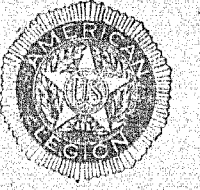

This Week in Our Town

"I'm glad to be back in the old home town," said Manager Williams of Burton-Lingo Lumber Co. "It's about ten years now, but all the time Santa Anna has been home to me." Williams relieved Manager Berry as the local B-L lumber yards and has taken hold with a vim that lets one believe he will advance materially the company's interests here.

"The diphtheria scare here is almost over, with no epidemic," remarked one of the school faculty. "There has been no panic because last year practically every child was given toxoid." It kind of upsets the anti-vaccinationists' theory when control by toxines is demonstrated, which is reminiscent of another curative sect that disclaims germs, but whose members prove impotent when smallpox or other "catching" diseases stalk about the country. Talking doesn't do the work of medicine at time.

"I'm glad we have editorials in the paper. They're good ones though pretty frank. But the town needs that kind, maybe," remarked Mrs. T. J. Lancaster when renewing her subscription the other day. It is not so much that the town needs frank editorials, but that the editor be frank in frankly facing the conditions and problems of the community. You don't build up and you don't cure mistakes by "shushing" or telling lies or by evading the issue.

"You forgot to send me copies of 'The News'," said Robert Heffner of Edinburg, writing to his mother. She came in and entered a year's subscription for him. "The Santa Anna News now has an editorial individually. The News here used to have," he went on. The Santa Anna editor was formerly editor of The Hidalgo County News at Edinburg; remembers Heffner slightly but had no idea he esteemed our editorials so much.

"Congratulations on the best paper of any town the size of Santa Anna," writes W. L. (Lee) Woodward from Alva, Okla. We appreciate the opinions of long-time Santa Anna residents for they, better than we, are in a position to gauge the innovations and improvements we are making in the paper.

"I rather like the editorials," said a good lady Monday when paying her subscription for another year. "The editor is quite frank in his way of writing, but maybe that's necessary. The paper has improved wonderfully." When a lot of people hold those views, and we hear them on all sides, maybe Santa Anna has a good paper even if we do consider a four page or a six page paper in a town this size a poor excuse.

"Got to get used to setting type 13 and 26 1/2 ems instead of 12 and 24 1/2 ems," opined John Gregg Monday afternoon before taking the bus for Midlothian, Texas, where he was offered a job over long distance early in the afternoon. The Midlothian paper still adheres to the old measures, like many other old established papers, while most papers now use the 12 em column, which is an exact two inch width.

Military Road Fort Sill to Sam Houston Now Being Sought

A movement to link Fort Sill, Okla., Fort Sam Houston, Texas, and Fort Brown, Texas, with a great Federal military highway through Brownwood has been launched.

Tom Sawyer, Breckenridge, Chamber of Commerce manager; Mayor Floyd Jones of Breckenridge and Manager Bob Taylor of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce conferred with officials of the Brownwood chamber of Commerce Monday regarding the highway project.

The military highway would directly link two of the largest United States army posts in the country — Fort Sill in Oklahoma and Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio — and would run by way of Wichita Falls, Breckenridge, Cisco, Rising Star, Brownwood, Goldthwaite, Lampasas, Burnet, Johnson City and San Antonio and then continuing over Federal Highway 281, would connect the two posts with Fort Brown at Brownsville on the Mexican border and the Gulf Coast.

The National Association of State Highway Engineers would be left to designate the number of the proposed Federal highway.

Report of Home Demonstration Association

By Mrs. R. F. Watson. Miss Maxine Stayton, society editor from the Coleman Democrat Voice, directed a training study, also presided in the absence of Mrs. Warren Gill in a meeting of the reporters association at the new Moore Hotel Saturday, Nov. 4, 1:30 p. m.

Miss Stayton emphasized the five W's. Who, What, When, Where, Why. Paragraph one should contain valuable information that any person not attending could use. In the lead sentence (a) Who said lead, (b) Title of person speaking, distinguishing each person by giving what Mrs. Smith or Jones, thus: Mrs. J. D. Smith or Mrs. Bob Smith. (c) Group to whom spoken, (d) Time and place of meeting.

The second paragraph should be an extension or enlargement of paragraph one, or it can be of some other valuable information learned at the meeting, if the lead paragraph does not require enlargement.

Paragraph three may be a business announcement, appointment of committees and entertainments announced.

The concluding paragraph, should consist of number of members and visitors and on special occasion give club members name. Also announce when where and the subject of the next meeting, the name of program leader.

Miss Stayton further stressed all reports must be in on time as old news is not appreciated. Regularity, promptness and accuracy are essential for a true report.

BUFFALO H. D. CLUB

This new kind of soap is made from clabber, Skim and sell the cream and pour 2 gallons of clabber into a granite dish pan, add 1 can lye and stir. No water is needed and the more you stir, the better, but don't cook it. The finished product is firm slightly reddish in color and lathers in water.

Mrs. Thigpen exhibited 6 kinds of soap and gave recipes for each. For better cleansing qualities add 1 cup horax (20 Mule Team) to each can of lye used.

Plans were made for each club member to bring a covered dish and help finish walls and stain cabinet top in the Home Making Cottage on Friday morning, Nov. 10.

Heart o' Texas News Briefs

Highway Engineer Asks Observance of Road Work Signs

The State Highway Engineer is appealing to the traveling public to observe the "Caution—Road Repairs" signs along State highways as a measure of safety to Highway Department employees and the traveling public. In the past several months, 23 workmen on State highways have been injured by motor vehicle drivers; most of these injuries have been of a serious nature.

In an effort to serve the traveling public better, the Highway Department often carries on maintenance operations without barricading a highway. The Highway Engineer states: "If the Department barricaded a road each time a maintenance crew undertook repairs, main highways of State would present a steady stream of detours. Our men have been trained extensively in safety and have shown considerable aptitude in taking care of themselves. However, occasions arise in which even the most cautious employee is exposed to grave danger, and many of them have been hurt while performing a public service on the highways for the benefit of the users of the highways."

"It is essential to the service of the traveling public that the maintenance operations continue uninterrupted, and all we ask of those who use the highway and drive carefully when they come upon a 'Caution—Road Repairs' sign."

"After all, it is just good, common sense to obey these signs. Motorist proceeding at too fast a pace through a repair zone might hit a large road roller instead of a highway workman. And we don't want that, either."

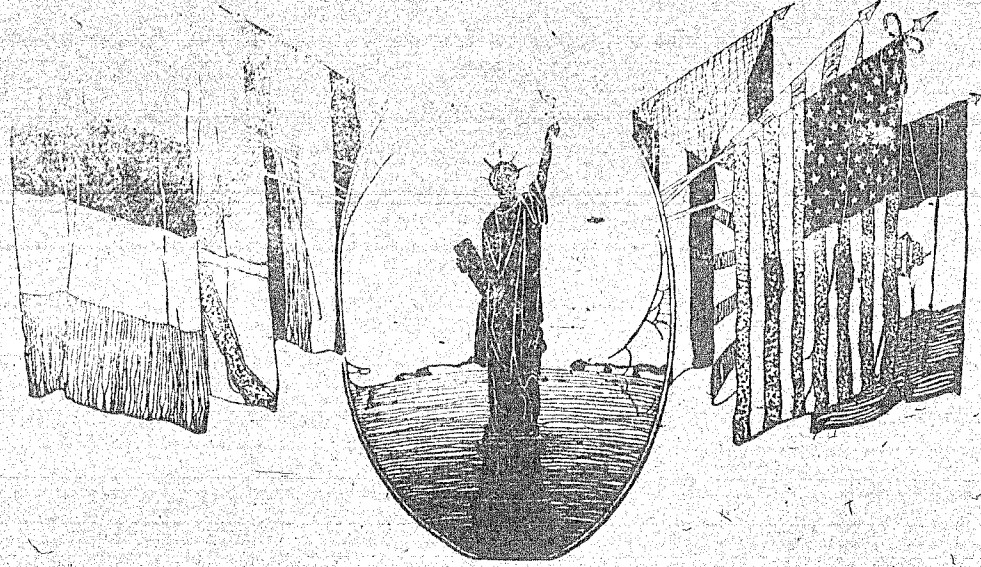
Plans for the holiday entertainments will be discussed during the business session and council and committee reports will be made. A covered dish luncheon will be served at four o'clock.

ARMISTICE DAY NOVEMBER 11

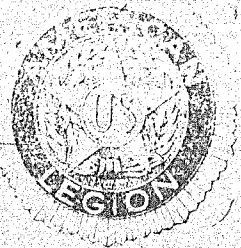
Twenty-one years ago the war to end wars was ended. That it failed so far as Europe is concerned is to be regretted. But the participation of this country, although costly in lives and material, served

Hoboes Help Feed Wild Turkeys

Not because the hoboes wanted to help feed the wild turkeys but because they were forced to do so by a trainman near Wichita Falls recently. The story goes that when a train conductor stops his train to sweep out the grain cars so that the wild turkeys may be fed, the Game Department feels that it is getting cooperation of the highest caliber. That is exactly what is happening in Archer county. The state game warden at Wichita Falls recently noticed the train halted near a river and the dust was flying out of the doors of several cars. Upon investigation he found that the conductor had about a half dozen hoboes sweeping out grain from grain cars to feed a bunch of wild turkeys that use the area. Questioned, the conductor said he had heard the warden's plea, last winter when the snow was on the ground, about feeding wild turkey. He had decided that every time he had any empty grain cars on his train he would make use of the bums riding by having them sweep out the cars at a place where he knew a bunch of about 40 turkeys were ranging and were now being fed in this unusual way. Our thanks to this unnamed train conductor for his service to wildlife by helping feed this group of turkeys.

25,000 TEXANS SUFFER PNEUMONIA EACH YEAR IN TEXAS

Potential victims of pneumonia, and families concerned, hold one of the keys to reduction of the death rate from this disease, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is estimated that each year 25,000 Texans suffer an attack of pneumonia.

As a means of prevention, people should guard against the common cold, neglect of which often leads to pneumonia.

Persons who develop pneumonia will have the best chance for recovery by knowing the symptoms of the disease and placing themselves under treatment promptly after onset of illness. Typical beginning symptoms include a severe chill and fever, stabbing pain in the chest, cough with rust-colored or blood tinged sputum, nausea and vomiting, loss of appetite.

Sudden onset of symptoms as described should cause the patient and members of the family to suspect the possibility of pneumonia. Rusty sputum, usually a sign of inflammation in the lungs, naturally gives rise to the question as to the cause of sickness. Examination of the sputum in a hospital or public health laboratory which serves as a pneumonia typing center, frequently shows the presence and type of the pneumonia germ, and makes clear the exact nature of illness.

Science has found effective means of combating pneumonia, through the use of proper serum and medicine. To be most effective, these treatments must be given early and after the exact cause of the inflammation has been determined.

During 1938 pneumonia deaths numbering 4,129 were recorded in Texas and it is necessary for all people to arm themselves with knowledge and

STATE POLICE WARN OWNERS OF CARS

Because car owners, in many instances, neglect to register their vehicles with proper motor numbers there may be questions raised as to ownership, state police officials warned today.

The problem rose after several applications for certificates of title contained identical motor numbers which were discovered to be parts and frame numbers. Ralph L. Buell, Chief of the Certificate of Title Section, which administers the newest motor vehicle act, said he learned from registration receipts that, in one instance, 21 automobiles of the same make have been registered under the same motor number. Investigations revealed that the owners have registered their cars with wrong numbers.

"In another case," Buell said, "an automobile had been registered three times under that many different motor numbers. Because of the fact that the motor number of a vehicle is its principal identifying mark, there may be confusion in the event of a test of ownership."

Motor numbers are the major clues in searches for stolen cars as thieves often remove license plate in an effort to escape detection, state police said. Under the certificate of title law definite proof of ownership is established before state police issue titles.

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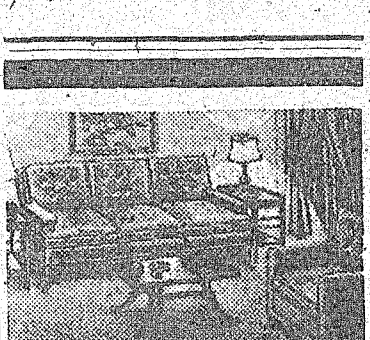

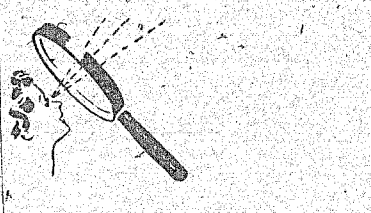
