23, 1940.

TEXAS PRODUCES MORE MOHAIR, MORE MONEY

Texas mohair production in 1939 increased 1,920,000 pounds over 1938, according to J. E. McDonald, Texas agriculture commissioner.

During 1939 Texas produced 15,960,000 pounds of mohair, eighty per cent of the 18,709,000 pounds produced in the USA.

Six other states — Missouri, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Oregon and California — contributed 2,749,000 pounds in 1939.

The total number of goats clipped in the United States for the year was 4,032,000, of which 3,372,000 were in Texas. The average weight of clip for the United States was 4.6 pounds; the average for Texas was 4.7 pounds.

Price range was favorable to Texas producers, Mr. McDonald said. The average clip was 49 cents per pound.

The aggregate value for the national mohair clip was 3,846,000. Texas producers received \$7,820,000.
