### VOTE SATURDAY, JULY 24

All persons wishing to see the representative should call promptly at 1:00 p.m., as Mr. Fisher will remain at the office for only a short time.

## Hico Udaley Discusses Hog And Cattle Raising

Hico Udaley, hog and dairy specialist from Universal Mills, Fort Worth, was in Santa Anna last Thursday night and made a talk to 40 members of the Santa Anna and Rockwood-Veterans Vocational Agriculture classes. His primary subject was care and feeding of hogs.

Mr. Udaley stated that under the present price of feeds and the high market for pork, a person can make a profit of from 20 to 30 percent on hogs. He said 100 pounds of pork could be produced from 350 pounds of feed.

### Care of Hogs

Mr. Udaley stated that hogs must have a balanced ration. In the early days hogs grazed in open pastures and on acorns etc. Nature furnished them with a balanced ration and in this respect, the hog is no different today from the early day hog. He must have a balanced ration, including minerals and salt.

Shade is recommended for hogs in this section. The shade should be built high so that breeze can pass through it and crude oil should be used on the ground under the shade and around it. Mr. Udaley stated that a hog would drink 15 times each day if a plentiful supply of fresh water was kept before them at all times.

He also recommended using a self feeder. The feeder should be put in the shade and should be kept filled at all times. A hog will eat day and night and will balance their own ration if the proper feed is before them.

He also stated that the tail should be left on the hog. It is a good way to tell if he is getting the proper feeds. If the tail has a tight curl in it, the hog is in good shape. If the tail is hanging straight down, there is something wrong with the hog.

### Brood Sows

Mr. Udaley recommended that you do not get a good brood sow too fat. He said to use a mixture of 40 percent ground alfalfa hay with 60 percent grain for their ration. He said to let the sow wean their own pigs and to keep them sucking until they are 10 weeks old if possible.

### Cattle on Range

Mr. Udaley stated that cattle on the range should also receive a balanced ration, especially if the range is dry, as it is in this part of the country. The ration should contain cotton seed meal, soy bean and linseed meal plus carbohydrates and grain with vitamin A added.

He recommended that cattle have a supplement with plenty of salt and mineral. The range in this section has a deficiency in minerals and a better calf crop can be expected when minerals are used. He also said not to overload the range.

### SCHOOL TRANSFERS DUE THIS MONTH

Parents of children living in school districts where their grades will not be taught next school term have been slow in making application for transfer to other districts. County Superintendent D. E. Loveless said today.

July is the only month when transfers may be made, he said. Parents or guardians should make application for such transfers at the county superintendent's office in Coleman, or the school superintendent's office at the Santa Anna High School.

## Hanz Outlines Platform For Attorney Race

Formally announcing his candidacy for 119th district attorney, Marvin Hanz yesterday issued a statement outlining a program for public participation in effective law enforcement.

The San Angelo attorney, seeking the prosecutor position serving Tom Green, Concho, Coleman and Tompkins Counties, set out the following platform and outline of law enforcement participation:

"1. The support and establishment of the Texas Prison Reform system as requested by the general manager of the Texas Prison System. Such legislation has a direct influence on the exercise of the district attorney's office.

### FOR RANCH PROJECT

"2. The support and establishment of the West Texas Boys' Club Ranch and other constructive and corrective youth programs. An ounce of prevention is worth pounds of prosecution by district and county attorneys.

"3. The unbiased and unprejudiced service of grand jurors and petit jurors. No man should promise to and willfully get on a jury if he can not serve honestly and fairly and no prosecutor should accept any such man on a jury whether he be prejudiced for or against prosecutor. Our constitution guarantees us a fair and speedy trial and that means every man is entitled to that right. You should see that such guarantee is protected.

"4. The certainty of punishment (Paid Political Adv. — Reprint from San Angelo Times)

should be the primary criteria and not necessarily the severity of the punishment. I am not opposed to the suspended sentence law and feel that it is well founded for persons who have never first offenders and have not perpetrated heinous crimes to be given a chance for correction under the surveillance of the district court.

### CO-OPERATION GOAL

"5. Close co-operation between the several district attorneys whose jurisdiction is concurrent and the four county attorneys in the district and the several sheriffs and other law enforcement officers. Proper apprehension is as important as proper prosecution.

"6. Support of the constructive revision by the legislature of the Code of Criminal Procedure. Such revisions should afford a more speedy trial and appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

"It is my opinion that it is the duty of the district attorney to bring out the issues that will assist him in the exercise of his office and to actively support those issues. I personally endorse and support the above programs and believe that the office of the district attorney should add the needed force and support of such programs. Statistics will show that the majority of the criminals are below the age of 25 years.

"For good citizenship and good government I earnestly solicit your support of the above programs and objectives.

### RUNNELS NATIVE

"I believe honesty, sincerity and good judgment of the district attorney without the indulgence in personalities in the application of the criminal laws of our state is a boon to our democratic form of government. That basically is a statement of the objectives for which I stand and on which I ask your support in seeking this office of great trust and responsibility. I would greatly appreciate your vote and your sincere influence in my campaign for district attorney."

Mr. Hanz was born in Runnels County, and attended the Ballinger High School, San Angelo Junior College and the University of Texas Law School. In 1940 he began practicing law in Ballinger. In 1941, he was called into the Army and served for over four years during which time he was stationed in India, Australia and in the United States.

After being discharged from the service in 1945 Hanz began practicing law in San Angelo and has maintained offices in the McBurnett Building since that time.

He has been active in local veteran and civic clubs since his arrival in San Angelo and has supported several constructive programs for the betterment of San Angelo and its territory.

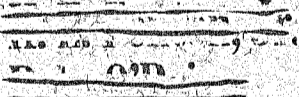

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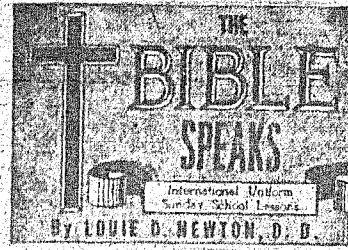

Jonathan, Loyal Friend  
Lesson for July 25, 1948

WE might term this a lesson on the facets of friendship. Rarely will one come upon such a splendid example of friendship in all literature. Coleridge put it well when he wrote, "Friendship is a sheltering tree." Diogenes Laertius, writing on Aristotle, says "He was once asked what a friend is, and his answer was, 'One soul abiding in two bodies.'"



Such was the friendship of Jonathan and David—a sheltering tree—one soul abiding in two bodies. Although Jonathan's father attempted at least ten times to kill David, Jonathan was drawn to David, with whose soul he was knit.

The record of this friendship is found in our scripture and devotional readings for the lesson with the golden text from Proverbs 17:17, "A friend loveth at all times."

A PRINCE SHARES WITH A SHEPHERD

JONATHAN was the crown prince of Israel. David was a shepherd boy. Saul expected to place Jonathan on the throne. God had selected David.

Jonathan would, no doubt, have made a better king than Saul, his father, but he had no desire to be king when he discovered the kindly qualities in his friend, David. Not once did Jonathan ever indicate any disappointment in not becoming king.

JONATHAN STANDS UP FOR HIS FRIEND

WHEN Saul openly plotted the death of David, Jonathan begged his father to reconsider his course and spare the life of the man who had killed Goliath and had proved himself the valiant friend of Saul. This was the final test of Jonathan's sacrificial love for David. He might have remained silent, thus aiding in the death of the one man who stood between him and the throne. But Jonathan was made of the stout texture which counts no sacrifice too dear for a friend. He was willing to stand up and be counted when it meant that he would not become king. Thus we see that true friendship is not always easy. It usually is very costly, but it pays big dividends in the coin of eternal wealth.

FRIENDSHIP THAT COSTS

AND like as Jonathan stood up and witnessed his lasting friendship for David, at a very great cost, so are we today summoned to this enabling type of friendship for Christ. "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you," he once said.

Young people find it rather costly to be loyal friends of Christ today. There are many siren voices that invite young people to take the low road—social drinking, gambling devices of one sort and another, satisfaction of sensual desires; but the true friend of Christ will withstand these voices, choosing rather the high road of Christian gentleness.

SACRIFICIAL FRIENDSHIP

"FRIENDSHIP is the loveliest flower in the garden of humanity," according to my cherished friend, Dr. Hight C. Moore. I would add this thought—true friendship flowers in the garden of humanity, but it finds its life in the Garden of God's Perfect Eden.

I have not known one single friendship that has impressed me that did not stem from above. "How can two walk together except they be agreed?" And the only cement that will hold human hearts together—one soul in two bodies—is the grace of God.

"Friendship is as God, who gives and asks no payment," said Richard Hovey, and not until the human will is yielded to the will of God, even as was the will of Jonathan, can sacrificial friendship come to flower and to harvest.

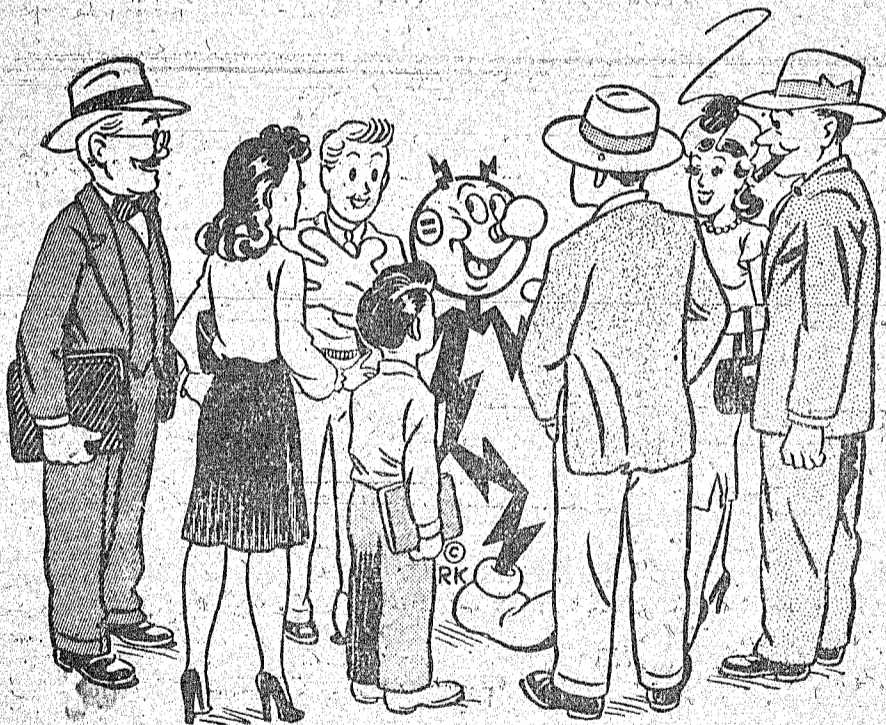

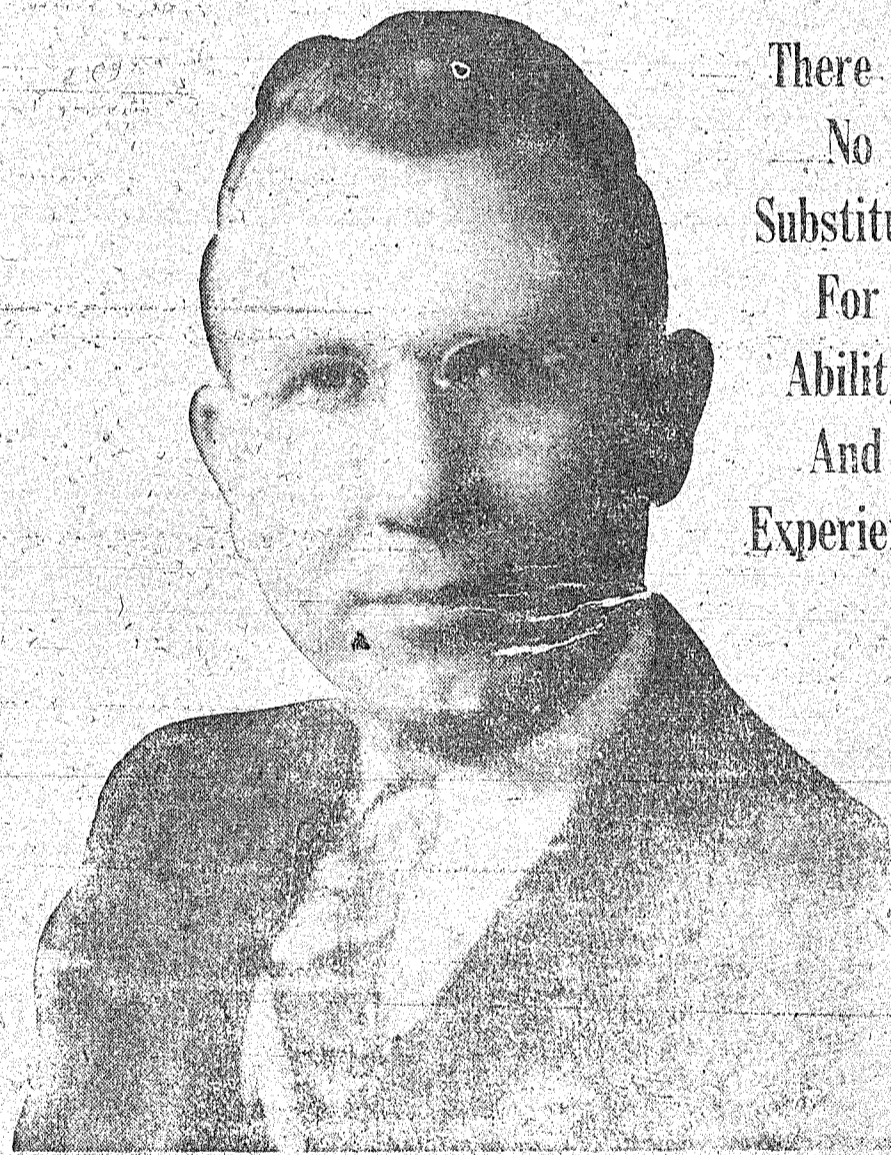
