SMOKE FROM SOMEWHERE

The editor very kindly accepted an invitation from our good friend and fellow publisher, H. H. Jackson of the Coleman Democrat-Voice, last Thursday afternoon, and accompanied him to Austin, where we attended the bi-ennial mid-winter session of the Texas Press Association, held at the Stephen F. Austin Hotel. Mr. Jackson being fortunate enough to own a good car, the drive thru that dust storm was not so disagreeable as one might suppose, and the trip was made in good time.

Upon arrival in Austin Mr. Jackson drove out to the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Burton Walker, for lodging, the writer taking up quarters in a second-rate hotel.

Friday morning, editors, some of them accompanied by their wives and other members of their families, assembled in one of the convention rooms of the hotel for our deliberations. Governor W. Lee O'Daniel was invited to come before the convention, and kindly accepted. He was received with the usual courtesy and delivered a nice little talk, defending his actions in Austin since becoming Governor. No one seems to question the Governor's good intentions, most people appreciate him as a man of some good qualities and certain lofty ideals, but very few seem to agree with him on his ideas of government. He seems to think that not many members of the senate or legislature agree with him. He is a very pleasant and likeable gentleman in many ways, and his courage in dealing with handicaps and obstacles and hindrances good naturedly is to be admired. However, we fail to see but little he can do. His transaction tax measure, in our opinion, is a very unpopular measure, and we doubt if it ever reaches the floor of the House, much less the Senate. As for his measure recommending the repeal of capital punishment, it has met with some favor, but we do not think it will meet with enough to go over.

Apparently some serious thinking is being done over a proposed measure supposedly to be a price fixing act, or fair trades act. These two measures properly analyzed, in their present form, would deal a hard blow to small merchants and independent merchants through out this state, and should not pass, in our opinion. Manufacturers would fix the retail prices on their products, and large stores that buy in large quantities at discount prices, would have a considerable advantage over the smaller merchants. It appears to us this measure is one where the tail would wag the dog, the larger corporations holding the tail while the smaller merchants over the state would be feeding the dog. S. B. 40 by Spears of San Antonio, and H. B. 231 by Reader of San Antonio, are so designed as to deceive a number of merchants and many of the public in general. As we interpret them, they would deal a death blow to the Texas Anti-Trust laws, they will fix and raise prices, cripple business enterprise, take competition out of business by fixing all prices at the top and closing the doors to independent merchants who put a little competition in business by trying to buy merchandise and sell it at close margins and lowering their overhead in business.

One other measure that deals with political subdivisions that impose and collect taxes for various purposes without complying with state requirements, would compel all political subdivisions to publish their financial statements twice a year, showing where the tax payers money is spent. Not all such units are unfair and practice graft, but in many instances graft has been practiced which cost the tax payers considerable money. All state and national banks are required to publish a financial statement quarterly and this measure would require tax collectors to publish their receipts and disbursements (continued on page 2)

Teachers of the Santa Anna Schools last Friday attended the 31st annual meeting of the Mid-Texas Educational Association held at Brady. Near 1100 teachers representing nineteen counties over this part of West Texas were registered at the convention.

Dr. Willis A. Sutton, superintendent of schools of Atlanta, Ga., was the principal speaker on the Brady program. His topic was "Breaking The Shackles of Education," in which he stated that the standard classroom is not essential to learning and the present report card is an abomination.

Other educators who contributed greatly to the general programs were Dr. John O. Beatty, S. M. U. Dallas; J. W. O'Banion of the State Department of Education; and G. B. Wilcox, president of State Teachers Association, College Station.

Various sectional meetings were held Friday afternoon. Mr. Pettit appeared on the High School Principals program.

Mr. Scarborough, who was one of the Coleman County delegates to the convention, was elected vice-president of the Mid-Texas Educational Association at the closing session Saturday morning. He was also named delegate from Coleman County to the State House of Delegates which will convene in San Antonio next Thanksgiving at the Texas State Teachers Association.

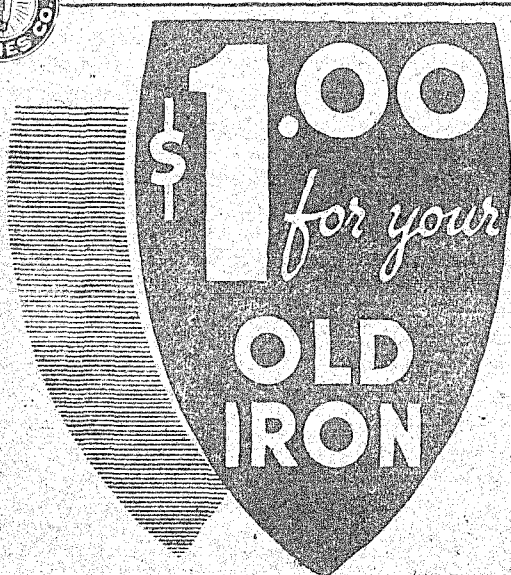
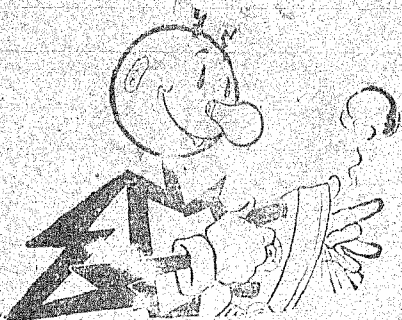

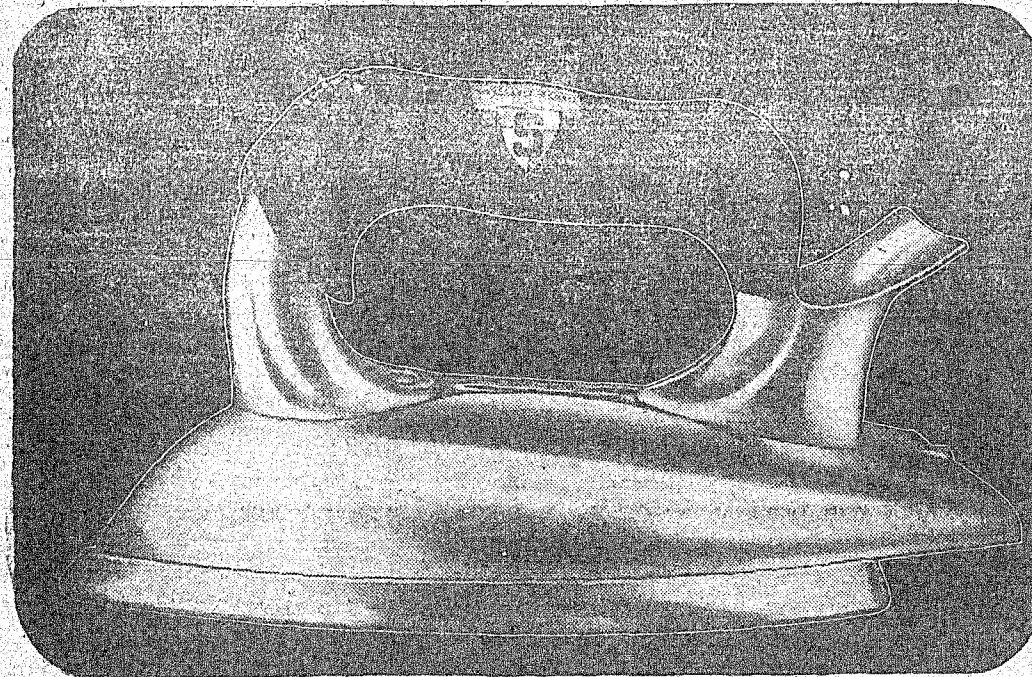
