Brownwood Plans Annual Regatta For September 4

Brownwood, Texas, August 26—West Texas this year will have an opportunity for the first time to see Divisional Championship speed boat races when the Southern Divisionals are held Sunday, September 4th, at the Lake Brownwood course. This is the first time that the big time championship event, which will bring to Brownwood the winners of the other regattas held throughout the South, has ever been held in this section.

The event, from which winners will be certified to the National Outboard Championship meet at Chattanooga, will draw the biggest field of entries ever assembled in a Southern race, according to officials of the Brownwood Regatta Association, which has sponsored boat racing at Lake Brownwood for the past four years. Drivers will compete for \$800 in cash prizes and for the handsome Divisional trophies.

Several grudge races are due to be offered the spectators, according to word received by officials of the association.

Several racers have signified their intentions to "beat or bust" their rivals that have showed them spray in races that have been run in the Texas Racing circuit in the earlier part of the summer.

Anthony F. Hopp, Dallas, who is regarded as one of the best referees in the nation, will serve again in that capacity. Other officials of the regatta will include many of the "big names" in boat racing in the South.

Mozelle School Opens Sept. 5

Mozelle school will open Sept. 5 with approximately 625 pupils expected in both high school and grade school departments, according to W. T. Bowers, superintendent. Of this number 225 will be in high school and about 400 in the ward school.

The school this year has 29 1/2 units of affiliation. Pupils will come to school from Gouldsbush, Brown Ranch, Elliott, Starkweather, Voss, Hardin and Hill communities. High school students from Leaday, Folk, Red Bank and Loss Creek will also attend. Seven buses will take about 400 students each day, some as far as 2 1/2 miles.

High tribute was paid to the Christian life of the deceased who was devout in his faith throughout his life.

Mr. Burris had been in ill health for a long time and recently had been confined to bed.

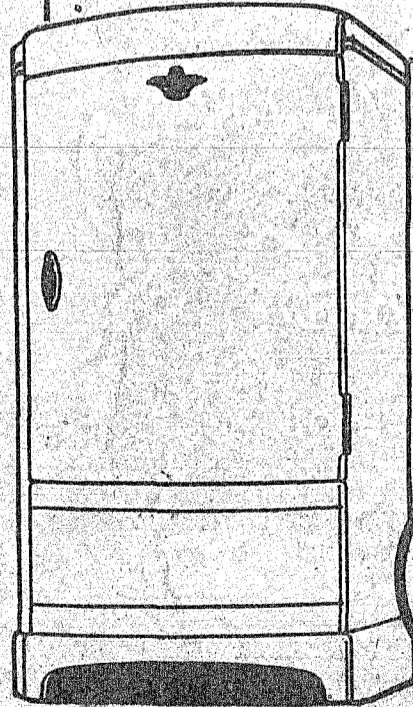
