W. E. Hall, Jr. Enters Race For District Attorney

W. E. (Bill) Hall, Jr., who is today announcing his candidacy for the office of District Attorney for the 119th Judicial District, is a practicing attorney in San Angelo with offices in the Rust Building. He was born in Temple, Bell County, and finished public schools there and is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin.

Hall was admitted to the bar in 1936 and entered general practice in Temple with his father under the old firm of Hall & Hall founded by his father and grandfather. He married Mary Hal Boyd of Waco in 1941 and moved to Runnels county where he operated a stock farm. In 1942 he volunteered for service in the Army Air Corps and served as an enlisted man in the capacity of training pilot and radio technician until 1945.

In 1947 Mr. and Mrs. Hall moved to San Angelo where he opened offices for the general practice of law and has since that time continued in active practice. Hall is 34 years of age, a member of the Methodist Church, The Exchange Club of San Angelo and the American Legion.

Hall has had experience in the active practice of law in both the state and Federal Courts and served on the Executive Committee of the State Bar Assn. for the investigation of unethical legal practice in Texas. He was admitted to practice before the U. S. District Court for the Western District of Texas in 1938 and in the same year licensed to practice in the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit. He has never sought a public office before. In announcing his candidacy Hall submits that he is fully capable and qualified to handle the office of District Attorney and stands for a fair and impartial prosecution for violation of the constitution and statutes of Texas. He is not a reformer nor a politician but promises his undivided effort and sober thought toward the discharge of the duties of this office.

W. R. Chambers Announces For Representative

TO THE VOTERS OF COLEMAN AND BROWN COUNTIES:

As many of you will recall, I served you as your Representative in the 46th, 47th, 48th and 49th sessions of the Legislature. The record I made is very well known.

I am led to believe that you approve the record some of the measures I introduced and guided to passage such as Soil Conservation, as amended, Rural Hospital, Tax on Natural Gas as amended, Tax on Insurance Companies as amended, a number of laws pertaining to agriculture, a law to govern the manufacturing and sale of insecticides and fungicides in Texas, Pure seed laws, etc.

For my position on public education, I believe that every superintendent, as well as teachers, whether they are supporting me or not, will testify that I supported every measure that was for the good of Public Schools.

I helped draw the Sadler Redistricting Bill and voted for its passage, as the Constitution required.

In the 47th Legislature the Old Age Pension was the paramount question. The problems of raising revenue to pay the pensions was difficult at that time.

The question was finally resolved by passing House Bill 8. Critics for the Bill argued the Bill would not raise enough money to pay one third of the States' Pensions.

The revenue raised by virtue of this Bill has run Texas very well. Not only has it met the expense of State Government, but a deficit of \$30,000,000 has been paid. House Bill 8 proved to be a good tax bill.

The three major problems that we face now, as I see it, that is if the world remains at peace, are Public Education, Conservation of all resources and Highways including a system of Rural Roads.

Voters, if you employ me to work for you again at Austin, I promise you to be about your business.

This means the last general election in November and not the election in July. The convention may select more or fewer delegates than the number to which it is entitled, but those selected shall cast the exact number of votes at the county convention, as the precinct is entitled.

The precinct convention is held the following Tuesday which this year will be May 4th.

Every democrat that has paid his poll tax, or has an exemption certificate is eligible to attend this precinct convention. Poll tax receipts or exemption certificates must be shown at the convention. All who are present, provided they are party members and qualified voters, are entitled to vote.

She is survived by two sons, six daughters and five sisters, one of which is Mrs. Lee Baugh of Santa Anna.

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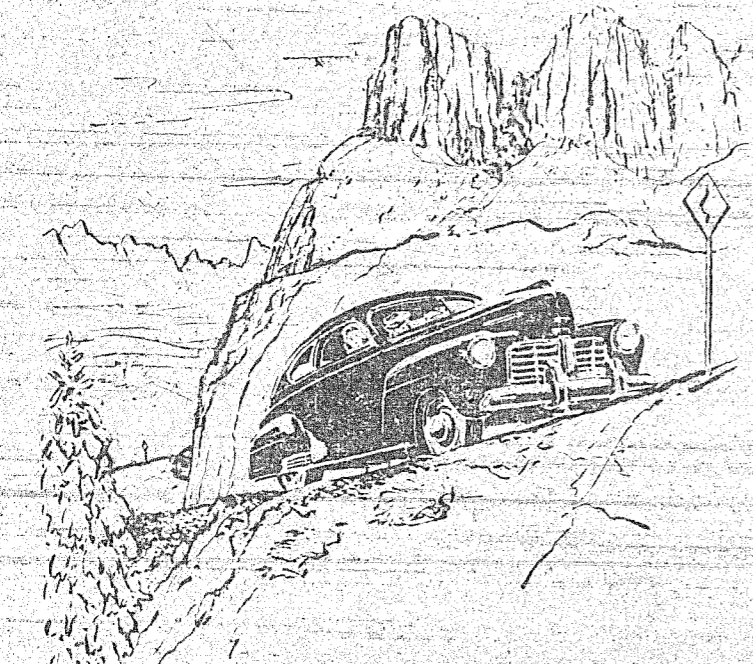
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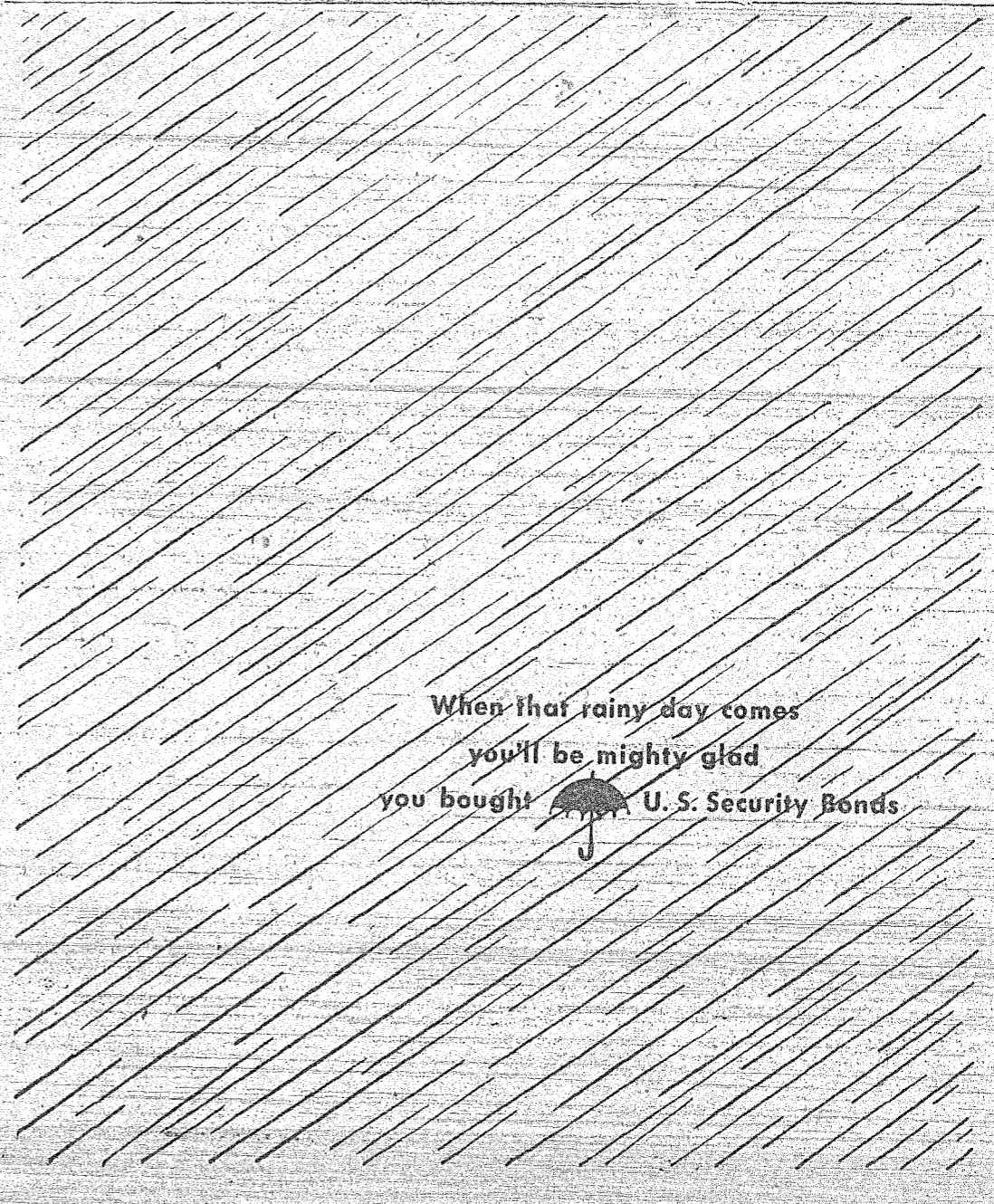

At a meeting of the City Commission held Thursday April 8th, a resolution was passed regulating the use of water.

This resolution provides the following rules and regulations.

- (1) After April 15th, 1948, it shall be unlawful to use water for the washing of cars, the sprinkling of lawns or gardens or for any other purpose other than strict domestic use is prohibited.
- (2) That the rates to be charged for water beginning on the Meter Reading date of April 15th, and on bills due June 1st, 1948, will be as follows:

All Over 2000 Gallons At 50c per 1000 Gallons
- (3) That any consumer using water for any use other than domestic consumption shall have his service dis-connected without further notice.

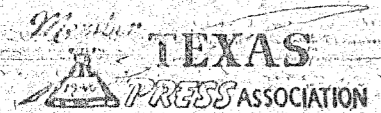

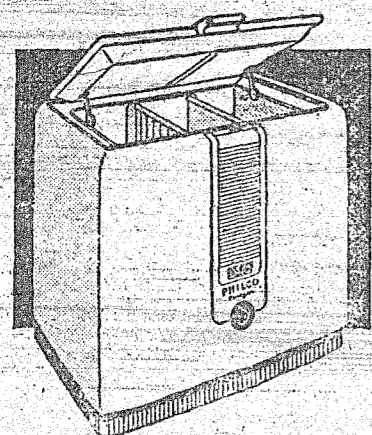

The F. F. A. boys wish to thank the Hotel Coffee Shop for donating the coffee and to thank their mothers, who sent the pies. The entire affair was a big success.

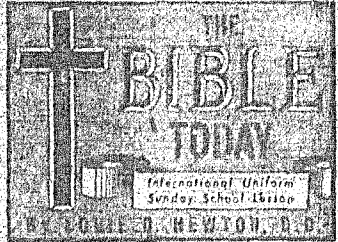

PERSONAL PRAYERS: Psalm 144

Zechariah Pleads For Righteousness

Lesson for April 25, 1948

ZEHARIAH almost certainly was born and reared in or near Babylon, and was trained for the priesthood and ordained of the Lord as a prophet. His father, Berechiah, was the son of Iddo, the prophet. Though much younger than Haggai, about whom we studied last Sunday, Zechariah began his ministry only two months later than Haggai's ministry which was to sum up the people's righteousness as a condition essential in the rebuilding of the temple and in cleansing themselves of idolatry if they were to show off the glory of their God. The student will wish to read the entire Book of Zechariah to have the background for this lesson. Also Psalm 24:1-6.

LIVING TOGETHER IN GOD'S WAY
WHEN you think of the Lord of hosts, and I will turn unto you," Zechariah 1:3. People cannot live together in peace and harmony until first they are on speaking terms with God. The insidious onslaught of secularism was weakening the Jews at the very moment when they needed to be strong and united for the task of rebuilding the temple and restoring their life in Jerusalem. Read further into the prophecy of Zechariah and note the admonitions of the Lord for kindness one toward another, kindness and understanding and sincerity, which are the indispensable qualities of community life.

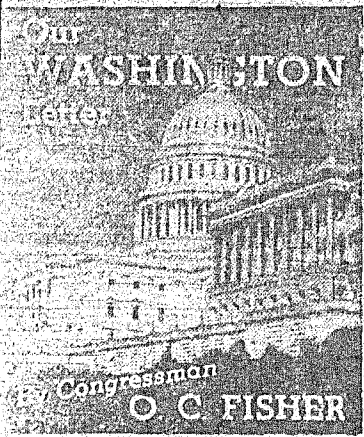
WHAT MAKES A PEOPLE GREAT?
ZEHARIAH reminds the people that the downfall of their fathers had been due to their forgetfulness of God. He calls them now to repentance of their own sins, that they become truly a great people. "Fear not, but let your hands be strong," Zechariah 4:13. "What makes a nation great and strong?" "Not brick, nor stone, nor wood, but justice, love and brotherhood." Boys and girls will do well to look again at what this old prophet was saying. We long to see the United States a truly great nation. Then let us be strong in the Lord.

GOD HAS A STANDARD
READ chapter seven, verses 8-14, and 8:16-17, for some of the standards which God sets up for his people. "Execute true judgment, and show kindness and compassion every man to his brother. Oppress not the widow, the orphan, the foreigner, or the poor, and never plot evil in your hearts against one another."

Zechariah is here epitomizing the Ten Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount. All of which is to remind us today that we do not need new standards. We simply need to conform to God's eternal standards.

GOD IS TO BE SOUGHT UNTO
THE first eight chapters of Zechariah have to do with the essential qualities of life if the people are to rebuild the temple. The last six chapters deal with the general standards of life which we must accept and strive to attain if we are to be well-pleasing unto him. I like the phrase of the fathers, "God is to be sought unto." And how are we to come into the presence of the Lord? "He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart, who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully." Psalms 24:4.

It was not enough to rebuild the temple. God wanted his people to become living stones of integrity and fidelity in the city of God. This we shall attain only as we seek first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness—constantly seek this daily walk with the Lord, in the light of his word. "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people."

requirements in aviation. A report was made and the 70-group program was strongly recommended. Moreover, a Joint House Senate Committee made a similar study and made a similar recommendation.

This bill had my active support. In my judgment, the United States should have and maintain the strongest air force in the world. As the situation now stands, we are lagging considerably behind Soviet Russia in air power. The 70-group program will not only vastly strengthen our regular air force but will also benefit our Air National Guard and our Air Reserve both of which are very essential components of our Air Force setup.

The Finletter Report, in recommending the pressing need for a stronger air force for our national security, made the solemn warning that "even the most optimistic view of the United Nations" does not secure us "that the world organization will develop in time the necessary authority to prevent another great war."

We know if there should, unhappily, be another full-scale war, the United States will undoubtedly be the first target. We must be prepared to meet such attack with devastating force. In the last two wars good fortune was on our side in that we had allies to hold the enemy in check until we could prepare ourselves for action. We will never have that advantage again if we should be forced into a war. Therefore, while Soviet Russia is making warlike moves, we had better keep prepared.

We must be prepared for war if we are to win in the struggle for peace.

Pete Gulley Visits
Our friend, Pete Gulley, came to Washington a few days ago from his home in Uvalde to testify before a Senate committee. Mr. Gulley is Secretary of the Texas Angora Goat Raisers' Association and is well known at goat and other Texas livestock sales for his prowess as an auctioneer.

Before the Senate Committee he had occasion to educate Senator Tobey of New Hampshire on the ins-and-outs of the angora goat business. The Senator has a farm in New Hampshire and seems to be seeking a means of getting rid of some underbrush. After the hearing he was a much more enlightened Senator.

Herb Sorrell Forgets
Not long ago in this column I mentioned the case of one Harold Christoffel, who directed the Communist-inspired CIO strike at Allis-Chalmers. When he appeared before our Committee investigating that strike he swore he was not and had not been a Communist. He was indicted for perjury and the Government proved to the satisfaction of the jury that he was a Commie, and he sat from two to six years.

There is a good chance of an indictment being returned against one Herbert K. Sorrell of Hollywood, who swore before our committee the other day that he is not a Communist and said a Communist Party card receipt which we had allegedly signed by him as "Herbert Stewart" was a forgery. So samples of his handwriting were sent

down to the FBI and they reported that Herbert Sorrell signed that name "Herbert Stewart". So, watch for an indictment for perjury.

Sorrell, 50, an ex-prize fighter of the AFL Conference of Studio Unions in Hollywood. He has been a central figure in the long and bitter movie strike out there, which our Committee has been investigating. Don't ever doubt it there are plenty of Communists in Hollywood.
