Tarleton Senior Student Teacher In Voc-Ag Dept.

James D. Cox, senior Agriculture Education major from Tarleton State University, has begun his student teaching in the Santa Anna Public School under the supervision of Billy Riley, vocational agriculture teacher. Cox will be in the community from March 15 through May 12 for the purpose of receiving training for vocational agriculture teaching. This arrangement has been made by mutual agreement between Mr. R. C. Smith, Superintendent of Schools, and Tarleton State University. Cox will assist with all activities concerning the local vocational agriculture program. Upon completion of this training period, Cox will receive the Bachelor of Science degree from Tarleton State University and be eligible for the Provisional Secondary Vocational Agriculture Teaching Certificate. Drs. Bill Irick, Johnny Johnson, and Len Steakley are the Tarleton State University Supervisors for the teacher education program in the Department of Agricultural Education. Cox, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Cox of Mullin, is a graduate of Mullin High School. He will receive his degree from Tarleton State University in July.

During World War II, Tower served with the U. S. Navy on a gunboat in Asian waters. After the war, Tower and the former Lou Bullington were married March 21, 1952. Tower is a trustee of Southwestern University and the Southern Methodist University and holds honorary doctorates from Southwestern Howard Payne in Brownwood and Alfred University in New York. Visitors Day At SDA Church

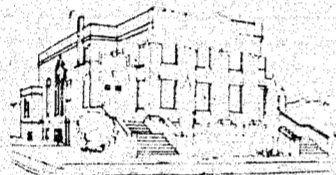

A Coleman County resident since 1906, he was a veteran of World War I, a stock farmer and a Baptist. Survivors are his wife; six daughters, Mrs. R. D. 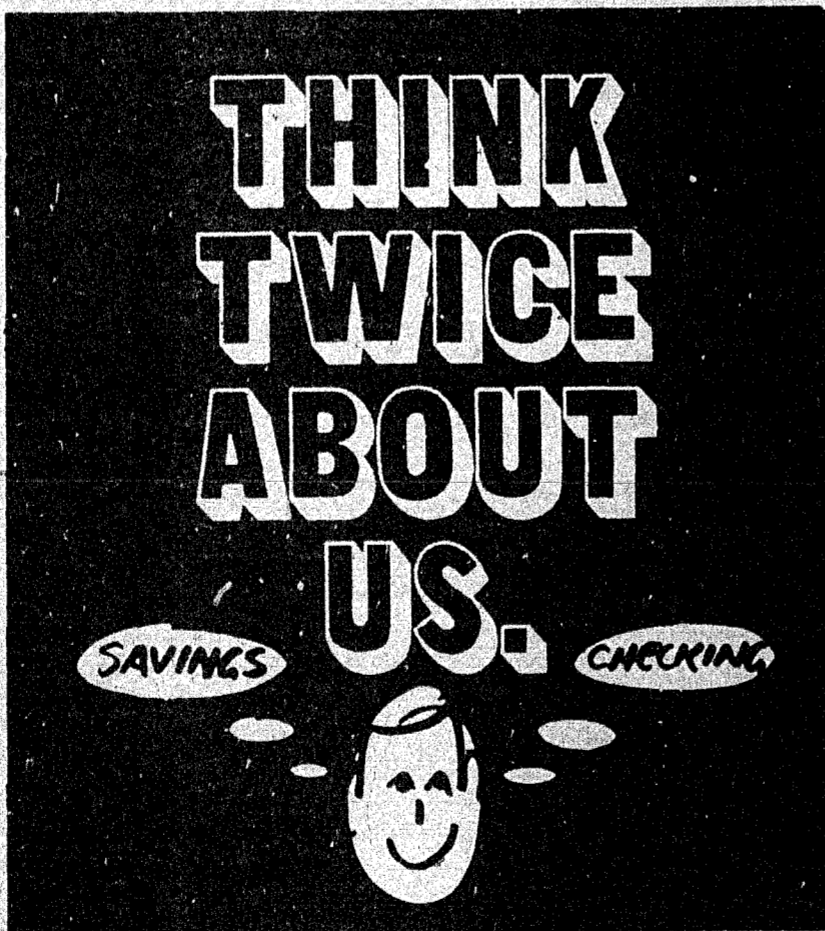

ELECTION ORDER AND NOTICE

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF COLEMAN On this the 12 day of January, 1976 the Board of Trustees of Santa Anna Independent School District convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit: Max Eubank, President, Edwin Hipsher, Joe Riley Sammie Powers, Eddie W. Hartman, Glen Scarborough and the following absent: Felton Martin constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following: WHEREAS, the term of office of Edwin Hipsher and Felton Martin members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1976, said first Saturday being April 3, 1976, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District. WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SANTA ANNA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT: 1. That an election be held in said School District on April 3, 1976, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District two members. 2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election. All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code. The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art.

13.32 of the Election Code. 3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election: (a) In election precincts numbered N.A. at Lions Club Building, in Santa Anna, Texas, in said School District, with Rose Bass as Presiding Judge and Barbara Kingsbery Clerk. The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m. 4. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at School Office Santa Anna High School within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent. 5. Absentee voting, both by

personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and Rose Bass, as Presiding Judge, Lorene Rice, Barbara Kingsbery as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election. 6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election. 7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and the combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election. The President shall also cause a copy of this com-

bined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days of said election. It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting. It is further found and determined that in accordance with an

order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Coleman County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside. The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Max Eubank Sammie Powers, Edwin Hipsher, Glen Scarborough, Eddie Hartman, Joe Riley and the following voted NO: None. Layette Shower Held on Monday

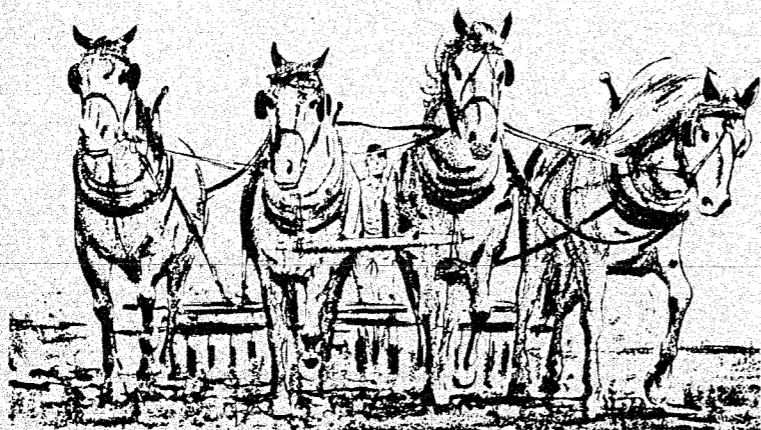

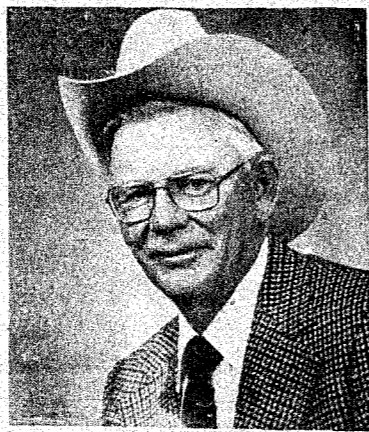

South County Water System Construction Starts Soon

Bids were opened on the southcounty water system project Thursday afternoon, with the low bid falling well within available funds. It now appears that construction on phase one may start within 60 days. Officials of Coleman County Water Supply Corporation opened 13 bids Thursday afternoon at the low bidder was Hobbs Industrial Service Inc. of Brownwood, at \$286,658.23. High bid was \$437,048.10. Of the \$418,000 in grant and oan funds, \$356,000 had been earmarked for construction. At this time necessary legal and closing work is in progress and is expected to take 30 days. Estimates are that construction will start in 60 days, with 90 working days permitted for completion. Phase one for the system includes lines to Valera and Mozelle, with phase two to include service west of Valera, to Gouldbusk, Voss, Centennial and close to Shield. It is expected that phase two may be ready to go by time construction on phase one is complete. From indications, water may be flowing through the system lines by late summer or early fall. Taps on the system will be in excess of 230 for both phases, and it is understood that the system is engineered to carry some additional connections. The system will purchase treated water from the City of Coleman an the line will be tied in near the water tower east of the Armory. The system is being financed through a Farmers Home Administration grant and loan.

This wonderful rain at this early spring season, just when farmers and stock raisers were getting a little shaky, as no rain had fallen to speak of since before Christmas.

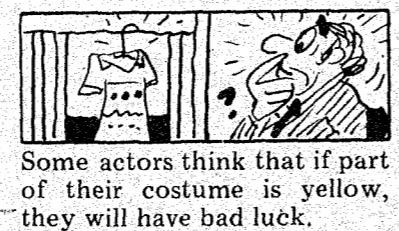

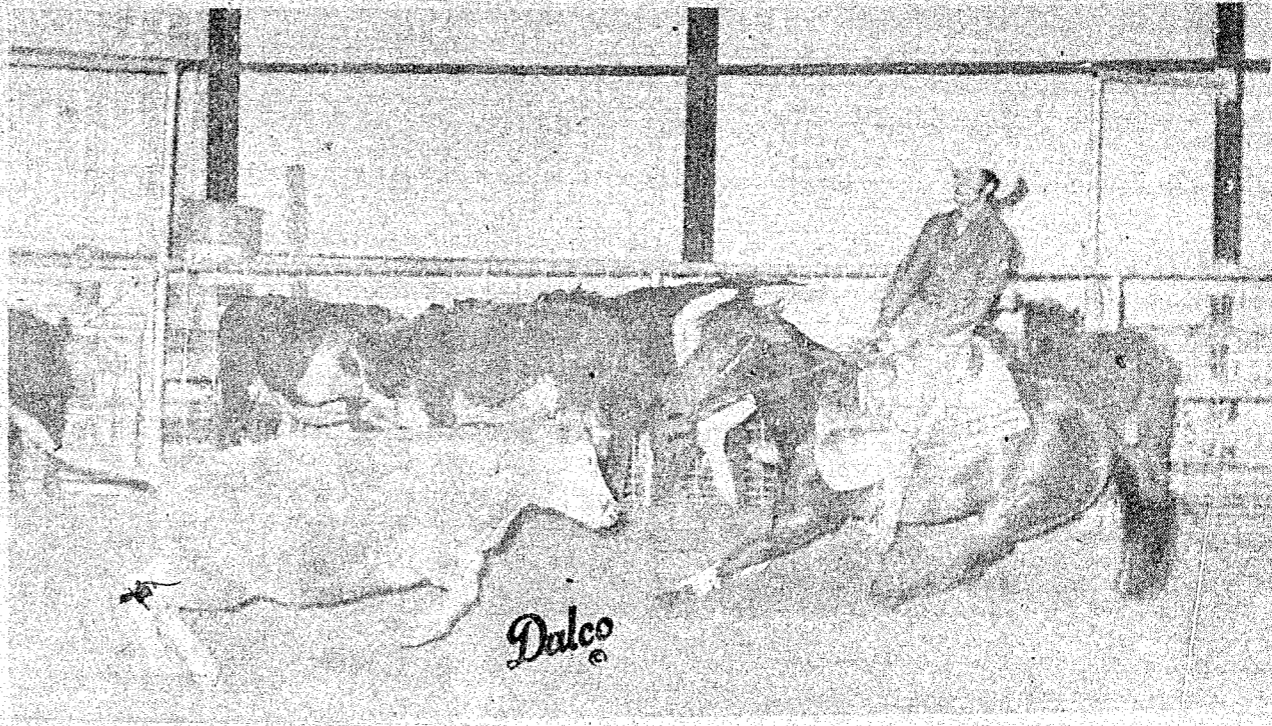
