Have you thought how many crippled children there are in our community—a tiny baby with club feet, another born with only one foot, one child hurt in play and left a cripple and others? And have you thought what it means to be crippled, particularly in childhood, when all other children of the neighborhood are playing "Run Sheep Run," "Cops and Robbers," or riding scooters and bikes down the street? Can you imagine how it feels to grow up with crutches always at your side or your back in a brace and be always conscious that you are different from other children?

If you have, you must sympathize with unfortunate cripples. But sympathy is a hard thing to live on for a lifetime. That is why we are asking you to go one step further, translating your sympathy into action—action with the concrete results of helping the crippled child to a better life.

You can do this by buying at the Santa Anna News Office, the high school or the ward school, seals symbolic of a new dawn for crippled children. These seals are sold under the direction of the Texas Society for Crippled Children and sponsored by the P.T.A. of this city. A little more than fifty percent of the proceeds is kept in our community and will be used to pay transportation to and from hospitals where the children can secure the necessary treatment, or for home treatment when possible. The remainder goes into the state fund, with the exception of not more than 10 percent, which goes to the national society.

Charles F. Ashcroft, president of the Texas society urges that a seal be on every piece of mail posted before April 15. A few cents from each individual will mean relief for many handicapped children. "Without assistance crippled boys and girls cannot hope to compete in a world where the able-bodied predominate," Mr. Tennant, chairman of the Texas Easter Seal Committee, said in announcing the campaign.

Proper ventilation and light in the kitchen are a vital thing, Miss Chrystene Trowbridge, county agent, stressed in a demonstration on the open-minded kitchen when Mrs. J. K. Harrison was hostess to the Santa Anna H. D. Club Friday afternoon, March 31.

Windows should be the right height, well screened, appropriately curtained and should give proper ventilation and offer an attractive view. For a cheerful outlook, windows should be built 3 1-2 feet from the floor and 1 foot from the ceiling. High windows give light and cross windows provide air circulation through the room. The window space should equal 1-5 of floor space for proper amount of light, and should open from top and bottom for air. For modern convenience the room should consist of 2 doors, the outer door having a glass panel at top for light. Doors placed to the side allow more wall space.

A dark room improperly ventilated makes one nervous and discontented, while a light, bright, clean, cheerful room with fresh, crisp window curtains adds comfort and delight.

Curtains to soften the light that enters should be bright and decorative, prints being suitable for a light kitchen and light weight materials for a dark one. Use plain curtains in harmonizing colors for figured walls, and place the tie back 1-3 from top down. Curtains should match floor coverings. Crepe shades that are plain, simple, durable and washable, or good, rich satisfying color combination curtains that blend with your kitchen furnishings lend an air of pleasantness to the housewife's work in the kitchen.

Frames that fill windows and doors and tight screens to protect from flies and mosquitoes are the eyes of the kitchen, Miss Trowbridge further discussed.

During the business session the club voted to contribute \$2.50 to the crippled children's fund.

Members of the club have finished a quilt and Mrs. J. K. Harrison and Mrs. S. K. Morelock were appointed to arrange for the sale of the quilt. Final plans for the Easter supper were made.
