This writer certainly was thankful when I learned that the Chamber of Commerce had decided to appoint a committee to work on the City Garbage Pick-Up and Disposal. I have been trying to get someone to give me a little assistance in trying to get it over for a long time, and now is the time for every citizen to get behind the committee that has been appointed and tell them that you are for this project one hundred per cent.

Every day or so for the past eight or 10 months I have had different ones to tell me that they wished I could get this over and that they were for it. Now, I would like for each person that has told me they were for it, to contact one of the men that are on the committee and tell them that you would like to see this project go through.

This project will have to go through the City Commission, but if there are enough citizens that are in favor of this city having a pick-up and disposal that will keep your place clean, the City Commission will act on this project and it will be put through.

It has not been decided just how it will be presented as yet. However, the committee is at work on it and within a short time it will be presented to you as citizens of Santa Anna.

Let me suggest that each of you give this a lot of thought. Think what it will mean to us as a city and what it will mean to you so far as sanitary conditions are concerned. It will mean the beginning of ridding the town of flies and mosquitoes and other disease carrying insects. The health of your family means more to each of you than anything else. This is one GOOD way to preserve the health of your family and so far as the cost of it will be, it will hardly be noticed and the benefits derived from it will be more valuable than all the costs can be. Give a lot of thought to this measure and when it is presented to you be ready to give the affirmative answer.

### Three Firemen At Texas A&M School

Fire Chief L. A. Welch, Fire Marshal Ben P. Vinson and Fire Captain Edwin H. Cox attended the five day Firemen's Training School at Texas A. & M. College July 20-25. Chief Welch took the instructors' course, Marshal Vinson took the Fire Marshals' course, and Captain Cox took the Basic Course on the Fundamentals of Fire Fighting. Santa Anna and all other towns that send firemen to this school receive a 3 per cent good credit rating on the fire insurance rate in the United States.

There were 539 firemen registered at this school, including five from Old Mexico, from Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma. The value of this school is becoming more widely known to the states in the south. There was an increase in the enrollment at this school of 184 men over last year. Fire Chief Welch states, "The school this year had the most competent instructors of any school I have attended and all of us, as the result, are better able to teach fire prevention and in case of fire, we are better able to fight it."

The school is offered each year and plans are being made for more of our local firemen to attend this school next year.

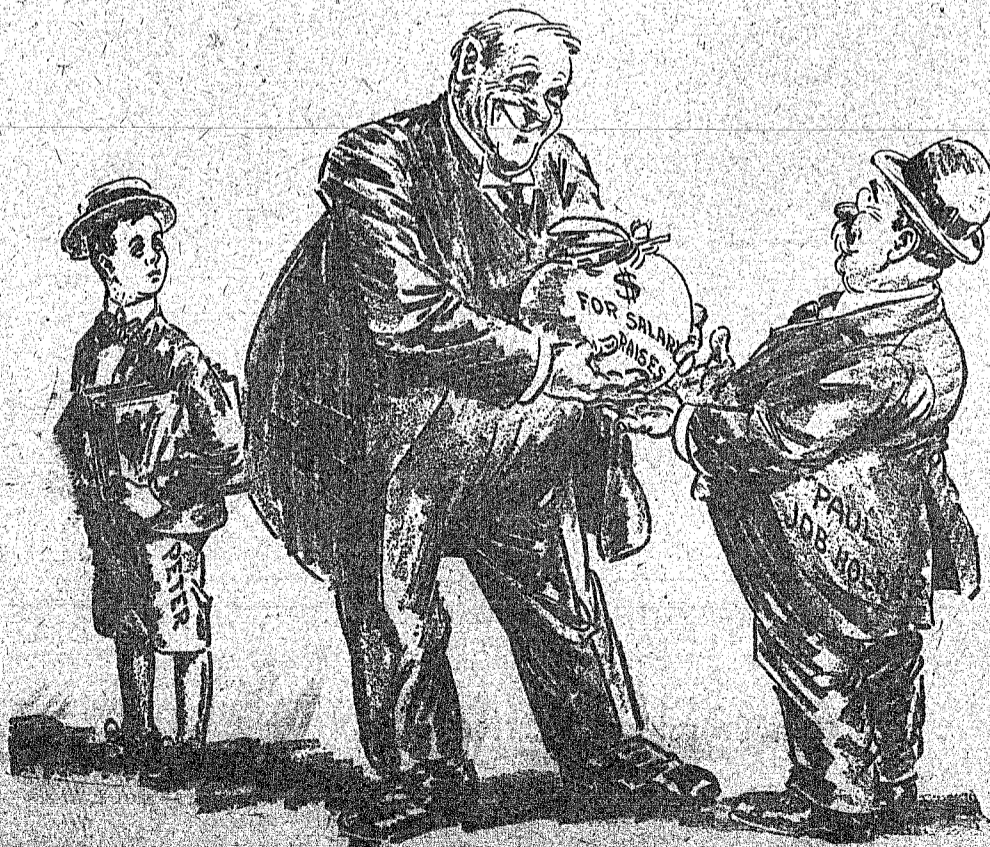

### Robbing Peter To Pay Paul



In the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Friday night discussions were held on the different improvements the Chamber of Commerce would undertake to put over in Santa Anna. The question of a city wide garbage pick up and disposal was immediately brought up and after a discussion on the matter, W. R. Mulroy, W. F. Barnes and E. R. Purdy were appointed as a committee by the president to go into a detailed study and find out just what could be done toward getting this garbage disposal into operation.

The second discussion to come up was the paving and putting gutters along the main street from the Burton-Lingo corner to the street that leads to the hospital. The Texas Highway Commission has proposed to the City of Santa Anna that "if the property owners along the main street of Santa Anna would put the curb along their property line they would pave the street from curb to curb". W. F. Barnes, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, has been doing a lot of work along this project and was authorized by the Chamber to continue this project and try to get all the property owners along the main street signed up to put their curb down. There are a number that have already signed their contracts and Mr. Barnes asks that all who have not signed be considering the matter. It will greatly increase the value of the property and would be a big help to the organizations in Santa Anna that are trying to improve the looks of our city. Mr. Barnes states that all property owners will be contacted in the very near future and he would like to have an affirmative answer from each of you.

Also along this same line the Chamber decided to try to get the street going to the cemetery paved. They have decided to start from the corner of Houston street and continue on Bowie street to the cemetery. The proposal has been offered to several property owners along Bowie street before and will now be offered to them again. All will be contacted. There are two breaks in the other pavement, one east of the City Hall and one from the corner of Hosh Groeery to the railroad, that the Chamber of Commerce will attempt to pave.



**NOTICE TO VIOLATORS OF CITY ORDINANCE No. 149**

It has come to the attention of the City Commission that persons are violating the City Ordinance regulating the use of the paved streets in Santa Anna.

Section 1 — City Ordinance No. 149 Reads:

That on and after the effective date of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person to operate or drive over and along or across any paved street within the city limits of the City of Santa Anna, any vehicle which has on its periphery any block, lug, stud, cleat, ridge, bead or any other protuberance of metal that shall project more than one-fourth of an inch beyond the tread or traction surface of the tire or rim, unless the said wheels of such vehicle are protected by bands, skids or some sufficient device to protect the street against injury by reason thereof.

Section 2 states that violators shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100.

**44 ways To get "Something for Nothing"**

The railroads have received 44 "rules" demands from the leaders of the operating unions... representing engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen. They say they are seeking only changes in working conditions—NOT a wage increase.

Additional equipment, yards, and other facilities required to take care of these short trains would cost hundreds of millions. What the Union leaders really want is to make more jobs.

The Union leaders demand that when a crew in one class of service perform incidental service of another class, they will be paid not less than a day's pay for each class, even though all service is performed as a part of the same day's work.

The Union leaders demand that the present basic day for passenger conductors and trainmen be reduced from 150 to 100 miles, which would have the effect of increasing their pay 50%. Such a run often takes only two or three hours!

**You Can't Afford This Waste**

Demands like these are against the interests of the whole American people, who depend on railroad service for nearly everything they eat, wear and use.

These rules would cost A BILLION DOLLARS annually—a gigantic waste which neither the railroads nor the country can afford.

Railroad workers are good citizens and good employees, with pride in their calling. Their record during the war was outstanding. We do not believe they fully understand the "featherbed" rules which the Union leaders are demanding. 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# SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

## Our Responsibility in Influencing Family Life

LESSON TEXT FOR AUGUST 3—Proverbs 18, 9; 6:20-23; 17:6; 19:18; 22:6; 23:22-29.

MEMORY SELECTION—Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it.—Proverbs 22:6.

TRUTH must be translated into living, and there is no place where it can be more effective than in the home. We will want to make much of this lesson, for it is the only one during the entire year which deals directly with the home. The book of Proverbs, to which we were introduced last Sunday, abounds in practical advice with a definitely spiritual emphasis, a combination of one wholesome and effective. This is the first of eight lessons making application of Proverbs to the problems of modern life.

Everyone in the home has a measure of responsibility for making the family life what it ought to be. No one from the small child to the great-grandmother is without influence, and each must contribute to the welfare of the home. Our lesson reaches from the young person to the grandfather rejoicing in his children's children. It begins quite properly with

I. Youth Looking to Parents (1:8; 9; 6:20-23; 23:22-26).

YOUNG people want to be well-dressed and properly groomed. They are interested in that which adorns and improves their appearance. It is right that they should have such concern. Let us remind them, however, that a young man or woman should not only be physically well-groomed, but spiritually attractive as well. If we should give as much thought to that side of our beings as we do to our bodies, there would be wonderful improvement in the life of the individual and in the home.

The child who is properly instructed, and who is responsive to that instruction, is prepared for life no matter where it may lead him (6:22). Wherever and whenever he needs guidance, night or day, it is with him. Even when he sleeps, he is in the hand of God for blessing.

Let no young man or woman be betrayed into that awful folly of our day which neglects the teaching of parents and of the church. Disaster is ahead on that road—sure disaster, and swift!

But now look at the other side of the matter, where we see

II. Parents Looking After Youth (19:18; 22:6).

THERE is a foolish idea current in our day which says that the way to rear children is to let them develop according to their own interests and instincts, without discipline or definite guidance.

The fruits of that kind of child training are now being harvested in the present crop of juvenile delinquents. We have the sad and awful proof before us that children cannot be reared that way.

We are not pleading for a return to the unduly restrictive measures of some of our forefathers; children are not helped by harshness or cruelty. But there is a proper place for definite instruction, for discipline, yes, even for chastening when that becomes necessary.

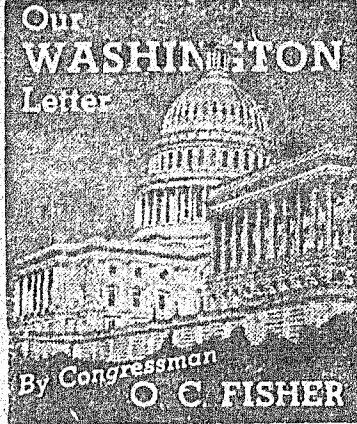
The larger part, and the most effective part, of this matter is the training of the child (22:6) and when properly done it brings forth the finest of results in later life. The boy who has been taught and directed right may get on a sidetrack for a time, but there is always the promise of a return to the right way.

This business of rearing children calls for the best any of us can put into it, and over and above that, all the grace and wisdom that God can and will give us.

We have reserved one verse for our final point, for here we find

III. Age and Youth Working Together (17:6).

OLD men need encouragement, and they receive it in no richer or more satisfying measure than in the delight they take in their children's children. Young people should remember that, and not fail to give to their grandparents, as well as their parents, the full measure of their interest



## Our WASHINGTON Letter

By Congressman O. C. FISHER

One of the hardest working Congresses in modern history ended its first session last week. The special interest pressure groups will find much fault with what was done. The same will be true of the isolationists who think America should ignore the rest of the world in planning the peace. The same is true of the pro-Russians like Henry Wallace, who think the Soviets should be encouraged to gobble up and communize most of Europe.

In this column next week will appear a brief summary of this session's accomplishments and some of its failures. task of investigating racketeering in connection with the marketing and distribution of food. Many complaints from that area have come in, and the investigation may expose some very bad practices that call for legislation where intrastate commerce is involved.

On the last day of the session the House passed the wool bill and sent it on to the White House. It continues the purchase program through 1948 at the same prices that were paid for 146.

Our fear is that the State Department will reduce the wool tariff later this year. The present tariff on wool brings in about \$130 million a year in revenue. President Truman, when recently asked about a possible reduction in the tariff, discounted that likelihood. But it remains a threat.

The agriculture appropriation was finally agreed upon last week. It provided for \$265 million for soil conservation practices this year, and contains a provision for this amount to be cut to \$150 million next year and no individual can receive more than \$500.

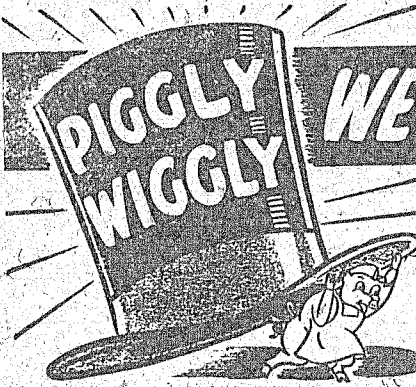

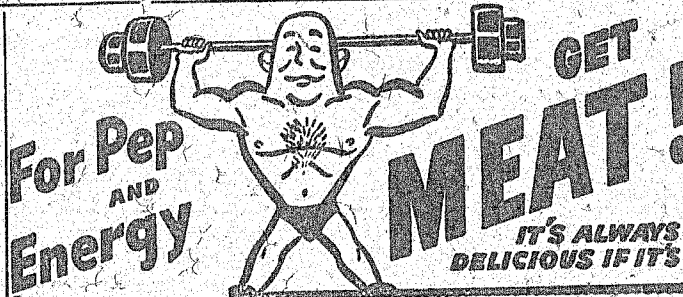
