Soil Conservation Range Field Day Held On Elmer Haynes Place Monday

Over 50 farmers and ranchers on the watershed of the Mukewater Creek and business men of Santa Anna attended a Soil Conservation Range Field Day program on the Elmer Haynes place, 3 miles north of Trickham Monday afternoon. The program was jointly sponsored by the Santa Anna National Bank and the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District.

The two-hour program consisted of discussions of water fall over the last 6-year period; good and bad soil; rain expressed in terms of moisture in the ground; soil temperature; and a review of the Mukewater watershed Flood Control Program.

Rainfall records for the county for the past six years were discussed. In the past 12 months the County Weather Station has recorded a total of 25 inches of

rainfall. Normal fall for this period is 27½ inches. An average from 19 gauges on the Mukewater watershed was 17 inches for the past 10½ months, with the normal fall being 27½ inches. Records showed the rainfall to be 25 percent under normal.

Opinions expressed by those present was that soil conditions are considerably different from early days, which accounts for the drought in this area being so severe.

In a demonstration of a simulated rain on good and poor soil, moisture penetration on poor soil was 1 inch and on good soil 8 inches. The same amount of water and time was used for each soil condition. Poor soil is described as having no cover crop and crusted over for ½-inch depth. Good soil is described as having 2000 pounds of litter or vegetation to the acre. Good soil gave no run-off indications with very deep penetration.

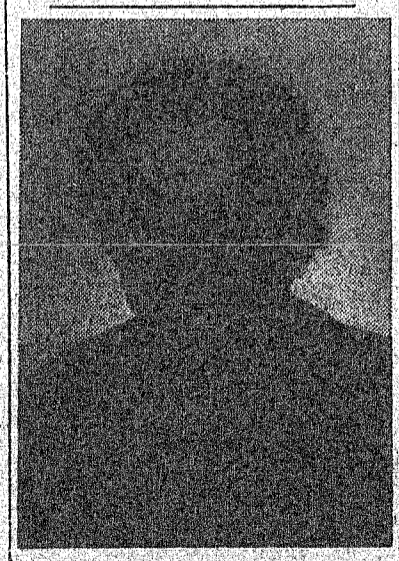
With the 2000 pounds of litter to the acre, the normal rainfall of 27 inches per year will have a run-off of 2 inches, 16 inches of penetration and nine inches of evaporation, which would result in about 7,000 pounds of surplus grass for grazing.

Analysis of the ranching business shows that beef can be raised for around 12 cents per pound total cost, under this type soil condition and still leave the 2000 pounds litter to care for the soil.

With poor range conditions and same amount of rainfall, 8 inches will run-off, 12½ inches will evaporate and only 6½ inches will be used for plant growth. This amount will produce around 2500 pounds of grass to the acre and if 2000 pounds left for rainfall control, only 500 pounds will be left for grazing. Beef produced under this method costs around 18 to 20 cents per pound to produce, which is below the market price.

Another very interesting demonstration was the soil temperature of good soil and poor soil. With the air temperature being 100 degrees, temperature of the poor soil (with no cover or litter) was 134 degrees, the temperature of the good soil was 96 degrees. Stastics show that plant growth is seriously hampered when the ground temperature reaches 105 degrees.

Last on the program was a review of the Mukewater watershed Flood Prevention Program. It was agreed that a committee be appointed from the farmers and ranchers living on the watershed to help push the program along.

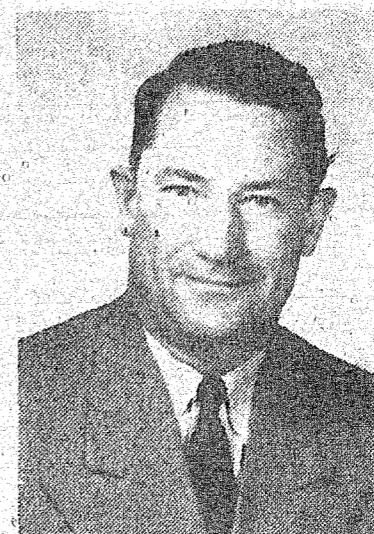

I did not write this article asking for your sympathy, or bragging about my war record, because millions of others did the same thing, thousands of them paying the supreme sacrifice. This was written to give the true facts why I draw the small compensation, and you disabled veterans who draw a small check will know that no man can live on that amount.

As for my qualifications for the job, I have had several years experience in legal work dealing with the people in the army as well as in civilian life.

I am 46 years of age. My wife, Rose, and I live at our home in Santa Anna. We have two sons, S/Sgt. Bennie Bass of the U. S. A. F., a Korean veteran, and Dean Bass, who graduated from high school this year.

I am a member of the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna, the Boy Scout Council, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, the Disabled Veterans of Coleman County, the Quarterback Club, and am a Knights Temper Mason.

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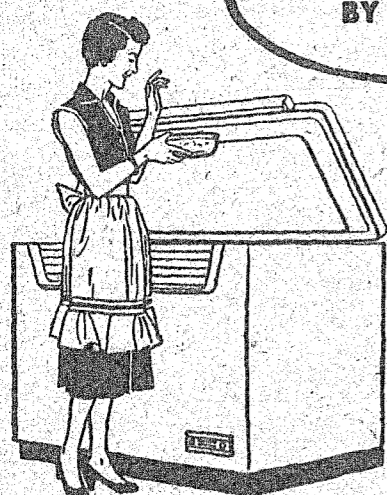

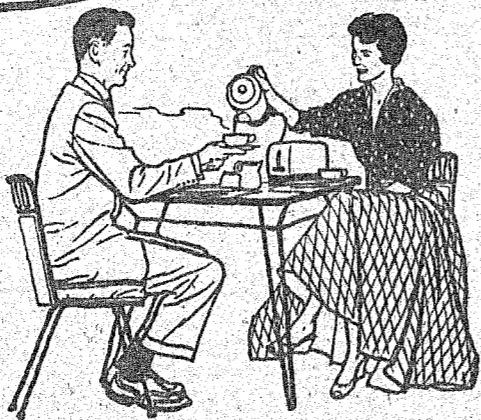

**THE NEED FOR
DISASTER RELIEF**

Two relief programs, hay and grain, were inaugurated in the Texas drought disaster area during August. Immediately after the programs were put into effect, the Texas Department of Agriculture made a survey of farmers and three points were evident:

1. Most stockmen and farmers in the drought area need some kind of help very badly—and quickly.
2. Emergency hay and feed will not completely meet this need.
3. Farmers are bitter about the "scalper prices" of hay in some areas.

Here are some comments which came to light during the survey:

Osborne Mullins, San Saba County farmer-rancher said: "Most stockmen in this county are anxious for any kind of help to keep their cattle going. I have a few head of cows and calves and a few goats and will need about 120 bales of hay for the next 60 days."

"But I can't depend on hay alone. Last year I had to burn the spines off prickly pears and feed them to my cattle. I'm going to be out there burning those prickly pears again this year."

E. B. Stiles, farmer-rancher of Hamilton County: "It couldn't be dryer in this county. In an ordinary year I usually make from 3,000 to 5,000 bales of hay for winter feed. All I have this year is 30 bales of Johnson Grass which was cut from along the edge of the highway near my place."

W. G. Barkley, vice-president of Hamilton National Bank: "I've been in this country since 1910. It never looked this bad for farmers and ranchers before."

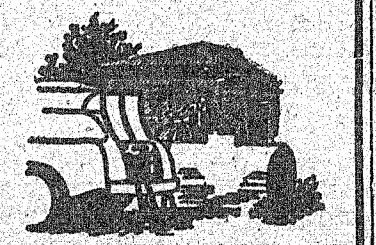
"The new hay program isn't going to help much. Our dairy and poultry men are suffering too. Farmers are worrying about the sudden increases in hay costs since the program was announced."

Cecil Brown, San Saba County rancher: "If I can't get some hay cheap, I will just have to sell out this year. I have 300 head of cattle here and no grass. The last time I had a good rain was two years ago."

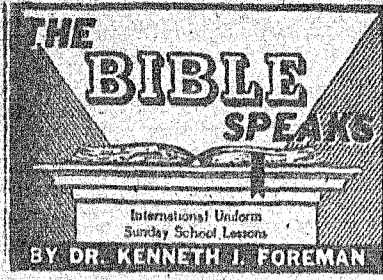

Some One Needs You

Lesson for August 29, 1954

IS RIGHT belief all that is needed to make a Christian? In several places in the New Testament a plain NO is given to this question. For one thing, there is the example of Jesus. The first biography of him we have is the thumb-nail sketch from Peter's sermon at Caesarea, spoken (of course) years before the gospels were written down: "He went about doing good." Jesus not only was good, he did good, he spent his time helping people. What can we say of a "Christian" who makes no effort to do as Christ did? Then James and John, different types though they were, agree on the same point. James says flatly that faith without works is dead, and a look at the whole paragraph where he says this shows that the "works" he is thinking of are just the giving of "things needed for the body," to those who are ill-clad and in need of daily food. As for John, he makes the same point; if a man sees his brother in need and closes his heart to him, how can the love of God be in such a man?

Need for Bread

Some one needs you. This is as certain as that you are a human being. Nowhere in the New Testament is it suggested that any one should be so super-generous as to make a pauper out of himself. But all through the New Testament it is strongly suggested that if there is a need in the world that we can supply, we do not have to ask ourselves, "What shall I do?" but only "How can I help?" The simplest needs are physical. There are children in our own families; there are the perpetually poor, the unemployables, the defectives, in every community. There are people without work, hard-up people,

even in the best of times. These are people you can see.

And you do not have to travel farther than the nearest church to be reminded of hungry people you will never see but whom you can help through that church. In Korea, for example, missionaries in every church that is at work there have been spending a large part of their time, in these last few years, in famine relief. Through "Church World Service," CROP and other interdenominational agencies you are offered the chance to help widows and orphans who without your help would simply starve. When your church helps to support "agricultural missions" you are helping people in backward countries to farm more intelligently and feed more people on the same amount of land.

Not by Bread Alone . . .

But man does not live by bread alone, though to be sure he does live by bread. Just because he is man and not brute, he has needs which are mental and spiritual. Every minister of a prosperous congregation knows families that never have needed help to pay their bills; they have all the money they need and all that money can buy. But these may be, among the most needy families of the congregation, their lives may be empty, or filled with fear and despair. Physically well-fed, spiritually starving people are all around us. In these days in particular there is need for cheer and courage. We are certainly living in the darkest hours of human history, and many believe these are the last hours of the human race. At such a time men's hearts melt within them.

Sharing and Bearing

There are also the needs of those who have missed the mark, who have been (to quote Paul) "overtaken in a fault" and need above all to have their spiritual health restored, they need to "get right" with God and man. Here again is a need which Christians supply not only to those whom they personally know, but—through the missionary work of the church which they support—to others around the globe. Wherever, in mid-Africa or in a lonely western mining-camp, or anywhere else, the message of Christ is brought by those who are supported by churches such as those in your community, there the Christians in the home churches are helping the deepest human needs perhaps better than they could if they were there themselves. Each of us has his own load of responsibility to bear; but also each of us can share some of the burdens of the heavy-laden, near and far. 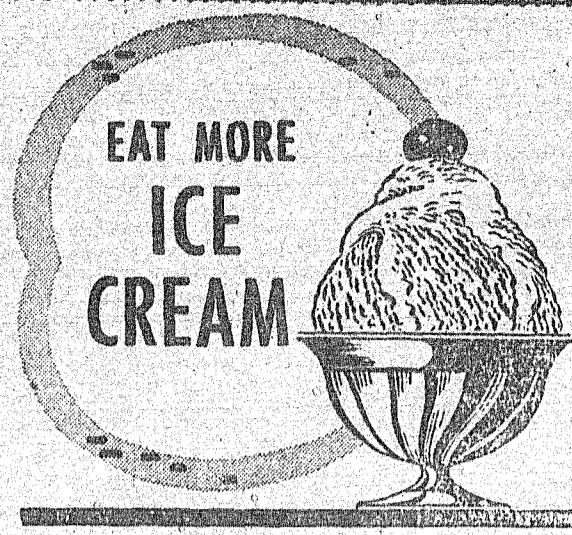

TEXAS FARMERS-RANCHERS WARNED OF CIO LABOR PLANS

AUSTIN, Tex., Farmers and ranchers of Texas were warned this week that the CIO plans to organize the farm workers of Texas if its candidate wins the Governor's race.

This warning came from Governor Allan Shivers who charged that the backers of his opponents "want to turn the state government over to the same bunch that is trying to wreck Port Arthur."

"One of the first things they would do is put one of their red-hot organizers from Port Arthur in as labor commissioner. Then every time a farmer or rancher wanted to hire someone he would have to go through the CIO."

Governor Shivers said there was no doubt in his mind that the aim of the CIO after the job of organizing industry in Port Arthur and along the Gulf Coast is finished is to begin organizing farm labor in all parts of Texas.

"You can imagine what will happen

when the CIO starts dictating how many laborers are needed to plow ten acres of land, refusing to allow a man to work more than thirty-five hours a week during the harvesting season and telling how much a farmer can charge for his crop," he said.

The Shivers administration, the Governor said, has worked hard to help preserve and protect the rights of the working man.

"But as long as I am Governor, the professional labor bosses who have been sent to Texas from the East—specifically those in the CIO and its Political Action Committee—are not going to run our State Government," Shivers promised. Shivers said the average working man in Texas appreciated good government and that they were not going to let CIO bosses and professional organizers from the East do their thinking—and voting—for them.

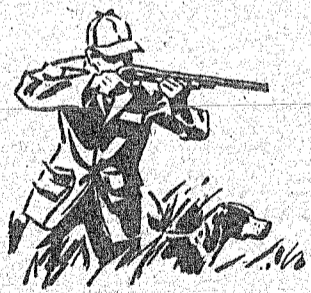

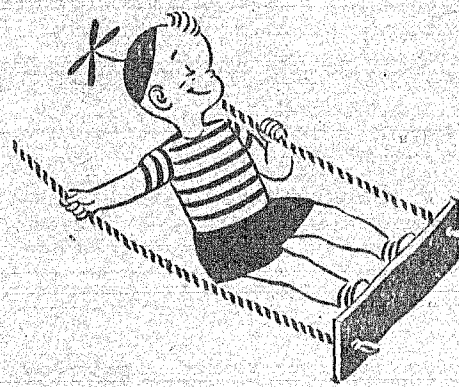

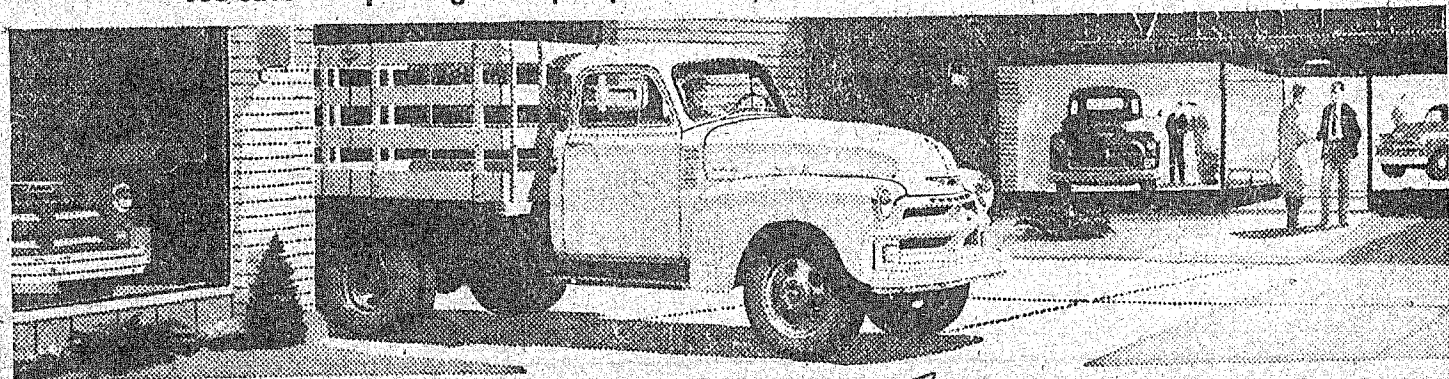

The 83rd Congress ended its two-year session on Friday evening. It was an historic session, featuring the controversial McCarthy issue, the first tax revision in 60 years, a new farm program, a half dozen bills designed to deal more effectively with domestic Communists and scores of other major legislative items.

The first tax relief in years was voted, with the major benefits going to rank-and-file individual taxpayers. The budget came within \$3.5 billion of being balanced. Foreign aid was cut considerably, and social security was expanded.

New wool program, differ-

ent from anything heretofore undertaken, was approved. Under this new plan, the Secretary of Agriculture will, in the Autumn, announce an incentive price for wool during the following year. The price will be one designed to encourage the production of more wool until a goal of 300 million pounds annually is achieved. The grower will sell his wool on a free market and retain his sales slip. At the end of the marketing season the average price received by growers will be compared with the incentive price previously announced by the Secretary.

A payment will be made to the grower in an amount that will insure him an approximation of the incentive price level. The formula will be applied in a way that will give advantage of those who get higher prices on the market and encourage all growers to improve their quality of wool and its preparation for market.

The money to pay for this program will come exclusively from revenue derived from tariff collected on imported wool. There will be no direct appropriation of funds by Congress.

Mohair will be included in the program. We were able, with the assistance of Rep. Bob Poage, to get a formula written into the law which guarantees mohair growers an incentive level of 15 percent of the parity accorded wool. In other words, if wool is allowed 100% of parity as an incentive price, mohair must be allowed at least 85%.

While the wool program was not the solution many of us preferred to the wool growers' dilemma, it was the Administration's program. We undertook to make it as workable as possible, after it became apparent that we must live with it and adjust ourselves to its terms. In practice it

may work out very well. Time will tell.

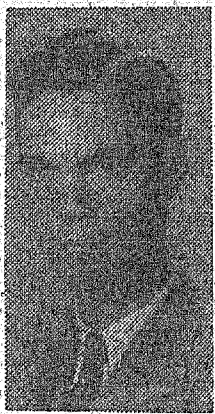
