## Ex-Student Homecoming Friday and Saturday

### Mountaineers To Entertain Bangs In Homecoming Game Friday Night

The annual Homecoming Football Game will be played on the local field Friday night, October 8, with the kickoff set for 8:00 p. m. between the Santa Anna Mountaineers and the Bangs Dragons. This will be the first conference game for both teams.

Bangs has had much the same luck this year as the Mountaineers. Thus far they have not won a game and naturally, this being the first conference game and our Homecoming game, they are going to be there in full strength attempting to win the game.

However, the Mountaineers are going to be there trying to win also. Last week they played the Rising Star Wildcats a good game and their spirit was good all through the game. If they show as much improvement this week as they did last week there will not be any doubt as to how the game will come out.

A lot of improvement last week as been attributed to motion pictures taken of the Santa Anna-Cross Plains game. The film was shown the boys five or six times and each player was shown where he was making his mistakes. Another film was made of the game last week and is being used for training purposes this week. The film for this is being furnished by the Santa Anna Quarterback Club.

The Mountaineers will be without the services of three starters for this game. James Allen is still ill and Dwan Cozart is not feeling well enough to play. Kenneth Henderson will not be in the lineup either because of an injury received last week. The coach said Allen and Cozart might play on a limited basis.

This is the first year Santa Anna and Bangs has been in District 23-A, along with Early. Old teams in the district are Burnet, Goldthwaite, Llano and Mason. Goldthwaite and Mason has been picked to be the top contenders in the district, but Santa Anna can upset that prediction if the improvement continues like it did last week.

#### RISING STAR GAME

The Mountaineers kicked to the Wildcats to start the game and on a series of running plays the Wildcats had worked their way down to the Santa Anna 5-yard line when they received a 15-yard penalty and they failed to make the necessary yardage for a first down with the ball going over to the Mountaineers on their 13-yard line. Three attempts failed to gain and the Mountaineers attempted to kick out. Daniel Gilbert, attempting to kick, got a bad pass from center and could not get the punt off, after recovering the ball in the end zone. He dropped to his knees in the end zone and gave the Wildcats a safety (2 points). After the kick off the Wildcats had worked their way back down

to the Mountaineer 24-yard line when the Mountaineers recovered fumble and took possession of the ball. In the second period, after an exchange of punts, Hollis Bible taking the Wildcat punt on his 24-yard line and working his way down to the Wildcat 31-yard line before being brought down. Two plays later a 15-yard penalty set the Mountaineers back to their 40-yard line. A power play netted 11 yards and a pass from Wess Wise to Hilary Rutherford set the TD up with the ball resting on the Wildcat 5-yard line. Two plays later Gilbert plowed through center for 4 yards and the TD. Danny Johnson kicked the extra point and the Mountaineers were out in front, 7-2, which was the score until early in the fourth period when Eddie Harding for the Wildcats went over from about 6 inches out for the Wildcat score. Their attempted pass for the extra point was no good and the game ended with the Wildcats leading the Mountaineers 8-7.

#### AROUND THE DISTRICT

Mason roared over Eden by a 76-6 count last Friday night to continue their winning streak. This makes four straight wins, no losses this season for Mason. Goldthwaite trounced Gorman to the tune of 68-14 to stay in 2nd place with two wins, a tie and one loss; Early and Llano are tied with three losses and one win each; Santa Anna is in fifth place with one tie and three losses; and Burnet and Bangs are tied for the cellar with four losses.

Early lost to Blanket last week by a 0-13 score; Llano won over Granger by a 22-7 score; Bangs went down before the undefeated Richland Springs eleven 37-19; and Burnet fell to the powerful San Saba eleven, 39-0.

### 1.35 Inches Rain Received Here

According to the rain gauge at the Coleman Gas Company office 1.35 inches rain has fallen in the Santa Anna area during the past few days. During the spell last week .70 rain fell and on Tuesday of this week .65 inch rain fell.

Reports from around in this vicinity seem to indicate that this is more or less local though. Some reports from south of town indicate that some less than an inch fell. Generally speaking about one inch has apparently covered the county, and it has come at a good time. This will enable a lot of farmers and ranchers to get some winter grazing planted.

We hope it is a good omen and that the rain will continue.

In the Fine Wool division Morris Straughan placed 3rd and Edwin Hipsher placed 6th; in the Southdown division Wess Wise placed 1st; James Allen placed 5th and Morris Straughan placed 16th. Wise also took first place in the Other Division, by showing his Shropshire lamb to the top place.

Wise's Southdown was judged the Grand Champion of the show. Both his first place winners were bred on his father's farm at Rockwood. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Wise.

This looks like the beginning of another successful year for the Future Farmers of America under the direction of Mr. Pettit. During the past few years the local group has been gaining in showing top animals at shows until now they almost always show the top animal at every big show in the state.

### Seven More 3rd Generation Students In School

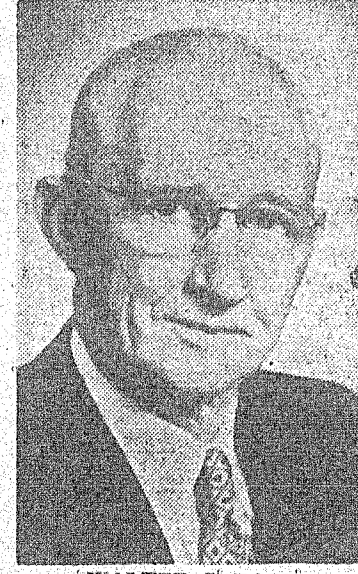

Walter S. Pope, member of the class of 1900, who resides at Abilene, Texas, will be the Homecoming Speaker at the Santa Anna Ex-Students Homecoming on October 9th. Mr. Pope was honored at a banquet at Austin on May 1, 1954. Prior thereto, the American Statesman, in the issue of Sunday, April 18, had the following to say concerning the speaker:

"Some people talk of public service as something mystic and exciting — but Walter S. Pope of Abilene doesn't just talk public service, he lives it.

"Pope will be formally honored May 1 at a state-wide meeting of his old college fraternity in Austin on the occasion of its 50th anniversary.

"Climax of the tribute by Delta Tau Delta fraternity to Pope's long career as a prominent attorney, patron of Texas education, civic worker and business man will be a dinner at which the national fraternity president will fly from Kansas City to speak. Twelve hundred fraternity members from all parts of the state have been invited to attend and at least five hundred college students, alumni and their wives are expected to participate in the activities.

"Local committees have been organized to honor Pope and the fraternity chapter's golden anniversary in 13 Texas cities.

"Pope is a member of the Abilene and State Bar Associations, serving as director of the State Bar in 1940-41, and later as president of the Abilene Bar Association. He is a member of the Baptist Church, Masonic Lodge, Knight Templar, Shrine and Lions Club.

"Born in the traditions of public service, educational opportunities and friendly council to his neighbor, Walter S. Pope is indeed a distinguished and accomplished Texan."

"Likewise, the Special Session of the Legislature passed House Concurrent Resolution No. 42, in recognition of this honor and extended congratulations to the fraternity and to Pope and three other members as original charter members of the fraternity.

### Wreck Thursday Takes One Life Injures Four Others

Sudden death came to, Mrs. Peggy June Oller of Brownwood last Thursday afternoon when the new car she was driving collided with a 1941 Pontiac driven by Lloyd S. Laird, 36, of Goldthwaite just east of the Brown-Coleman County line.

Mrs. Oller was believed to have been killed instantly. Four others in the car with her received minor to serious injuries. They included Mrs. Oller's two children, Bobbie Keith, 3, and Donna Carol, 15 months; Mrs. Gayle McLane, 20, of Brownwood, sister of Mrs. Oller and her 3-year old son.

Charges of murder by automobile were filed against Laird Friday morning. He was placed in the Brown County jail Thursday night on a drunk driving charge.

Laird, driving alone in the Pontiac which was owned by J. T. Person of Brownwood, was reported to have moved from his lane of traffic in attempting to pass a 1947 Buick driven by Mrs. Opal Waldrip of May and crashed into the Oller car seconds later.

Mrs. Oller was thrown from her car and apparently was run over by the other vehicle. Neither overturned.

Master Sgt. Dillard Oller, husband of Mrs. Oller, had purchased the new car only a few days before. It had only been driven 225 miles. The sergeant, stationed at Ft. Hood, and his family had returned from Germany only last June.

**FARM FIRE PREVENTION**

Fire is still one of the most costly drains on a farmer's income. Last year, fires cost the American farmer an estimated \$139 million in property loss alone. And more than 3,000 farm people died as a result.

The week of Oct. 3-9 is designated as National Fire Prevention Week. The Texas farmer owes it to himself and his family to safeguard farm life and property.

The minimum of fire-fighting equipment on a farm should include: An adequate supply of water available in any season of the year; approved fire extinguishers conveniently placed near all hazardous locations such as the barn, machine shed and gas and kerosene storage tanks, and a garden hose or filled water barrels and buckets strategically located.

Also needed are safe ladders long enough to rescue persons from the highest farm roof top, a back-pack pump, fire swatter, wet brooms or wet burlap bags to fight field fires.

Does all this sound overly cautious? It shouldn't. Below are nine major "hot spots" or main causes of farm fires. And every Texas farm is endangered by at least one, and probably more, of them.

Lightning-Rod System should be checked for rods or wires that are damaged or worn. Be sure ground connections are secure.

Chimneys that are defective should be replaced and heating apparatus properly installed and insulated. Keep chimneys and stoves clean.

Combustible Roofs should be protected with spark arresters on chimneys. When re-roofing, fire-resistant material is preferred.

Defective Heating Apparatus should be overhauled, cleaned and repaired.

Careless Smoking and Matches cause major fires! Cultivate careful smoking habits and keep matches in metal containers away from children.

Flammable Liquids should never be stored in the house. Do not use kerosene, gasoline or any flammable liquid to start or boost fires in stoves, ranges or fireplaces.

Spontaneous Ignition often occurs in barns stored with wet hay.

Rubbish should be removed from house and barns regularly and never let oily rags accumulate.

Electrical Defects should be repaired. Replace or repair defective electrical appliances and use proper fuses for your electrical circuits.

**REAL ESTATE TITLE PROCEDURES OUTLINED**

How may a purchaser determine whether the title he is receiving in a real estate transaction is good, bad or indifferent? Although at first glance there may appear to be more than one alternative method, purchasers usually find that all roads of complete title security lead to a lawyer chosen by the prospective buyer to represent his interests.

In a previous column it was said that the Contract of Sale should state the QUALITY OF TITLE to be conveyed to the purchaser. If the contract does not so state, then the seller may be obligated to sell — and the purchaser bound to buy — only whatever title the seller happens to possess, which may actually be quite defective. This may be true in spite of the fact that the seller is in possession, has a deed to the property, has been paying taxes, etc.

A real estate title is a claim of ownership or right to land and to the improvements, such as houses and other structures, located thereon. It may be partial or complete, as determined by the numerous facts in each case. If it is complete and superior to any other person's claim — if you can prove your right thereto against all the world, it is a GOOD TITLE. If, in addition, the evidence of your claim of ownership is contained in the proper public records, it is a GOOD TITLE. Ordinarily, only a GOOD RECORD TITLE is considered

saleable, being sometimes referred to as a GOOD MARKETABLE TITLE.

When you buy a house, you want a title which is good, so that you and your heirs will not be troubled while enjoying the use of the premises. You also want that title to be marketable, in order that it can be sold when you are ready to sell — without the expense of perfecting title before your buyer will complete his purchase.

Having made certain that your contract of sale indicates, the exact nature of the title to be conveyed to you by the seller, how do you go about assuring yourself that you will receive the specified quality of title? People have varied ideas about this matter.

Some consider themselves safe when they gain possession of an Abstract of Title or a General Warranty Deed. But an Abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract of land — a history of the title — which anyone may purchase, regardless of ownership.

A General Warranty Deed from a responsible seller is comforting to have, but is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. True, it entitles you to sue the seller for damages caused by defects in the title. But serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt.

Safer procedures include your attorney's examination of the Abstract tendered by the seller, and the purchase of a Title Insurance Policy, indemnifying you as the insured for the full amount of your investment. In any event you will want your attorney's advice when closing a real estate transaction.

# Hardeman Gives Explanation Of Proposed Constitutional Amendments

(Editor's note: Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, State Senator of this district, upon request has summarized the eleven amendments to the State Constitution to be voted on in the General Election in November. We urge you to study these proposals and be prepared to vote when you go to the polls.)

Important amendments to the Constitution of Texas are to be voted on November 2. Such election may result in fundamental changes in our basic law.

It is hoped that this brief analysis will invite further study thereof. The proposals will be summarized with regard to the order of their appearance on the ballot.

S. J. R. 10 involves the transfer of about \$6,000,000 from the constitutional Confederate Pension Fund for the erection of state office buildings. This fund has accumulated in excess of the needs of the original purpose and may only be distributed by a

constitutional authorization. The annual outlay of about \$233,000.00 for rent by the State suggested this proposal and the State Bar Association is supporting a movement to erect a courts building for this fund.

This amendment, if adopted, will not change the present 2-cent tax, but will "freeze" it as a permanent source of funds for additional buildings. Some \$1,250,000.00 was realized from this tax during the last fiscal year with an expenditure of about one-half thereof.

S. J. R. 7 proposes an increase of \$7,000,000.00 in the amount of money that may be appropriated for old age assistance, aid to needy blind and aid to dependent children. It does not purport to increase the monthly benefits of recipients. It can only mean the addition of more people to the rolls. The present limit is \$35,000,000.00 annually for such purposes.

The proposal also provides that the Legislature shall enact laws relating to the public inspection of lists of those receiving aid or assistance thereunder. Some 28 states now so provide.

H. J. R. 16 relates to jury service for women. Unlike the milder proposal of 1949 which was defeated, this one contains the mandatory feature. If adopted, such service by women will be required as in the case of male citizens.

S. J. R. 4 deals with 4-year terms for specified county and district offices. It contains a blanket provision, however, which appears to embrace all "elective district, county and precinct offices, which have heretofore had terms of two years." This may be construed to include all other such offices, even though not specifically designated. If so, then school trustees, State Representatives, officers of various type districts such as irrigation, soil conservation, water conservation, etc., would be affected.

The proposals preserve the biennial elections by staggering the offices. Thus a part would be elected each two years to serve 4-year terms, with those elected this year to the offices of County Judge, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Treasurer, Commissioners No. 2 and No. 4, Justice of the Peace and County Surveyor receiving a four-year term, while those elected to the office of Sheriff, District Attorney, County Attorney, Assessors and Collectors of

Taxes, Commissioners No. 1 and No. 3 and Constables, in the November, 1954 General Election would serve only two years until following the general election, in 1956.

This amendment is extremely vital. All of its importations are not readily discernible. It takes away the right of the people to vote on certain officials each two years as at present, although elections will continue to be held each two years.

S. J. R. 5 would authorize the Legislature to fix the salaries of certain constitutional officers at not less than the salaries presently prescribed by the Constitution. It would also set the per diem of the members of the Legislature — Representatives and Senators, alike — at \$25.00 for the first 120 days and nothing thereafter. The present compensation is \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of a session and \$5.00 for each day thereafter that the session continues. Neither the present constitution nor the proposed amendment contemplates any payment to the members between sessions.

H. J. R. 10 is designed to permit any member of the armed forces of the U. S., or of their component branches, to vote, provided, such person is otherwise qualified as to residence, payment of poll tax, etc.

S. J. R. 14 proposes to prohibit the State from lending its credit in any manner towards the building and maintenance of toll roads and turnpikes constructed by private industry or political subdivisions of the State. It is intended to preclude the State from engaging in the toll road or turnpike business and to prevent such from ever becoming a charge upon tax money now levied and collected to construct and maintain a state highway system.

H. J. R. 8 would permit counties of less than 10,000 population to separate the offices of sheriff and tax assessor and collector upon a vote of the qualified property taxpayers therein. There are 91 counties in this category now, with 16 of them situated in this Senatorial District.

The remaining three proposals are of little general interest and with rather limited scope, for all practical purposes. Such does not lessen their importance, however. Of these, S. J. R. 6 would permit members of the Teachers Retirement system and the State Employees Retirement system to receive credit for services rendered in one capacity in the other. H. J. R. 37 proposes to empower the Legislature to provide for coverage of "proprietary" employees of the State's political subdivisions under Federal Old Age and Surviv-

or's Insurance. At present, only "governmental" employees are so qualified.

S. J. R. 2, applicable to counties having a population in excess of 190,000 and to Galveston County, authorizes the creation of county-wide hospital districts therein and the levy of ad valorem taxes for support, etc., upon vote of the qualified property taxpayers therein. Such counties will then have a direct source of income for the support, etc., of such institutions as may be acquired by such districts.

## Builders Required To Give Veterans 1 Year Warranty

GI home builders now are required to give veteran-purchasers a one-year warranty that their homes have been constructed in "substantial conformity" with Veterans Administration-approved plans and specifications.

VA said the one-year warranty is being put into effect October 1, 1954, under the Housing Act of 1954, which stipulates that all new housing purchased with the aid of VA or Federal Housing Administration guaranteed or insured loans must carry the warranty.

The warranty does not apply to existing homes which have been occupied for more than a year.

It applies only on new homes for which VA issues a certificate of reasonable value on or after October 1, 1954.

Builders or sellers of new housing will give each veteran-purchaser a warranty in a form which has been prescribed by VA. A copy of the warranty on which the veteran has acknowledged receipt, must be forwarded to VA by the lender before VA will guarantee or insure the loan.

Notice of any substantial non-conformance with plans and specifications must be given by the owner of the house to the warrantor within one year from the date the veteran takes title or the house is initially occupied, whichever is earlier. The terms of the warranty will run to successors or transferees in event the property changes hands before the expiration of the warranty.

The warranty terms prescribed by VA and FHA are identical. For homes sold with GI financing where FHA has made compliance inspections, the warranty form prescribed by FHA will be used.

VA emphasized that the one-year warranty required by the Housing Act is in addition to any other rights or privileges a purchaser or owner may have under

any other law or instrument. VA said it will be up to the purchaser to enforce his rights under the warranty.

## LOCAL STUDENTS AT SAN MARCOS COLLEGE

San Marcos — Mr. and Mrs. Homer W. Schulze from Santa Anna are enrolled in Southwest Texas State Teachers College.

Total enrollment at the College will reach 1850, officials in the Registrar's Office predict. There is an increase of about 100 over last year, this year's freshman class of 543 being the largest since 1949. The World War II veterans' enrollment has decreased from the peak in 1947 of 710 to 12 this fall. There are 214 Korean veterans now enrolled.

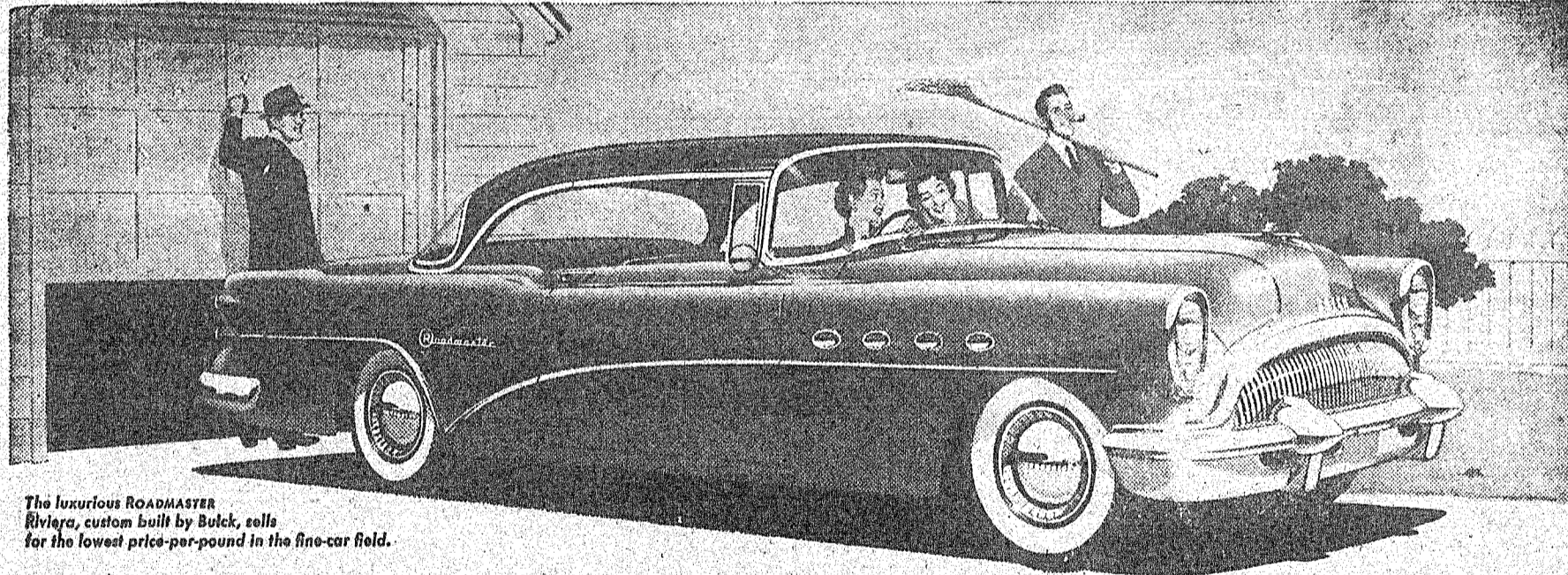

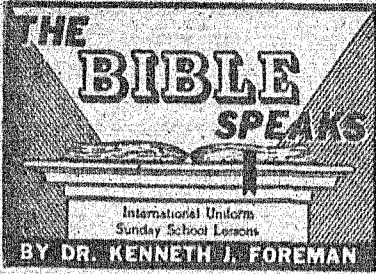

**Man's Questions**

Lesson for October 10, 1954

TO MAN'S eternal questioning there is an answer; but it is not the kind of answer that man expects. For the tremendous problem of evil, the questions that are forced on us when we see the triumph of good over evil anywhere, when like Job we or those we love are racked by calamities not of our making—for these problems and these questions what we think we want is some answer all written out clear and smooth. We Dr. Foreman want all the whys and the wherefores answered so that we have no further questions to ask. But God does not respond to this demand. He did not give Job what Job kept shouting for—an explanation. So far as we know, Job never did find out the real reason why God had allowed these troubles to descend on him. But his mind and heart were satisfied all the same.



**God Does Not Answer**

From time to time, all through the long, brilliant, dead-end argument Job has with his friends, Job breaks off the line of his thought to wish that he could once speak to God, face to face. These well-meaning, stupid friends of his have no answer to life's riddle. They have one, but it is like a rusty key that fits no lock. All they can say (though they repeat it again and again with poetic power) is that suffering is caused by sin, period. Job knows this does not fit his case, not the way they think. So he feels almost as if he were talking into a well. There is nothing out hollow darkness—and he wants God. Well, God at last comes down in the terrifying majesty of a great storm. Job dares not look; but there comes out of the whirlwind a voice of thunder, not bringing answers but asking questions. Job is beaten in the face with a wind of questions to which he has no answer at all. In the

midst of it Job begs God to stop, but God will not stop. Many of the questions which are asked of Job science now can answer; but some remain without answer to this day. One lasting message of these last pages of Job is that this universe is woven with mystery from top to bottom. We do not understand the simple things around us. Why must we expect the answers to the difficult questions before we can settle the simpler problems? If the presence of evil be a mystery, and to a large degree it is, it is only one great question in a universe crowded with questions.

**God Has the Answers**

There is one point Job reaches in his final faith, which was not in his first faith. For the story of Job is about a man who began with a faith which was real but untested, and came through storm and stress to a better faith, better because wiser, better because tested in the tempest. He began with believing that God ought to explain to him all that God was doing. He ends with a faith that has given up that claim. God does not answer him and yet he is satisfied. How could this be? It is clear that Job did not think that God is puzzled by his own universe. God's wisdom is infinite. Job believed that the universe "makes sense" to God, since it is His. The change in Job's thinking was just here. At first he thought God ought to tell us what he knows. At the last Job realizes that God does not have to tell us all he knows, and will not.

**God Is the Answer**

Nevertheless Job's cry for light did not go without response. For he learned that in every darkness God is the light. God himself is the answer. He learned that the right question to ask in the presence of life's tragedies is not always "Why is this?" but rather, "How may I meet it?" Explaining life is less vital than bravely bearing life. In a storm at sea the passengers and even the crew may be in greatest distress. They may not know where the storm came from, nor how much of the ocean is swept by it, they may have no notion of where land is; but they do not mob the bridge demanding a weather map and a lecture on meteorology. They have confidence in the captain. An ounce of confidence is worth a ton of explanations. So it is on the voyage of life. We are all passengers across an unplumbed sea, whose winds we cannot chart and whose storms are not made to our order. But God is the Captain. Knowing he is near, we are content to ask fewer questions.

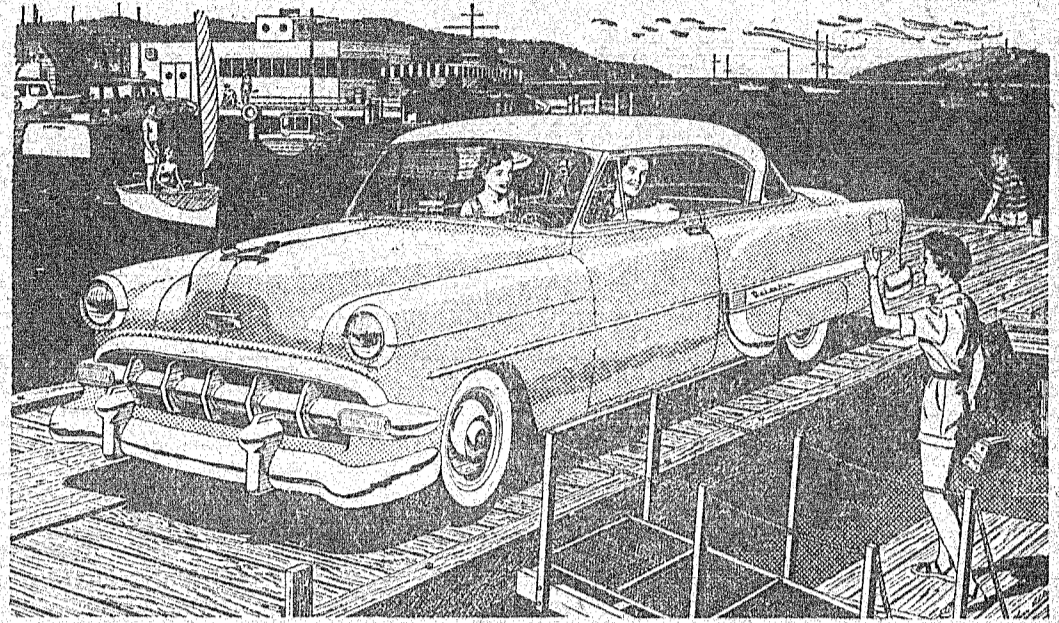

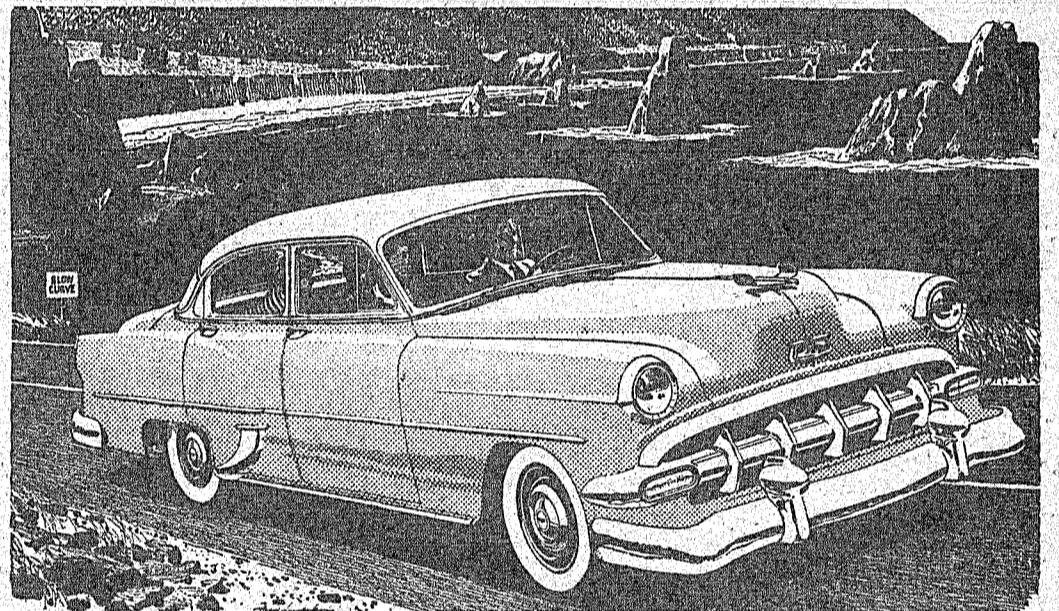

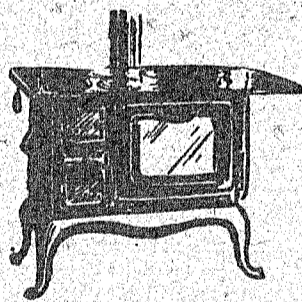

## Do You Know What To Do In Case Of A Fire?

San Antonio (Spl.) — If you suddenly wake up and smell smoke, do you know what to do until the firemen come?

Few people do. Southwest Research Center fire technologists have discovered. And knowing what to do — and what not to do — might save your life.

"Put your hand on the bedroom door," advises Calvin Yuill, director of fire technology at Southwest Research Center, who has prepared a "check list" of what to do in case of home fires. "If the door is warm, don't open it.

"The draft might fan the blaze, or hot gasses and smoke could overcome you. Get out a window as soon as possible. Jump if you have to. A few broken bones are better than being burned to death."

However, if you must go out the door, Yuill advises you to wrap a wet blanket or towel around your head and crawl across the floor.

Heat rises and it is coolest near the floor. The wet towel will also absorb some of the gases.

Yuill has a word of advice for home fire fighters trying to put out a small blaze:

"Call the fire department first. Then try to put it out. Don't

wait to see if you can handle it. It may spread badly before the firemen can get there."

If a frying pan of grease catches fire, don't throw water on it, said Yuill. Grab a cover that fits and smother the flame or throw baking soda on it. Baking soda is a good homemade fire extinguisher and is used in many commercial extinguishers.

If a curtain catches fire, pull it down and stomp on it or douse it with water. Curtains will not burn easily if you rinse them in a borac acid solution when you wash them. You make it by using nine ounces of Borax and four ounces of Boric Acid to a gallon of water.

"Fire prevention is the major part of cure," Yuill said. "Every home should have a good garden hose permanently connected, preferably to an inside water supply, and periodic home fire drills."

Don't leave a rug over a floor furnace. It holds the heat in so that it builds up.

Don't put pennies or tin foil behind fuses or use 30 amp fuses in place of 14 or 20 amp fuses. You are throwing out the protection you had and are liable to cause a fire.

Frayed lamp and appliance cords are dangerous. Replace them.

Never have a fire in the fireplace without a screen in front of it.

Don't use flammable cleaning fluids. They can cause a flash fire.

Above all, if you do have a fire,

keep calm, advises Yuill. The fire department can get to your house within a few minutes.

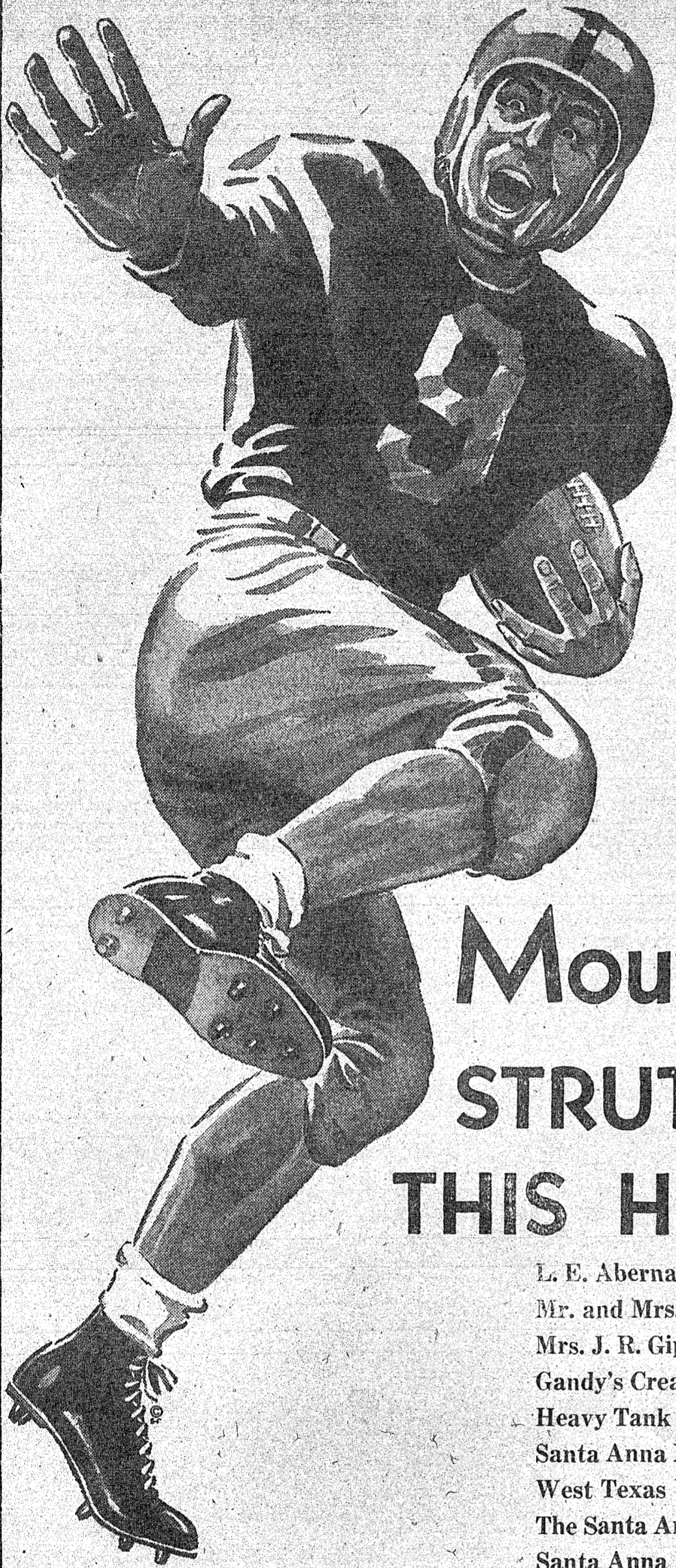

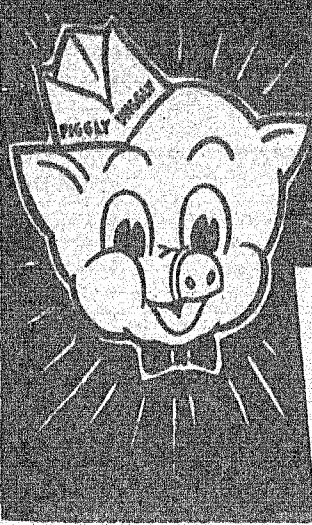
