Senator Stresses Continued Need of Conservation

Senator Tom Connally spoke before a large audience Monday at the Coleman High School building after an 85-mile inspection tour of Coleman County conservation projects and commended workers of the Central Colorado River territory and citizens of the county on conserving soil and water for the future needs of residents.

Following the visit to the projects completed after a two year period of work, the Senator was guest of honor at a luncheon given jointly by the Coleman Lions and Kiwanis Clubs at the First Christian Church. He was also honored at a breakfast at Hotel Coleman.

One of the main points Senator Connally brought out in the after dinner address and in the 2:30 o'clock speech was the slowness of governmental agencies and citizens in realizing need for conservation. He emphasized the fact that conservation must be carried on now to preserve the land and water for future generations. He promised to "continue to help and aid you in your undertaking."

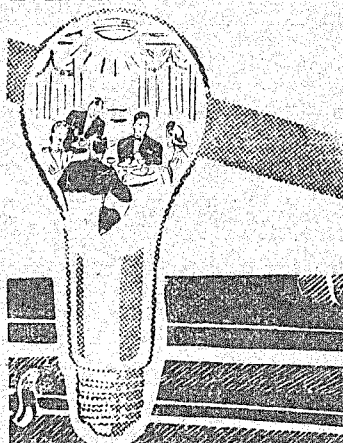

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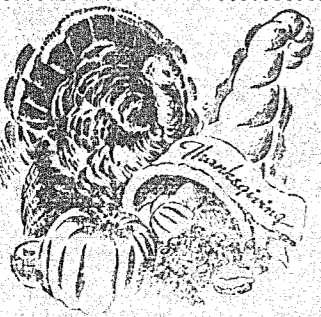
