Big Spring Man For Associate Justice Of The Court Of Civil Appeals

Seeking advancement from a district court bench he has oc-cupled for ten years, Cecil C. Collings has announced his candidacy for associate justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 11th judicial district, (Eastland).
Collings already has started a

tour of the 23-county district, and said he plans to visit all points in behalf of his candidacy before the July Democratic primary.

The Big Spring judge is presenting a record of public service that dates back 20 years. He has been a resident of Big Spring since March, 1928, In 1934 he was elected district attorney of the 70th judicial district, and then was elevated to the district bench in 1938. He was reelected in 1942 and in 1946.
