## Work to Start On Renovation

Jack Owens, general contractor from Gainesville, has been hired by the Santa Anna Independent School District to be in charge of the building and renovation program for the local school system. Mr. Owens has moved here and is sub-contracting the work at the school with plans for the work to start on or before August 1.

The high school renovation is the first work planned, with the remodeling to begin first. The classrooms in the high school building are to be finished as soon as possible as school starts on Monday, August 19.

The general contractor and sub-contract system were chosen by the local board after all bids on the entire project were above the figure approved in the recent bond election.

## Floyd Marshalls Move to Melvin

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Marshall are moving this week to their home in Melvin after living in Santa Anna for the past four years. He is retiring from his position as high school principal and science teacher which ends a 40-year career in the field of education.

He served as president of the Mid-Texas Association of School Superintendents and was one of a group that worked toward the establishment of a four-year college at San Angelo. He holds memberships in county and state teachers associations and the Texas Secondary Principal's Association.

Marshall and his wife, Beth, are the parents of three children, Dr. Jerry Marshall of Rotan, Jimmy Marshall of Jourdantown and Mrs. Mike (Sandy) Wuest of Leander, and have four grandchildren. The couple will maintain their farming and ranching interests in McCulloch County upon their retirement.

The Marshalls have sold their home on South Second Street to Walter R Buse. The house has been rented by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Andrews and family, the new band director for the local schools.

## Robert Barkley To Teach Here In High School

Santa Anna School Board members will soon complete the 1974-75 faculty when they select an English teacher for the high school. Applications are being processed and the selection will be announced soon.

R. C. Smith has been assigned as principal for the entire school system, serving from kindergarten through high school. An assistant principal will be named for the elementary school, selected from the present faculty.

Robert Barkley, local businessman, has been hired as high school science teacher on a half-day basis. He will also attend graduate school at Abilene Christian College during the coming year. Barkley has two years teaching experience and is also a registered pharmacist.

## Local Teacher To Be Honored At State Meet

Mrs. Winnie McQueen of Santa Anna will be honored by the Vocational Homemaking Teachers Association of Texas on July 31 for her service to the teaching profession. A long-time member of VHTAT, Mrs. McQueen is a teacher of Vocational Homemaking Education in the Santa Anna High School. The award will be presented by Carl Morgan, Chairman of the Vocational Committee, State Board of Education, at the Annual Banquet of the VHTAT to be held at the Statler Hilton Hotel, Dallas.

Mrs. McQueen will participate in a week-long inservice conference July 29 - August 2 for professional development of Vocational Homemaking Teachers. The conference, conducted by the Homemaking Education Division, Texas Education Agency, will explore the meaning of multi-cultural education to Homemaking Education and ways in which Homemaking Education can continue to meet the needs of individuals and families in a multi-cultural society.

According to Mrs. Marilyn T. Johnson, of Stephenville, President of the VHTAT, more than 2500 teachers are expected to attend the conference.

Mrs. McQueen will receive her 35-year award at the meeting. Thirty-one of her years in the teaching profession have been in the field of home economics, with most of that time in the local high school.



### Young Santa Anna Team Roper Gaining Fame at Early Age

An apparent rising star in the rodeo circuit is Guy Allen, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Allen of Santa Anna. The 15-year-old SAHS sophomore has won more than his share of honors in the daily team ropings this summer and is becoming known as a top competitor in the adult event.

Guy could ride a horse before he could walk, and his roping started when he was a toddler; he carried a lariat rope around like other kids carry toys.

Roping from atop a horse started at the Allen Ranch north of Santa Anna where Guy's father had a roping arena and a ready supply of livestock. Guy's first real competition was at the ripe age of six when he entered the break-away roping at a junior rodeo.

Young Allen did not enjoy the riding events in the rodeos and only entered the roping events during his early years. He won many awards and championships at junior rodeos including Bangs, Brownwood, Richland Springs and Goldthwaite. In 1973 he was all-around winner and champion in four roping events at the Sewall junior rodeo series in Brownwood.

About three years ago Guy

started team roping with his dad, a RCA professional steer roper. Guy was "header" and his partner roped the steer's heels. The two entered a number of jack-pot ropings and later Guy roped with his brother, Gip, who is a year younger. Last year the two boys won the West Texas Junior Rodeo Association team roping championship.

Guy's favorite mount is a small

sorrel gelding named Pawhuska which he and his dad trained. This summer Guy is roping mainly with Sonny Holt of Mason, and the two are on the road every weekend participating in as many ropings as they can make. Their record is eight rodeos and one jack-pot roping during the Fourth of July weekend.

Guy has roped with a number of other performers including Johnny Bierschwale of Mason, Jim Daughtery of Sandia, Jim McCorkendale of Marble Falls, Billy Don McCrary of Santa Anna, Dale Jones of Brownwood, and others.

His most famous partner was World Champion Cowboy Phil Lyne who asked Guy to rope with him in a jack-pot at George West. The two won the event. Guy has also had major wins at Hondo, Junction, Marion, and other ropings in the Hill Country area. He and Holt plan to enter the Brownwood rodeo later this month.

While not on the roping circuit, Guy helps with the farm and ranch work and practices roping. He credits his dad with his success, but has also had encouragement from the rest of the family. Tony, the oldest Allen daughter, has also been a regular rodeo competitor and was a break-away roper with the Cisco Junior College rodeo team last year. Becky, a SAHS senior, has also rodeoed all her life and is the current Coleman County Junior Rodeo Queen. Gip, a SAHS freshman, is currently sidelined with a leg injury but has also been a top competitor in the roping events.

It is unusual for one so young to be in the adult roping competition, and everyone is expecting Guy Allen to be among the top ropers for many years.
