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

LESSON FOR FEBRUARY 23

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THE GOOD SHEPHERD

LESSON TEXT—John 10:1-18. MEMORY SELECTION—I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep.—John 10:11.

An open door! How inviting! Jesus had just been talking to the man once blind (John 9) who had seen the temple door closed against him. It shut him out from all the sacred traditions of his people, but it turned him to Jesus, who presents himself in our lesson as "the door of the sheep."

I. The Door of the Sheep (vv. 7-10). The preceding verses of chapter 10 are important, for they identify Jesus as the true Shepherd. He speaks of his people as his sheep.

Flocks were sometimes kept in the field at night, as was the case on the night when Jesus was born in Bethlehem. But originally they were brought into a sheepfold, where many flocks gathered for protection. A shepherd was on guard at the door. Thieves would climb the wall to steal sheep, but the true shepherds, when they came in the morning to lead forth their flocks, entered by the door. They called out their own flock by name.

It is said that only sick sheep will follow a stranger, which may explain why so many false Jesus of our day appeal to the sick and lead them away from the Good Shepherd.

Do you know his blessed voice? Have you responded to his call? Will you follow him? Decide now.

Consider the beautiful figure of the shepherd as the door of the sheepfold. When the sheep enter the fold to rest, he is the door. When they are ready to go out to feed in green pastures again, he is the door.

Note that they go in and out. Belonging to Christ is not bondage. If any man enters in by Christ, the door, he is free to go in and out, to find pasture, to live for and to serve him.

"The Door"—what a striking figure! It is a means of entry, the only way in. Every door has two sides and the side we are on determines whether we are inside or outside—saved or lost. Children often say:

"One Door and only one. And yet its structure two—Inside and outside. On which side are you?" Then repeating the two first lines comes the direct testimony, and question, "I am on the inside. On which side are you?"

II. The Keeper of the Sheep (vv. 11-13).

We think of sheep as peacefully grazing on the hillside—an idyllic picture in the summer sunshine. But there were dangers to meet. It is so with Christ's sheep too, and then he is there to keep them. The wolves come out as the shadows gather. They come to kill and to scatter. Where then is the shepherd? If he is only a hireling, serving for what may "be in it" for him, he will flee.

How perfectly this pictures religious leaders, who, in spite of their swelling words and ingratiating manners, desert the flock in the hour of adversity. Fair-weather friends are they, who disappear when darkness and danger appear.

In the darkest hour Jesus is nearest at hand. He never fails. He has no fear, for has he not tasted the bitter death of Cavalry's tree for you and me? He is the Good Shepherd. He gave his life for the sheep. Those who have put their trust in him shall never be put to shame.

III. The Saviour of the Sheep (vv. 14-18).

He laid down his life for the sheep. Ah, yes, it is all too true that evil men laid wicked hands on him and crucified him. Their guilt is awful. But it is clear from Scripture that until the hour had come for Jesus to be made sin for the redemption of man, they could not touch him (see Luke 4:29, 30; John 8:59).

When the time came, Christ laid down his life in accord with "the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God" (Acts 2:23). He died for us, not as a martyr to a cause, or the victim of an accident or miscarriage of justice, but willingly, and for the glory of God.

Yes, he died for us, but he also died for every lost soul who will hear his voice. There are "other sheep" about whom the Lord is deeply concerned. Are we?

He "must bring" them—but remember, God works through yielded

co. The measures would allow our experts in The Bureau of Animal Husbandry to operate in Mexico, cooperate with Mexican officials, and join in any program that can be devised. The big job will be to get full cooperation on the other side of the river where the menace of the disease is not so fully recognized as it is in this country. However, reports are encouraging, and our experts think they can get the job done with enough money and time.

A number of Texans have been in Washington pushing the foot-and-mouth legislation and attending to other business. From the King Ranch came ex-Congressman Dick Kleberg and from Galveston came Dolph Briscoe and his son, Dolph Jr., accompanied by their wives. The Briscoes attended committee hearings and conferences in the state and agriculture departments.

The hearings on labor legislation are continuing and will not be concluded before the middle of March. Hundreds have requested permission to be heard by our Committee. Already we have heard scores of stories of extortion and virtual robbery by strikers led by radical union leaders. This is especially true right now in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and New York, where the Teamsters Union has been operating in a most ruthless manner, demanding that their terms be met or the victims' businesses would be closed. The Union leaders, when they go into action, import hundreds of professional pickets who are tough and vicious. They then terrorize the business man, and often even the community. Stockades are set up if an attempt is made to resume business, employees are set upon and beaten, trucks are wrecked and sometimes burned, and right now in the Pittsburgh area scores of fire and explosive bombs are being used by the strikers and their imported gangsters. Until you listen to these stories of violence and terror, it is not easy to fully comprehend how ruthless and mad with power some of these union bosses are. They must be dealt with by effective labor legislation which we hope to secure during this session of Congress.

Mr. W. D. Terry, who ranches south of Gouldbusk, is the first producer in Coleman County to take advantage of the assistance offered by the AAA on a new practice, the construction of spreader dams. After two of these dams were constructed Mr. Terry readily saw the value of the practice and has just completed 27 from such dams, which range in size from 200 cubic yard to 650 cubic yard, and are so built that the water will be slowed down and spread over a large area completely stopping all soil losses and insuring more grass over a longer period.

A number of systems of these spreader dams are being worked out on W. Ford Barnes ranch south of Santa Anna. Mr. Barnes is anxious to save all the water and stop erosion.

Producers in Coleman County are becoming more conscious each day of soil losses. Numerous request for assistance are being filed by the AAA on mesquite elimination, terracing, diversion

National and International News Hi-Lights of the Week

The Senate judiciary committee voted 9-1 Monday for a proposed constitutional amendment to limit presidential tenure to two full terms of four years each.

Chairman Wiley told reporters the committee made two changes in a similar resolution already passed by the house.

1. Under resolution voted by the Senate committee, if a president had served less than one year he would be eligible for an additional two full terms.

2. The Senate measure would require ratification by conventions in three-fourths of the states, rather than by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The government sold its Big and Little Inch pipelines for \$143,127,000 Friday to carry natural gas to the East.

The War Assets Administration snapped up the offer by the Texas Eastern Transmission Corporation of Houston only \$2,700,000 short of what the line cost to build and Administrator Robert M. Littlejohn expressed hope the company would take over May 1.

Gen. Eisenhower, army chief of staff, has flatly rejected efforts by Republican friends in his home state of Kansas to draw him into the race for the GOP presidential nomination in 1948.

It was stated that Eisenhower has met all arguments with the assertion that he does not want to be president. He said that he does not believe a military commander should occupy the presidency.

United States government Sunday asked the United Nations to designate the chains of Japanese mandate islands in the Pacific as a "strategic area."

The United States asks that the whole area, including most of the Marshalls and Marianas be placed "United Nations Trusteeship with the United States as administrator."

The House swung a double-edged economy ax on OPA Tuesday and Price Chief Max C. Coughlin said promptly that similar Senate action would result

in collapse of rent control and sugar rationing by Friday.

The House:

1. Ignored OPA's plea for \$5,900,000 to continue its few remaining activities until June 30.
2. Voted to demand a refund of \$9,000,000 already in the agency's possession.

American farmers would be assured an average farm price of about \$1 to \$1.30 a bushel for wheat sold in foreign markets under a proposed four or five-year international wheat agreement made public Tuesday.

The agreement will be submitted to a London conference of major wheat exporting and importing countries, beginning March 18, it would not govern the domestic price.

The document was drafted by an international wheat council organized before the war to combat world surpluses.
