1942 Wheat Insurance Explained

Instead of asking for the cash equivalent, approximately 70 percent of insured Texas wheat farmers are using their certificates of indemnity as collateral for government loans...

In taking the loan, farmers are not only receiving better prices, but by retaining possession of the wheat they will be able to take advantage of the market in case prices advance...

Certificates of indemnity of the cash equivalent are paid farmers at the time the total or partial loss of the insured wheat is determined.

To date, 3,340 claims have been paid on 217,175 acres with an insured production of 1,063,947 bushels. A total of 11,040 farms and 4,943,435 bushels were insured for the 1941 crop.

All-risk insurance policies for 1942 have already been made on 1,500 wheat farms representing 1,200 operators and owners and covering production of 84,000 acres.

Provisions of the 1942 loan program specify that in order for owners and operators to insure wheat on one farm, they must insure all wheat crops in which they have an interest.

When a grower applies for insurance this year, Colgin pointed out, he will sign a commodity note which authorizes the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation to deduct the amount of the premium from indemnities which might be paid...

If a producer elects to pay his note before maturity, it may be paid either in the cash equivalent of wheat based on market prices or in bushels of wheat. If the premium is paid by the producer after maturity, he will be required to pay in the cash equivalent based on the market price of wheat on the date the premium was due.

Insurance coverage may be either 50 or 75 percent of the normal yield on the farm, but the 75 percent coverage is proving popular with Texas wheat farmers, Colgin said.

With at least three buyers active, wool has been moving in the Lometa - Fredericksburg-Brownwood country, sources in those points disclosed. Buyers active are A. S. Baker, Beall Barbee and J. M. Lea.

Construction of the fourth tent theatre at Camp Bowie has been cancelled and instead a wooden structure will be built. Maj. William E. Ryan, constructing quartermaster, announced. These wooden buildings, which will be constructed between the 132nd and 133rd Field Artillery areas, will be approximately 180 by 90 feet. The wooden theatre will seat 1,200 persons, as compared with 2,000 in the tent theatres.

A 1,000,000-gallon water reservoir for Camp Bowie will be constructed atop a hill directly west of the main gate of the military training center. Hickey & Company, Dallas contractors, were low bidders on the water reservoir project. The water reservoir will be the fifth at the military center.

Fifty workers were assigned Monday to begin work on the WPA project for improvement of the Camp Bowie military reservation at Brownwood. The project is for clearing debris, leveling, grading, sodding, and land-scraping the military reservation. The WPA is supplying funds totaling \$45,000 and the U. S. Army is to pay \$19,960. A total of 213 workers is to be employed.

Building permits for this month climbed materially at Brady when work started Monday on the fifteen-unit tourist lodge with steak house and filling station which is being constructed by Fred S. Stanton on North Bridge Street. The setup is to cost approximately \$30,000.

The Rev. D. A. Graves, 36, pastor of the Salt Creek and Concord Baptist churches, died Tuesday of a broken neck suffered Friday night when his car struck a bridge near Brownwood. The funeral was held Wednesday at Howard Payne College, where he was a student. Survivors include his widow and a son.

A race with death Tuesday was won by Jordan McFarland, 20 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. McFarland of Brady. The child swallowed a nickel Sunday afternoon and the coin lodged in the esophagus leading from the throat to the stomach.

When Brady physicians were unable to extract the coin and the child began to smother, the parents rushed him to Santa Rosa hospital, at San Antonio in an automobile. After extracting the nickel, attending physicians said the child would recover.

Editorial

SANTA ANNA HAS NO TRAINING CAMP, CCC Camp or Air Base, is not a county seat, has no big industries to supply a huge pay roll, has no large manufacturing, and so must draw her income from the farms and ranches of her trade territory. Santa Anna's future progress lies in fostering that trade. And diligence must be exercised to prevent the further shrinkage of the trade territory personnel. The federal farm policy injured Santa Anna and other small communities immeasurably. Centralizing agricultural activities in county seats rendered a lot of damage; permitting landlords to place their tenant farmers on relief and take over the tenant's direct relief money as well as his own percentage was a sledgehammer blow that has hurt every small town in the country. Grabbing for the federal handout cut the rural purchasing power in half (the other half going on relief) and every town has seen a number of local concerns close up, losing their monthly spending on top of the cut in trade area support. Last year we were told of a landlord in this county who was cussing out the WPA very thoroughly because he couldn't get a half dozen relievers to come out help on his huge (formerly 3 tenant family) farm. He objected to paying taxes to support the PWA; he didn't like relievers, and was very frank about it. The men he couldn't get to help him very properly objected to taking the job, at double or treble rates even, because they were not assured that at the end of the job they could get back on the relief rolls before they starved. The landlord had put them on relief and dodged the responsibility. A normal town grows at the very least by the excess of births over deaths. Some towns dry up because of jealousy among its commercial personnel, too many refusing to help the town because it might help a competitor. Towns that grow are those whose merchants work for the welfare of the town, even if the competitor does gain some of the increased business. There is no place for short-sighted business policies in small town America these stressful days. If we can't get more people back to the farms and better prices for their products, the nation will face an economic situation of grave proportions one of these days.

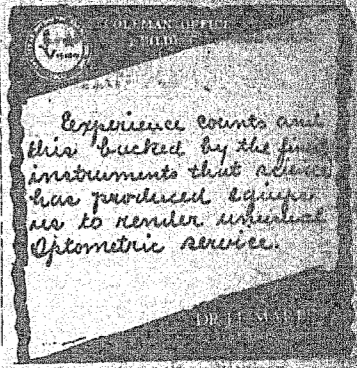
