STILL CAPTURED NEAR TRICKHAM

Last Saturday, Deputy Sheriff Geo. Bobo of Trickham was tipped off regarding a whiskey making outfit near Trickham, and went out in search. Mr. Bobo and Mr. Lee Vaughan discovered the still on Mr. Vaughan's ranch, in the Trickham community, and placed under arrest two Mexicans, who, we understand, plead guilty to operating the wildcat distillery, however, they were not present when the still was found. Fire broke out from some unknown origin, and burned off several hundred acres of grass, and when a search was made for the origin of the fire, the still was found in operation, but no one present. A small quantity of whiskey and a barrel of mash was captured together with the still, which was carried to Coleman with the two Mexicans, and turned over to Sheriff Dick Pauley.

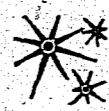
Uncle Billie Ellis of Coleman, who is in the local hospital for treatment is improving.

MET AFTER 40 YEARS

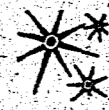
