Cotton is the overcoat of a land that is planted and grown in the Southern states to keep the producers broke and the buyer crazy. The fiber varies in color and length and the man who can guess the nearest length of a fiber is called a cotton-yarn man by the public, a fool by the farmer and a poor business man by his creditors.

The price of cotton is fixed in New York and goes down when you have bought and up when you have sold. A buyer working for a group of mills was sent to New York to watch the cotton market. After a few days' deliberation, he wired his firm to this effect: "Some think it will go down, some think it will go up, I do, too. Whatever you do will be wrong. Act at once."

Cotton is planted in spring, mortgaged in summer and left in the fields in winter.

## County Farmers Approve Quotas In Referendum

Coleman county farmers who produced cotton in 1938 approved marketing quotas proposed for 1939 by a margin of 623 votes in an agricultural referendum held Saturday. Of 1,135 votes cast, 859 favored a cotton marketing quota for next year, compared with 276 opposed.

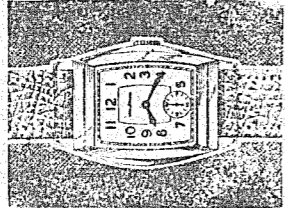

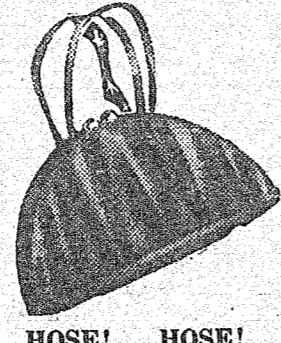
