We have been trying to work ourselves up to prepare an article on the importance of attending church. We have attempted such a few times, but getting our subject blended with too much truth we generally ditch them in the waste basket rather than pass them on to the reading public.

People who attend church are generally the ones who carry on in the community. It is to them the distressed go for confidence and sympathy when in distress, and in most instances the ones people call upon when it becomes necessary to follow the results of some hard one out to the cemetery to be buried.

We do not pretend that all church-going people are popular leaders and rank high in the esteem of all the citizens. But for those are exceptions to the rule. But are we not justified in our contention that the congregation, Christians who devote a part of their time to religious work and worship, those who attend church if you please, burning exceptions, are among the most desirable and trustworthy citizens to be found?

Then, if the best people are those who make up the church and its congregations, what is there wrong about attending church?

We admit that a busy man who attends church and the services for some reason are not very apt to go to us, but there are again exceptions to the rule. In most instances we return to our homes or places of business greatly elevated in thought, mind and intention, and are generally benefited by the experience.

All church members and church workers are not perfect, but they evidently are working improvement or they would not attend church. Suppose you buy yourself in seriousness, go to church, and get a little rest and quiet in the looking for the best of people in people in need of help for their shortcomings, attend church services, seeking to be benefited instead of looking at the misdoings of others who attend, and see if you too will not receive a blessing and return to your home with a desire to try going to church again. Keep it up a few weeks and the habit will grow upon you.

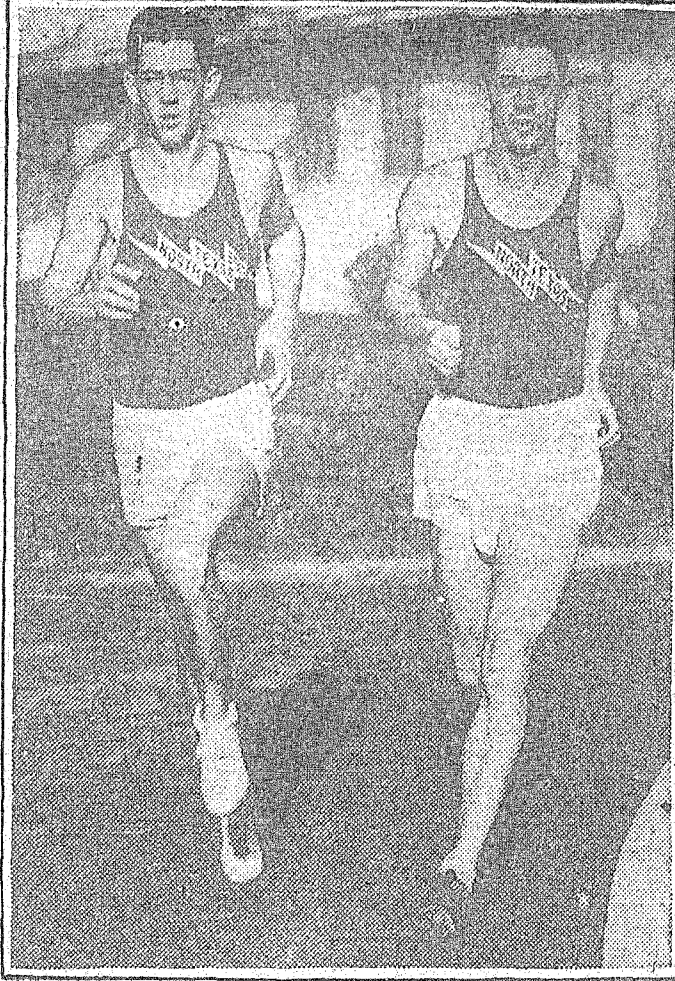

Twins Take Track Sports Spotlight



BLAINE AND WAYNE RIDEOUT

DENTON, Texas—Experts are saying that one of these days one of these twins is going to show his heels to the nation's greatest miler, Glenn Cunningham.

And early last week Blaine and Wayne ("Me and My Shadow") Rideout were off with their coach Choc Sportsman, track mentor at the North Texas State Teachers' College, for four of the most important indoor meets on the Eastern seaboard: the Prout Games, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus at Boston, January 28; the Millrose Games in Madison Square Garden, February 5; the Sevcith Regiment meet at the Park Avenue Army, February 10; and the B. A. A. Games at Boston, February 11.

High point of the four will be the Millrose Games, where Blaine will be entered in the featured Wanamaker mile against Cunningham and other top-flight milers of the nation. Brother Wayne, world record holder in the three-quarters mile, is entered in the Millrose two thirds event. Blaine will run the mile and Wayne the two mile at the Knights of Columbus meet. In the two other meets Blaine will be entered in the mile and Wayne in the 7,000 yard run.

The Rideouts are developing into great contenders with Cunningham. Blaine came in one stride behind him at the Sugar Bowl this year and last spring brother Wayne led him to the tape as Wayne set his world's record in the three-fourths mile run. But that was after Cunningham already had won a blistering mile race.

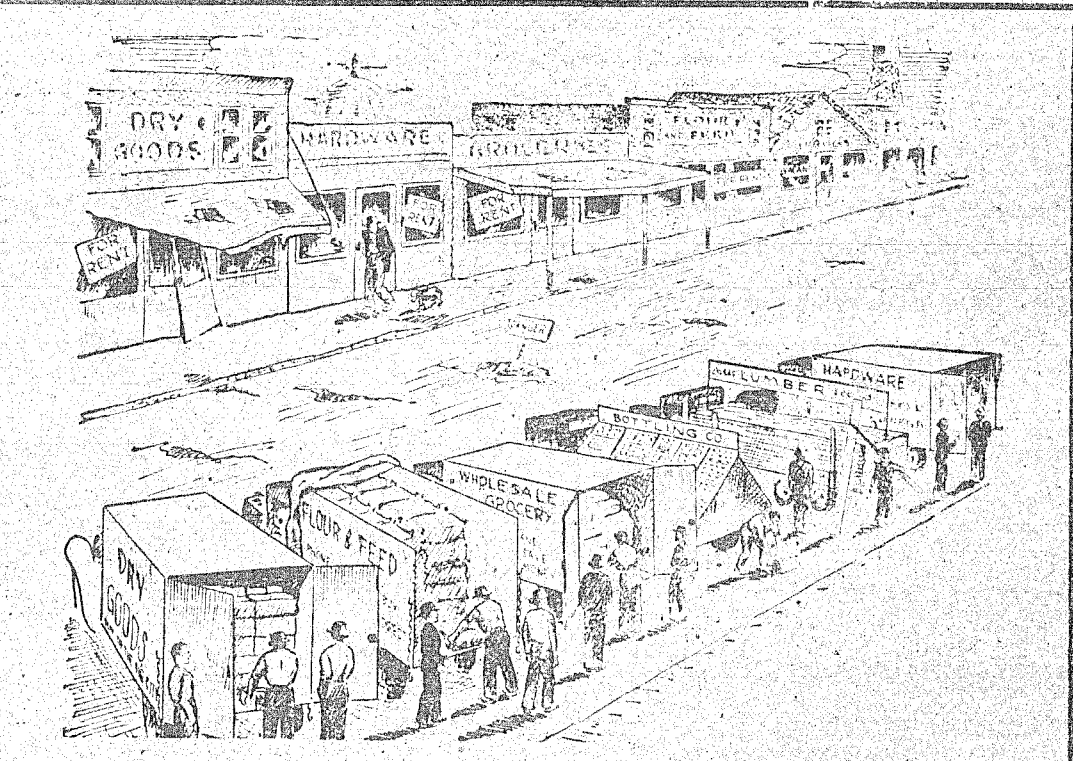
