The annual Coleman County Fair will be held at the Coleman Rodeo grounds on Saturday, September 28. The all-day event is to be bigger and better than ever, and many changes and improvements have been planned by the sponsoring committee.

A workday is to be held at the grounds on Saturday, September 21, and everyone interested is invited to be on hand to help get the grounds ready for the fair.

Tickets are to go on sale this week with the cost being 50 cents for children and \$1.25 for persons 12 and over.

A youth horse show will be held at the rodeo area adjoining the fair site, and other special activities are being scheduled.

Clubs and organizations in the county will have food booths this year instead of the usual barbecue meal included in the price of the admission ticket. About 30 booths have been reserved by merchants and groups, and the women's

division at the recreation building will include displays of handwork, art, needlework and foods. About 100 people in the county have been named to committees for the fair. Entries in the women's division are to be in place by 9:15 a.m. that morning.

Everyone in the community is urged to attend the county Fair on Saturday, September 28.

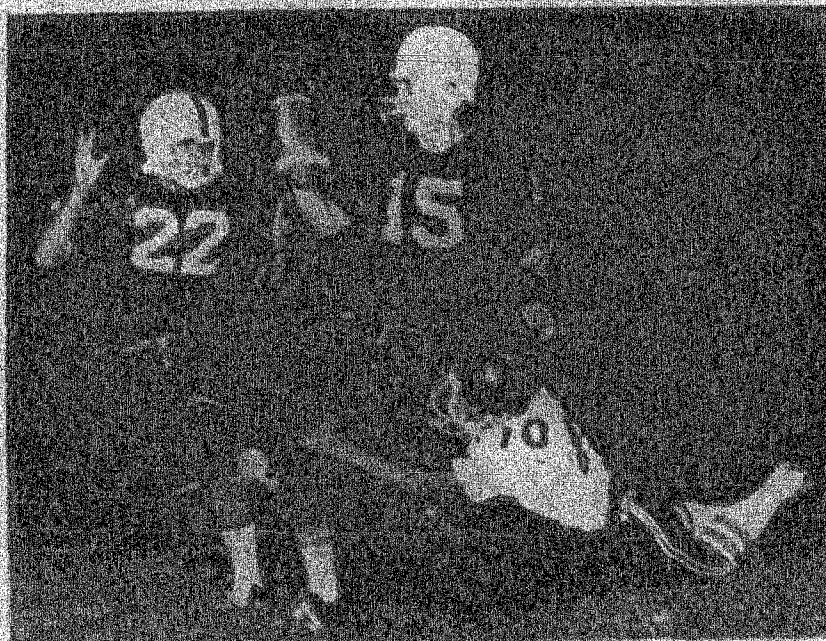
Mrs. Haynes was taken to the hospital by her son-in-law, Doyle Evans, where she is receiving treatment. She is getting along well.

### 'Unusual Preacher' To Speak Sunday At Coleman UMC

Bob Harrington, called the "Chaplain of Bourbon Street", will conduct a non-denominational crusade in Brownwood this weekend and also speak at the Coleman United Methodist Church on Sunday.

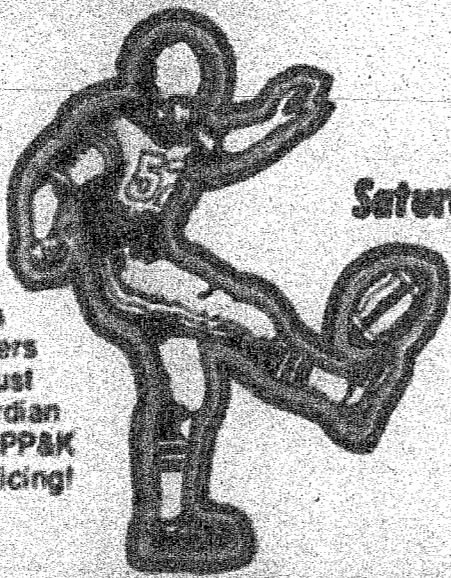

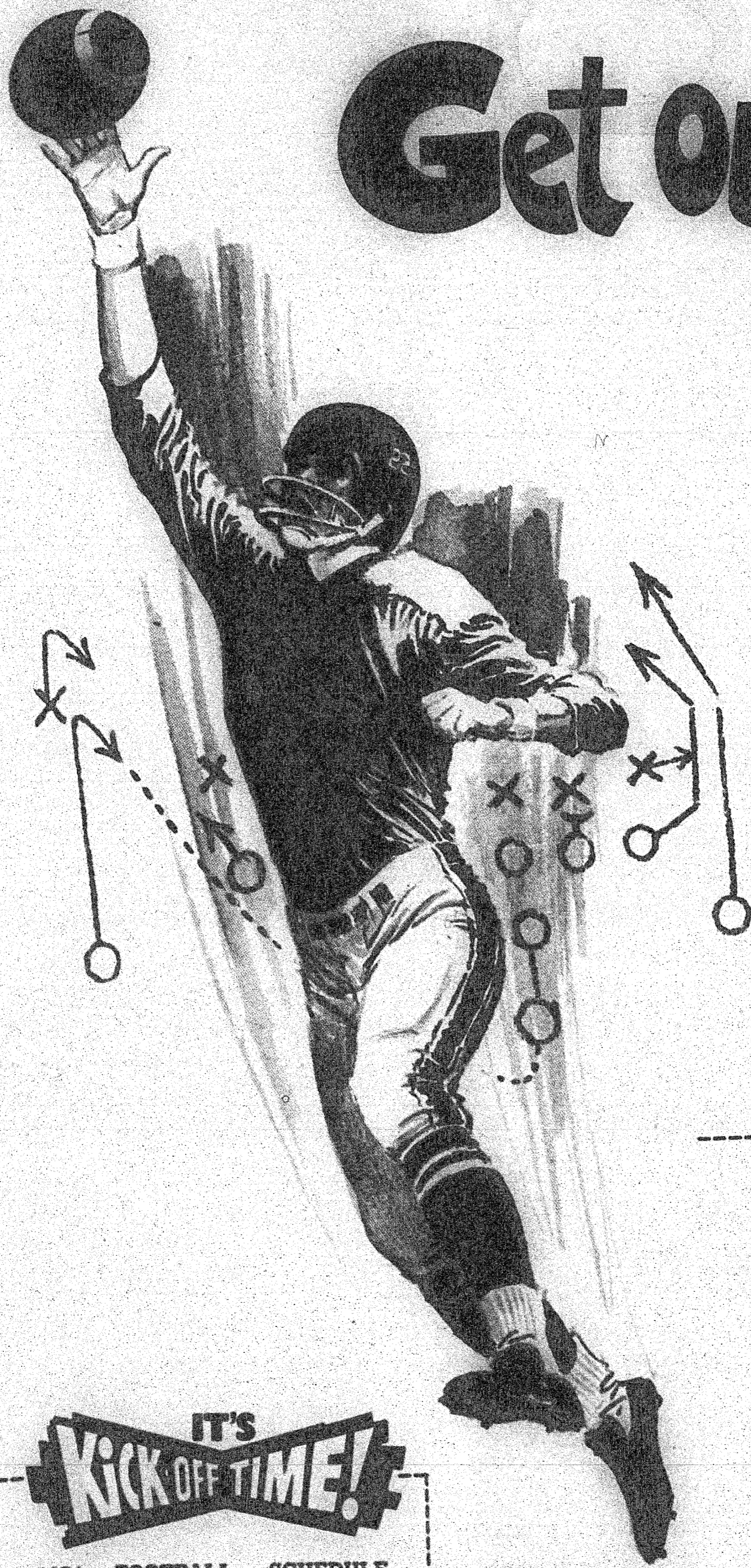

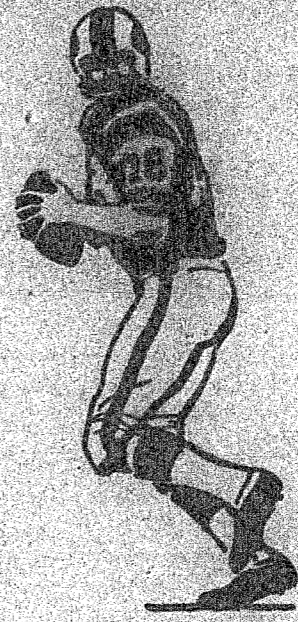
