National and International News Hi-Lights of the Week

Prime Minister Stalin's statement on Russia's relations with the western world were viewed unofficially by a highly placed British government spokesman as an indication that Moscow is readying a "get tough" policy of its own.

The British spokesman who gave his own reaction said there were several indications in the Stalin statement that it was made "to tell the western world that Soviet Russia will answer U. S. toughness toward her with a 'toughness' of her own."

An 11,000% profit for Henry J. Kaiser's wartime shipbuilding was reported and denied Tuesday amid republican cries of "new deal sacred cows" and "get-rich-quick Wallingfords."

Kaiser waved his hands as he testified Monday in Washington, defending his companies' operations during an appearance before the house Merchant Marine committee which is seeking data on shipbuilding profits.

Officials of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association disagreed Tuesday night with Secretary of Agriculture Anderson, who said in a radio broadcast from Albuquerque, N. M. that meat ceiling prices were sufficiently high now to stimulate production and that the present low slaughtering of animals would prove a boon to consumers later.

Secretary Anderson observed that the low level of livestock sales reflects a cessation of marketing of light weight animals. Large numbers of these were rushed to slaughter, he reported, during the July-August period when there were no ceilings and prices shot up to record levels.

The Army Air Forces has disclosed it is conducting experiments with guided missiles at Ladd Field near Fairbanks, Alaska.

While no details were given, the experiments were described as part of elaborate cold weather maneuvers to be conducted by two ground force task groups in Alaska and Adak this winter.

Chou En-Lai, No. 2 Chinese communist said Thursday, September 19 in Shanghai he had walked out on the Nanking peace negotiations. He said the Chinese and American governments' far eastern policies are based on assumption that there will be a war between Russia and America and that China will be an important base.

The U. S. embassy has received reliable reports indicating that some American airmen who were forced down in 1944 are living as slaves of the aboriginal Lolo tribesmen in mountainous western China, Ambassador J. Leighton Stuart said Sunday.

President Truman on September 20th, dismissed Secretary of Commerce Wallace for criticizing administration foreign policy. Immediately after his dismissal from the cabinet, Wallace took to the air with a plea for a popular crusade to "win the peace."

W. Averell Harriman, retiring as U. S. ambassador at the Court of St. James to succeed Henry A. Wallace as secretary of commerce, Monday announced his intention to work in "closest cooperation" with President Truman and Secretary of State Byrnes.

He said he plans to make a flying visit to Paris for "co-ordination talks" with Byrnes before leaving for Washington.

President Truman has begun looking around for a man of "outstanding character and prestige" to be the new ambassador to Great Britain.

Many names were mentioned in speculation over Harriman's successor but no one has been decided upon yet.

A PROCLAMATION

KNOW ALL MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN

BY THESE PRESENTS:

That, WHEREAS, the health, happiness, life and safety and general welfare of each citizen are dependent upon existing living conditions, and

WHEREAS, the lives and property of our people are endangered by fire caused by rubbish accumulations in our homes, offices, stores, alleys and streets, and

WHEREAS, a city is judged by its general appearance, cleanliness and beauty, and

WHEREAS, fires to a very large degree are preventable by the proper application of education in fire prevention and fire protection;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Geo. M. Johnson, Mayor of the City of Santa Anna, do hereby proclaim the week of October 6th to 12th as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK, during which week I most respectfully urge our civic and commercial organizations, our school officials and teachers, and our citizenship as a whole, to cooperate and work with the Fire Chief, Fire Marshal and other city officials in an effort to control this useless loss of life and property by fire. Every home, office and place of business should be inspected carefully and all fire hazards removed.

The city has acquired three buildings from the hospital wards at Camp Berkeley and they are to be moved to Santa Anna and built into a number of houses to house veterans who are living in Santa Anna. These buildings have been acquired by the efforts of Mayor George M. Johnson and the Chamber of Commerce and will be moved here as soon as possible. This project is to be completed by the 18th of January.

The city has some prints of drawings and some other prints come with the contract, as to the way the buildings have to be erected. This is all in compliance with government regulations and the buildings are for rent to executive personnel only.

It has not been fully decided as to just what the buildings will look like when completed but there will be housing units for several families of veterans. The houses will contain all the modern conveniences and will be put on city property and rented at OPA prices.

Prominent Men Killed in Texas Auto Accidents

Four persons, including the chairman of the State Board of Control and a former member of the Texas legislature, died as a result of week-end traffic accidents.

Two other accidental deaths brought the week-end total to six. In Austin the State Department of Safety has reported that Texas traffic accidents have increased 42% during the past eight months, with 1,185 persons killed in traffic accidents during that period. For a comparative period last year, 835 persons were killed.

Weaver Baker, former law partner of Governor Coke R. Stevenson and chairman of the State Board of Control, is believed to have died instantly from injuries received when the station wagon he was driving overturned and struck a post near Austin after having failed to make a curve yesterday morning.

Governor Stevenson returned to Austin from his Kimble county ranch upon being notified of Baker's death.

S. D. Shanon, 79, of Ft. Worth, a former state representative, received fatal injuries in an automobile collision near Scotland, Archer county, yesterday. Three servicemen, injured in the crash, are in a Wichita Falls hospital.

At Tyler, Freeman Clark, 32, died in a hospital yesterday from injuries received in an automobile collision Saturday night on the Henderson highway.

Mrs. Anna L. Adams, 40, was found dead on a highway near Houston Saturday night. Deputy Sheriff Vic Parker said she had been struck by an automobile.

Patsy Bagwell, 10, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Bagwell of near Bronte, drowned yesterday morning while wading in the stock tank of her parents' farm.

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

Improved Uniform International LESSON

By HAROLD L. LUNDQUIST, D. D., Of The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago. Released by Western Newspaper Union.

Lesson for September 29

JESUS AND THE LAW OF LOVE

LESSON TEXT—Psalm 119:33-38; Matthew 5:43-48.

MEMORY SELECTION—Love worketh no ill to his neighbor; therefore love the fulfilling of the law.—Romans 13:10

Love fulfilled the law—in Christ. God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son (John 3:16). The law of love is therefore appropriate as the subject of our closing lesson on the general theme, "Jesus Interprets Old Testament Laws."

Love is the heavenly gift of God, who is love, to man who so much needs its grace and power for his own life and for his living with others.

I. The Mind of Love (Ps. 119:33-35).

Eight times in this psalm there is found the cry of verse 33 for instruction in the laws of God. Man not only must know them, but he must know how they operate. The picture here is that of a man who wants to get in step with God, marching out to spiritual warfare and being prepared to respond in prompt obedience to the commands of his divine leader.

Here we have the true mind of love. The one rightly instructed in the principles of God's rule in the world sees that love is the basic requirement, but that it expresses itself in a life that is in accord with the will of God.

The thought of this passage is well expressed by Dr. W. R. White: "The psalmist had the highest possible conception of love before the revelation in Christ. He saw it as the basic order of things. He conceived it as identical with the will of God. He viewed it as the safe, happy path for man. He considered it as the way of wisdom. He passionately desired to embrace it and order his life by it. He saw it imparting to the naive and simple the benefits of extraordinary judgment. To measure up he knew that he had to be quickened or made alive to it by the power of God."

II. The Manner of Love (Ps. 119:36-38).

Love operates not from necessity, but because of an inner urge which will not be denied. The psalmist prays that his heart may be so inclined toward the Lord and so quickened within that he may be eager to do the will of God.

Love has a technique, if you will, a manner of operation. It avoids certain things which would hinder or prevent its full function and seeks out those attitudes and experiences which will encourage and enlarge.

Covetousness must be avoided, for that is idolatry (Col. 3:5). We noted in our lesson of two weeks ago that covetousness makes a man stingy, envious, selfish, proud and foolish. That means that love must rule out this destructive element. Love cannot live in such an atmosphere.

Love turns away from vanity. The vain things of this world are usually presented in such attractive dress that to look at them is to be tempted. The answer is to turn your eyes away, or better still, ask God to give you special grace not only to turn away, but to stay turned away. The vain passions of this world destroy real love, even while using the word to describe their base counterfeit.

The positive side of the matter is also clear. The manner in which love best expresses itself is in the fear of God, in the established order of a life according to the law of God (v. 36). By being inclined to his testimonies it finds the right way—God's way (v. 37).

III. The Measure of Love (Matt. 5:43-48).

How far does love go? Does it have a limit? Does it choose those toward whom it will express itself? Loving the lovely and ignoring the hateful the rest? In answer to these questions let us first ask, What is the general attitude of the world? The answer is evident. The world has established its own principle of conduct based on selfish advantage. It pays to be polite to those who can favor you, so cultivate their good will by acts of courtesy and kindness. Your neighbor may be able to help you in an hour of need, so do good to him as you have opportunity.

But an enemy—what can you gain by kindness to him? Hate him, treat him like an enemy.
