Of course the odds are against the local eleven in this contest, but by virtue of a 12-0 defeat of the Blizzards by the Cross Plains club gives the Mountaineers somewhat of an outside chance to take the go.

The Winters ball club has been somewhat of a miss and hit affair all season, being on at times and again looking very ragged, and of course it will probably be the Mountaineers luck to get them when they are at their hottest, but regardless of what may come or go there will be a scrap. The injury jinx has at last hit the Mountaineers, and has decidedly weakened their team, along with some scholastic difficulties. In last weeks game against Ballinger Co - Capt. Charles Wristen sustained a severe injury to his hand that is likely to keep him off the sidelines throughout the game. This weeks team will see a new member to the Mountaineer secondary in the starting lineup in the person of Shag Garrett who will call signals and direct the team from left half position. Shag is the best hustler on the ball club and seems to be plenty cool under fire, and it is believed that he can call a very smart game of football. The starting lineup should look something like this when the eleven men take the field against the Winters Blizzards. At the wings, Rowe and Wade; tackles, Gregg and Henderson or Everett. The guard holes will be manned by the old faithfuls L. V. Cupps and Lucy Guthrie. The pivot man should be Lee Schattel, who in the Rising Star game scored the Mountaineers second touchdown on an interception of a lateral and raced 80 yards to a touchdown. The secondary should line up something like this. Oakes at quarter back, Garrett at left half and Cotton Nichols at right half. The fullback will be either Brown or Gregg, this position depending upon how well the injured leg of Brown continues to respond to treatment.

The Mountaineers should give the Blizzards a full afternoon of entertainment, and again as before, if they can make up their minds to charge and block hard they will win another ball game.

Two Men Succumb After Explosion Of Gas Well Here

Two of the men most seriously injured last Thursday afternoon at the gas well explosion on the L. L. Baker place, died early Friday morning, October 14 at the Sealy Hospital where they were rushed when the accident occurred. Those who died were John S. Simpson of Coleman and John Knox Jr. of Midland. Both were terribly burned and Mr. Simpson also had received a broken arm from the explosion.

Funeral services for Mr. Simpson were held at Coleman Saturday afternoon.

Services for Mr. Knox were held Saturday afternoon at Eastland, his former home.

The other seriously burned who is still in the Sealy Hospital is W. P. Lacy of Midland. Besides severe burns, he suffered a compound fracture of his right leg, and is in a very serious condition.

The tragedy occurred at the well northeast of town as the well was being acidized. When the well exploded, fire broke out and continued blazing until late Thursday night, when efforts of the Coleman Fire Department to put out the fire were successful.

Twenty-five grade points are equivalent to an average of 90.

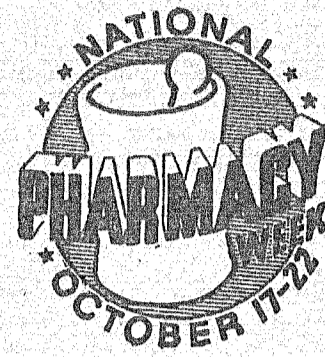

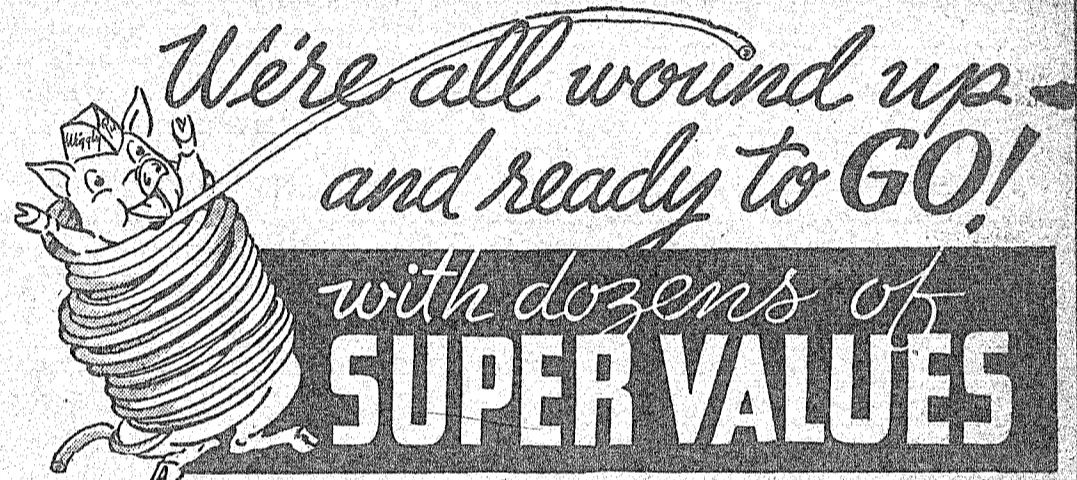
