**AAA CHIEF SOUNDS WARNING OF RULES ON "PLOWING UNDER"**

There are certain rules and regulations that farmers must observe in turning under small grain crops—oats and barley at this time of the year—in order to receive 75 cents per acre as a soil building payment, according to E. E. Hirsch, secretary of the AAA board of Coleman county.

Such grains must be at least ten inches high, a good stand, and of a good growth. While the grain can't be plowed under before April 20 it must still be green, or before it is ripened, when plowed under. The grain must be checked by a representative of the Triple-A before being turned under.

Incidentally, wheat cannot be turned under.

## Coleman County's Oil Play is Reviving After Quiet Decade

Ten years ago, about the time the East Texas field was beginning to explode into the greatest oil boom in history, the corner of northwestern Coleman county was experiencing a drilling and leasing has been under way for a couple of years. Several producers had been completed from the Strawn series sands in the vicinity of the town of Goldsboro.

But the combined assaults of East Texas boom, overproduction and the depression knocked the props out of Coleman county's flurry of excitement. Not until a couple of years ago was activity resumed. Now that exploration, leasing and drilling is beginning to show productive results excitement is bobbing up again in northwest Coleman county.

An extension to the Novice field, Bradford and Robertson of Haskell No. 1 Morris estate, may foreshadow an intensive new drilling campaign to spread throughout that corner of the county.

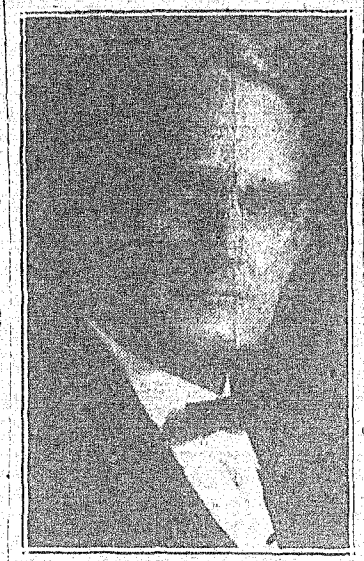
The crash came just before classes were resumed at the noon hour.

## Annular Eclipse of the Sun to Occur on Sunday Afternoon

During the late afternoon of Sunday, April 7, a solar blackout will throw its swiftly moving shadow across the southern edge of North America from Lower California to Georgia and Florida over a belt about 150 miles wide.

In the course of this eclipse, the moon's disc will cover about 86 percent of the surface of the sun, leaving a thin ring of light around the moon. This, in some respects produces an even more spectacular effect than a total eclipse of the sun.

If the day is clear, the black beam of the moon's shadow, rolling from west to east at a speed of more than 1,000 miles an hour, will turn daylight into dusk along a path that reaches 75 miles north and south from its center. The eclipse is to enter the United States from Mexico when it crosses the Rio Grande at Big Bend, Texas, at about 3:40 p. m. Then it sweeps toward Florida over a path that touches the following cities in Texas: San Antonio, Houston and Beaumont.

Partial effects of the eclipse will be seen throughout the United States and Canada. This is the first ring eclipse covering such a long path in the United States since 1865. The next eclipse of this kind is not due until May 10, 1994.

the officers with whom I
have had the pleasure of working.
The arduous, faithful and
unselfish service of jurors,
Grand and Petit their uniform
courtesy and loyalty, have
been a source of great encouragement
and satisfaction.

"The public has been generous
in recognizing and commending
such official acts and
conducts as merited it, and has
been very charitable in withholding
criticism and condemnation
where it might have been
justified. For this I cannot adequately
express my deep gratitude.
The press has been liberal
with space and sympathetic
in lending assistance to my efforts
to create a greater respect for
and a greater observance of our
laws, and to instill higher ideals
of citizenship for this land.

RESPONSIBLE POSITION

"The office of District Judge
is one of great responsibility and
grave responsibility. In District
Courts, and in the remainder
of our most important laws, and
protect our most valuable rights.
The field of law covers
childhood, home and property
rights, where the lives of
one thousand dollars I deem it
the responsibility of the District
Judge to so conduct the court
and to interpret and apply the

in the justice, integrity
and impartiality of the judicial
branch of their government.
In the discharge of his
duties he can in many ways
arouse greater interest in, and
a better understanding of, our
laws and process of government
and can increase respect for
and observance of our laws, as
well as instill higher ideals of
citizenship. In a democratic
form of government these
duties are of immense importance.

"Insofar as my ability and
judgment permits, I have discharged
my official duties in
harmony with these principles
and ideals. That I have made
errors is not denied, however I

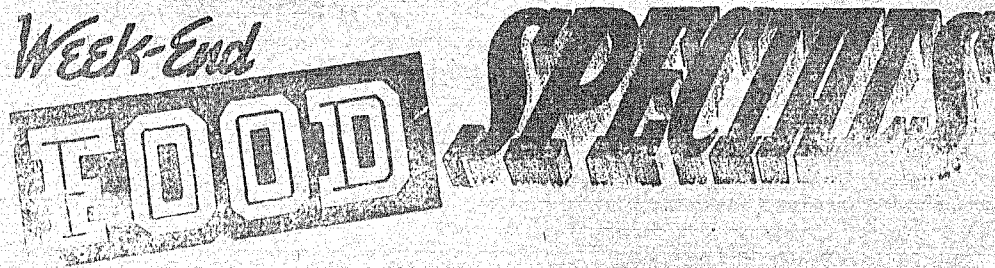
