HALF CENT POSTAGE STAMP WILL SOON BE OFFERED PUBLIC

Washington, March 10.—A 1-2c postage stamp will be issued for the first time by April 1. The new denomination has become necessary because of the new postal rates on third class mail effective April 1. A 1-2c stamp bearing President Harding's picture is being prepared also for this class of mail. The design and color of the new half-cent has not yet been decided.

INCOME TAX

Sunday, March 15, 1925, is the last day for mailing Income Tax reports. These reports must be accompanied by check for one-fourth of the total amount of the tax, or the whole amount may be paid. After this date penalties and interest charges are added.

"COLD CHECK LAW" NOW IN EFFECT

By Pollard S. B. No. 116. (In the Senate—January 23, 1925, read first time and referred to Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence; January 23, 1925, reported favorably.)

A Bill to be Entitled
An Act to amend Paragraph No. 4, of Article 1422, Chapter 18, of the Penal Code of Texas (1911) as amended by the Thirty-third Legislature, regular term, (1913) page 184 of the Acts of the Thirty-third Legislature, relating to swindling, making certain facts prima facie evidence of fraudulent intent and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That Article 1422, Title 17, Chapter 18, Penal Code of Texas (1911) as amended by the Acts of the Thirty-third Legislature of Texas, relating to swindling be amended so as, hereafter to read as follows:

Article 1422. Within the meaning of the term "swindling" are included the following wrongful acts:

1. The exchange of property upon the false pretense that the party is the owner or has the right to dispose of the property given in exchange.

2. The purchase of property upon the faith and credit of some other person upon the false pretense that such other has given the accused the right to use his name in making the acquisition.

3. The obtaining by false pretense the possession of any instrument of writing, certificate, field notes or other paper relating to lands; the property of another, with the intent that there by the property owner shall be defeated of a valuable right in such lands.

4. The obtaining by any person of any money or other thing of value with intent to defraud by the giving or drawing of any check, draft or order upon any bank, person, firm or corporation, with which or with whom such person giving or drawing or at the time of the giving or said check, draft or order has drawing said check, draft or order, or at the time when in the ordinary course of business such check, draft or order would be presented to the drawee for payment, sufficient funds to pay same, and no good reason to believe that such check, draft or order will be paid; provided, that if said check, draft or order is not paid on presentation of the return of same shall be prima facie evidence of the fraudulent intent of said person drawing or giving said check; and, provided further, that if such check, draft or order is not paid within 15 days after the same is returned unpaid, it shall be prima facie evidence that no good reason existed for believing that said check, draft or order would be paid, and it shall also be prima facie evidence of intent to defraud and knowledge of insufficient funds with the drawee.

5. The special enumeration of cases of swindling above set forth shall not be understood to exclude any case which by fair construction of language comes within the meaning of the preceding article.

6. That the fact that there is no law now protecting individuals, banks, firm or corporation of this State from being swindled by the giving or drawing of any checks where there are no funds to pay same, created an emergency and an imperative public necessity which demands that the constitutional rule requiring all bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and the same is hereby suspended, and this Act shall take effect from and after its passage.

NEW POSTAL LAW EFFECTIVE MARCH 15

Under a recent act, effective March 15, several changes will be made in postal rates. If we correctly interpret the changes, there will be no more 1 cent letter mail, and all postals except those printed by the government will require a 2 cent stamp.

Registration fees are increased from 10 cents to 15 cents for values up to \$50.00, and from 15 cents to 20 cents for values up to \$80.00, with 3 cents service charge for a return receipt.

Insurance fees have been increased from 3 cents to 5 cents for values up to \$5.00 and as high as 25 cents for \$100.00 values.

C. O. D. packages increased to 12 cents, not to exceed \$10.00 values.

Money order fees are increased from 3 cents to 5 cents for values up to \$2.50, 7 cents to \$5.00 values, up to 20 cents for \$100.00.

All packages above 8 ozs. now being classed as Third and Fourth class mail will be changed to Fourth class, Parcel Post.

Newspapers are not materially effected in the first and second zones, but all periodicals going beyond the second zone are increased considerably.

Why Not Realize Grady's Vision?



The Troup Banner recently reproduced in a "box" on its front page a quotation from a speech by Henry W. Grady that ought to be framed and hung in every farm home in the South. Here it is. Clip it and put it where it can be seen often:

"Whenever the farmer in the South shall eat bread from his own fields and meat from his own pastures, and, disturbed by no creditor and enslaved by no debt; shall sit amidst his teeming gardens and orchards and vineyards and dairies and barnyards, pitching his crops in his own wisdom, and growing them in independence, making cotton his clean surplus, and selling it in his own time, and in his chosen market—and not at his master's bidding—getting his pay in cash, and not in a receipted mortgage that discharges his debt, but doesn't restore his freedom—then shall be the breaking of the fullness of our day."

Learning to Make Their Clothes.

The State Department of Education of Texas is sponsoring a movement that should meet the approval of every parent in the State. This is a clothing contest to be held at Austin April 23-25, which will be open to all the schools in Texas that have home economics departments. More than 100 schools will be represented in the contest by several girls from each school who have won the trip through local school contests. These girls, some 500 in number, will have with them their clothing made in their schools that will be entered for prizes aggregating \$100.00 offered by the Texas Mothers' Congress. The girls will give exhibitions of the clothing made by them and as worn by them. This will be a fashion show worth while. How I wish every Texas girl could see it.

Travel is a Great Educator.

The making of their clothes and the prizes received in the contests will not be the only advantage the girls will receive from their efforts. The trip to Austin at their age will be a most wonderful lesson for every one of them. They will get to see the capitol of Texas, that marvelously beautiful building under its brilliantly lighted dome. They will see many of the institutions that belong to them as much as to any one else in Texas. They will be filled with pride of citizenship in so great a state so rich in inspiring history. They will see other sections of the state than the familiar surroundings of their own homes. They will have experiences that will be treasured through life. Surely Texas school children have many advantages now that their parents never dreamed of in their school days. Getting an education is being made attractive to those who work hard enough to get the best that is offered even in the remote country schools.

Making Billions for Texas.

A University of Texas professor of physical chemistry, Dr. E. P. Schoch, has announced the completion of experiments that, if his conclusions are correct, will mean the conservation of more than \$50,000,000,000 of Texas wealth. There are "in sight" some 22,000,000,000 tons of Texas lignite and probably many more billions that may be revealed by further exploration. This lignite, when exposed to the air, soon slacks to fine powder, is burned with much difficulty, and is unpleasant to handle. Hence, the sale of it is restricted, as it cannot be stored. The governments of this country and Canada have made many costly experiments in efforts to dehydrate and use have been too expensive. After some eight years of experimenting, Dr. Schoch says he has found a way to process lignite to make it commercially available at reasonable cost.

According to his figures lignite can be mined, processed, and loaded at the mines at a total cost of \$2.51 a ton, the processed fuel being as good for fuel as and having heating units equal to soft coal. On account of difference in freight rates this should be a great saving to all Texas fuel users.

The Figures Are Astounding.

It is hard to think, in figures, just what Dr. Schoch's discovery may mean. First, there is the 22,000,000,000 or more tons of lignite of which but little use could have been made in its natural state. It is now worth at least that many dollars. Miners will be employed to get it out. Then, the processing will require \$1.50 for each ton. The railroads will get a haul. So will teamsters or draymen. Then, there is the saving to the buyers of coal. Can you estimate it?

But that is not all. Think of the additional manufacturing that will result—the location of cotton mills near lignite mines, the work of a small-salaried university professor: done during the spare hours he might have spent playing golf or fishing.

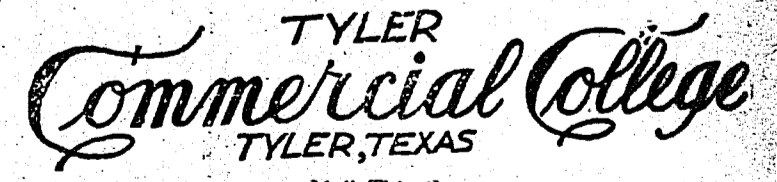

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Santa Anna located in the Hays, Mathews & Riley Building on Lot 17 in Block 25 of the city of Santa Anna, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election to-wit: A. R. Brown, as Presiding Judge, and C. F. Freeman as Assistant Judge; said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes of 1911 and Amendments thereto and Acts of the 37th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 9 and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

Electricity in Homes

A recent survey of the United States made an electrical publication shows that more than half of the 26,219,100 homes in the country or 50.5 per cent are lighted by electricity. Pacific coast states lead all sections with 85.7 per cent. The six New England States are second with 67.4 per cent of the homes. In the three Middle Atlantic States, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York 53.3 per cent of the homes are wired, and 26.9 per cent in the nine South Atlantic States. Five East North Central States show 4.3 per cent, and the West North Central States 49 per cent. The four East South Central States, Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama and Mississippi have 22.2 per cent of the homes wired and 33.3 per cent of the homes of the West South Central States electricity is used.

The survey shows the states of the country which ranks the first ten in percentages of homes using electricity are: Utah, 98.2 per cent; California, 96.5 per cent; Connecticut, 78.8 per cent; Illinois, 73.2; Michigan, 72.5; Washington, 68.8; Massachusetts 67.6; Maine, 66.8; Vermont, 66.3; and New Jersey 65.8 per cent.

After three years of concentrated effort the 200,000 postal employees are to have an increase in salaries of about \$320 each per year, involving a total of about \$68,000,000 to the government pay roll. The bill signed by the President makes the increase effective at once, with back pay from January 1, under the new scale. The new postal rates will yield about \$59,000,000, and the other \$9,000,000 will be added to the deficit which now amounts to about \$50,000,000 per year.

J. W. Kirkpatrick

Again our town has been made sad on account of another one of our citizens being laid to rest—John Wallace Kirkpatrick, who died at six o'clock, Saturday morning, Feb. 28, 1925.

Brother Kirkpatrick lived in and near Santa Anna for the last forty-six years, having moved here with his prents from Ellis county in 1879. He was well known in Coleman county, having lived here most of his life, being only 8 years old when he came to the county. He was a highly respected citizen. His noble virtues were many. His imperfections were few. You could not meet Wallace (as he was commonly called) and talk with him very long, without leaving him feeling brighter and

more cheerful. You could not be sad around him, he had a word of cheer for those he met.

Bro. Kirkpatrick was born in Ellis County, Texas, July 5, 1871 and accepted Christ as his Savior at the age of 13. He soon thereafter united with the Cumberland Presbyterian church in Santa Anna in 1884 and remained a member of this church 41 years. We will miss him very much in our services.

He was married to Miss Marietta Baxter Dec. 24, 1894. There were born to this home 4 daughters, all of which are living and were present at the time of their father's death. He also leaves his wife, one brother and one sister to mourn the loss of a husband and brother. He will be missed in our church; he will be missed as a fellow townsman; a place in the home will be vacant, but we can through Christ look toward eternity's shore where we shall all be able to make the landing some day, if Christ the son of God has been our pilot while our little bark has been tossed to an fro, while crossing life's tempestuous sea. May this sorrow which has so completely overshadowed us be used as a means to draw us nearer the Master, that he may comfort us, as he did Martha and Mary on a similar occasion.

I would say to the family as friends and neighbors we have tried to help share your burdens and sorrows with you, but there is one who can go all the way with you. May the Savior comfort you during this sadness.

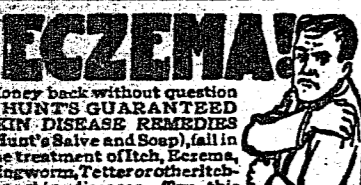

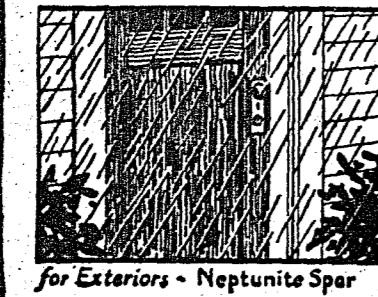
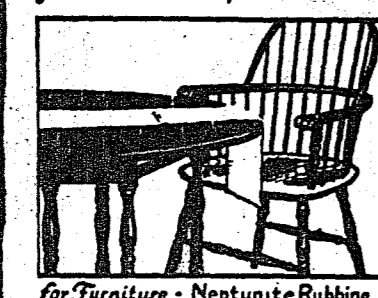

Lesson for March 15

OUR LORD'S RESURRECTION

LESSON TEXT—John 20:1-25.
GOLDEN TEXT—"The Lord is risen indeed."—Luke 24:34.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Rises From the Dead.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Jesus Rises From the Dead.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Christ's Victory Over Death.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Proofs of the Resurrection of Jesus.

The resurrection of Christ is one of the foundation truths of Christianity. Its entire superstructure stands or falls upon its reality. It is the grand proof that Christ was what He claimed to be, the Messiah, the Son of God (Matt. 12:39-40; John 2:19-21). His resurrection authenticated his claims. If Jesus did not rise from Joseph's tomb, He was not the Son of God, nor a true prophet (He said frequently while alive that He would arise), neither a Savior; not even a good man, for He would then be a falsifier. However, if He did arise, all that He said concerning Himself is true. His resurrection declared Him to be the Son of God with power (Rom. 1:4).

I. The Empty Tomb (vv. 1-10).

John does not enter into a description of the resurrection of Christ, but says the tomb was empty, and that Jesus had repeatedly manifested Himself after the tomb was found empty. To see the body of Christ with a spear thrust and nail prints, and then the empty tomb was all that faith needed.

1. The Testimony of Mary Magdalene (vv. 1-2).

This woman out of whom Jesus had cast seven demons (Mark 16:9; Luke 8:2), announced the fact of the empty tomb to Peter and John. Prompted by great love to Him for His kindness to her, she went early to the tomb even "when it was yet dark." "She was last at the cross, and first at the grave. She stayed longest there and was soonest here." This woman's love for the Master was genuine though her knowledge as to His resurrection was defective. She had realized great good at His hand, therefore she could not rest until she had done her utmost for Him.

2. Personal Investigation by Peter and John (vv. 3, 10).

The news of the empty tomb which Mary brought with breathless haste so moved John and Peter that both ran to investigate. When John came to the empty tomb he gazed into it, but Peter entered it. This investigation convinced them. The removal of the stone from the sepulcher and the arrangement of the grave clothes convinced them that the enemy could not have done this.

II. The Manifestation of the Risen Lord (vv. 11-29).

1. To Mary Magdalene (vv. 11-18).

(1) Mary Weeping at the Empty Tomb (v. 11). Peter and John went home, but Mary could not. She stood weeping. Home was nothing to her while her Lord was missing. Earnest love need not weep long for Jesus is found of those who love Him. She should have been rejoicing that the grave was empty, for the empty tomb was eloquent proof of His messianship and deity. Had His body been there she would have had real cause for weeping.

(2) Mary Questioned by the Angels (vv. 12-18).

She viewed through her tears angels at the tomb who inquired as to the cause of her sorrow. She replied, "Because they have taken away my Lord and I know not where they have laid Him."

(3) Jesus Reveals Himself to Mary (vv. 14-16).

She first saw the angels and then her eyes lighted upon the Lord. As soon as He called her by name she recognized Him and fell at His feet weeping.

(4) Jesus Forbade Her to Touch Him (v. 17).

This showed that she was coming into a new relationship to Him; besides there was not time for such familiarity while the disciples were in darkness. "Go tell my brethren," was the message she must carry.

(5) Mary's Testimony (v. 18).

She told the disciples that she had seen the Lord.

2. To the Disciples (vv. 19-29).

(1) When Thomas Was Absent (vv. 19-23).

a. His message of peace (v. 19).
b. He showed His hands and His side (v. 20).
c. He commissioned them (v. 21).
d. He defended the power that was bestowed upon them (v. 23).

(2) When Thomas Was Present (vv. 24-29).

a. Victory of sight and touch (vv. 24-28).
b. Greater blessings for those who believe, not having seen (v. 29).

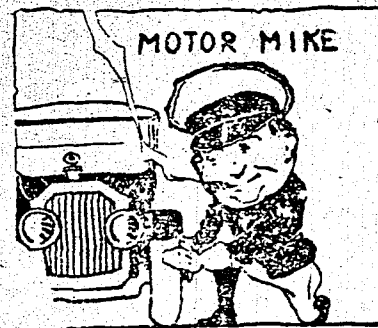

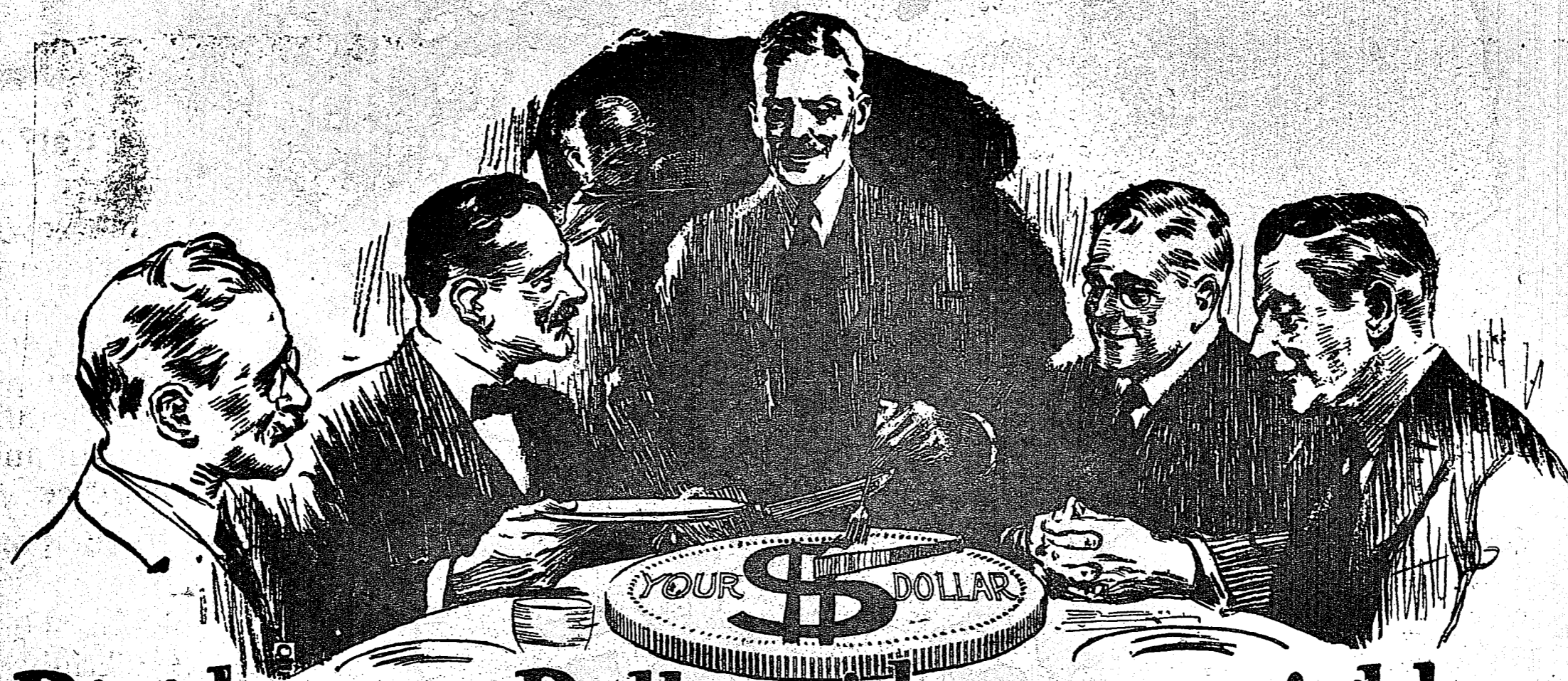



Mrs. Emma J. Melton died at her home 1619 Austin Avenue, Brownwood, Texas, Thursday morning at 2:30 o'clock, following a few days illness with pneumonia which resulted from influenza. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. W. R. Hornburg Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock at Coggin Avenue Baptist church, Brownwood, Texas, after which the remains were brought here and laid to rest by her brother the late Ben M. Melton Sr.
