either well, however, and only the Bailey has been used commercially. The theory of many of the experts was that somewhere between the two wells lies the pool of which both wells are on the edge, and it was to test this theory that the Williamson began this test.

COTTON COMING IN RAPIDLY NOW

Santa Anna has this week taken on all the activities of a thriving industrial center, with the gins humming a merry purr as farmer after farmer brings a load of cotton to be ginned.

Up to noon today the four gins of Santa Anna reported a total output of 759 bales, divided among the gins as follows:

Farmers gin.....290
Turner gin.....237
Wallace gin.....132
Rose gin.....80

At the same hour. Weigher Earl Watkins had weighed 1,000 bales.

The fleece which is being gathered now presents a very good sample, as it has not as yet been rained on to any appreciable extent, at least that portion of it which has opened within the last ten days.

The market in Santa Anna for the offerings this week has been hobbing right around the 27c mark on a middling basis.

The hot sunshine of the last ten days has entirely put to rout the pessimistic farmers who were wont to pull a seven-foot stalk of cotton without any visible signs of fruit from some isolated spot in the field and bring it to town during the wet weather of a fortnight ago out of the human propensity to seek comfort in company when in misery. Now, the farmers are hustling all day to gather what appears to be one of the largest cotton crops ever gathered in the Santa Anna country.

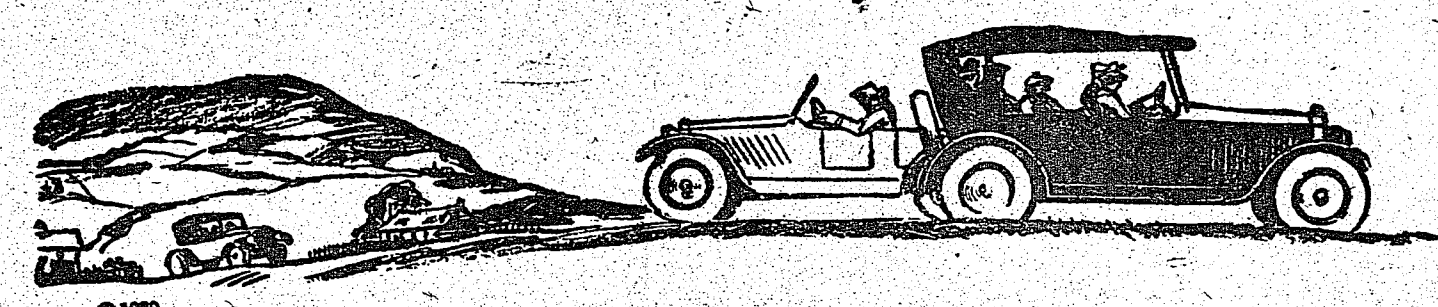

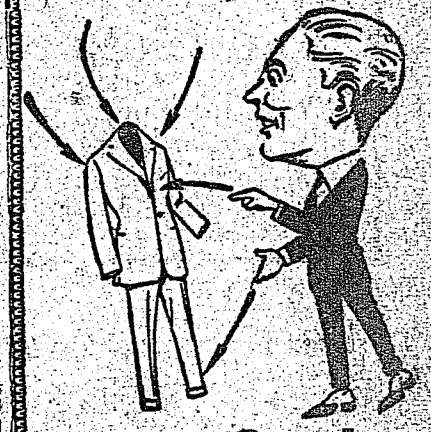

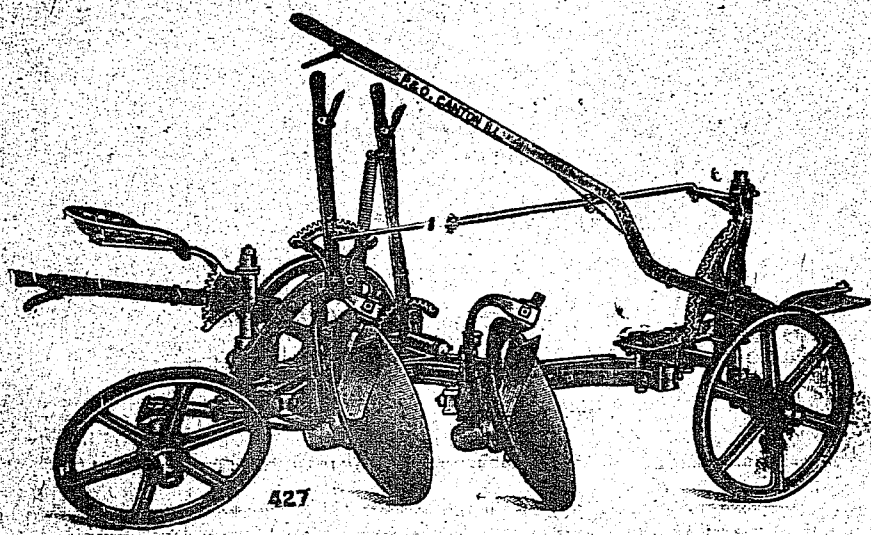
