National and International News Hi-Lights of the Week

A four point agreement on a basic structure for economic merger of the American and British occupation zones in Germany, including establishment of administrative agencies manned by Germans given executive powers, was announced September 5 by military governments of both countries.

William Heirens, 17 year old Chicago University, confessed slayer of Suzanne Degnan and the fatal stabbing of two other women and more than a score of robberies, burglaries and assaults, was sentenced to a series of consecutive terms which will insure his serving a minimum of 61 years in the Illinois state penitentiary.

Any hopes for peace in the nation's strike bound waterfronts suffered a setback last night with the announcement that CIO seamen would demand pay raises matching anything won by AFL sailors in the strike against a "pay cut" decision by the wage stabilization board.

Strike leaders said only an outright reversal and restoration of the \$5 and \$10 cut would end the walkout.

OPA has announced today that industrial sugar allotments for the final quarter of this year will continue at the same rate in effect for the third quarter (July-Sept.).

The agencies said that the agriculture department allocation of sugar for civilian use does not permit any increase in rations to any type of users during the fourth quarter.

Indications were Tuesday that the return of fresh meat to the counters hinges upon the success of OPA investigators in crushing a budding black market in livestock.

Major parkers Tuesday still could not compete with independent packers and shipper buyers for the supply of cattle. Swift stated that during the past two days they have been able to purchase about 10 per cent of the supply needed for one day of operation at the packing houses.

Government troops attacking from three directions advanced on the Chinese communist stronghold of Kalgan Tuesday in a major offensive which neutral observers said may end China's last chance for a negotiated peace.

The civil war already had reached an all out tempo in much of North China, military personnel of Peiping has agreed. Both government and communist leaders predicted a fierce fight for Kalgan. Some Chinese dispatches report a noticeable slackening of the Tating siege, presumably as communists moved troops to Kalgan's defense.

Yugoslavia has tentatively agreed to pay damages for the loss of the five lives in the forced crashes of two unarmed American transport planes, the state department disclosed September 10.

Thus far, however, Marshal Tito's government has not consented to pay an additional indemnity for the loss of the planes which were attacked by Yugoslav fighters, Undersecretary of State William L. Clayton told a news conference.

Clayton has said several times that the United States is willing to end the dispute over the crashes if the indemnity issue is settled satisfactorily. He emphasized, however, that the negotiations being carried on in Belgrade by Ambassador Richard C. Patterson, Jr., are far from conclusive to date.

President Truman pushed for army-navy unification September 10 in a major conference with heads of the U. S. armed forces.

He called Secretary of the Navy Forrestal and Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, chief of naval operations, to the White House.

Jester To Walk In Friendship With All

Beauford Jester won the support of the state democratic convention after a sharp fight and declared that he was ready to walk in friendship with all down his people's path.

Jester appeared half an hour after a test vote had overwhelmingly assured his control over the party machinery for the next year, and was cheered as he entered the convention hall.

Jester's forces won their first clear cut test of strength 1,184 to 524, in a vote to elect a Jester hand picked state democratic executive committee.

The vote came on a roll granted a few moments after a loud and persistent demonstration had protested the action of the committee on nominating party officers which had disregarded district caucus recommendations in the cases of six committee members.

A platform advocating in general Jester's campaign program — "betterment within the broad lines of existing institutions" — was adopted. It included Jester's pledge for no new taxes.

Train All Youths 'T Vets Ask

Ft. Worth, Sept. 9 — Approximately 1,000 citizen soldiers, veterans of the famed 36th division, today will act on a resolution that would "condemn with no reservations" individuals responsible for "unwarranted, unjustifiable and indefensible treatment according to the citizen soldier in all of our wars."

The veterans, meeting here for 36th division association reunion, yesterday gave approval to a resolution calling for speedy enactment of legislation to require military training of all male youth in the hope that such preparedness will make it unnecessary for future units to go through another "bloody Salerno."

Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright, hero of Bataan, presented views before the reunion that concurred with those expressed in the military training resolution. "Our soldiers of 1917 and 1918 thought that was the war to end all wars. Somewhere along the way we lost the peace we sought" he said.

"But in this atomic age we dare not lose the peace again. We learn from the lessons of the past that the way to peace does not lie in weakness. We must realize that this time we cannot, by weakness, inspire other nations with a desire for peace."

The citizen soldier resolution states that national guard units gained 36.4 per cent of ground gained in World War II and suffered 40 per cent of all casualties of the war.

Representative Harley Sadler of Sweetwater has announced that he is bowing out of the race for speaker of the 50th session of the Texas legislature. Dallas representative, W. O. After expressing his appreciation for the support of his candidacy Mr. Sadler announced that he pledges his support to the program of Governor nominee Beauford Jester.

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
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Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By HAROLD L. LUNDQUIST, D. D., Of The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago. Released by Western News-Service Union.

Lesson for September 15

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JESUS AND COVETOUSNESS

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:17; Proverbs 11:23, 24; Luke 12:13-21.

MEMORY SELECTION—He that trusteth in his riches shall fall; but the righteous shall flourish as a branch.—Proverbs 11:28.

The Ten Commandments, the study of which we conclude today (the remaining lessons of the quarter deal with other laws), have been revealed to us as being characterized by their brevity, their comprehensive touch with all of life, and fidelity to the right. But they are also unique and different from all other laws in that they reach into the inner recesses of a man's heart, a realm where only God can judge and act.

This last commandment (against covetousness) emphasizes that point, for it does not expressly require or forbid any act, but deals with the motive of man's action. Man can judge another man's acts, but he cannot judge his motives, desires or thoughts. God must do that.

But man can, by the grace of God, control his motives; and hence we have this commandment and its interpretation.

I. Covetousness — What It Is (Exod. 20:17).

To covet does not mean just to desire, but to have an unrestrained desire for that which we ought not to have or which by right belongs to another.

It shows itself in our day in a more general way — an inordinate desire for possessions in general. There too man loses himself. It may be a surprise to many to learn that coveting, or desiring what belongs to another, is a sin. It has become one of the "respectable sins" accepted in the best circles and practiced by many church people.

As a matter of fact, this sin underlies all the other sins against which the commandments speak. He who has a love for money and an evil desire to have his neighbor's possessions will hate, lie, steal, cheat, kill. In fact, as Dr. G. Campbell Morgan says, "The whole realm of human interrelations is disorganized and broken up by the dishonoring of the tenth commandment."

II. Covetousness — What It Does (Prov. 11:23, 24; Luke 12:13-21).

1. It Makes a Man Stingy (Prov. 11:23, 24). The righteous man seeks that which is good and he knows nothing of the close-fisted stinginess which withholds from God and man. Sometimes to economize is to lose, and to be liberal is to gain—especially in the things of God.

God gives liberally (James 1:5), and the man who knows God scatters not only his money, but his riches of mind and service for God's glory.

In sad contrast is the man who keeps his possessions for himself and reaps only the barrenness of soul and leanness of life.

2. It Makes a Man Envious (Luke 12:13-15). Noting the ability of Jesus in dealing with others, this man thought to divert the Lord from his real ministry to the souls of men to the settling of social problems—all because he was greedy.

Some church leaders think that is our business now — to preach and promote a social gospel. They had better reread verse 14.

3. It Makes a Man Selfish (Luke 12:16, 17). The one who was known to his friends as the "rich man" (v. 16) was known to God as a "fool" (v. 20), because having more than he could use he hoarded it for himself. One wonders what he had to say for himself when that very night he was called into the presence of God to give an account of his stewardship (v. 20). If you are similarly situated and have the same attitude, what will you say in that day?

4. It Makes a Man Proud (Luke 12:18). All around him were the hungry. He needed no barns, for there were the empty hands of the needy; but money had made him hard and proud. He would build bigger barns, perhaps the biggest in that community. People would marvel at his prosperity and he would live long to enjoy it.

But it did not work out that way, for, alas, it is true of covetousness that—

5. It Makes a Man Foolish (Luke 12:19-21). The man who reckons without God is sure to come to grief. Leaving him out of one's thinking and planning invites disaster. God called, and he who had
